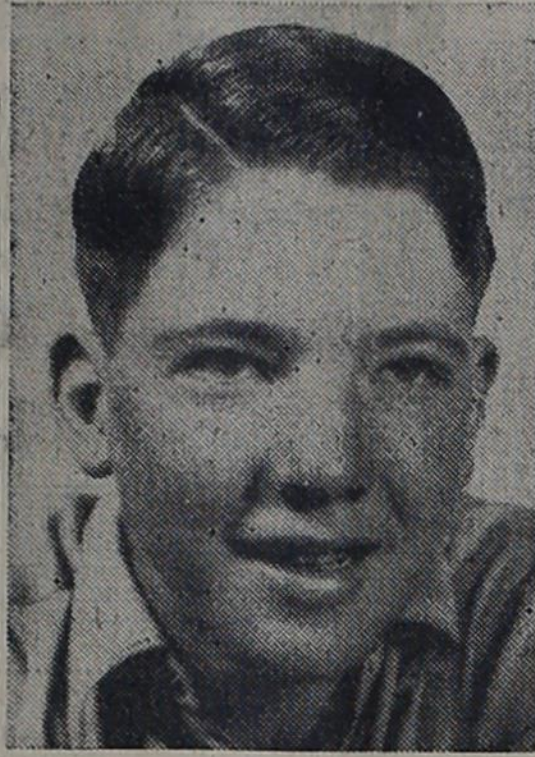
Then, on the other hand, the City Commission was right when they accepted the recommendation of the highway men and designated Third Street as the route.

Local Club Boy Is National Winner

COLLEGE STATION—Leon Langford, 16, Parmer county 4-H club boy, has been named a national winner in the 4-H Home Grounds Beautification Program.

Floyd Lynch, State 4-H club leader, said the announcement was made today in Chicago by the National Committee of Boys and Girls Club Work.

As a national winner in this program, young Langford received an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, which he is now attending. He was state winner in the same program last year and was not eligible to compete last year and was not eligible to compete on a state basis in 1951.

The 4-H home grounds beautification program is sponsored by Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen, Chicago, Ill.

Leon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Langford of Farwell. His demonstrations during the five years of 4-H club work have included beef cattle, swine, safety and home grounds beautification.

He started his home grounds beautification demonstration in January, 1948. Through careful planning and hard work he changed the landscape around the Langford home from an unsightly area littered with trash and rubbish to that of well-ordered lawns bordered with attractive trees and shrubs.

Cotton Piles Up At County Gins

Unginned cotton continued to pile up at the three gins in this county early this week, despite the fact that two of the gins were operating on 24-hour schedules.

Approximately 4000 bales had been ginned in the county when a check was made Tuesday morning, and ginners estimated that not more than half the crop had been handled up to that time.

Lariat lead the parade with 2325 bales being ginned up to noon Tuesday, with the North Plains gin at Friona handling 1312 sales up to that hour. Both the Friona and Lariat gins are operating on round-the-clock schedules. At Farwell, only 305 bales had been ginned on an 8-hour schedule.

Ginners were inclined to boost estimates of 8000 bales in the county, made early in the season. Predictions of 9,000 to 10,000 bales are now being heard.

Junior Robertson Receives Injuries

According to word received here this week by Mrs. J. C. Robertson, her son, Junior, is on his way to an army hospital in Japan for medical treatment for injuries received recently in Korea.

Pvt. Robertson didn't know exactly what happened, but he was hit on the head by an object, causing an injury to an old fracture which he received in a car wreck about two years ago. Robertson commended the way the boys were evacuated from the fighting zone, saying that they were loaded on helicopters and flown to evacuation trains immediately.

Robertson had been on the front lines for several weeks.

Robert Pekrul is being held in the Parmer County jail on a charge of forgery. He was brought here Tuesday from Brownfield by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace, where he had been taken into custody.

New Hudson Will Be Given Away

Creation Of Road District Gets No Action By Court

Taking the position that they desired further time to consider all angles of the matter, the Commissioners Court, meeting here Monday, deferred any action on a petition for the creation of a special road district in Precinct No. 1 in the county.

