This is much too important to all of us for the political bug to kill it.

With this thought always in mind, Sarah has learned to do many things which add much to comfort and happiness of her husband and two daughters. Sarah is the youngest child and only daughter of the late Mr. A. A. Guenther and Mrs.

Guenther. She began her life in the small town of Schulenburg, Tex., and lived there until she was eight years of age. At that time her parents moved to Donna. The family later lived in San Benito and Weslaco. It was at Weslaco that Sarah completed high school. She later attended McAllen Business College and took a general secretarial course.

Following graduation from the business school, Sarah was employed at a chemical company in Weslaco and for the gas company and an insurance company in the same town, prior to her marriage to Glenn Marsh.

Following their marriage, Glenn and Sarah moved to Lincoln, Neb., where he was employed by a seed company. SOUTHERN FRIED CHICKEN
1 large chicken - washed and cut up, salted and peppered to taste; 2 or 3 packages of saltine crackers crumbled; 3 eggs-beaten; flour;

After the chicken has been cut up and seasoned, roll in flour; then roll in the eggs and last roll in the cracker crumbs. Fry in electric skillet until golden brown on both sides (but not completely done). Put chicken in baking dish, cover with aluminum foil, place in 200-250 degree oven and bake approximately one hour. This is an excellent dish for company... especially if you have no idea when they will actually arrive.

DANISH BUTTER ROLLS
Soften . . . 1 package dry yeast in 1/4 cup warm water in large mixing bowl. Stir in 1/3 cup sugar
2/3 cup scalded milk, cooled until lukewarm
2 unbeaten eggs
1/2 cup butter or oleo (melted and cooled)
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
To this mixture gradually add

5-5 1/2 cups flour to form stiff dough.
Knead on floured surface until smooth and satiny (five to eight minutes). Cover and allow to rise while preparing filling.
For the filling:
Combine 1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Roll dough to an 18"x12"

At Home In Parmer County

Are leftovers a problem at your house? Some of the more common leftovers are rice, green peas, roast beef and boiled potatoes. Here are some suggestions for using leftovers in tasty dishes.

*Cooked rice can be covered and stored in the refrigerator. Reheat in a small amount of water, and it tastes as good as when it was first prepared. Rice also gives body to soups and meat loaves.

*Leftover roast beef is often sliced for sandwiches. Or try cutting it into small pieces and frying with diced potatoes and onions.

*Boiled potatoes can be used for potato salad, or they're good fried. Mashed potatoes can be shaped into patties and fried in margarine until crisp.

When shopping for peached, a soft, creamy-to-gold undercolor of the yellow part is the best sign of ripeness. The red blush on a peach, may or may not be a sign of ripeness. Blush depends on variety, not ripeness.

Proper care of roses now will insure you of having attractive plants and abundant flowers this fall. The regular application of a complete fertilizer plus a continuation of insect and disease controls are musts. But, fertilization is not recommended after early August.

Does your family enjoy meat grilled outdoors? To keep the meat from sticking to the grill, brush it with oil.

