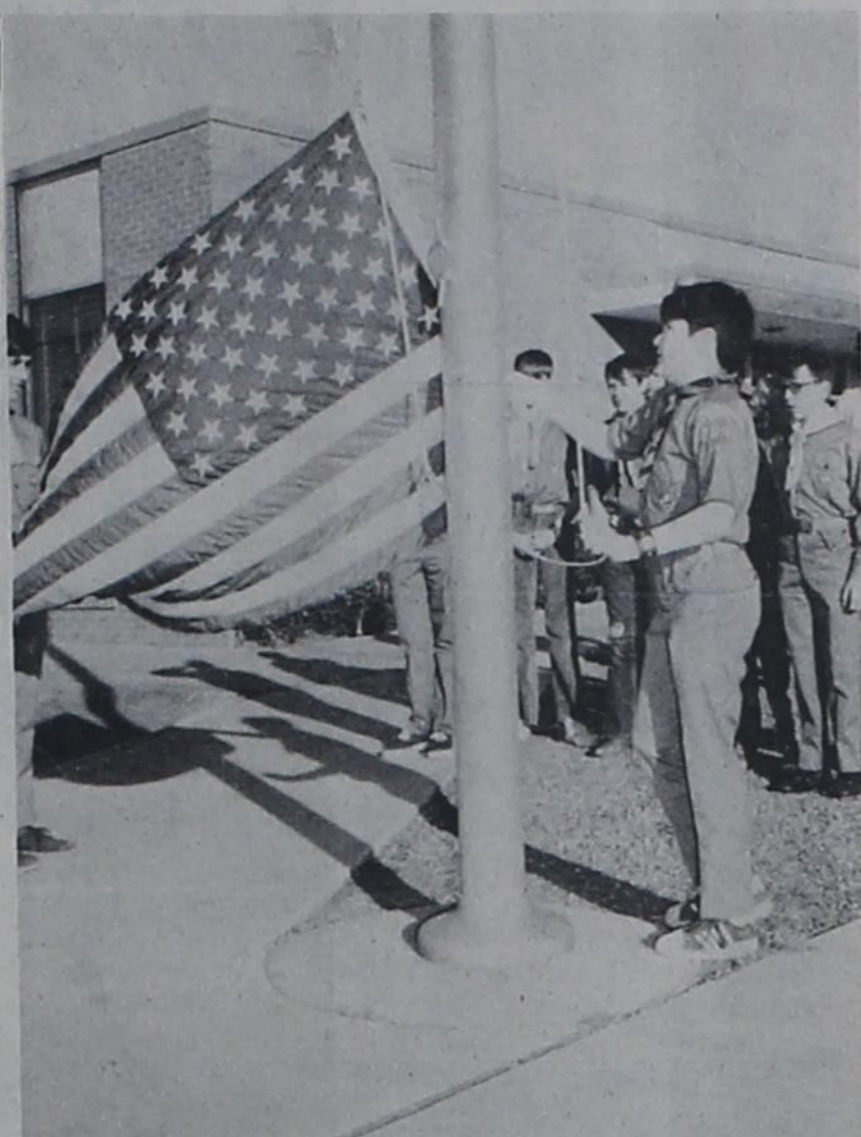


At Farwell Livestock Show - -

Lesley Curtis' Cross Barrow was Reserve Champion. His barrow won first place in the heavy weight Cross class.

Haseloff also exhibited the first place heavy weight Duroc which was Champion of its breed. Reserve Champion in the Duroc class was exhibited by David Garner. He exhibited the first place light weight Duroc.

Grand Champion Gilt was a 185-pound Duroc exhibited by Dwight Green, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Green. The gilt won first place in the light weight market gilts class.

Thirty-eight Farwell FFA Chapter members and local 4-H members exhibited 67 head of stock during the show. Five