"We want further consultation with the Highway Commission and time to consider what effects such action would have on the other precincts of the county," a member of the Commissioners Court told a Tribune reporter.

A delegation of residents of Precinct No. 1, met with the Commissioners and presented their arguments for a special road district. Opposition to the district was also heard from land owners within the proposed special district, it was reported.

Should the special district be created, voters of the district would have the right to vote bonds for road building. Officials pointed out that such a bond issue would have to carry by a two-thirds majority.

Murder Trial Opens In Muleshoe, 3rd

Thomas Livesay and Lester D. Stevens, Amarillo smelter workers, go on trial Monday at Muleshoe when Judge E. A. Bills convenes district court in that city.

The pair is charged with the murder of Joshua Blocher, 85-year-old founder of the town of Progress, in Bailey county, 20 miles southeast of here.

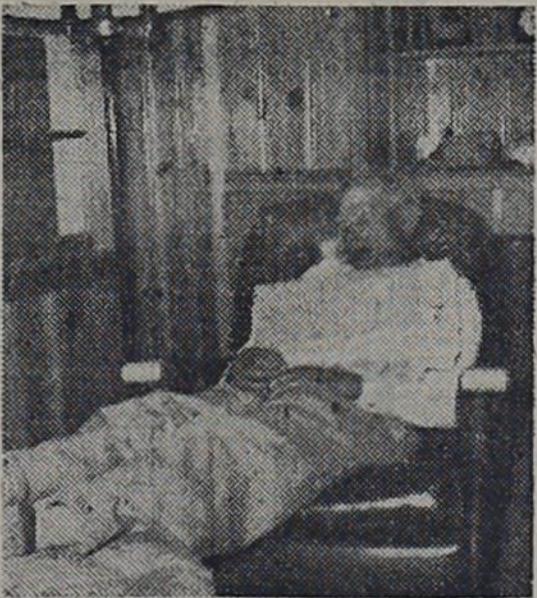

Stevens is being held in the Parmer County jail here, and Livesay is being confined at Muleshoe. The sheriff's office at Muleshoe reported Tuesday that Livesay had undergone an emergency operation for appendicitis last Friday and guards were being maintained at his bedside in a Muleshoe hospital. He is expected to be able to go on trial on schedule, it is reported.

GOP Congressman To Appear In Amarillo

Congressman O. K. Armstrong of the Sixth Missouri District, is coming to the Texas Panhandle early in December for a "whirlwind" campaign in the interest of the Republican party.

He is scheduled for two speeches in Amarillo on Dec. 8. He will address Republican leaders at a dinner in the Amarillo Hotel at 6 o'clock that day, to be followed by a public address at the Amarillo Junior College Auditorium at 8 o'clock. He will also appear at Borger and Childress at luncheon meetings on Dec. 7.

Congressman Armstrong came into national prominence when he "told off" Russian Envoy Andrei Gromyko at the San Francisco Conference. He hails from the President's home state and is one of the rising leaders in the Republican party. He has just returned from a tour of inspection of European defenses.

Road Route Through Town Brings Furor

The question of routing a tie-in loop through the City of Farwell to connect with New Mexico State Highway 348, along the Texas-New Mexico state line, came in for some heated discussion Monday night at a joint meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and the City Commission.

Previously, the City Commission had passed a resolution, granting the State Highway Department right-of-way privileges along Third Street, and the Commissioners Court had agreed to provide the right of way beyond the city limits to connect with the state line pavement.

On Monday, the County Commissioners reconsidered their previous action, upon recommendation of 28 petitioners asking that the spur not run down Third Street.

A resolution, signed by 23 members of the American Legion, asked that the road be routed along First Street, was presented to the Commissioners, and the Court accepted this resolution and passed it on to the Highway Department.

The City Commission, following Monday night's meeting, voted three to two to ask that the route be located on First Street.

A committee went to Lubbock Wednesday to contact Res. Engineer McCarthy with the view of changing the route from Third Street to First Street.

Mrs. Gonzales and small baby make their home with her parents just south of the Santa Fe tracks.

Pfc. Gonzales was killed in the vicinity of Sesackhol, Korea, March 2, 1951, and his body was returned here for reburial. He was a member of Company I, 230 Inf. Reg., 2nd Inf. Div., and the Silver Star medal is being awarded "for gallantry in action against the enemy."

