## Bond Set At \$25,000 - - Hereford Woman Slain; Ex-Husband Is Charged

The body of Mrs. Betty Carlisle, 22 of Hereford, was discovered in a parked car Thursday, Aug. 1, at about noon at the northeast corner of Bob's TV Service, 105 Ave. A in Farwell.

An autopsy showed that Mrs. Carlisle had been shot five times from the right side, according to Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace who, along with Deputy Tom Atkins, investigated the incident. Her former husband, David Carlisle, 30 has been charged with the murder. A .38 caliber pistol was recovered near the scene. Carlisle's bill found was also found near the pistol, according to sheriff Lovelace.

Pathologist reports indicate that Mrs. Carlisle was probably shot around 4:30 or 5 a.m. at the site where the body was discovered. The Pontiac Grand Prix, containing Mrs. Carlisle's body, was first noticed around 7 a.m.; however, passersby theorized that the woman might have been sleeping.

Ronny Anson of Farwell checked the car around noon and discovered the body. He

summoned his brother, Bob Anson of Farwell, owner of Bob's TV, and together, they informed Sheriff Lovelace. Bob Anson stated that when the car was first spotted early Thursday morning, all doors were closed. However, when he and his brother checked the car, the passenger-side door was open.

According to Bob Anson, Mrs. Carlisle was sitting up in the car behind the wheel. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Farwell Justice of the Peace R.E. Mears.

Approximately 30 minutes after the discovery of the body, according to Sheriff Lovelace, David Carlisle, accompanied by his father of Tulsa, voluntarily turned himself in. He was taken before Judge Mears for arraignment on murder charges.

Mears set bond at \$25,000 for Carlisle and ordered him bound over to district court for grand jury action. Carlisle posted bond and was released.

Services for Mrs. Carlisle were held Saturday in the Assembly of God Church in Hereford, with the Rev. T.W. Chap-

man of De Leon officiating. Burial followed in West Park Cemetery. Mrs. Carlisle was born in Oklahoma and came to Hereford in 1968.

Survivors include one son, Jerry Heggstad; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elgin Moore of Hereford; grandparents, Mrs. Martha Williams of Ryan, Okla., and C.H. Moore of Petrolia, Tex.; and two brothers, Randy and Ricky Moore, both of Hereford.

## School Improvements - - Preliminary Cost Studies Are Presented To Farwell Board

Farwell School Board members met Monday at 8 p.m. in the office of Superintendent W.M. Roberts to discuss preliminary cost studies for Farwell school improvements. This study was presented by Herbert Brasher, architect, of Brasher-Goyette-Rapier Architects-Engineers, Lubbock.

Items and costs discussed included construction of a new band hall, \$105,000; re-paving of parking lots and streets adjacent to schools, \$27,000; remodeling of elementary gymnasium building and wood shop including dressing rooms and shower facilities, \$63,000; relocation of bleachers, \$5,000; evaporative cooling in the lunchroom and kitchen, \$6,000; football lighting, \$28,000; and building of a concession stand at the athletic field for an additional \$12,000.

The School Board is in the process of planning a bond issue for late September or early October for an approximate amount of \$250,000. Bob Davis, bond advisor, of Columbian Securities Corp. went over the schedule of bonded indebtedness noting that this proposed program would add about 10 per cent to the present school tax rate.

School board members are still studying the cost presentation and will meet again on Aug. 19 at 8 p.m. in the Superintendent's office for additional discussion.

In other business, the School Board approved the hiring of Tom Adamson of Clovis to teach English and speech, Jack Howard of the Floyd-Portales area to teach math, and Miss Shirley East to instruct

science. All positions are in the high school. One position for the coming school year remains to be filled, a junior high science instructor.

Howard holds both bachelor's and master's degrees from Eastern New Mexico University. He has nine years teaching experience, all but one at the college level. Miss East also holds bachelor's and master's degrees from ENMU. During her three years of teaching, she has held posi-

tions in Causey, Floyd and Lovington. Adamson has both bachelor's and master's degrees and taught for three years in Muleshoe and for nine years in Clovis. He is presently in the insurance business in Clovis.

Board members present for the meeting were W.M. Roberts, Gilbert Kaltwasser, Billy Mayfield, R.J. Garner, Charles Aycock, Wilbert Kalbas and Ted Magness. Member Walter Hughes was absent.