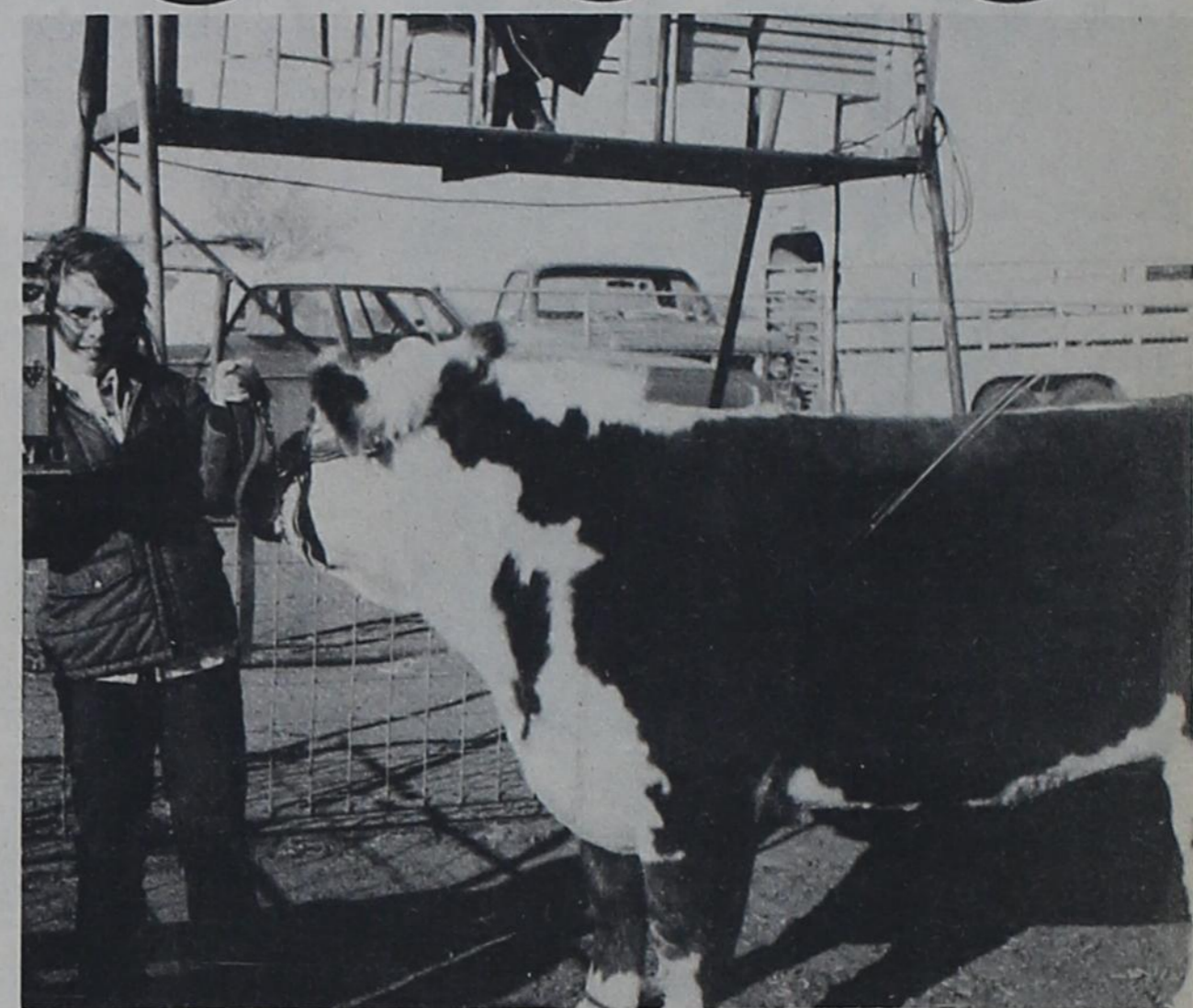

Social Security Man To Speak At Texico Meet

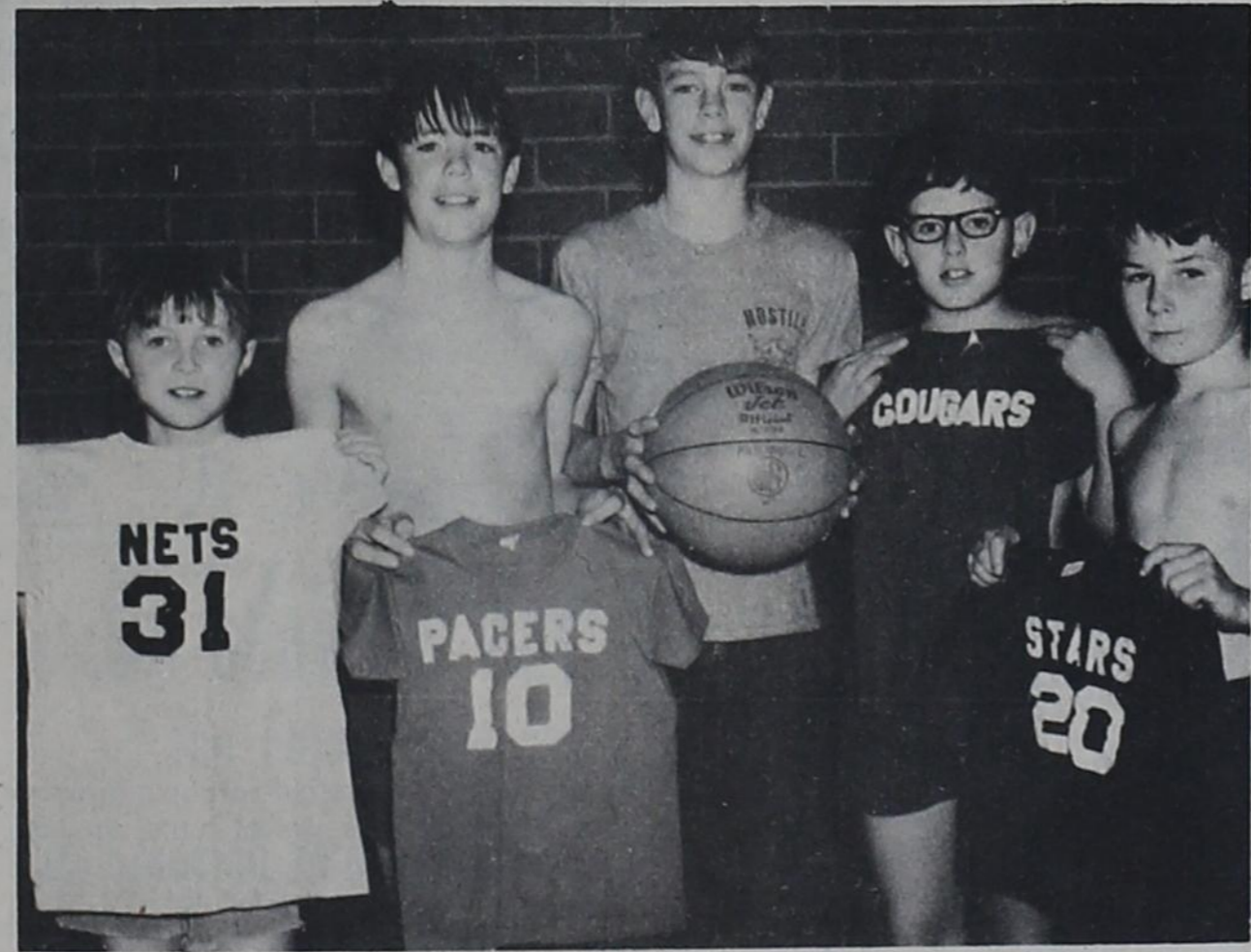

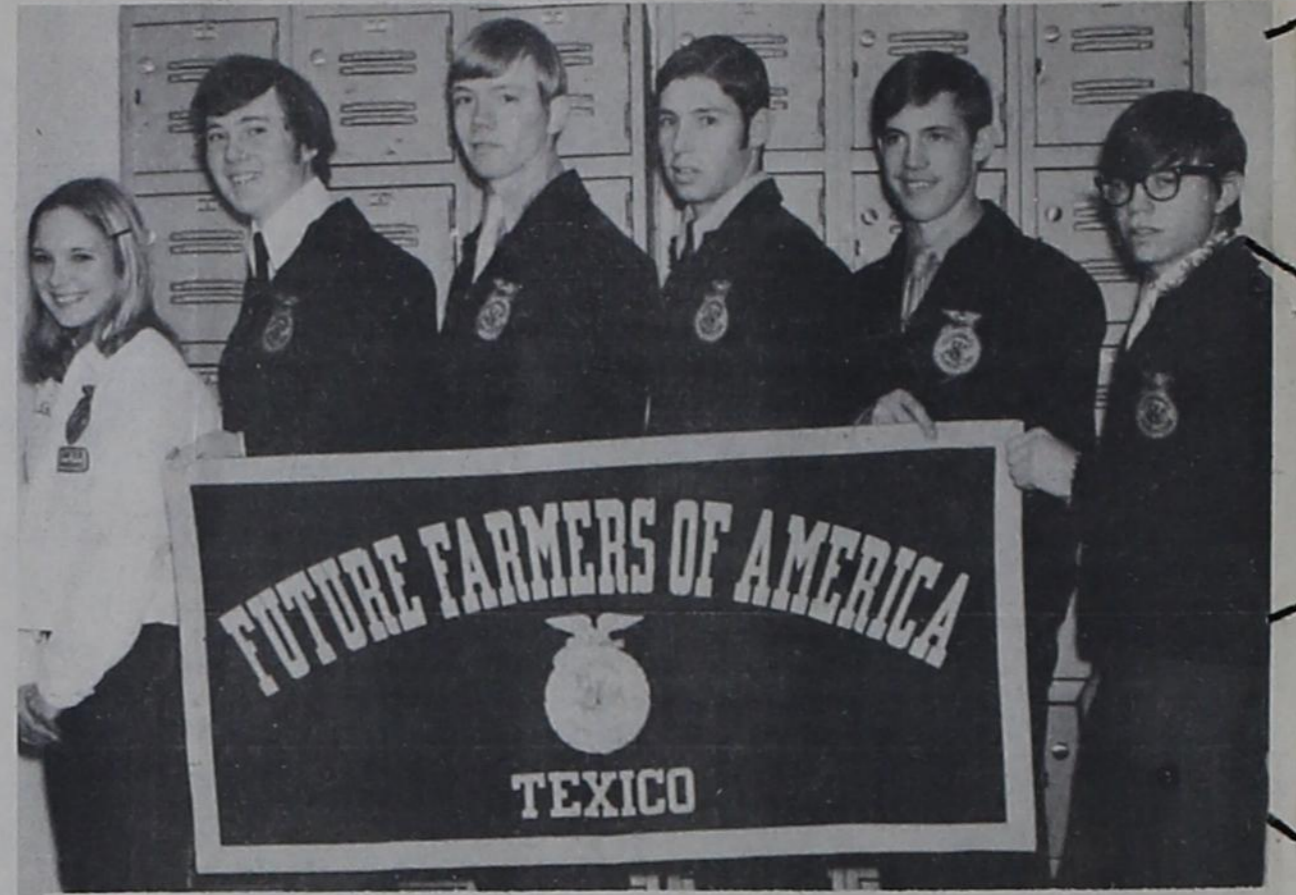
