## Philosophical difference

A Clovis Public Library official spoke at last week's Texico-Farwell Rotary Club meeting and a couple of interesting items were noted. One I agreed with and the other I had a philosophical difference of opinion with.

First, the one I agreed with. The official said that a study being taken may have a positive recommendation to establish a branch library in Texico. It's in an early stage right now so you never know what will happen. But I think it would be great for the Twin Cities to have a public library branch established here.

I realize our churches have good libraries, too. A public library branch can supplement them. Until coming to the Twin Cities, I've always been a heavy library user and I feel badly that I've sort of let that slide.

Libraries are one of our nation's true strengths and the beginning of the public library system through Andrew Carnegie's financial backing has been a real plus (although I've never been one of Carnegie's admirers for the way he broke the Homestead strike in the 1880's.)

So if you ever visit the Clovis library, folks, don't hesitate to put in a plug for a branch here in the Twin Cities.

And now the area where I had a difference of opinion with the library official:

Besides the many fine book programs offered at the library, she pointed out how the library also loans out video-tape movies for your home VCRs. You can take them home for free.

Well, in my opinion, what you have here is a tax-supported institution competing with private industry. I'm not a proponent of that. It's not fair to the private business that rents and sells video-tape movies, and there are several in our area. Why rent when you can get the movies free?

When I made my point, the library official said that the few movies offered at the library don't even come close to making a dent when you compare them to the thousands, for example, at Curtis-Mathis. And she said that people whet their appetite on the library's movies, then go on to rent others at businesses in Clovis.

I agree that a large business with many, many movies probably won't be hurt much by a small collection at the library. But I am aware that a smaller business that rented out movies closed recently in Clovis -- due to lack of business.

Anyway, I can appreciate the library's position on the movie matter, since I believe it's a library's job to offer educational materials and many movies fall under that title.

But there's more:  
The official said the Clovis library is considering loaning out tools and lawn mowers.

Now, this is where I have a real problem. To reiterate, I oppose the idea of tax-supported institutions competing with private industry. And there are places in Clovis that rent out items such as tools.

Also, while I could understand how video-tape movies might fall under the "educational" umbrella that a library offers, I'm not so sure that lawn mowers do.

Let me ask you this question: if you can get a lawn mower for free when you need it, would you do so -- or would you go buy one?

Even if the library charges a small fee, I'm sure many folks would take them up on it. Today its movies and tools. Tomorrow? Maybe farm implements? Cars? Where do you draw the line?

Meanwhile, the private business has to pay its taxes -- with part of those taxes being used to help a competitor. To me, that's not our American system and is unfair.

Rumor of the week: The days of open burning of trash in Farwell seem to be limited.

## Church addition nears completion

The new addition to the First Baptist Church of Farwell is expected to be completed by March 9. And on March 23, the church will have a dedication of it, plus an observance of the church's 33rd anniversary.

Dr. Floyd Bradley, area missionary from Plainview, will give the morning worship at 11 a.m. Also, the following persons will be recognized for their work: building committee chairman Don Williams, general contractor Charlie Hromas, Randy Johnson, Ronald Byrd, Cindy Littlejohn, Gladys Armstrong and Leslie Lunsford.

After the service, there will be a luncheon. Then the church and its new addition will host an open house for the community from 3 to 5 p.m.

The new facilities include two bathrooms, eight classrooms, a large kitchen, an all-purpose room which can be used as two classrooms with a wall divider, and a fellowship hall which can seat almost 300 persons. The hall also will be used for basketball.

During the summer, a children's story hour program will be started, said Bro. Pat Riley.

Riley said the building's goal of \$80,000 has been topped. The church went over-goal on Feb. 20 when it reached the \$82,557 mark. Plus, due to the merger with the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church, another \$6,245 was received. They will have a way to go before the entire facility is paid for.

"The people were ready and God's will was the key to reaching our goal," said Williams.