## Good Samaritan Representative - - Farwell Development Commission Hears Discussion On Nursing Home

Members of the Farwell Development Commission met Thursday, Aug. 1 at 5 p.m. in the Security State Bank building to hear Wayne Muth, of Sioux Falls, S.D., representative of the Good Samaritan Society discuss the proposed nursing home for Farwell.

Muth began by giving a his-

tory of the founding of the Good Samaritan Society, a Christian organization, incorporated under the laws of the State of North Dakota as a religious, charitable non-profit corporation.

The Society was founded in 1922, Muth stated, as an organization of Lutherans who were concerned with providing care in a Christian atmosphere. Although the Society was organized by request of the Lutheran Church, it is not owned or controlled by any particular church body.

Starting from one small frame home, Muth continued, the Society has grown to include over 170 centers in 24 states with a capacity of over 16,000 residents in 1974.

Muth explained that there are two ways the Good Samaritan Society works with communities in the operation of nursing homes; first is ownership by the Good Samaritan Society and second is ownership by a local non-profit

organization with the Society serving in management capacity.

If the Good Samaritan Society serves in the ownership capacity, Muth stated, the Society must be invited into the community and the community must become financially involved with the project. The local contribution is based on 20 per cent of construction cost of the facility. The community must agree to provide men and women to serve on an advisory committee, he commented.

Under the Society's management agreement, again an invitation must be extended to the Society from the local community, and the advisory board will be the owner board with the Society serving as management.

"The Good Samaritan Society has a complete package on operation of nursing homes," Muth stated, "and this can be inserted into locally owned operations."

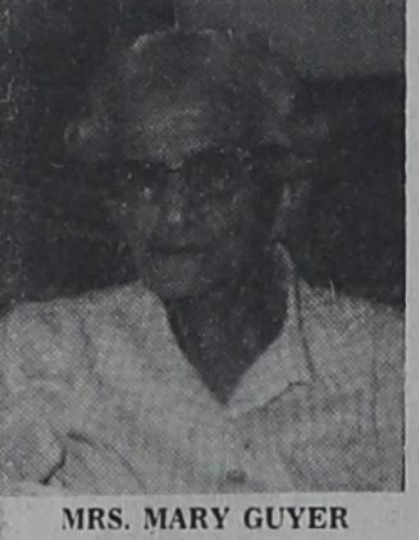
During the question and answer period following Muth's discussion, he stated that the Society is not presently constructing any new nursing homes, but rather is looking more into the management aspect with locally financed construction.

Muth stated that at present a figure of \$10,000 per bed is the current rate on which construction costs are based. Estimate of a 60-bed nursing home for Farwell had been given by Bill Nance at \$525,000, and \$595,000 for 120 beds.

Citing the necessity for a local nursing home, attorney Charles Aycock stated that patients from Farwell are housed in facilities as close as Clovis and as far away as a 100-mile radius. He said that about six years ago Farwell citizens started looking at the possibilities of a hospital and nursing home.

At that time the Farwell Development Commission was

## Gridders Kick Off Season Sept. 6

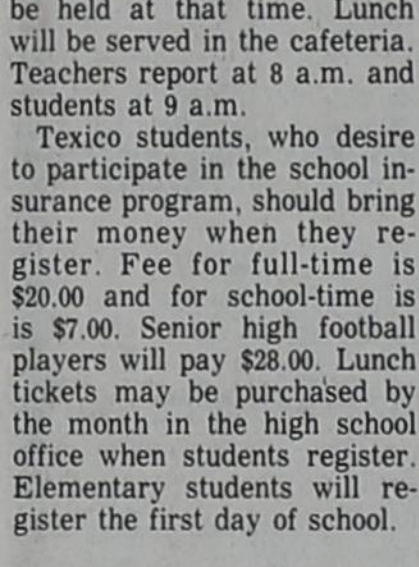

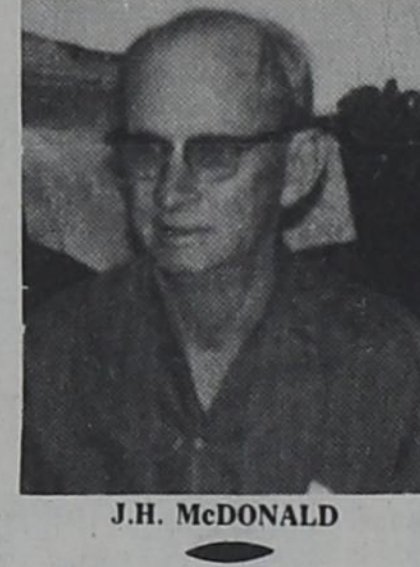

Cecil Defoor of Farwell escaped serious injury shortly after noon Thursday, Aug. 1 when the tractor trailer truck he was driving was hit by a Santa Fe Railway Company train.