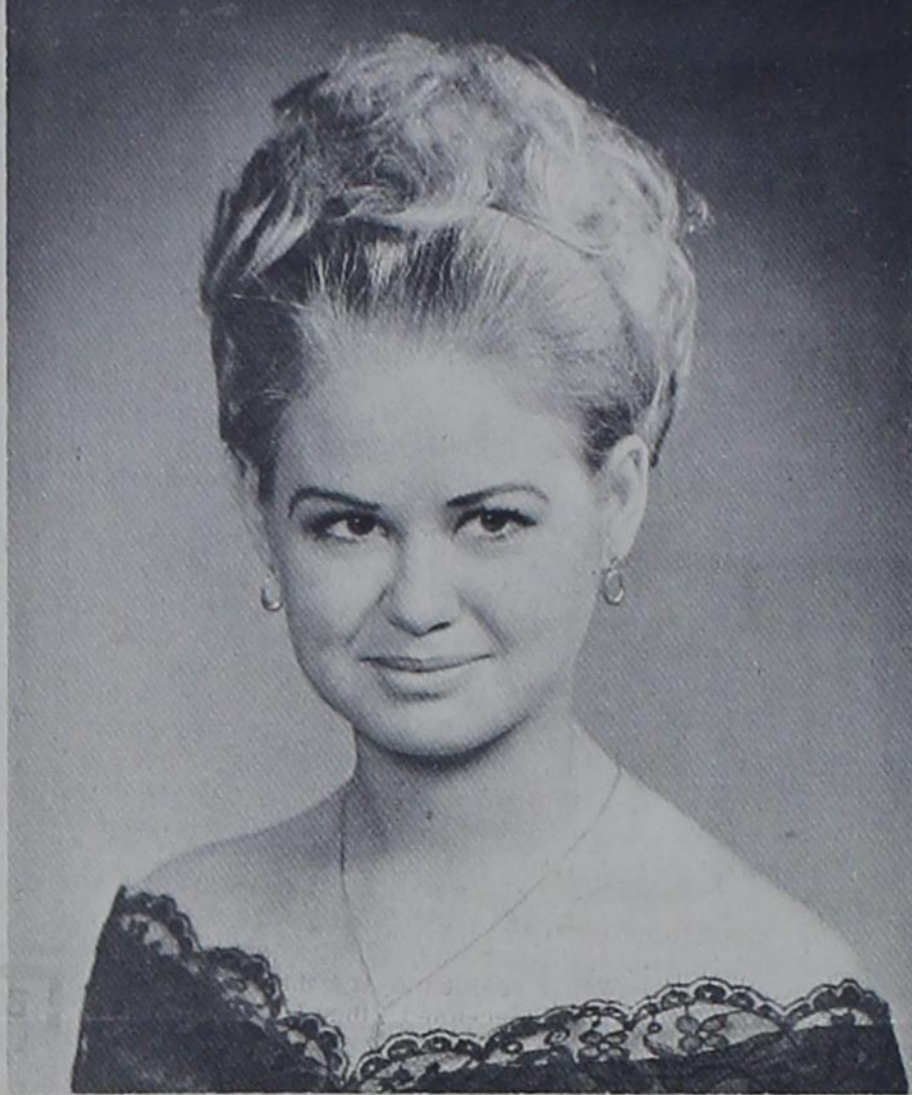

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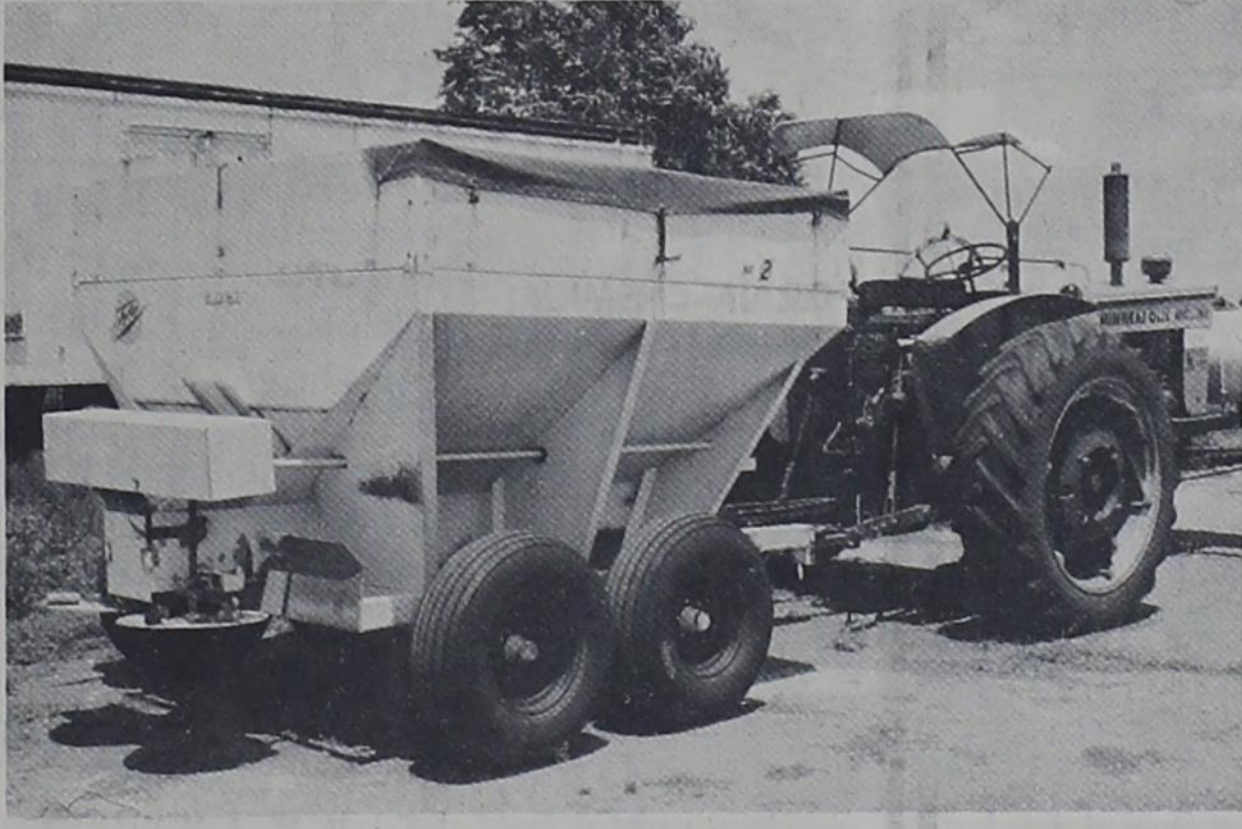

