Local Grain Dealer Is Arrested at El Paso

C. M. (Heine) Henderson, mayor of the City of Farwell, and large grain operator, was taken into custody at El Paso late Tuesday afternoon by members of the El Paso police force as he crossed the International border on his return from a business trip into the interior of Mexico.

He was first taken to the police station and lodged in the city jail, later to be removed and placed in the El Paso County jail, according to reports received here.

A warrant for Henderson's arrest was issued in Garden City, Kansas, last week, being charged with accepting a \$45,000 personal loan with a "spurious warehouse receipt" as security, which he allegedly left with the Fidelty State Bank of Garden City, Kansas.

At the time of his arrest, Henderson told news reporters that he had been informed by telephone that the Kansas warrant had been issued for his arrest and he was on his way

Late Wednesday evening, as The Tribune was preparing to go to press, dispatches from El Paso said that Henderson remained in jail at El Paso in lieu of \$10,000 bond. Attorneys for the Farwell grain dealer were contending that the bond was too high, and were insisting that the bond be reduced to \$5,000, which, the attorney said. he was prepared to furnish.

Amarillo Firm Gets Farm Road Contract

Bell, Braden, Barker & Gilvin Inc., an Amarillo construction firm, was awared the contract to build the farm-to-market road from the Oklahoma Lane school house to a point 81/2 miles north of Bovina, commonly called "cross roads," when the Highway Commission let a number of contracts at Austin last Wednesday.

The successful bidders submitted a bid of \$144,139 for the completed job, including grading structures, base and surfacing. The entire job will run a distance of 17.2 miles.

Work on clearing the right-ofway of fences and other obstructions has been in progress along the route since the latter part of last week, officials here stated, adding that actual construction work on building the new farm road would likely

Commodity Credit Corporation auditors began an investigation of the books at the Henderson Grain & Seed Company in this city last October, which resulted in the local firm being ordered into receivership when it was revealed that the firm was short several thousand bushels of grain sorghums and wheat, stored for the CCC, valued at more than a million dollars.

This objective is to 'Use each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities and treat each acre in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement."

Terraces, diversions, concrete pipe, contouring or any other practice cannot perform miracles and make land productive if it is not suited to conservation.

In assisting the Parmer County SCD, the Soil Conservation Service can give only that kind of help which farmer cannot do himself. It is a misappropriation of government funds to do small jobs or "chores" for farmers when they can do them without technical help.


