## J.W. 'Indian' Crim --

# Predicts Generally Dry Year For Area

J. W. "Indian" Crim predicted a generally dry year for the area Wednesday morning at the old Crim homeplace near Clay's Corner. He said it would be a good year for mechanics as the wells would get a good workout. He said there would be a few good showers and rains -- very spotty and some light hail -- although the hail wouldn't be enough to speak of.

Each year Crim predicts the weather for the coming year on March 22 at sun-up by watching which way the wind blows the tepee-shaped fire which he sets. Crim doesn't really know why March 22 is so important, but that was the day his father always picked for foretelling the weather.

Crim says his father learned the ritual when he was working near Sierra Blanca, Tex. Each year when the Indians knew spring had come, they set fires in the mountains to foretell the weather.

Crim's father noticed the puffs of smoke coming from the mountains and inquired as to

their purpose. He was told that the Indians predicted the weather for the coming year at the same time each spring.

Crim's father, who had a great interest in the weather, learned the technique from the Indians and used it each year. Crim, himself, has been predicting the weather by this method for the past 49 years.

Last year Crim predicted a generally fair year without much turbulent weather. Lacking the usually fierce March sandstorms and going through a rather warm winter, it would seem that Crim was right. He says that his predictions throughout the year have been about 99 per cent correct.

Winds were fairly strong and steady out of the southwest when Crim made his predictions Wednesday morning. According to old Indian legends, wind out of the west, south or southwest indicates a poor crop year. Winds from the north or northeast indicate the crop year will be average or above.

# Bishop Smith To Speak At Holy Week Services

Special Holy Week services will be held in Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell March 26-30. Featured speaker during the week will be Bishop W. Angie Smith of Dallas, Bishop Smith was principal speaker during the Fall Evangelism at the church last year.

Services will be held at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. CST on Palm Sunday, March 26. Services Monday through Thursday will begin at 8 p.m. CST. The Thursday service will close with a Maundy Thursday Communion Service.

Additional services will be held Monday, Mar. 27, when Bishop Smith speaks to a Men's Breakfast in the Fellowship Hall of the church at 7 a.m. CST. The meeting is open to all men in the Texico-Farwell and Clovis areas.

On Wednesday, Bishop Smith will speak to the women of the church and communities at 9 a.m. CST in the church parlor. Leading the congregational singing throughout the Holy Week meeting will be Rev. Oran

Smith, pastor of Oklahoma Lane United Methodist Church. Organist will be Mrs. Joe Jones of Farwell.

The chancel choirs of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church as well as the chancel choirs from Trinity Methodist Church in Clovis and First United Methodist Church in Bovina will provide music during the week. The choir from Clovis will be featured on Tuesday and the Bovina choir will be featured on Wednesday.

For 24 years, Bishop Smith was the Episcopal leader and resident bishop of the Oklahoma-New Mexico area of the Methodist church. During part of that time he served as President of the General Board of Evangelism. He also has rendered service as Bishop of the Hong Kong and Formosa area, had the responsibility of the

Latin America area and was Bishop of Chile and Peru, as well as Official Visitor to Mexico. He served as President of the Council of Bishops of the Methodist Church in 1957-58. He was elected a Bishop of the Methodist church in 1944.

Bishop Smith has been a trustee of Southwestern University at Georgetown since 1938, and Southern Methodist University at Dallas since 1944. He also served as president of the Board of Trustees of McMurry College at Abilene and Oklahoma City University. He is a 32nd Degree Mason, with an Honorary 33rd Degree.

The Holy Week Services are a project of the Evangelism Work Area Committee of the church which is composed of Mrs. M. A. Snider Jr., chairman, Mrs. Troy Christian and Donald Christian.

