## Wheat Harvest Complete

Wheat harvest in the Farwell area this year has been completed with most farmers completing their harvest operations over the weekend. The harvest was unusually light due to the shortage of acres and also due to the heavy hails and wind storms which hit the area in June, just as the crops were beginning to ripen. Many acres of wheat were a total loss in the area and other wheat in the area received much hail damage. Approximately 600,000 bushels was handled locally.

Fred Chandler at Sherry-Anderson-Pitman elevator in Farwell stated that the elevator handled only about two-thirds the amount of wheat handled in a normal harvest year. Other elevators in the area report similar operations for the harvest. However, State Line Grain estimates that they handled approximately 200,000 bushels of the golden grain, which is about like any normal year. They attribute this run to the fact that their regular customers were not in the hail stricken area and also to the

fact that they handled some wheat from outside their usual run.

Protein content in the wheat this year was listed as "good" by all of the elevator managers. However, test weight seemed to be off some over the area as a whole. Yield per acre was good with most farmers re-

porting 35-75 bu. per acre harvested.

Average price of wheat at this time is \$1.25 per bushel, depending upon the protein content. Elevator operators do not look for the wheat price to go up this year and feel that it is pretty well stabilized at the \$1.25 figure.

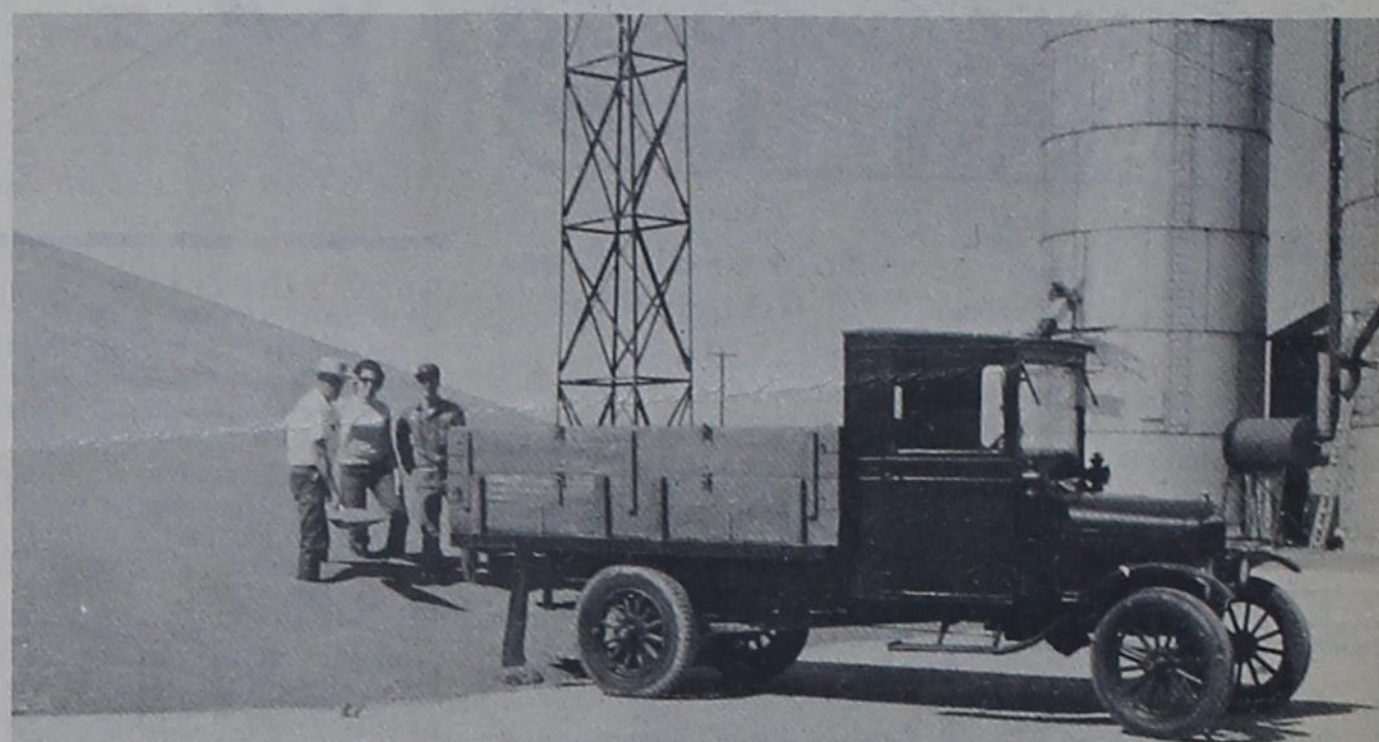
## Invite Children To Story-Hour

She also asks that if any members knows of someone who is out of town at this time, who is planning to be a member of the pep club, that their name be turned in also.

