Overly fast driving will throw small pebbles which will chip windshields and damage paint jobs. This need not happen if common sense and decency will prevail in our automotive driving habits.

While we have the paving equipment at hand, we think it would be an excellent time for the city dads to pave and gutter Fourth Street between the highway and Avenue B. This area will have a lot of local traffic for many years to come. With the new post office location, Farwell folks will use that street on an ever-increasing basis. A good civic investment would be to put it in proper condition to safely and conveniently carry the local citizenry to and from the post office.

We realize that most of our curbing and street paving has been done by the property owner paying the cost. This would give some advantage to those property owners along that small strip, but we feel this would be more than offset by the use that all citizens would get from it. Personally we go to the post office several times a day at least six days a week and once on Sunday. There are many streets in Farwell we may not traverse once a month. Therefore, it appears that everybody would benefit from curbing and paving along this block.

We have in the past mentioned the valuation of property and the effect that a clean, tidy and well-cared-for look can have on the valuation. This addition to the Farwell paving system will also "add a mite" to all the property in town; it certainly can't detract.

Speaking of our new post office, we notice where the rank growth of weeds has been limped over with a herbicide. It was needing attention badly and will continue to need attention if the outside landscaping is to do justice to the beauty of the basic style and architecture of the building.

A little civic cooperation could turn what was formerly a rundown area into a place of civic pride and beauty.

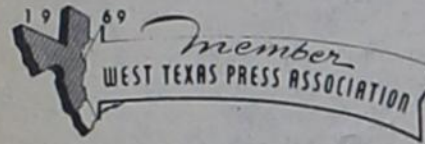

On The Farm In Parmer County

By RONNY McNUTT County Agent

CORN IRRIGATION GUIDELINES

Many acres of corn have been planted in Parmer County this year. To make maximum corn yields it is essential that farmers understand the water needs of this plant.

The following guidelines for irrigating corn are suggested, based heavily on the results of irrigation research and plant growth patterns obtained in the Corn Belt and on limited local investigations.

VEGETATIVE STAGE

The time from seedling established (5 to 6 unfolded leaves and 15 to 18 days after planting) till 8 to 10 leaves can be seen externally (knee high) makes up the early vegetative growth period. This period usually lasts from seedling establishment until about 30 days after planting.

Limited soil moisture during this stage mostly reduces vegetative growth. It is usually not critical in determining yield, provided severe moisture stress is avoided.

Slow growth because of lack of moisture will delay silking and pollination later. The importance of this growth stage is primarily its effect on when the plant will mature. Pre-plant irrigation moisture or that from early rainfall should provide adequate moisture through this growth stage.

RAPID GROWTH STAGE

After 8 to 10 leaves have unfolded, a sudden growth change occurs which initiates formation of the tassel and ears. This transition can be identified by the appearance of tiny bumps on the side of the growing point inside the plant. The location of the growing point at this time is about ground level and 1 inch above the connection of the permanent root system to the stalk.

Good soil moisture levels should be maintained beginning at this growth change and continuing until pollination 5 to 6 weeks later. The roots are also penetrating the entire soil root zone. At the same time, the tassel and ear are developing inside the plant. The plant will grow at least 4 to 5 feet during this 5-to-6 week period, and heavy requirements for both moisture and nutrients occur.

The last 3 weeks of this period just prior to tassel is a critical time in the development of the corn plant. The high water requirement makes moisture stress extremely serious. Damage to pollen and ear development at this time is likely to be permanent.

Irrigate early in this period, 30 to 40 days following planting, if rainfall hasn't provided sufficient moisture. A second irrigation 20 days later is likely to be required, depending on rainfall.

TASSELING, SILKING AND POLLINATION STAGES

By the bloom stage, all major vegetative plant growth has taken place. The primary function now is to produce grain. Adequate soil moisture during this period is important to obtain maximum yields.

Ordinarily, the tassel tip can be seen a week to 10 days before any silks appear. Pollination will then take place over a

5 to 8-day period. A shortage of moisture during this period will reduce yields by limiting kernel initiation.

Good soil moisture conditions during pollen shedding may minimize the detrimental effects of high temperature, should they occur. Temperatures above 85 degrees F can cause poor pollination. Light, frequent irrigation may aid by reducing crop canopy temperatures.

During hot, dry weather, peak water use appears to be in the range of .3 to .4 inches per day. This means a corn crop may require 3 to 4 inches of water every 10 days. The average July water use by corn in this area is 8 to 10 inches.

EARLY GRAIN FILLING STAGE

The three to four weeks following pollination is also a high moisture use period for corn. Grain weight increases rapidly.

By the end of the third week after pollination, the kernels have developed and filled to the milk or early dough stage. Soil moisture requirements begin to decrease. However, moisture stress during this period will limit grain filling. High moisture conditions should be maintained during the 3 weeks following pollination.

Corn water requirements during these critical growth periods appear to be in the range of 3 inches every 15 days up to a peak of 6 inches during the 15 days just prior to and during pollination. Lighter as well as more frequent applications should be made on the sandy soils to prevent water and nutrient losses to deep percolation.

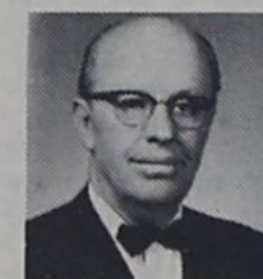

Classes are to be conducted eight hours a day, five days per week and will continue for one year, Rape said.

"This training is made available through the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962," he said, "and is offered at no cost to the trainees. In fact, if they should meet certain requirements, they may draw a training and transportation allowance while they are being instructed."

Anyone who desires to be a mechanic but cannot afford to go out of the city to attend a training school is urged to call in person at the local TEC offices at Seventh and 25 Mile Ave.

"The main requirement is the desire to be a mechanic," Rape stipulated. Other requirements include being 18 years of age or older with at least an eighth grade education.
