Use Preventive Medicine. Dr. Henry Boswell, of Sanatorium, Miss., told how the medical profession could co-operate with non-emdical agencies in the prevention and control of tuberculosis.

In continuing the discussion Dr. John M. Dodson, secretary of the council on Health and Public Instruction of the American Medical association, said that the successful plan must seek the best interests of the public. He pointed out that public health work is without the co-operation of the general practitioner and urged family physicians to give more attention to preventive medicine.

Mother Needs Proper Care. The child specialists and experts considered methods of lowering the mortality of infants in this country. Special emphasis was laid by Arthur B. Spaulding, of San Francisco, on the relation of veneral disease and other infections of the mother to deaths in infancy.