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On The Farm In Parmer County

CALF SCOUR CONTROL FACTOR FOUND

Texas A&M University researchers have found that an inexpensive by-product of the cottonseed oil refining process contains a factor which prevents common scours in calves. The by-product is acidulated soapstock (acid oil), which is an excellent source of fat in milk replacer formulas for calves and has a unique anti-diarrhetic quality. Research dates back to 1956 when Dr. R. E. Leighton of the A&M Animal Science Department discovered an anti-scour substance in a methylated product made from cottonseed oil soapstock. Leighton said excellent success has been reached in the past two years with dairy calves fed a milk-replacer formula containing 15 per cent acidulated soapstock. The researcher noted that the cottonseed oil refining industry formerly regarded the product as of little value. Disposal was often a problem. Later, uses were found in the feed industry, but it is currently the least expensive fat ingredient in calf milk replacers. Cost per pound is 5 cents or less in large quantities. "The ever-increasing use of milk replacer formulas in feeding both dairy and beef calves, plus the surprising reduction in calf diarrhea which results when the acid oil is used in the diet, suggests that this finding will be of considerable importance to livestock feeders, feed

manufacturers, veterinarians and the cottonseed oil industry.

FORAGE TESTING SERVICE

The Texas A&M University Forage Testing Service has now been in operation for several years. Results of this service have been of great educational value, and producers report it to be of significant value as an aid in developing sound and economic feeding programs, and evaluating and improving forage production practices. The charge is \$6 for each hay and pelleted or watered forage sample and \$7 for each silage sample for determination of crude fiber and calculation of digestible protein, total digestible nutrients and net energy. Moisture in silage also will be determined. The charge is \$2 per sample of hay and \$3 per sample of silage for determination of protein only. If requested, balanced feeding recommendations, based on the forage tested for complete analysis, will be provided at no extra cost. Forage testing forms are available at the county agent's office.

POISON CONTROL CENTERS Safety first has been a long-time watchword and it can't be emphasized enough when using pesticides. The best way to be safe is to read the label and follow directions. In case a pesticide poisoning occurs, several "poison control centers" are establish-

ed over Texas to assist in emergencies. The nearest poison control centers are at Lubbock and Amarillo. The Poison Control Center in Amarillo is located at Northwest Texas Hospital, 2103 W. 6th. The telephone number is DR 6-4431 extension 211 or 212. In Lubbock, the center is located at Methodist Hospital 3615-19th. The telephone number is SW 3-4321 Extension 234.