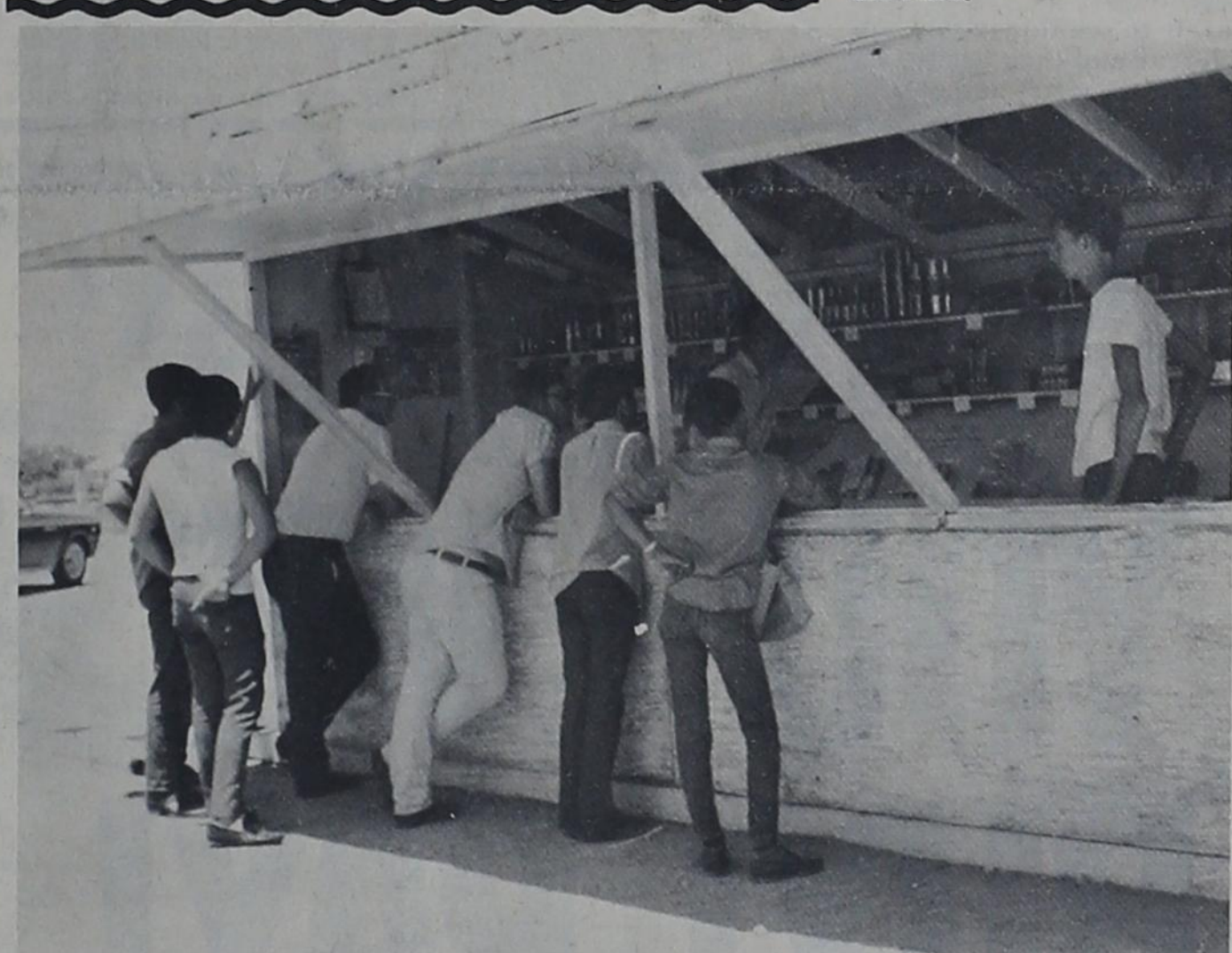
## Office To Be Closed July 11-July 19

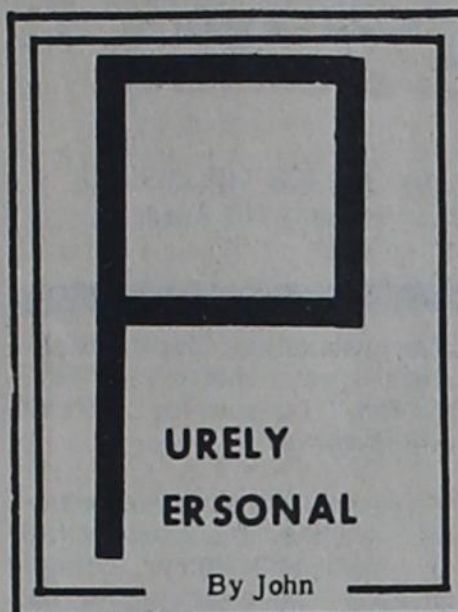
stand are ladies from the Neighborhood Scout organization and Softball organization.

First, may I introduce myself. My name is Tom Hudson. I spent two years in Texico back in 1916-18 when my father was editor of the Texico-Farwell News and I was linotype operator. I am now a retired newspaper man, editing a historical magazine and doing free-lance writing. Nice meeting you, but you'll have to tell me your name.

I have written a story dealing with the Cannon Ball Motor Company which tried to get off to a start in Texico at the time I was there. But I need a bit more information which I am taking the liberty of asking you to supply. If you don't have the time, or don't know the answers, will you please pass this letter on to someone, or some organization, that could help me.

While I was there the Western Tire Company built the first unit of a tire factory in Farwell. That's as far as the factory got. What I want to know is: Is the building still standing and if so, used for what?

I have a copy of the Texico-Farwell News published after I left there that pictures a three-story "home office" building for Cannon Ball Motor Company. It appears to be a substantial building. Does it still stand, and if so to what use is it being put?

If you know anything else about the Cannon Ball, or know anyone who does, I would certainly appreciate the information.

One question that pops in my mind is: Did anyone preserve one of the Cannon Ball models, and if so, where is it? Several models were made, at least one of which I rode in. I have a printed prospectus that Cannon Ball published that shows two models, the Big Six and the Little Six, as well as a truck and a tractor.

