The State Line Tribune reaches another milestone with this issue. It was exactly 25 years ago that the present publisher assumed control of this publication, and we have been grinding away constantly since that time... never missing a single issue.

For many months we had looked forward to this date, and had entertained ideas of throwing a big party celebrating the occasion. But all these plans we had been turning over in our mind went by the boards when we folded up with a heart ailment on Jan. 6. The whole thing was given up when we went to the hospital.

Heinie Henderson was just in and said that this week winds up his 10th year in Farwell. We talked of the big celebration we would have pulled if things had worked out properly.

Heinie had planned a big feed to be followed by a grand frolic. But all his warehouses are full of grain and nowhere to throw the party.

To our way of thinking, one of the most important programs the Soil Conservation Service can give its attention to is the creation of at least two large surface lakes in Parmer County.

Two large draws cross the county diagonally and at times millions of acre feet of water flow down these ordinarily dry draws. We need at least one retaining dam on both Running Water and Frio Draws.

In addition to creating recreational spots, the lakes formed by these dams would serve as recharging sources for our underground water supply.

Such a program involves more than just going out and building dams. Rights to construct such dams must be obtained and there is a lot of ground work to be done before actually building a dam, and it is not too early to begin now formulating plans to that end.

We might wake up some of these days in the near future to find that water rights to Running Water and Frio had been gobbled up by other towns or counties.

Wouldn't this be a great program for the three active Chambers of Commerce in the county to take up in co-operation with the Soil Conservation Service?

Another sign that times have changed is seen when a farmer brings in a can of cream, sells it to the produce dealer then goes next door and buys several pounds of oleo. And that is happening every day in this county.

One of the biggest expenses of the state highway maintenance department these days is keeping the right-of-way cleared of bottles and tin cans, most of them of the beer variety. There ought to be a strong law against throwing beer and whiskey bottles along the right-of-way, punishable by ten days spent gathering up such bottles.

STILL UNSETTLED

Consolidation of two government agencies now operating in Parmer County, recently ordered by Secretary of Agriculture Brannon, has not been affected here.

A meeting was held at the PMA office in Farwell Monday afternoon, which resulted in no decision. A second meeting will probably be held here next week in an effort to decide on a location for the two agencies, it was announced here late Wednesday afternoon.

Offices affected by the order are the Soil Conservation, the Production and Marketing Association.

Farwell Lags Badly In Red Cross Drive

With only \$70 accounted for and the end of the drive 10 days away, Farwell is lagging badly in the annual Red Cross drive, according to Allan Romich, county chairman.

Friona is leading the eight reports from Parmer, although two were not available at The Tribune's press time. Romich replied "No" to the question posed him about whether it looked as though the county would be able to meet its quota.

If Parmer fails to go over the top, this will be the first time such a thing has happened since the inception of the Red Cross drives.

Other returns as of Wednesday of this week are Friona, \$402.50; Lakeview, \$50.18; Black, \$80; Lazbuddy, \$67.69, and Bovina \$165.85.

Romich reminds that the county goal this year is \$1340, a slight increase from 1950's, but he pointed out that Parmer counties were able to give \$1509.05 for the drive last year, and it appeared that this would far surpass anything that can be done this year unless the situation is met with promptly.

Reason for the lag in Farwell donations might partly be laid to the lack of organized soliciting. At present, there is no one acting as a chairman for the drive here, and Romich said he would make an effort to straighten things out this week-end.

Donations for the drive still are being accepted by Loyde Brewer at the county courthouse, he announced this week.

Annual spring fat stock and dairy show for Parmer County 4-H and FFA boys is planned for April 13-14 at the show barns in Friona, it was announced today.

County Agent Joe Jones; J. T. Gees, agriculture instructor at Friona; Weldon Spinks, ag teacher at Bovina; and Robert "Prof" Morton, Farwell agriculture instructor, met the past week to set up the classes for the show.

Finale of the event will be the auction sale held at the barns, on Saturday afternoon, officials report. Entries in all classes are limited to bonafide members of Parmer County 4-H clubs and FFA chapters.

All entries must be in the show barns by Friday, April 13 at 9 o'clock in the morning, with the exception of boys who have entries in the Dairy Show at Plainview, Texas. This group may have until 9 o'clock Saturday morning to get their dairy entries in the barns.

Judges for the show are tentative. Judging will begin at 9 o'clock Friday morning and will continue through Saturday afternoon. To be rated first will be fat hogs, then breeding swine will be judged at 10:30. Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock beef (breeding animals) will be judged followed by the beef (fat steers) contest at 2 o'clock.

Dairy judging is planned at 9:30 Saturday morning; and beef classification according to grade will be made that afternoon at 2. The sale is planned for 3 o'clock.

Rules and regulations for the swine department state that classes will be set up for each breed with two additional classes for cross breeds in the fat hog division. Five or more pigs of the same breed constitute a class; where there are less than five entries in a class, breeds will be combined to form a class.

