



Irregularities May Be Responsible For The Trouble In Mexico

Report Says Documents Reached President Calles Purporting to be From Secretary of State to American Ambassador in Mexico

WASHINGTON, March 28 .- Secretary of State Kellogg today permitted to go unchallenged published reports that forged documents were involved in the latest misunderstanding between the United States and Mexico.

The reports stated forged documents had come into the hands of President Calles of Mexico, purporting to be instructions from Kellogg to American Ambassador Sheffield, pointing to a break between the two governments.