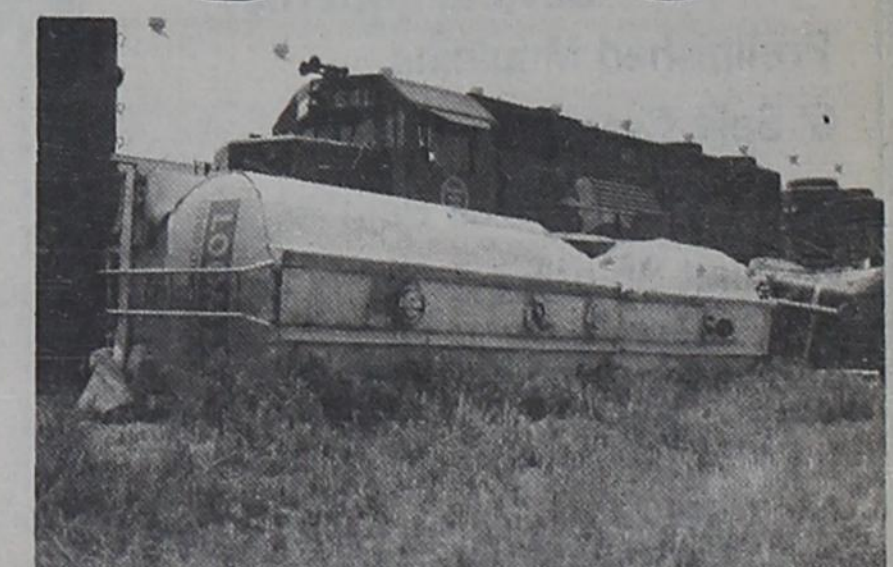

New Mexico Mounted Patrol, Troop 24, was officially sworn in July 19 in ceremonies conducted at the First Federal Community Room by John Nance, chief of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol.

Troop 24 recently formed in Clovis will be working with State Police officers in the Clovis area, under the direction of District Captain A. C. Jones. The New Mexico Mounted Patrol is in no way connected with the Sheriff's Department, Curry County Mounted Patrol or the Clovis "Five Watters" auxiliary police unit.

Officers of the troop are 1st Lt. Richard Kelley, Route 1, Box 110-A, Texico, and 2nd Lt. Don Lance, 1st Sgt. Phil Jackson and Sgt. Robert Jones, all of Clovis. Troop members are Ben Pritchett, Box 325, Texico, and Troy Barrett, Frank Chadwick, Alvin DuBose, Wayne Higgs, Don Stagner, Joe B. Taylor and Willard Williams, all of Clovis.

Kelley stated that, "it is the troop's goals to reduce crime in our rural areas, assist State Police in their daily activities and maintain the troop in a constant state of readiness to assist or direct in a state of emergency."

All members of Troop 24 have been trained in First Aid, consisting of emergency medical training from the New Mexico Regional Medical Program and the University of New Mexico. Included in this training was the Red Cross Standard and Advanced First Aid courses.

In addition, all members have been trained in the use of firearms and have qualified to New Mexico State Police standards. Training in all phases of police work will be given to the troop to enhance professionalism within each member. Troop members wear a distinctive uniform while on duty and are the same throughout the State of New Mexico.

The New Mexico Mounted Patrol was created by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico on April 16, 1941 by Senate Bill 128.

Members of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol may be detailed to assist and render aid in specific instances involving law enforcement or other matters when request is made for such assistance and aid by the New Mexico State Police or other law enforcement agencies.

When acting upon such call, members shall be deemed to be the agents or deputies of the authority issuing such request, shall be possessed of the same powers and duties as such requesting authorities.

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## On The Farm In Parmer County

With mid-summer upon us, everything green seems to be growing by leaps and bounds, especially the weeds. Broad leaf weed control is always a problem and continues to be so this year. Controlling these type weeds with a harmonized herbicide can produce good results, but controlling your neighbor's cotton or vegetable crop may also result. When this happens tempers flare and threats are spoken. Sometimes, fines are imposed upon the guilty party. So, before using such a herbicide a farmer needs to contact a member of the Texas State Department of Agriculture in order to obtain a permit to use such a herbicide. Mr. Newt Goodwin, from the Plainview office, has been working Parmer County for the past few weeks. He is staying at the Budget Motel, next to Clara's Restaurant in Texico. You can contact him there if you need a spraying permit.