It has been fifty years since I left Texico, but now that I start to pick up the threads, memories come flooding back. Do you know anyone who knows someone who knows what became of Mutt Carter? He should be in his late sixties or early seventies now. He was a close friend of mine and also of the family of Judge Hamlin. This question has nothing to do with my story, but it would give me great pleasure to learn something of him.

Please excuse the length of this letter. I had intended to make it short. Thank you for any help you might give me.

**WHEAT VARIETY DEMONSTRATION**

Darrell Norton, recently harvested a wheat variety demonstration on his farm 4 miles northeast of Farwell.

The wheat received a hail on June 13 which reduced yields by about 30 percent.

The results of this test are as follows:

**CAPROCK WHEAT AVAILABLE SOON**

Caprock, the second semi-dwarf or "shorty" wheat developed by Texas A&M University plant breeders will be available to Texas growers after the 1969 harvest.

Caprock and Sturdy are sister strains. Caprock is best adapted to irrigated areas of the High Plains where it has out-yielded Sturdy by about 10 bushels per acre and weighed a half-pound higher in test weight. Plant characteristics are nearly identical in Caprock and Sturdy.

Studies at A&M show that shorty wheats use fertilizer more efficiently than do tall wheats.

Excessive straw in the taller wheats is sometimes a disposal problem in preparation for the next crop.

Caprock and Sturdy are suitable for production of bakery flour.

Seed of Caprock can be obtained from the Foundation Seed Section at Texas A&M.

**GREENBUG REPORT**

The last Texas Economic Insect Report indicates that light infestations of greenbugs were noted in many fields throughout the High Plains.

Heavy infestations of the corn leaf aphid (or commonly referred to as lice) were reported in the High Plains during the week of June 23-27.

Some sorghum in Parmer County is reaching that boot stage. Still there are those farmers who had to plant a second time the last of June because of hail. Farmers in either of the above situations should make a regular check for greenbugs on their sorghum.