Texico FFA Chapter was chartered as the 10th chapter in New Mexico in November, 1929. The chapter now has 72 members in vocational agri-

culture and 45 members in FFA.

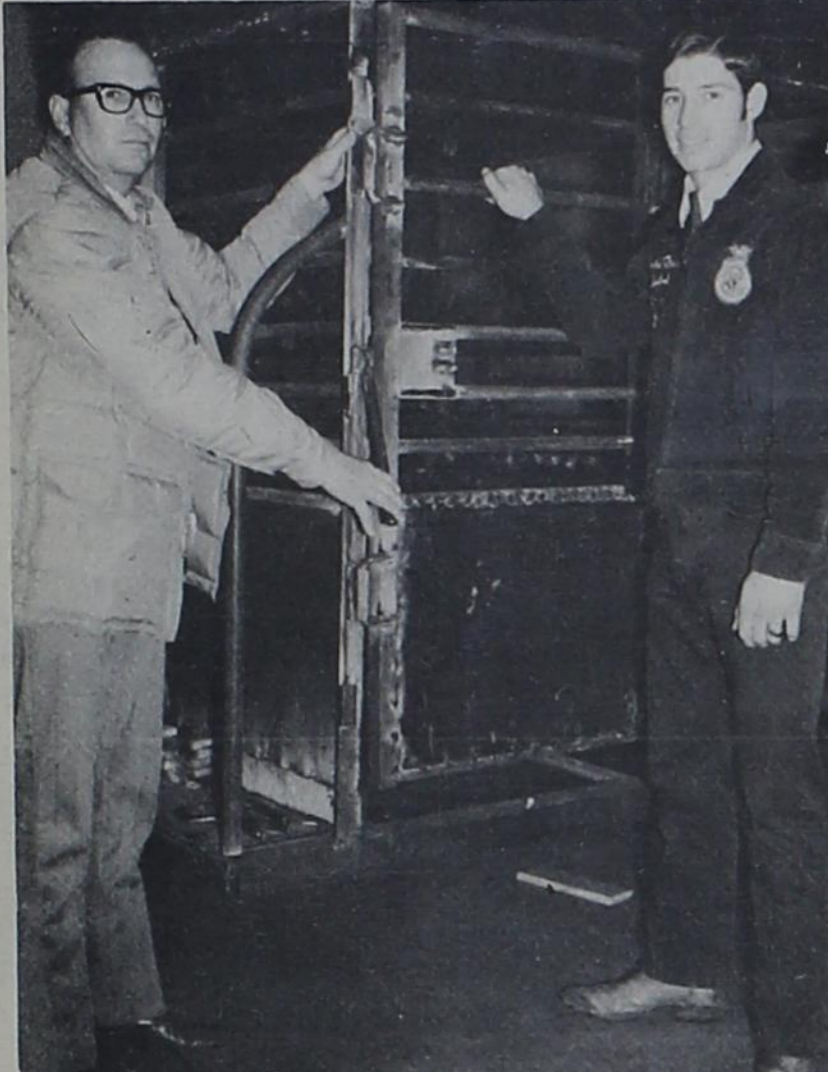
John Hadley received the first American Farmer degree from Texico in 1937. He was also State FFA President in 1937-38. Texico has had three other state officers since then.