Service Agreement Is Reached On Rural Phone Program

Service to rural patrons in the Farwell area was worked out in an agreement reached last Wednesday in Denver between the Mountain States Telephone Company and the West Texas Rural Telephone cooperative, it is announced by Leo Forrest, manager of the co-op.
At the Denver meeting, an agreement was reached for extended scope service, Forrest said, with it being agreed that the newly-formed cooperative (which will serve patrons in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties) will extend service to patrons in the Farwell area who are not now being served by Mountain States.
Basically, the agreement is the same as that made with Southwestern Bell for extended service to other areas of the rural set-up.
No further details are available on when bids for the project may be called, due to a recent Washington ruling that three major changes in the overall cooperative program must be made before final approval of the project can be granted. Forrest has indicated that he has hopes of being able to call for bids by the first of the year.

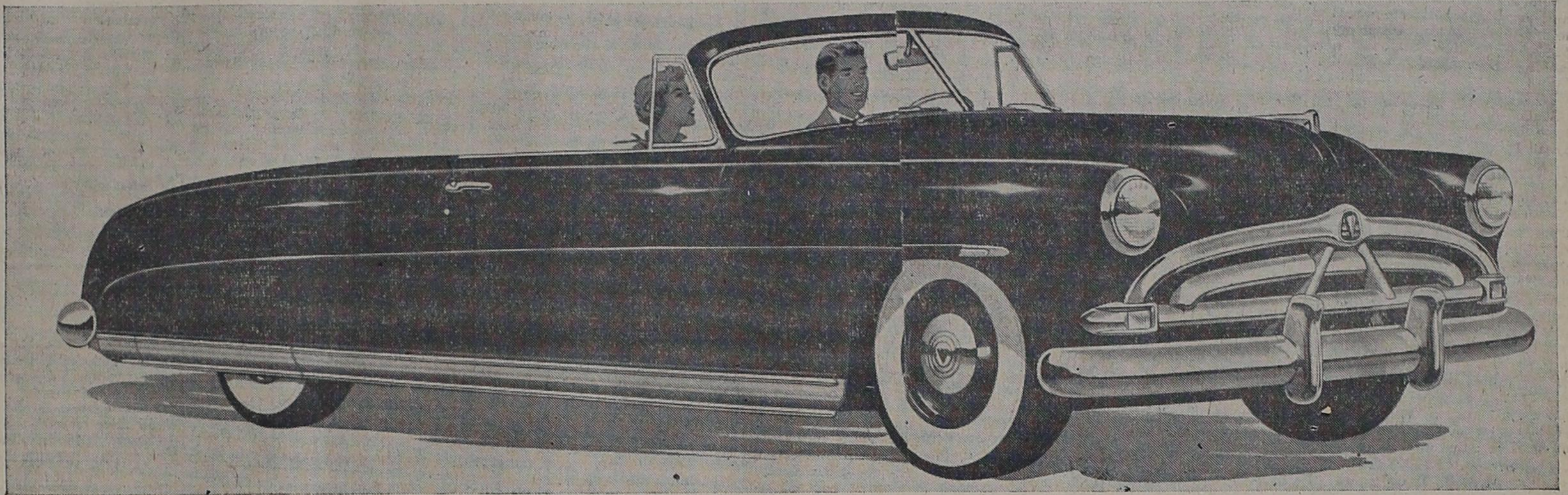

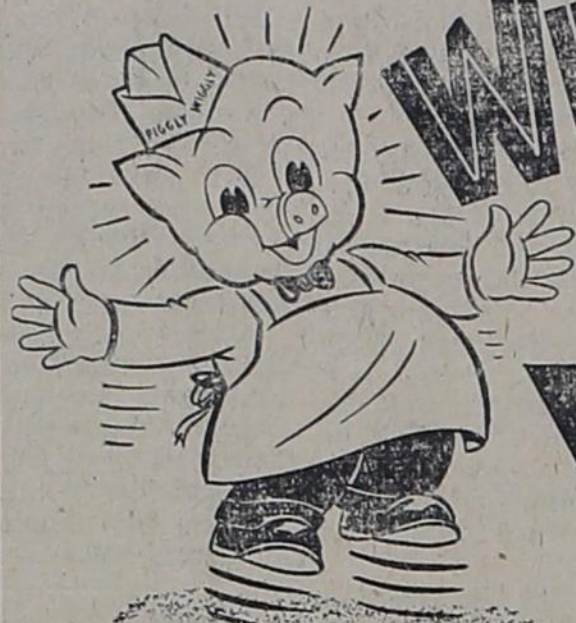

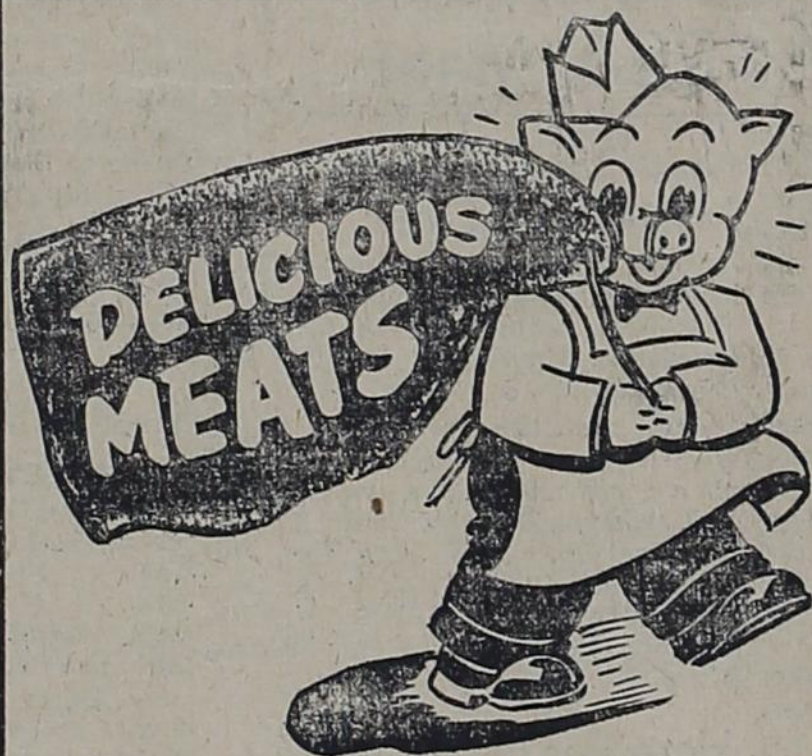

Parmer Defense Fund Drive Totals \$9056.25

Parmer County's sales totaled \$9056.25 during the first U. S. Defense Bond drive, Nathan Adams of Dallas, state chairman, informed Frank A. Spring, local county chairman. The drive was held from Sept. 3 through Nov. 13.

Final figures showed that Series E bonds accounted for all sales.

Sales of \$27,778,453.25 in Texas during the drive were almost 50 per cent more than normal, Mr. Adams said.

"Normally sales for this period would have been about \$18,000,000 or \$19,000,000," he said, "and the fact that sales were so much higher is definite proof that the people of Texas are responding, as they always do, to the country's need in national emergencies."

The sales total for the state included \$22,450,665.25 in Series E bonds and \$5,318,788 in Series F and G. There were no state or county quotas, as the goal behind the "largest possible" volume of sales.

Mr. Adams expressed appreciation to the thousands of citizens who served as volunteers in the drive, but urged that they continue their efforts.

"The need for buying Defense Bonds still exists," he said. "With our country engaged in a gigantic preparedness program, these bonds form an important economic link in our defense."

DHIA Gives September And October Report

September and October reports for Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement association were released this week. The September figures were higher than those released for October in all phases.

Fifteen herds were included in the reports. For September, 110 cows were dry and 250 were milking for a total of 360. For October, 219 cows were milking, 130 were dry for a 349 total. Association totals for September were: milk production, 190,270; butterfat production, 7081; average milk per cow, 529; average butterfat per cow, 19.8. In October, milk production, 170,180; butterfat production, 6665; average milk per cow, 487; and average butterfat per cow, 19.0.