Plants from emergence up to about six inches in height, showing visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on the under leaf surface, should be treated. Research data from 1968 indicates that larger plants, up to the pre-boot stage, may tolerate more greenbugs. Large numbers of greenbugs on this size plant should be controlled before any entire plant leaves are killed.

Yield reductions during the pre-boot, boot, blooming and grain development stages are dependent on greenbug numbers, length of time that greenbugs have infested plants and plant condition. Based on one year's experience and research, heavy populations can cause extensive damage to pre-boot and older plants. Indications are that greenbug numbers, which result in death to more than the two lower, normal-sized leaves, should be controlled.

The above general guides are based on the assumption that the greenbug buildup is occurring more rapidly than effective control by beneficial insects. Also, if a plant is undergoing stress, it cannot support as many greenbugs without suffering yield reductions. Due to the hot weather and high winds much of the sorghum in the county is showing moisture stress. This sorghum could be damaged worse if greenbugs build up and if water is not received reasonably soon.

Insecticides recommended by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are as follows: Carbofenthiol (Trithion), Demeton (Systox), Diazinon, Malathion and ethyl parathion.

**Dust Pollution Near Record Low In 1969**

Air pollution from dust storms was a near record low in Texas this spring, according to wind erosion report released this week by Clyde W. Graham, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service. Graham credited favorable moisture conditions and the work of conservation farmers in the western part of the state with reducing the dust storms.

"Reduced dust pollution benefits a lot more people than you might think," Graham said. "Dust hurts people with asthma, emphysema, hay fever, and other respiratory ailments. It ruins electric motors, cars, buses, trucks, tractors, and anything else with moving parts. And it settles in homes, grinding furniture, floors, and carpets."

Less than 500,000 acres, or about half the 5-year average, were damaged in Texas by wind erosion this year, Graham said. His report was the result of an annual survey made by SCS offices in the 34 million acre area of west Texas subject to severe blowing during the Nov. 1 to May 31 blow season.

Graham noted that during the dust bowl days in the "dirty 30's", dust blown from several million acres of Texas land darkened the skies along the eastern seaboard and out into the Atlantic Ocean.

Of the land damaged this season, 460,000 acres were cropland and 9,500 were rangeland.

The lost has been found after 85 years making a story which would be worthy of "Ripley's Believe It or Not." Mrs. Hedwig Gast has in her possession a picture to prove the story for any "doubting Thomases."

The story begins in the early 1880's when Mrs. Gast's mother, who was at that time Ida Budach, lived on a farm near Earlville, Ill., with her parents. Like most young ladies of her day "Ida" assisted with chores about the place and it was on one such occasion that she lost a highly prized possession . . . a ring.

The ring, a beautifully engraved band was inscribed inside with the initials L. B. Ida believed that she had lost the ring while feeding a young calf from a bucket; therefore, after she married and had children of

her own she always warned them . . . "now be careful and remove your rings before you stick your fingers in a calf's mouth . . . you know I lost my ring that way."

Ida Budach Boltz passed away in 1960 at the age of 94, still never having found the highly prized ring. Two years ago, in June 1967, Herbert Budach, a nephew of Ida who lives on the old Budach homestead near Earlville, was plowing corn on the place when he spied a glittering object on the ground. He quickly stopped his plow and picked up the article which had attracted his attention. Imagine his surprise and delight when he found the object to be the long lost ring and prized possession of "Aunt Ida."

The ring is still in perfect condition with the engraving as clear as it was when lost and the initials L. B. plainly visible inside. "Oh how I wish mamma could have known that her ring had been found," related Mrs. Gast who observed her own 80th birthday last month.

Shortly after the ring was found Mrs. Gast visiting in Illinois with her cousin and brought back an enlarged picture of the long lost but recently found ring.

Yes, many times truth is indeed stranger than fiction and the story of the lost and found ring only bears out the truth of that statement.

Do you wonder why your perishable fresh foods don't last long? The expiration of ethylene gas by some fruits affect the storage life of vegetables. During the winter months when crispers are filled with apples and pears, this gas can turn salad greens brown. Here are some storage suggestions for fresh foods.

\*Keep apples, pears and melons separated from carrots, celery, cabbage, potatoes, onions and salad greens.

\*Keep celery and onions separated.

\*Keep potatoes and fruits separated; potatoes can give an earthy flavor to the fruit.

\*Keep oranges away from eggs and butter.

\*Keep dairy products away from fruits and vegetables.