The appliances, vinyl, Formica and carpet came from McDaniel's of Clovis; carpet for the Fellowship Hall came from the Ponder Co. of Amarillo; plumbing was done by

Neighbors can also work cooperatively to increase the use of effective security measures, such as good lighting on streets and around buildings.

## Texico joins COG

The Texico City Council voted Tuesday to join the East Plains Council of Governments.

The cost will be more than \$200 annually. Texico had dropped out of the COG a couple of years ago when COG raised its dues for Texico to more than \$500. Since then, the dues structure has been lowered for small cities.

Lee Tillman, COG director, attended the meeting and asked Texico to rejoin COG. He said 20 of 22 municipalities in his area were members, with Texico being one of the two not involved. He noted the grant money that came from Santa Fe through COG to local towns and cities.

Since he hoped Texico would come back in, Tillman said he would

ask his board to let Texico come in for free its first year. If that fails, then the city would pay a prorated share since it would return during the fiscal year.

In other business, the council: --Noted that the state Environmental Improvement Division lawsuit against Texico over the former landfill has been dropped. The landfill hasn't been used since Waste Control has taken over the garbage pickup.

--Agreed to seek proposals for a fiscal year audit.

--Accepted the bid of Roy Farley to buy the old grace-side delivery broom for \$250.

--Agreed to buy a new muffler for the police car, plus have a tune-up done.

## Texico election on tap

Texico voters will go to the polls Tuesday to pick a mayor and two councilmen.

Two persons are seeking the mayoral post -- Max Carter and incumbent John R. Hadley.

And three persons have filed for the two council posts -- Nathan Tharp and incumbents Doyal LaRue and Lewis Cooper. Cooper is seeking re-election while LaRue was appointed by the council earlier this year to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of longtime councilman Vane Doshier, who had moved out of the city.

Hadley has lived in the Texico area since 1929. He has served as mayor for six years. A retired

farmer, he and his wife Evelyn have six children.

Carter, a Texico resident since 1972, operates Heart Enterprises, a construction and home repair company, and also sets up and removes mobile homes. Carter, who was once appointed a Texico councilman, also has the contract for the Texico school buses. He and his wife Patricia have one daughter, Andrea, 7.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. MST. Voting will take place at the Texico Community Building, 417 Wheeler.

The election judge will be Mae Stone. The clerks will be Bernice Thigpen and Theodora Rojas.

## Economic development topic

Economic development will be the topic of a special meeting at 8 p.m. March 17 at the Farwell Community Center.

The announcement was made at Tuesday's Farwell Chamber of Commerce meeting. City officials recently had discussed the idea of having a meeting on the topic and Southwestern Public Service officials agreed to help set it up.

In other business at the Chamber meeting:

--A special meeting is planned in March to pick new officers and board of directors. The present board and officers were supposed to have begun their tenure last February but actually didn't take office until June due to delays. So the Chamber is trying to get back on its

**Tribune rate hike announced**

Effective March 1, the display advertising rate in the State Line Tribune is being increased from \$2 a column inch to \$2.20 a column inch, Publisher Mike Pomper announced. This will be the first rate increase for display ads in more than two years; the last one went into effect Feb. 1, 1984.

Rates for classified display advertising will increase from \$2.33 an inch to \$2.56 an inch. However, classified ads containing reader or body type will stay at 12 cents per word for first insertion and 10 cents per word for subsequent insertions. The minimum of \$3 per insertion

for classified ads will remain the same.

The national display advertising rate will increase from \$2.61 per column inch to \$2.75 per column inch.

"We don't like to raise our rates," said Pomper, "but in the past year, the Post Office has increased its rates for newspapers twice and the publishing plant that prints our paper also has hiked our rates. Add to this our normal expenses from suppliers that have increased and we must raise our rates to cover these increases."

