## 1836: WEDNESDAY, MARCH 2. The siege of the Alamo continues.

 The siege of the Alamo continues.Colonel William B. Travis is now in sole command. Colonel James Bowie relinquished his co-command
on February 24 after suffering an on February 24 after suffering an
injury when placing a cannon. He has since developed a high fever. On February 24, Colonel Travis issued an appeal "To the People of
Texas and All Americans in the Texas and All Americans in the
World." Addressed to "Fellow Citizens and Compatriots," it says: "I am beseiged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna. I have sustained a continual Bombardment and cannonade for ${ }^{24}$
hours and have not lost a man. The enemy have demanded a surrender at discretion; otherwise, the garrison is to be put to the sword, if the place is taken. I have answered the
summons with a cannon-shot, and summons with a cannon-shot, and
our flag still waves proudly from the walls. I SHALL NEVER SURRENDER OR RETREAT. Then I call on you, in the name of liberty, of
patriotism, and everything dear to patriotism, and everything dear to our aid with all dispatch. The enemy are receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three
or four thousand in four or five days. or four thousand in four or five days.
Though this call may be neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible, and die like a soldier who never forgets what is