The week of July 14-20 most of you heard about the Anthrax outbreak in East Texas. As of this date, the only confirmed diagnoses of Anthrax have occurred in Falls County. According to a report from one of the federal veterinarians working in the area, between 100 and 200 cattle have died, presumably of Anthrax, as of July 18, 1974.

Arly cattle deaths outside the quarantine area are being checked for the possibility of Anthrax. To date these have all been negative. The quarantine area is all of Falls County east of the Brazos River. Historically Anthrax does not spread over a wide area therefore the intent of the quarantine is to minimize the area affected by the Anthrax organisms.

Proper watering, of course, is fundamental. However, a void wetting plant foliage and soil spattering when watering as this leads to fungus diseases.

Insect pests such as aphids and spider mites are common on roses during the summer. An insecticide such as amilthion or diazinon provides effective control.

All spraying should be done in early morning or late afternoon when the wind is calm.

Continued blooms and plant growth depend on pruning techniques. Young, undeveloped plants can develop size by cutting stems short. Even on established plants, cut stems only as long as needed.

## At Home In Parmer County

The state of maturity at which vegetables are harvested varies from crop to crop.

In the immature state, snap beans, cucumbers, okra and peas are at their highest quality. Okra becomes fibrous and inedible if allowed to remain on the stalk.

Vegetables harvested in the ripe or mature state include tomatoes, eggplants, watermelons and cantaloupes.

Some vegetables -- squash, okra, cucumbers, eggplants, peppers, and beans -- will produce more if the fruit are harvested frequently.

In fact, the fruit's size and quality will actually decrease if not harvested frequently.

Other advantages to picking vegetables regularly is that they will be more tender, will retain more flavor and will be easier to prepare.

The vitamin content will be greater when prepared soon after harvest than at any other time.

Care should be taken not to damage the plants during harvesting.

Hold the part of the plant with the fruit in one hand, then snap off the fruit with the other hand. The fruit may also be pinched off with the fingernails or snipped with a knife or scissors.

Harvesting at the peak of quality can also have a great effect on how well fruits and vegetables will can and freeze. Vegetables and fruits should be prepared and processed as quickly as possible. An old 'rule of thumb' which should be practical whenever possible is "1 hour from garden to jar". If this isn't possible do take care of your 'harvest' as quickly as you can to preserve as much quality as possible.

Inner fabrics successfully applied to a garment achieve a professional look. But successful application depends on knowing what to use and when

and where to use it.

Understanding the differences among lining, underlining and interfacing can help the homemaker learn which to use.

Underlining is a second layer of fabric, constructed with the fashion fabric. It gives shape to the garment and helps prevent wrinkling.

Interfacing is attached to these two layers of fabric. It prevents stretching and adds strength to areas of stress. Interfacing adds shape to detail areas such as collars, pockets and hemlines.

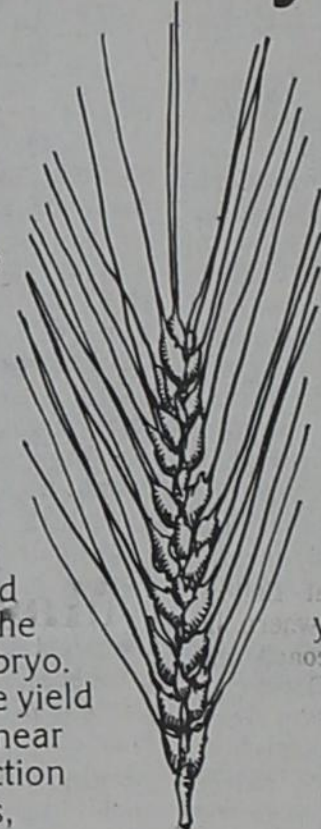
Lining covers the inside of the garment. The lining is constructed separately and is attached just before the garment is finished.