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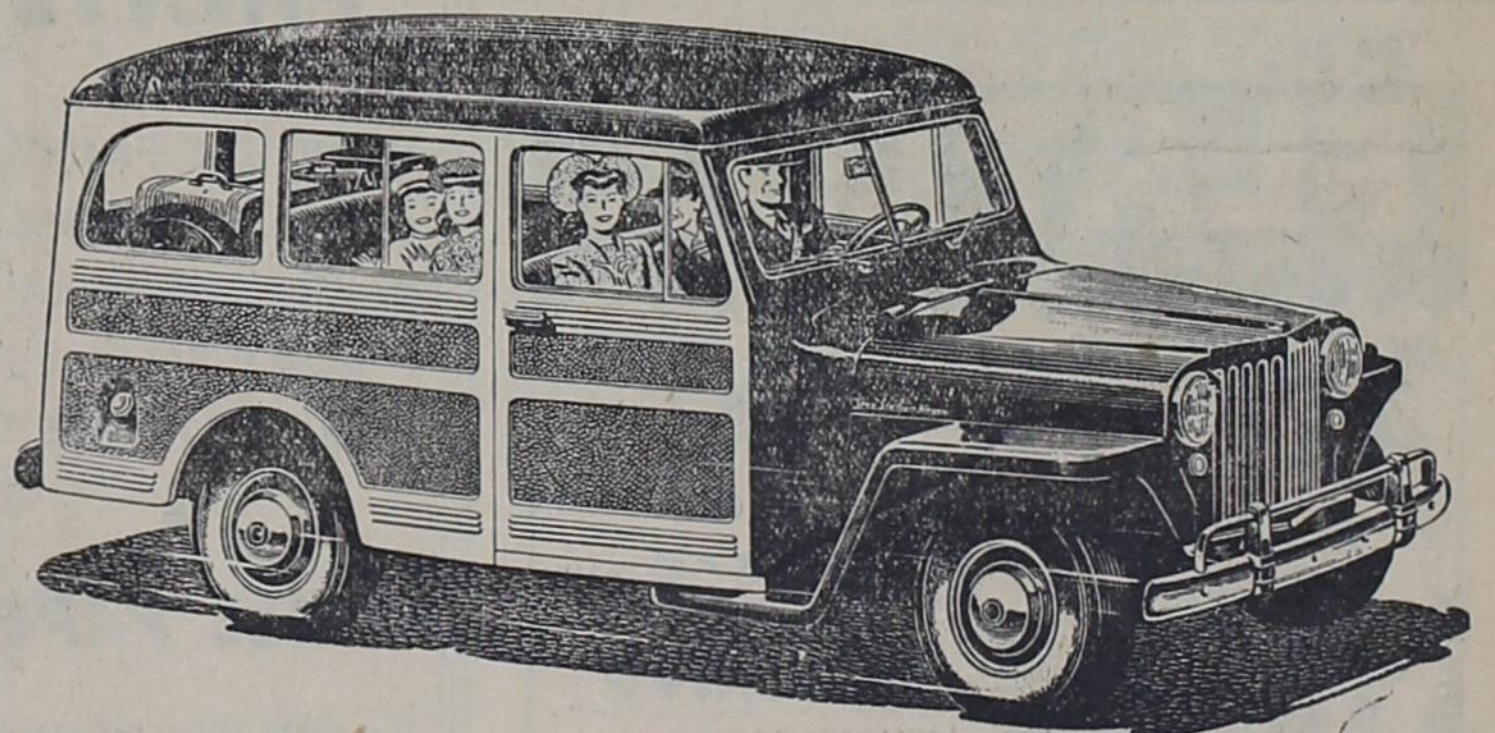

County Agent Joe Jones Gives Information On Greenbug Situation

Small grain fields are not likely to be damaged by an early build-up of the greenbug population this fall—as they were in 1950—according to information received by County Agent Joe Jones.

Dr. Ralph L. Hanna, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, points out that the weather was extremely hot last summer, a condition which is unfavorable to greenbug survival.

Surveys were made by the experiment station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture between July 15 and September 1 to obtain information on summer survival of greenbugs. Dr. Hanna reports that 425 field inspections were made in 71 counties. Several greenbugs were found on volunteer wheat in Deaf Smith, Floyd and Motley counties.