One exhibitor may enter two hogs in each class, it was pointed out. Gilts that show in the fat hog class are ineligible to show in the gilt class. Fat litters consist of five or more hogs weighing 160 pounds and up, it was explained.

It was also pointed out that exhibitors with fat litters may also exhibit a pen of three fat hogs from this litter and two hogs can be shown as individuals.

Swine Department

- Classes of swine include:
1. Fat barrows weighing 160 pounds to 225 pounds.
 2. Fat barrows weighing 225 lbs. and over.
 3. Fat litter consisting of five or more hogs 160 lbs. and over.
 4. Pen of three fat hogs weighing 160 lbs. and over.
 5. Open gilts 160 lbs. to 225 lbs.
 6. Open gilts 225 lbs. and over.
 7. Bred gilts.
 8. Sow and litter.
 9. Sows.

Beef Cattle Department

Fat classes and premiums in the beef cattle department were also explained.

1. Pen of 5.
2. Pen of 3.
3. Individuals—Light weights, 750 lbs. and under; medium weights, 750 lbs. to 900 lbs.; and heavy weights, 900 lbs. and over.

Classes according to grade include: choice, good, commercial, and utility. Breeding classes are: heifers under one year, heifers 1 to 2 years; heifers over 2 years, cow; and cow and calf.

Special classes to be represented are: highest average daily gain on a pen of 5 calves purchased before July 1, 1950; highest average daily gain on pen of 5 calves purchased after July 1, 1950; and highest average daily gain on a pen of 3 calves.

Dairy Cattle Department

The following classes will be used for each breed of dairy cattle.

1. Heifers dropped after July 1, 1950.
2. Heifers dropped from January 1, 1950 to June 30, 1950.
3. Heifers dropped from July 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.
4. Heifers dropped from July 1, 1948 to June 30, 1948.
5. Cows dropped from July 1, 1947 to December 31, 1947.
6. All cows dropped before July 1, 1947.
7. Jr. Champion from Classes 1, 2, and 3.
8. Sr. Champion from Classes 4, 5, and 6.
9. Grand Champion Female from Classes 7 and 8.
10. Bulls dropped after July 1, 1950.
11. Bulls dropped from January 1, 1950 to June 30, 1950.
12. Bulls dropped from July 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.
13. Bulls dropped from July 1, 1948 to June 30, 1948.
14. Bulls dropped from July 1, 1947 to June 30, 1947.

Reservations for the Explorer Scout Fishing Expedition sponsored by the Eastern New Mexico Area Council are coming into the council office rapidly and John Clardy, Field Scout Executive of Tucumcari who is to be in charge urged Explorers to forward their reservations to Box 791 Roswell before April 6. Clardy stated that the maximum Explorers and leaders that can be handled is 60 and after that number has come in the remainder will have to be turned down.

The expedition will open at Conchas Lake Friday evening April 13 with a campfire and program. Early Saturday morning the Explorers will take out to the lake and remain for the day. Lunches will be prepared and taken with them. On returning Saturday evening a fish supper will be prepared and followed by a campfire program. The expedition will officially close Sunday morning at 7 o'clock. If adult leaders wish to stay longer they may.

A large number of Tucumcari fishermen are using their boats for the explorers and will be in direct charge of the boats at all times. Each explorer will be furnished a life jacket which will be worn at all times.

Crim and the Indians Predict Weather

Parmer County has a new weather prophet. Well, not exactly a new one, but at least he isn't heard from three times a day over the radio.

Still, he does his weather forecasting just as regularly (and probably more pains takingly) than the professional meteorologists we are always hearing from. His name is J. W. Crim, and he lives in the Lazbuddy community. Once a year (that's regular, isn't it?) he takes an all-inclusive look at the weather and makes a sweeping statement about how it will turn out.

He's always been a farmer so the weather means just one thing to him: whether he will or won't make a crop. Crim doesn't pull any punches, and this year he isn't very optimistic about the crop outlooks. He just reads the signs and reports accordingly.

Old Indian Legend

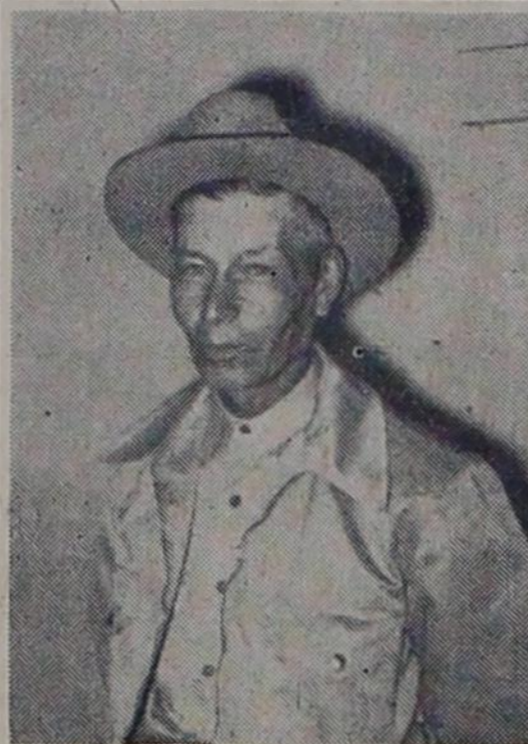
"There is an old Indian legend," the farmer-forecaster says, "to the effect that a fire burning at sunrise on March 22 will give signals through its smoke indicating whether the year will be a good one for crops or not."