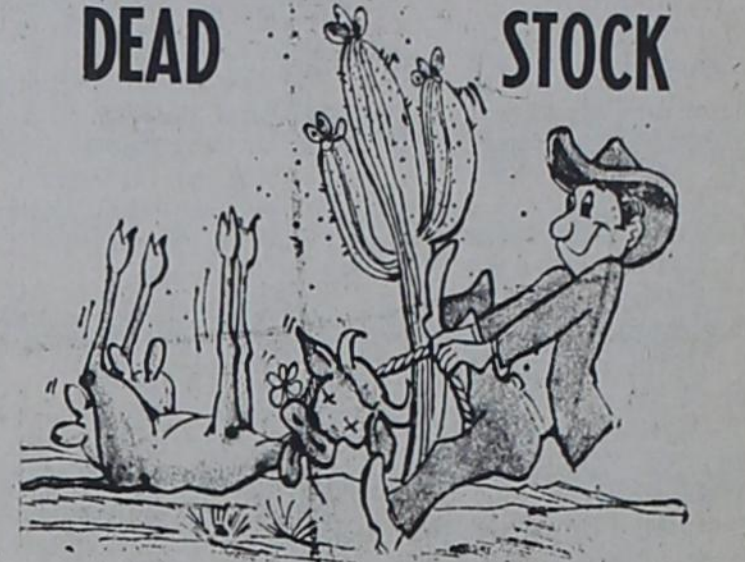

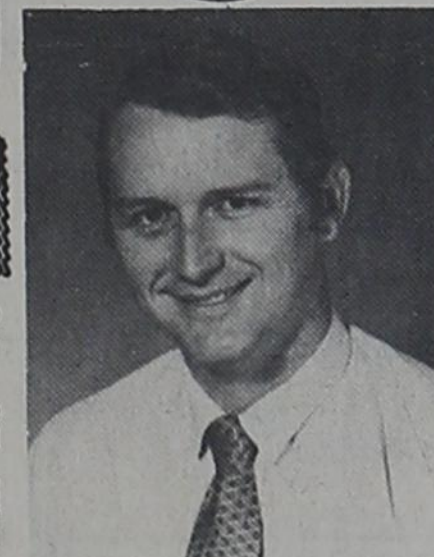
### Mast Employed As Vocational Ag Advisor

### GLORIOUS PROSPECT

To the true Christian, one of the most wonderful passages in the whole Bible is Eph. 2:7 where we read of God's purpose:

"That in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus."

This passage appears the more wonderful when viewed in the light of its context.

Verses 2-6 tell how we were all once the "children of disobedience," and therefore "by nature the children of wrath, even as others." But then we read those wonderful words of hope, "But God,"

"But God, who is RICH IN MERCY, because of His GREAT LOVE wherewith He loved us..." And the next verses tell how He has taken believers in Christ from the lowest position of condemnation and wrath and given them the highest place of favor and blessing in Christ at His own right hand in the heavenlies.

The simplest, humblest believer in Christ as His Savior has been given this position in the heavenlies, for God no longer sees him in himself, but in Christ, who died for his sins. This is why St. Paul so often writes about "those who are in Christ Jesus."

It is for the believer now to occupy this exalted position, to appropriate by faith the "all spiritual blessings" which are his in Christ (See Eph. 1:3). Like Paul, he may be lifted by grace, through faith, above the troubles and sorrows of "this present evil age" and enjoy his position and blessings in the heavenlies in Christ. And even this is not all, for looking far ahead to the future, the apostle, by divine revelation, goes on to say (in Eph. 2:7) that God has done this all for us, "that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus."

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## Portraying Area Homemakers

Our homemaker this week is sweet, petite Mrs. Don (Kathy) Weems. Her real name is Kathleen, but she says, "Only my mother knows me by that name."

Kathy is a native New Mexican, having been born and reared in Portales. She had six brothers and sisters to grow up with, and her husband had eleven. "I never thought I'd end up with an 'only child', she said. However, the Weemses' only child is nine-year-old Jeanette. Kathy modestly exclaimed, "Jeanette should be the Area Homemaker instead of me! She has all kinds of talents!" But it sounds like mama has a few talents, too.

She loves sports (the whole family does). They jog and ride bicycles as a family (not as much now as in the past). Kathy enjoys tennis, and would love to take a back-packing trip, but hasn't found the time yet. After Jeanette was a year old, Kathy decided to go to college. She got her BS degree from Eastern New Mexico University, and is now working on her masters degree in Elementary Education with emphasis on early childhood education and special education. After "mama" got her degree, "papa" decided to get his. He did, and now they are both teaching school in Farwell. Our homemaker loves house plants, and has many beautiful plants in her home and her classroom. The family has a vegetable garden, and Kathy loves to do home canning. "Not that we need lots of food, for just three people," she explained, "but just because I enjoy canning so much. One summer my sister and I were putting up some hot peppers, like you make chiles rellenos out of, and they ate the skin right off our hands! We haven't tried that any more!"

