

INTERVENTION IN MEXICO URGED IN RESOLUTION IN THE SENATE

NO REDUCTION IN TRAIN SERVICE INTO OIL FIELDS ANTICIPATED AT PRESENT

The fifty per cent reduction in train service which is being contemplated by the United States Railway Administration, press reports of which have appeared conspicuously for the last few days, will not likely affect the train service in the Ranger oil fields, according to Passenger and Freight Agnt. C. B. Jonz of the Texas and Pacific railway.

"Traffic in the oil fields is so heavy that it would not serve to conserve coal by removing any of our passenger or freight trains," Mr. Jonz said.

Henry Frick, Who Waged Life Long Struggle With Andrew Carnegie, Dies at New York

(By The Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Henry Clay Frick, steel magnate, died here today. The career of Henry Clay Frick, former one of the most fascinating characters in the romance of industry in the United States. At 10, a son on a farm in a family of only ordinary means, he was, at 60, a man so many millions that his fortune, those of Carnegie and Rockefeller, was largely a matter of guesswork even to himself. It has been estimated he was worth more than \$100,000,000, perhaps as much as \$200,000,000.

Mr. Frick built up the greatest business in the world, and acquired such vast interests in steel that he was also one of the principal agents in that industry, and in ending out his career he became known as one of the world's greatest factors of master paintings. Through the homestead strike of 1902, Mr. Frick came into national prominence. Differences had arisen between the Carnegie Steel company and its employes over a wage scale, culminating in a strike involving thousands of men; the calling out of National Guard and the proclamation of martial law. It was at this time, July 22, 1892, that Alexander Berkman, a New York anarchist, tried to assassinate Mr. Frick. Berkman walked into Mr. Frick's office, drew a revolver and fired, the bullet lodging in Mr. Frick's neck. Mr. Frick was shot a second time and then grappled with Berkman. During the encounter Mr. Frick was stabbed three times, but he downed his assailant and held him until the police arrived. Berkman was tried and sent to the Western penitentiary in Pittsburg for twenty-one years.

The secretary of war was authorized under a resolution introduced by senator Ashurst to use military forces on the American side of the border, to suppress the activities of the Mexican outlaws and other beligerent factions in the republic.

If this be true, and it probably is true of many other American cities, the authorities should remove these poisonous servants of the public with such unceremonious celerity as would convince them that this nation long refuses to shelter and support enemies, great or small, of the republic.