**Wild horses, burros to be adopted**

The new Wild Horse and Burro Distribution Center in Muleshoe will begin adopting animals on March 1. The facility, originally designated as a holding facility last July by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), was recently approved to handle adoptions.  
 The program places wild horses and burros from the western range with qualified individuals that agree to give them good homes. The Muleshoe center will now be able to handle all aspects of the adoption program, including processing applications for individual adoptions. Group adoptions will still require BLM inspection and clearance.  
 A corral fence must be at least six feet high for horses, or 4½ - five feet high for burros and should consist of rounded pipes, poles, wooden planks or similar materials that do not pose a hazard to the animals. Small mesh woven wire fencing with a board along the top is acceptable. Size should be at least 20x20 feet for each animal. Once gentled, the animals may be maintained in pastures. A shelter should include a run-in-

shed adjacent to corral or box stall and barn with a stall space at least 12x12 feet per animal.  
 The March 1 adoption will begin at 8 a.m., with 50 animals to be adopted. There will be two drawings of names to determine the order of selection. The first will include all people that have not previously applied and need their applications screened before they adopt. Applications will be taken, screened and processed on the spot as quickly as possible, according to Stewart Watterson, manager of the Wild Horse and Burro Distribution Center near Muleshoe.  
 On May 3 and 4, 100 animals will be adopted.  
 A highlight will be a two year old, red dun stud horse will be given away.  
 To be eligible to win the horse, you must name him, and write in 50 words or less, why you have chosen that particular name.  
 A child may enter, as long as their parent or legal guardian completes an adoption application. Any entrant must meet eligibility requirements, the same as for a regular

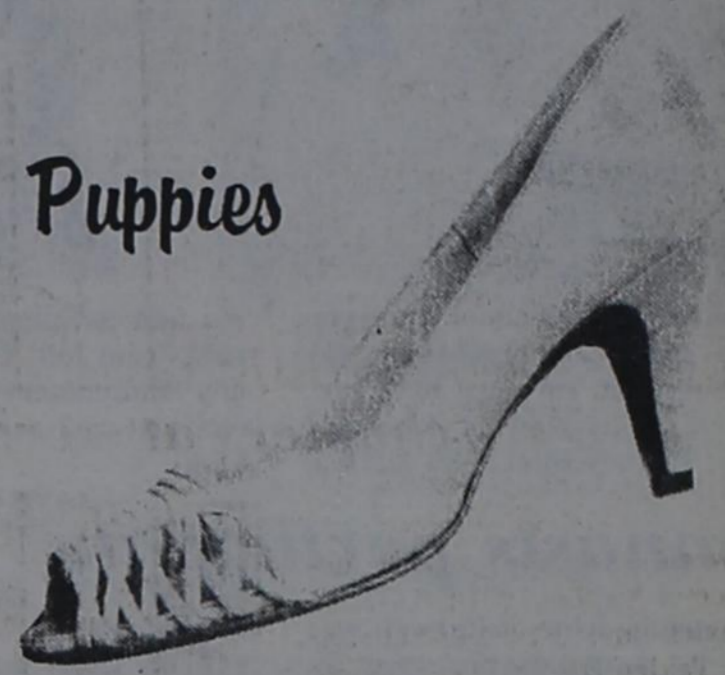

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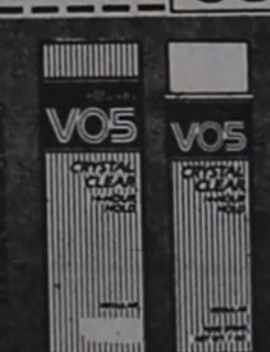

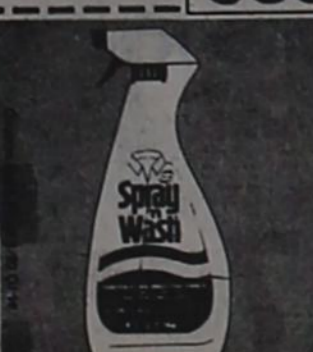

# Siege of the Alamo under way

1836: WEDNESDAY, MARCH 2. The siege of the Alamo continues. Colonel William B. Travis is now in sole command. Colonel James Bowie relinquished his co-command on February 24 after suffering an injury when placing a cannon. He has since developed a high fever.