\*Keep ripe pineapple wrapped in a plastic bag to hold in the aroma.

Potatoes and onions are usually stored in a cool, dry place outside the refrigerator.

**CUSTARD PIE**  
2 1/2 cups milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
4 eggs--slightly beaten  
one 9" pie shell  
Scald milk; add sugar, salt, and flavoring to the milk and mix well; stir slowly into beaten eggs. Pour into nine inch unbaked pie shell, place in oven and bake 20-25 minutes at 400 degrees.

Combine flour, salt and pepper, mix well and pour in paper bag, drop steak strips in bag and shake well to coat meat with flour mixture. In a large skillet cook steak until brown; drain tomatoes (saving tomatoes for later use), mix tomato liquid, water, onions and garlic to meat in skillet, cover and simmer 1 1/4 hours. Uncover and stir in Worcestershire sauce and pepper strips; cover and continue to simmer five minutes. If necessary, thicken gravy with flour added to small amount of water; add tomatoes, return cover to skillet and cook another five minutes. Serve over hot cooked rice or a delicious variation to the usual meat dish. Makes sufficient servings for six persons.

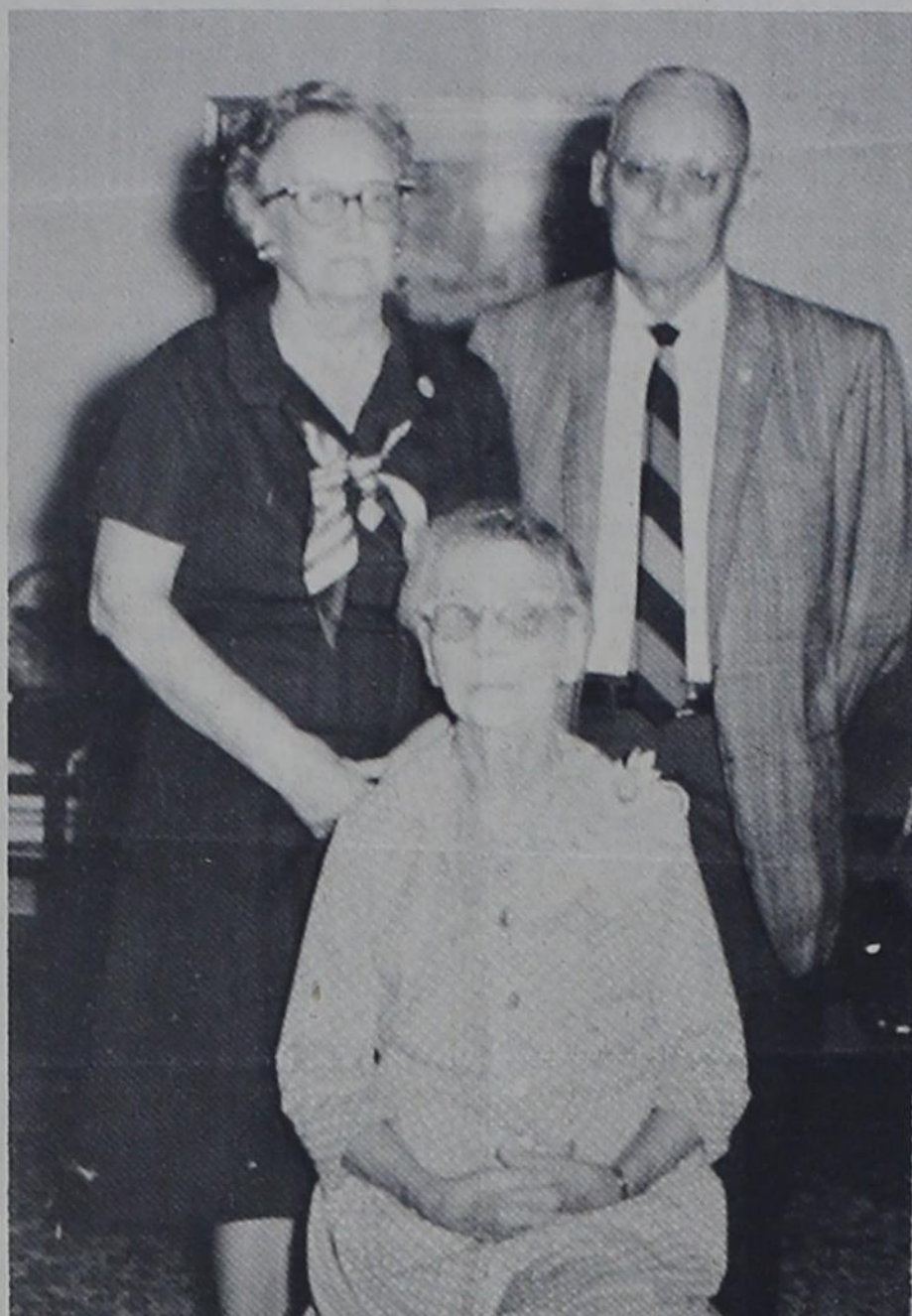

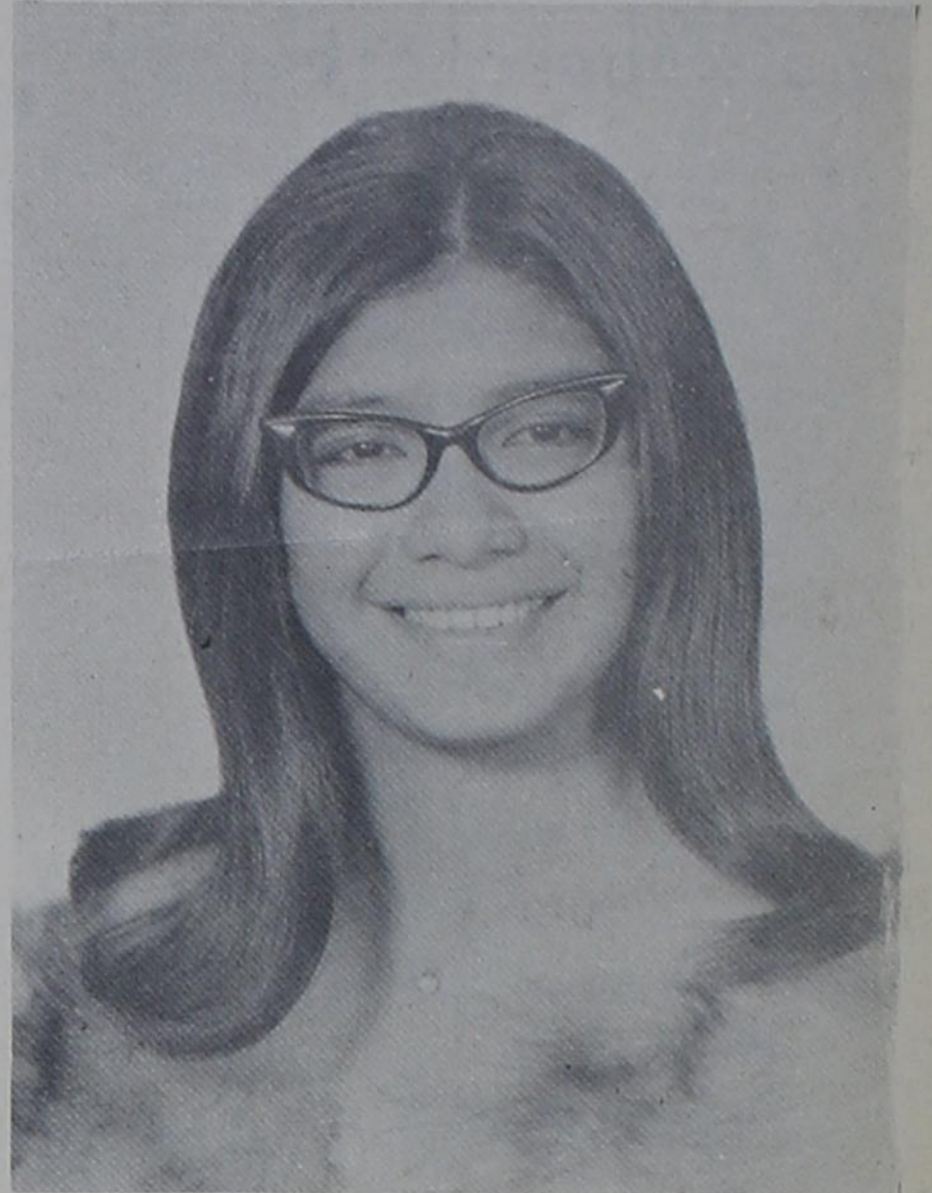