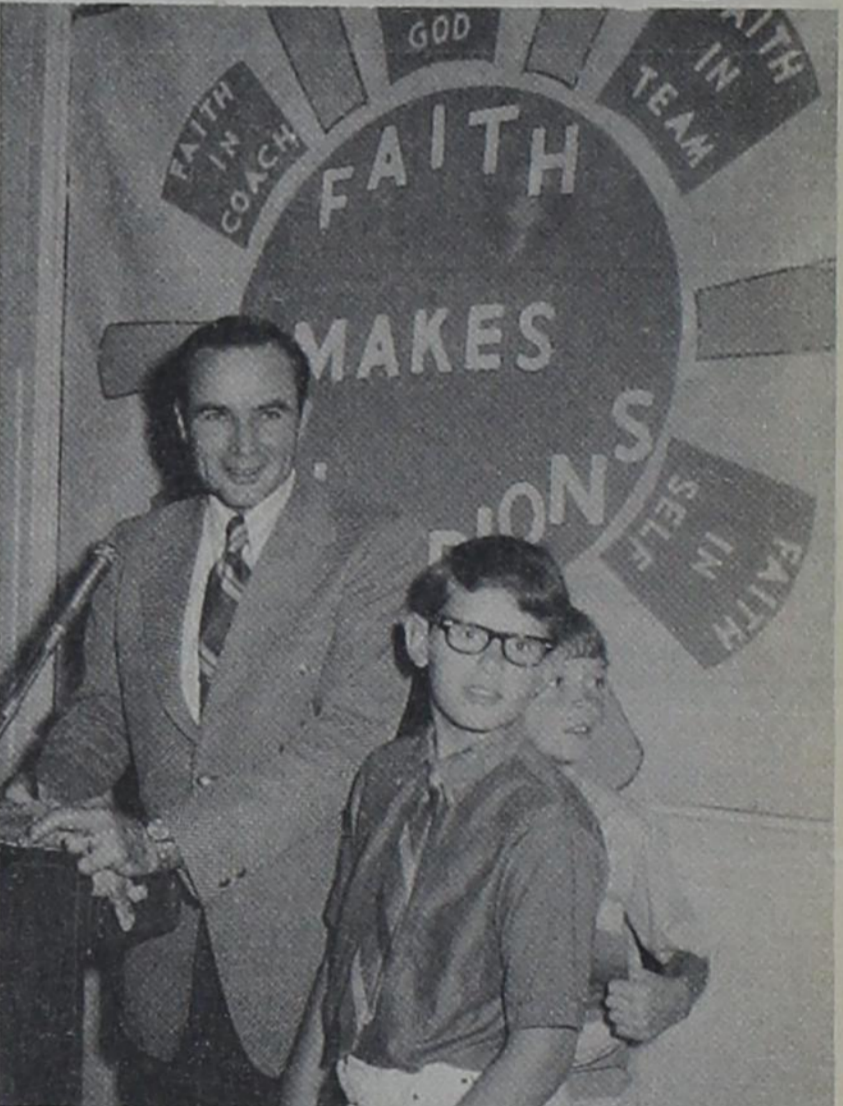



Others joined and the chorus swelled until "all with one voice about the space of two hours cried out, Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" (Acts 19:34) and the town clerk, referring to the religion which surrounded this pagan goddess, said confidently: "THESE THINGS CANNOT BE SPOKEN AGAINST" (Ver. 36).

But later, at Rome, the apostle was informed, with reference to those who had accepted the truths he had been proclaiming: "As concerning this sect, we know that EVERYWHERE IT IS SPOKEN AGAINST" (Acts 28:22).

We wonder which side our readers would now prefer to be on: that of the superstitious multitude or that of the minority who place their faith in the Bible.

Millions worshipped the goddess Diana from a thousand years before Christ to two centuries after, but who knows her today? Where is the evidence of all the miracles she is supposed to have wrought? Her glory is little more than a memory and the religion which revolved around her name is a thing of the past.

But the Bible, for all these centuries and more, has stood unchanged and unchangeable. It has weathered, not barely, but handsomely, all the storms of criticism and opposition and has proved to be indeed the Word of God. Read the Bible and, especially the part meant for us today: the epistles of Paul. Depend upon it, act upon it and don't hesitate to stand for it, even when in the minority, for where the most vital truths are concerned, majorities have often been wrong.