Crim goes on to say that if the smoke from the fire at this time is carried west or southwest, there will be a bumper crop. If the wind is from the north or northwest and carries the smoke south or southeast, the crop will be average. Wind from the west, south, or southwest indicate bad years, and a southeast wind means a very poor crop is coming.

With all this information at hand, Crim and his three sons got up early last month on the 22nd, and lit their fire about 15 minutes before sunrise. His boys take an active part in the ceremony, and are given appropriate Indian names, Chief Big Drink, Dancing Red Eye, and the squaw man are typical titles assigned to these junior medicine men.

Bad Crop Year

"We found the wind to be from the south to the southwest, indicating a bad crop year," Chief Crim said. He reports that all the readings are taken exactly at sunrise in order to be accurate. "It doesn't matter whether you can see the sun or not," he says.

Crim has been building these tell-all bonfires for 26 years in Parmer County, and finds his calculations to be quite accurate, "generally speaking." He has missed a few times, he admits, but then so have some people who take considerably greater pains for forecasting.

"A lot of people have laughed at me," Crim smiled with his tongue in his cheek, "but I notice that next year they are always coming back to ask me how the crop is going to turn out."

The Lazbuddy prophet says he would like to point out that the forecasts deal more with the row crop than the wheat crop. "Last year when we had a virtual washout on wheat, the row crop turned in pretty well," he recounts. And the sunrise fire predicted the outcome of the rowcrop, too.

"You see, when the Indians used this means of foretelling the weather for crops, they were most interested

in the plants that matured later in the year," Crim explains.

The forecast may call for a bad crop year and the wheat to turn out well, or vice-versa.

Where Did It Come From?

How was this legend handed down? As far back as Crim can track it in his memory is the practice of the late J. J. Wilborn of Post in 1906. The Lazbuddy farmer is sure that the story has been in the family for many generations more, however.

According to Crim the fire-building was continued by U. O. Steven of Post and Judge Clark M. Mulligan of Lubbock. Mulligan was district judge at Lubbock, and died only last year. The legend was given Crim by his father.

Other of Crim's forecasts were an east wind in 1948, and "a slow north-east wind" in 1949 and 1950.

Editor's note: We see in J. M. Forbe's column, "Mr. Muleshoe" that two other men in our area are trying out the Indian signs. They are Bert Mathis and Shorty Davis (presumably of Muleshoe.)

Curry County Defense Bond Report Given

Curry County residents invested \$26,681.25 in Defense Bonds during last February Reece Cagle Chairman of this County Defense Bond Committee has announced.

"For January, 1951, the total was \$40,885.00," the chairman said, "and in February, 1950, the total was \$34,447.50."

"Series E Bonds attracted \$26,681.25 of the total in February, \$33,885.00 in January, and \$32,447.50 in February, 1950," Mr. Cagle said.

The chairman reminds us that Congress has approved the Treasury's optional plan to extend the term of maturing Series E Bonds for another

ten years. Interest will accumulate at 2½ per cent for seven years and an average of 3 and one-third per cent simple interest for the second ten-year period. Owners may also exchange Series E Bonds for G's; or they may, of course, cash them at any bank at any time.

Parmer Included In New Water Reservoir

All of Hale, Lubbock, Parmer and Swisher counties and parts of 17 other High Plains counties are included in an underground water reservoir designated by the State Board of Water Engineers.

The designation was delivered by James S. Guleke, member of the board, at a meeting Thursday in Lubbock of the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, which had petitioned for the reservoir designation in order to determine boundaries of a proposed underground water conservation district.

Included in the reservoir are parts of Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Terry and Cochran counties.

A map showing the act boundaries of the reservoir has been filed in the county seat of each county.

The designation clears the way for the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association to petition the Board of Water Engineers to create an underground water conservation district.

The association will draw up petitions and forward them to each county represented in the reservoir designation. As soon as the petitions are signed, they will be mailed to the Board of Water Engineers.

When created, the proposed district will carry out a water conservation program through proper spacing of wells, prevention of pollution, educational programs and re-charging.

In making the description, the Board pointed out that the proposed district will be the first of its kind in the world. Embracing about 13,000,000 acres, the High Plains pool is also the largest underground water reservoir in the world.