On February 24, Colonel Travis issued an appeal "To the People of Texas and All Americans in the World." Addressed to "Fellow Citizens and Compatriots," it says: "I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna. I have sustained a continual Bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man. The enemy have demanded a surrender at discretion; otherwise, the garrison is to be put to the sword, if the place is taken. I have answered the summons with a cannon-shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the walls. I SHALL NEVER SURRENDER OR RETREAT. Then I call on you, in the name of liberty, of patriotism, and everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid with all dispatch. The enemy are receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. Though this call may be neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible, and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due his own honor and that of his country. VICTORY OR DEATH." It is signed William Barret Travis, Lt. Col. Comd't.

Colonel Travis' determination seems to be shared by the entire Alamo garrison. Colonel Bowie made a similar commitment in a letter to Governor Henry Smith on February 2: "The salvation of Texas depends in great measure on keeping Bexar out of the hands of the enemy. It stands on the frontier picket guard, and if it was in the possession of Santa Anna, there is no stronghold from which to repel him in his march to the Sabine. Colonel Neill and myself have come to the solemn resolution that we will rather die in these ditches than give them up to the enemy." Colonel Neill is the former commandant at Bexar, before he was relieved by Bowie and Travis.

The Alamo has a total of 14 working cannons, but the supply of ammunition is limited. The defenders have put up earthworks in the inner court, and earthen platforms inside the walls to fire from.

The fort was reinforced last night by the arrival of 32 volunteers from Gonzales under command of Captain George C. Kimball. They were able to get through the Mexican lines without injury, guided by John W. Smith, except for one man shot in the foot by a Texian sentry. The Gonzales men have volunteered in full knowledge of the desperate situation in the fort, after they heard that Colonel J.W. Fannin had declined to send help from the main Texian force at Goliad. The Alamo garrison now numbers about 180, plus some 15 noncombatants, consisting of Mexican women and children, the American wife of one of the officers, and two Negro boys who are slaves to Bowie and Travis.

The Mexican forces are now increased to about 4,000, as predicted

by Travis. They have been staging constant feints and attacks, day and night, in an effort to wear down the defenders. Their cannon fire has not been effective, since they must stay out of range of Texian sharpshooters, who are taking a considerable toll of the enemy. So far, the Texans have not lost a man. However, the enemy is moving closer each day, protected by trenches they are building, and by buildings which the Texans unfortunately did not tear down before the battle. A major assault is expected at any time.

1836: WEDNESDAY, MARCH 2. A Declaration of Independence was issued today without a dissenting vote by the delegates of the Texas Convention which convened yesterday in Washington-on-the-Brazos. The document states that the people of Texas "do hereby resolve and declare that our political connection with the Mexican nation has forever ended: and that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent Republic, and are fully invested with all the rights and attributes which properly belong to independent nations."

All fifty delegates are expected to sign later. The signers include three native Mexicans, Jose Antonio Navarro and Francisco Ruiz, both born in Bexar, and Lorenzo de Zavala, born in Yucatan.

The document lists numerous grievances which were "patiently borne by the people of Texas, until they reached that point at which forbearance ceased to be a virtue." These include lack of trial by jury, failure to establish a public system of education, arbitrary acts of oppression and tyranny by military commandants, and piratical attacks upon commerce. The Declaration charges that Mexico "has invaded our country, both by land and sea, with intent to lay



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waste to our territory, and drive us from our homes." It states that after having induced Anglo-Americans to colonize the Mexican wilderness, the government has changed under General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, "who, having overturned the constitution of his country, now offers us the cruel

alternative, either to abandon our homes, acquired by so many privations, or submit to the most intolerable of all tyranny, the combined despotism of the sword and the priesthood."

The Convention will now begin deliberations on a constitution for the new Republic.