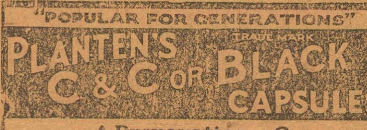

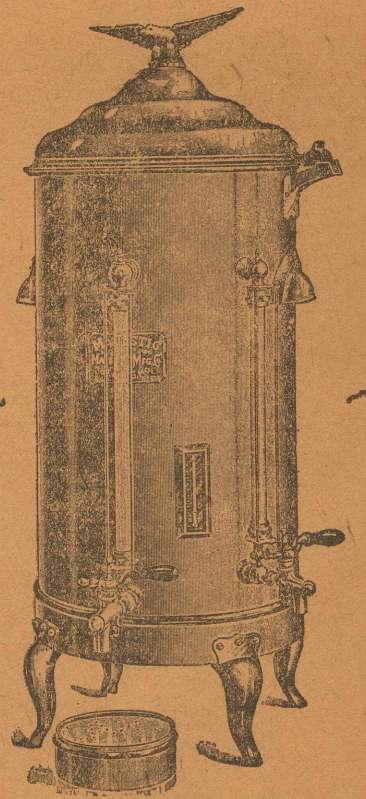

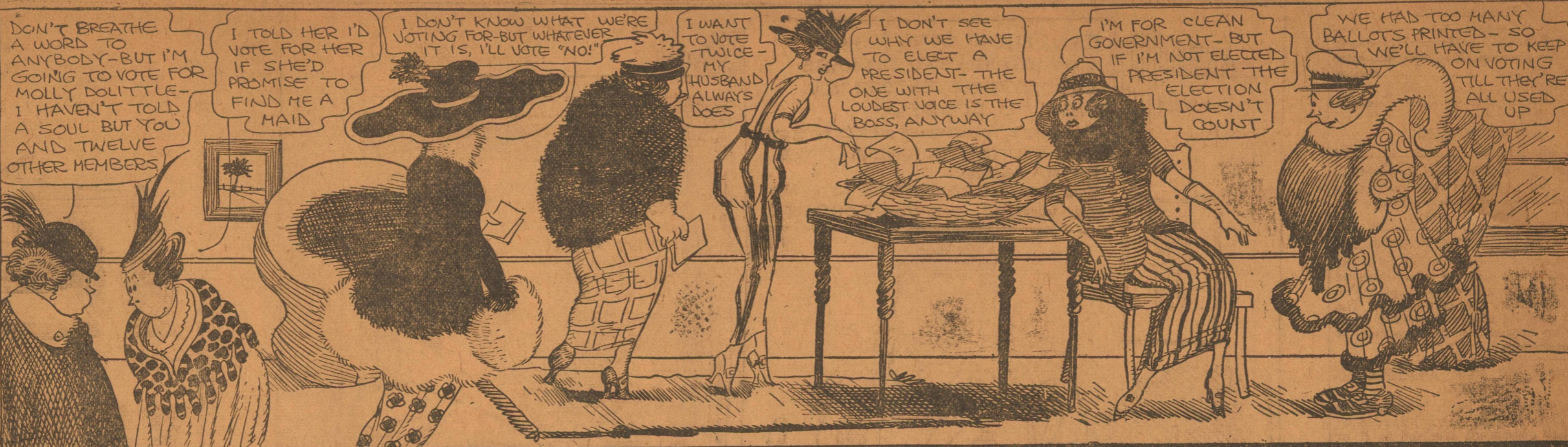

Baptists Will Have Ample Working Force for New Pro-Campaign Hopes to Strengthen Local Churches and Win 100 Lost to Christ During Next Five Years.

By the most encouraging developments that has come to the Baptists Campaign, so far, is the number of young men and women from the South and Southwest who have volunteered their services for Christian work wherever they are needed. A special day was held at the Baptist schools for "calling out the volunteers" when it was expected to secure a minimum of 5,000 volunteers for Christian service, this number necessary, it was held, if the program of the campaign was to be carried out. Returns from these are still coming in with the number that will reach 7,300.

Volunteers will enter the ministry as missionaries, Christian doctors and teachers to foreign lands in the homeland for the advancement of the kingdom of God or in any special capacity where the Lord directs them. Bay College, Belton, Texas, an institution for young women, led the list with 430 volunteers; Bessie College, Forsythe, Ga., responded with 100; Louisiana College, Pineville, La., 100; Women's Training School, Ft. Worth, Tex., 114; Southwestern Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth, Tex., 100; the foreign field alone; Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Ok., 57; similar responses came from numerous other institutions in the various parts of the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. CANANDAIGUA, N. Y.—Because he sold medicine which is said to have contained about 18 per cent of alcohol Antonio Rotundio has been sentenced by Judge Fitch here to pay a fine of \$500 and serve three months in jail.

Rotundio, a storekeeper, sold a liquid which is said to have come into popularity because of its alcoholic content since the war-time ban went into effect.

"SEE AMERICA FIRST" SLOGAN OF INNKEEPERS

St. Louis Post-Dispatch: The hotel keepers of the country, meeting in New York, renewed in an almost plaintive form of old appeal to see America first. Reason enough exists for its renewal now. Since 1914 the native tourist has been compelled to see America first. Persons had to go on other than mere sight-seeing missions to obtain admission to most European countries and shipping was lacking to get to other countries.

Now, however, with the barriers down and the tourist's ardor burning with all the warmer flame because of five years of extinguishment, Europe's confident expectation is that he shall see America last. England is waiting impatiently for swarms of American visitors to inspect Shakespeare's tomb at so much per head. The Swiss inn keepers are brightening up their premises and hiring more help. France's elaborate arrangement for alluring the tourist and profiting by his presence even have the benefit of government guidance and counsel and are unassociated, it is charged, with the almost unaccountable opposition there to any change in the status of American emigrants established by loving hands on her soil.

Seeing America first will, of course, have its handicaps during the coming year. Transportation costs are higher than ever before known. Profiteering by landlords is going on in almost every part of the country.

TRUNKFUL OF GEMS LEFT BY WHISKEY SEEKERS

International News Service. RALEIGH, N. C.—In a patch of woods two miles outside this city four colored culprits cautiously opened a trunk. All they found in it was about \$80,000 worth of jewelry. Famous Bandit Is Captured

A report from Douglas, Wyo., Tuesday was to the effect that William Carlisle, the famous train robber and bandit, has been captured by a posse near there. He was suffering from exposure and wounds.

Probably no case in the history of the country—certainly in recent years—has created such interest as that of Carlisle, chiefly because of the fact that scores of newspapers had received letters and telegrams purporting to come from Carlisle, as he traveled through numbers of towns eluding his pursuers. Whether Carlisle really entered the towns, dropped into newspaper and telegraph offices and left word that he was having a good time, or whether the whole thing was a hoax, remains as yet an unsolved mystery. One theory is that he really left the northwest and even went into the east, but another is that he never got out of Wyoming following his escape from the state penitentiary at Rawlins. The "job" that made the nation sit up was the one he "pulled" on a Union Pacific passenger train, in which he robbed scores of passengers just after his escape from prison.

Texas had a share in the sensation. A San Antonio newspaper received a communication purporting to come from Carlisle, who said that he was headed toward Mexico. And still nearer home—in fact at home—the Ranger police department received a postal card signed "William Carlisle." It was written in cheap, doggerel verse. The "times" police reporter was shown the card and hurried to the office with it, skeptical. The police and the newspaper men decided it was just a joke, or rather hoax. Doubtless, that was the way with all of those communications, supposed to have been sent out by Carlisle.

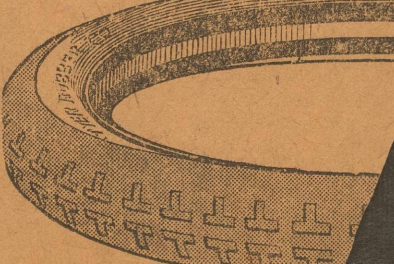
