The Tribune stuck out its neck last week way out. The lead story on the front page of this paper was misleading, and in some instances, untrue. We've been called on the carpet so heavily for this that if we can straighten out what has been said, we'll be only to glad to.

For one thing, it should not be said generally that county taxes were raised. They were in some instances, but they were lowered in others. It was a simple process of adjustment and nothing else.

For instance, the Commissioners' Court drew up what it considered to be a more just formula for the assessment of taxes. It was not a formula for raising additional taxes-simply one to put taxation on a more fair

Old Method Discarded

Eighteen or twenty years ago it was decided that the land valuation for Parmer county would be determined by the distance of the land from the county seat. This meant that a washed-out gulch, if two miles from Farwell, was worth (in relation to the amount of taxation) a lot more than improved and irrigated land that might be as far as 30 miles away from the county seat.







WILDCATTERS TO DRILL FOR

The never-ending search for oil has period. carried wildcatters to the top of a 6,880-foot mountain in California. To bring equipment to their lofty drilling site, the company has constructed an 8½ mile road at a cost of \$80,060. Water for the operation will be pumped up through a six-mile pipe from a water well drilled 3,000 feet down the mountain. Because winter storms often close the roads in the mountainous territory, sleeping and cooking facilities are being installed at the rig.







The term insurance extension has expired and now I have no coverage at all. May I apply for new U. S. Government Lite Insurance"

A-Yes, so long as you meet the health requirements for insurabili-

Q-I took out a National Service Life Insurance policy when I entered service in February, 1942, and I allowed it to lapse when I was discharged in March, 1948. Am I eligible for the second special NSLI dividend to be paid in 1951?

A-No. The policy must have been in force at least three months between its anniversary date in 1948 and the date in 1951. Your policy was not in force for three months during that period.

Q-I was discharged from the Navy in 1946, and I was recalled to active duty in the naval reserves for six weeks in February and March, 1947. May I count those six weeks in computing my entitlement for GI Bill education?

A-Yes. All members of the organized reserve called back to active duty for 30 days or more on or before July 25, 1947 (official termination of World War II for







Military petroleum requirements are an important factor in total demand. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1950, these requirements were estimated at 101,887,000 barrels. While considerably below those for 1945, they were more than eight times 1941 needs, which amounted to 12 million barrels.

Jess Osborn First Parmer County Bench Leveller


Jess Osborn, Parmer County Soil Conservation District cooperator, is bench leveling his land in preparation for irrigation; and he is the first and only person in Parmer County who has already observed this prac-tice as far as Bill Kennedy, supervisor of Soil Conservation, knows.

Bench leveling is a new thing in this section of the county according to the supervisor, yet he thinks that the system will be used more because "it's the way to water." But development of the practice will be slow; it takes time, Kennedy adds.

The Osborn farm, located 4 miles east and two miles south of Oklahoma Lane schoolhouse, features 20 acres of bench leveling. Purpose of the practice, emphasized by Kennedy, is that farmers save water, increase yield, decrease erosion on irrigated land, and improved water application results are given.


After width is determined, engineers lay out the key guide lines for borders, then construct a diversion errace above the area to be bench leveled, thus protecting the area. On he Osborn place, the diversion places the excessive water on native pasture.


The engineers then stake out the borders by using key lines. A survey is made by the Soil Conservation, before the work is begun and after it is finished, Kennedy relates.

Discussing the cost, Kennedy says that the PMA payment on bench leveling is half of the cost up to \$15 per acre. The Osborn job ran around \$25 per acre, so it actually cost Mr. Osborn \$12.50 an acre.

Damaged highways, such as the Texas highway shown in this picture, are a hazard to the safe operation of automobiles, farm trucks and other motor vehicles.

It costs three times as much to build roads that will withstand the loads of big trucks now being operated over them than it does for the smaller trucks and automobiles.

Latest records show \$115,282,344 was spent on Texas highways for the year ending August 31, 1950.

A bill sponsored by the big truck operators is before the Texas Legislature. This bill proposes

- (1) to increase the load limit from the present 48,000 pounds to 72,000 pounds, and
- (2) to increase the maximum truck length from 45 feet to 50 feet.

Another cause of loss of stand is adverse weather conditions; also disease such as soreshin, angular leafspot, and seed rot. Diseases should be controlled by proper seed treatments; for strong, healthy seedlings will help eliminate some of the destruction caused by bad weather, Jones adds.

The county agent released inforstanding events for the scouts of the mation derived from tests at the Agricultural Experiment Sub-station at Temple, Texas, which show that cottonseed treated with 2 to 5 per cent Ceresan gave from 25 to 30 per cent better stands and 50 more pounds of lint cotton per acre than untreated plantings.

At current prices, this is a return of more than 20 on an investment of 10 cents, it is emphasized. According to Jones, treating cottonseed is a simple process and consists mainly of covering each seed thoroughly with an organic mercury disinfectant. Jones asks that farmers not familiar with the procedure should consult him or a seed dealer for details.

Many growers may prefer to have the seed treated by the seed dealer or gin, but they should make sure that the correct material has been used and that the seeds have been covered completely, the county agent concludes.