The Weemses are Presbyterians, but since there is no Presbyterian church in Farwell, they attend Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church. Kathy belongs to ESA and various professional organizations, and she helps with Jeanette's Brownie troop. Don helps with Little Dribblers and

The family is crazy about Mexican food, and they have it at least twice a week. Here is one of their favorite Mexican food recipes, along with a couple of other family favorites:

**Enchilada Casserole**  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1/2 can water  
1 c. grated cheese  
1 c. chopped green chiles  
1/4 c. chopped onion  
Tear up 1 pkg. corn tortillas into bite-sized pieces and add to this. Cook until cheese melts and onions are soft. (About 20 min. on top of stove. This can also be cooked in the oven, but is faster on top of the stove.)

**Chinese Chicken**  
1 chicken, boiled in salted water. Cool and debone into bite-sized pieces  
1 c. rice, cooked in chicken broth  
Saute in oil:  
1/2 c. cubed celery  
1/2 lb. fresh sliced mushrooms  
1/2 c. chopped onion  
1 can water chestnuts, sliced into small pieces  
1/2 c. slivered almonds, toasted  
Add all the above ingredients to cooked rice. Add poultry seasoning, soy sauce, and pepper to taste. Serves 4-6.

**Beef Stroganoff**  
1 small round steak cubed into bite-sized pieces. Salt, pepper, and roll in flour. Brown with 1/2 c. onion in skillet with small amount of shortening. Drain off excess shortening. Add 1 can Cream of Mushroom soup and 1/2 can water. Turn heat to low, cover, and simmer for 30-45 min., stirring occasionally. Turn off heat and stir in 1 carton sour cream. Serve over hot rice or noodles. Serves 4-6.

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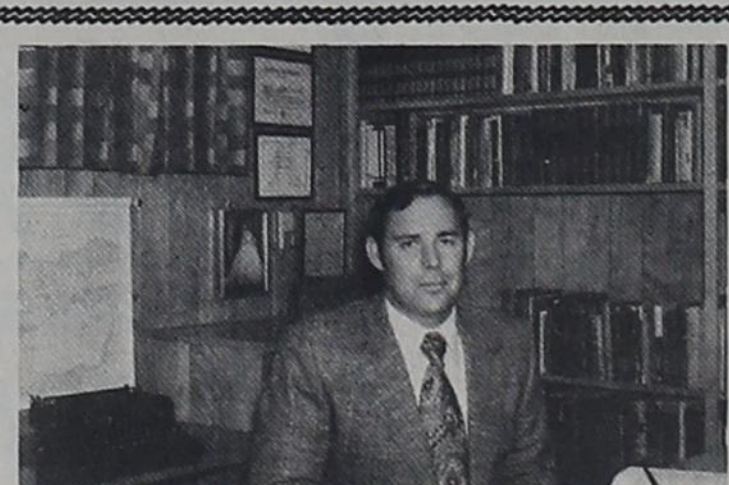

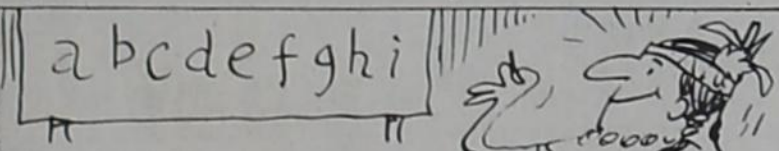

It is time to think spring. I received some Christmas advertisements the other day.

Having just received the Christmas suggestions it reminds us that spring '75 can not be far away. The Parmer County SWCD and the SCS in Friona have received the order blanks for trees for the 1975 planting season.

Like so many things these days, trees need to be ordered about six months in advance of planting needs.

The main tree plantings in Parmer County are for wind breaks. The tree that is most popular in Parmer County is the red cedar for windbreaks. When using cedars a double row is best.

Where space will permit a combination of trees such as red cedar, Russian Olive, and wild plum make an excellent windbreak and furnish cover and food for birds.

Special management of these trees is required when they are received.

If you are interested in ordering trees from the Texas Forest Service come by the SCS office in Friona or the County Agent's office in Farwell. Either office will talk over your needs and discuss ordering and handling of the trees.
