

The Santa Fe train, en route to Lubbock, struck the trailer almost in the center. The truck was dragged several hundred feet down the track and came to rest on its side.



With mid-summer upon us, everything green seems to be growing by leaps and bounds, especially the weeds. Broad leaf weed control is always a problem and continues to be so this year. Controlling these type weeds with a harmonetype herbicide can produce good results, but controlling your neighbor's cotton or vegetable crop may also result. When this happens tempers flare and threats are spoken. Sometimes, fines are imposed upon the guilty party. So, before using such a herbicide a farmer needs to contact a member of the Texas State Department of Agriculture in order to obtain a permit to use such a herbicide. The state of maturity at and where to use it. which vegetables are harvested varies from crop to crop.

In the immature state, snap beans, cucumbers, okra and peas are at their highest quality. Okra becomes fibrous and inedible if allowed to remain on the stalk.

Vegetables harvested in the ripe or mature state include tomatoes, eggplants, watermelons and cantaloupes.

Some vegetables - squash, okra, cucumbers, eggplants, peppers, and beans - will produce more if the fruit are harvested frequently.

In fact, the fruit's size and quality will actually decrease if not harvested frequently. Other advantages to picking

vegetables regularly is that they will be more tender, will retain more flavor and will be easier to prepare. The vitamin content will be

greater when prepared soon after harvest than at any other

Care should be taken not to damage the plants during har-

Hold the part of the plant with the fruit in one hand, then snap off the fruit with the other hand. The fruit may also be pinched off with the fingernails or snipped with a knife or

scissors. Harvesting at the peak of quality can also have a great effect on how well fruits and vegetables will can and freeze. Vegetables and fruits should be prepared and processed as quickly as possible. An old 'rule of thumb' which should be practical whenever possible is "I hour from garden to jar". If this isn't possible do take care of your 'harvest' as quickly as you can to preserve as much quality as possible.

Inner fabrics successfully applied to a garment achieve a professional look. But successful application depends on knowing what to use and when

Understanding the differences among lining, underlining and interfacing can help the homesewer learn which to

Underlining is a second layer of fabric, constructed with the fashion fabric. It gives shape to the garment and helps prevent wrinkling.

Interfacing is attached to these two layers of fabric. It prevents stretching and adds strength to areas of stress. Interfacing adds shape to detail areas such as collars, pockets and hemlines.

Lining covers the inside of the garment. The lining is constructed separately and is attached just before the garment is finished.

Lining provides a smooth and comfortable finish. It reinforces the shape of the garment and minimizes clinging.

Any combination of fabric applications - or all three together - can be used in constructing a garment.

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
