trict champions in playoff action in Friona, and Linda Autrey and Craig Chumley were crowned as Texico's 1974 homecoming royalty.



will be consummated as soon as possible," Reed continued. "The Postal Service will do

its best to get the most qualified person and we hope that the community (of Farwell) will accept the new Postmaster," Reed commended. "The best qualified person in all aspects will be recommended to the Postmaster Selection Committee," Reed stated. "We are going to proceed with the process of filling the job."

When queried on salary for the position, Reed explained that the Farwell Postmaster job was a level 17 position. Starting at step one the job pays \$14,043 per annum and runs through eight steps up to

\$18,000 per annum. The Postal Service does not come under Civil Service General Schedule (GS) ratings, Reed explained, but rather has separate levels and separate entrance examinations. However, employees do come under Civil Service retirement.

Reed further explained that the revenue units determine the class of office and Farwell is a second class office. Level 17 is the highest second class office without city delivery, Reed said. However, the salary paid to the Postmaster is not determined by the amount of revenue taken in, according to Reed.

Reed said that Smart's termination would cause him to lose all Postal Service benefits

For this reason each interviewer needs some uninterrupted time each day to process the claims cases he or she has taken. Also, because of the complicated nature of the social security and supplemental security income laws, substantial training time is needed on a continuing basis. "All area residents are

How important is soil moisture before planting time?

It must be pretty important to most people because nearly everyone pre-plant irrigates. Pre-plant irrigation provides the moisture in most cases for crops to emerge and start growing.


However, there may be a better way. Crop residues that are managed on top of the ground save water. It has been proven that most soil moisture that is lost before planting time can be saved by using residues.

This can increase net money. If a producer only has to replace two inches of water instead of four inches the operating time on irrigation equipment is cut in half.

Residues are organic material and add soil nutrients to the soil. It is not uncommon to see residues burned off and then manure or compost applied. The value of manure is the organic material. Compost and mature application is good, but why burn the residues.

Farmers and ranchers in Parmer County who sustained production losses as a result of the drought during the period Aug. 14, 1974 through Oct. 1, 1974 may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administra-

tion, according to Billy R. Boling Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 207 Avenue D in Farwell before the close of business Sept. 15,

1975. These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (P.L. 93-237) enacted Jan. 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975.

Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is five percent (5%) and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured

by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.
