

We feel that the mention of water automatically causes a general feeling of necessity and that this is sort of a Mother, God, and Country thing. Most people would hesitate to speak out against it.

This could cause the politicians to go overboard in spending the peoples' money unless responsible opposition develops to keep the plan within the realm of reason and finances. If the political boys did move in and mess it up, it wouldn't be the first time the fine finger of politics spoiled a good idea. We could think of several ideas sour. This is much too important to all of us for the political bug to kill it.



These make delicious breakfast rolls -- for summer or winter -- and are extra handy if you have some in a freezer for unexpected company. When ready to serve, remove from freezer, place in oven and leave only long enough to thaw out and get warm. If overheated they will be dry.