Farwell FFA Members Work Tight Stock Show Schedule

Members of Farwell Future Farmers of America Chapter just finished exhibiting stock in the Farwell Junior Livestock Show and are exhibiting at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show in Friona at the Bus Barn which began Thursday and will continue through Saturday.

The 17th annual show is co-sponsored by Parmer County Junior Livestock Show Association and Friona Young Farmers. FFA Chapter members and 4-H Club members from Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie will participate in the show.

Barrows and lambs to be judged today (Friday) with steer judging on Saturday. Jim McManigal of West Texas State University will judge barrows and lambs. Herman Boone, Vocational Agriculture teacher from Spearman, will judge steers.

A premium sale will begin at approximately 1 p.m. Saturday. Sixty-five steers, 60 lambs and 125 barrows are expected to be exhibited and sold during the show.

Monday, Farwell FFA Chapter members joined local 4-H

Club members in exhibiting stock at the local show. FFA members had previously exhibited stock in the Amarillo, Hereford, Odessa and El Paso stock shows this year. They will be exhibiting stock at the Lubbock and Houston stock shows before the stock show schedule is complete.

There are 68 members in the Farwell FFA Chapter. Chapter officers are Ray Norton, president; Harold Jones, vice-president; Steve Kaltwasser, secretary; Larry Wardlaw, treasurer; Conda Jones, reporter; and Ty Phillips, sentinel.

Danny Ivy and Jerry Mathis, Vocational Agriculture teachers at Farwell High School, are FFA Chapter advisors.

During the course of the year, students enrolled in Vocational Agriculture courses and involved in FFA are introduced to many phases of the agricultural life.

In Ag I, students cover record book keeping, parliamentary procedure, swine production and sheep production, which includes breeds; and basics of woodworking and welding. They also write an essay titled "Natural Resources - Meeting the

Needs of People'

Ag II is a course in animal science. Topics include the systems of the body and how they function, safe use and kinds of power equipment, soil erosion, testing and fertilization and cold metal work.

Shop projects include small metal items such as bending jigs, grinding gauges, made without using any heat or power equipment, construction of book racks, knife holders and wood floats for cement work.

Ag III class covers livestock diseases and parasites, learning the use of the oxy-acetylene torch to weld by using all kinds of rods and discussion of grasses, their uses and identification.

Construction includes pig waters and feeders for the ag farm, and building a set of catch pens for barrows.

Friona Man Selected As Top Conservation Farmer

Max Self of Friona has been selected as Farmer County's Outstanding Conservation Farmer for 1973. Max and his wife, Dorothy, have three children, Gayla, Gary and Terry. Self, raised on a farm near Muleshoe, has been farming continually except for the two years he was in the Army.

The Self family lives on their farm seven miles west and two miles north of Friona. He has built his farming operation up to over 1000 acres of irrigated land. The 160 acres he owns serves as the base for his operations.

In 1969, being aware of the benefits of good soil and water

conservation, Self asked the Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District for assistance. With technical help, he developed a conservation plan for his farm and instituted it as finances permitted.

When Self heard of the Great Plains Conservation Program, he investigated and found the program would speed up his applied conservation and was tailor-made for his farm goals. Wanting to protect and improve his land and conserve his underground water, his primary objective was to plant grass on the sloping land to check erosion.

Secondary benefits were grazing and protection for his

pheasants. His pasture plantings were half cool season grasses and half warm season grasses.

Since pheasant watching is a favorite pastime for the entire family, the increased ground cover created by grass planting and good crop residue management has increased the pheasant population around the Self farm and contributed to the enjoyment of the whole family.

Good residue management also reduces wind erosion and conserves moisture. The conservation plan developed by Self improved his irrigation efficiency by designing a complete irrigation system for his farm. The design includes a distribution system plus proper application for his particular soils and crops.

In short, Self has installed an efficient irrigation system, managed crop residues on the soil surface, established and managed grass and improved his pheasant watching.