In a less extensive survey made in late October to determine the immediate danger of a general greenbug infestation, 71 inspections were made in 31 counties, most of them in the Northwest Texas grain area. Very few greenbugs were found.

If a heavy infestation of greenbugs should occur, parathion and metacide are the best insecticides available, says Dr. Hanna. These poisons proved to be the most reliable ones in 10 experiments conducted during 1950 in the High Plains area.

Although high winds and low temperatures often make effective application of greenbug insecticides difficult, Dr. Hanna says timely and careful application of parathion and metacide will kill up to 90 per cent of the greenbugs.

If conditions continue to be favorable for greenbugs, the population will build up again after the insects are poisoned. The number of applications of poison that can be made depends on the margin of profit expected for the grain field.

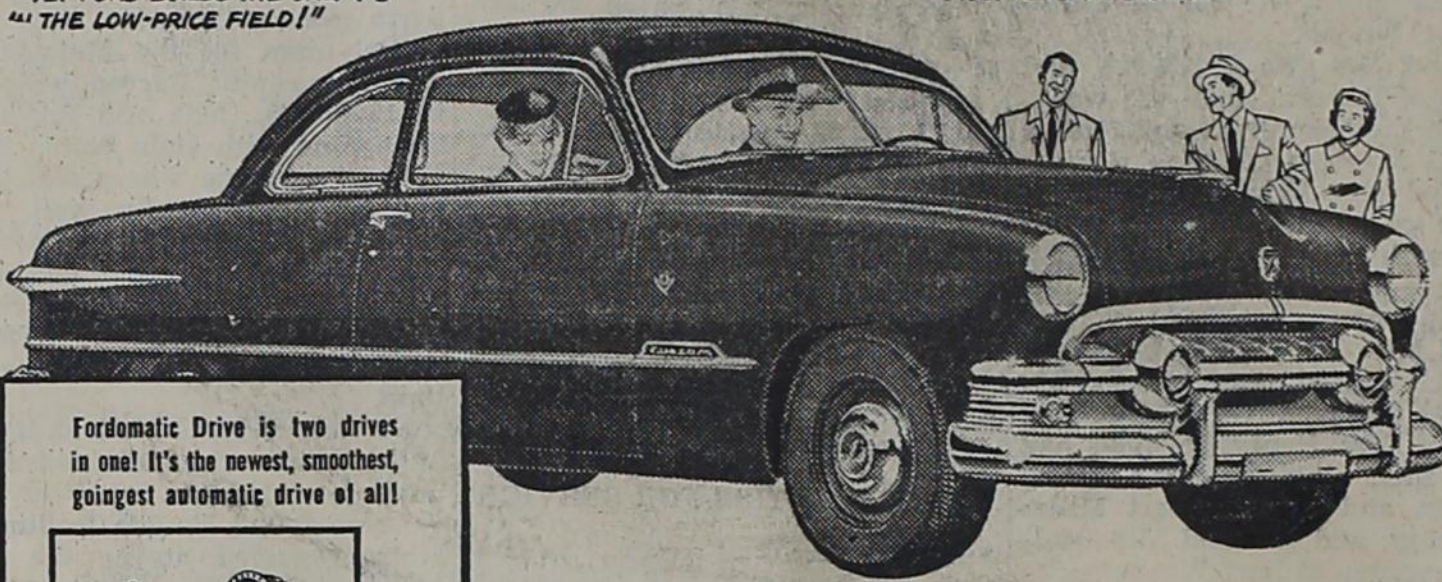
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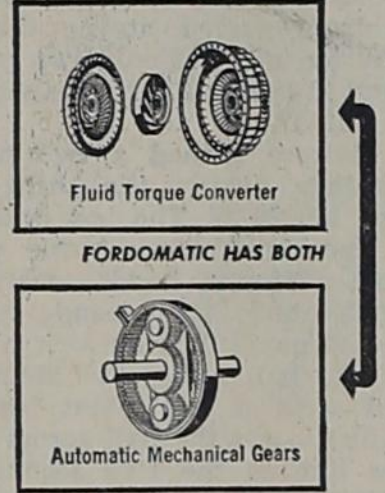

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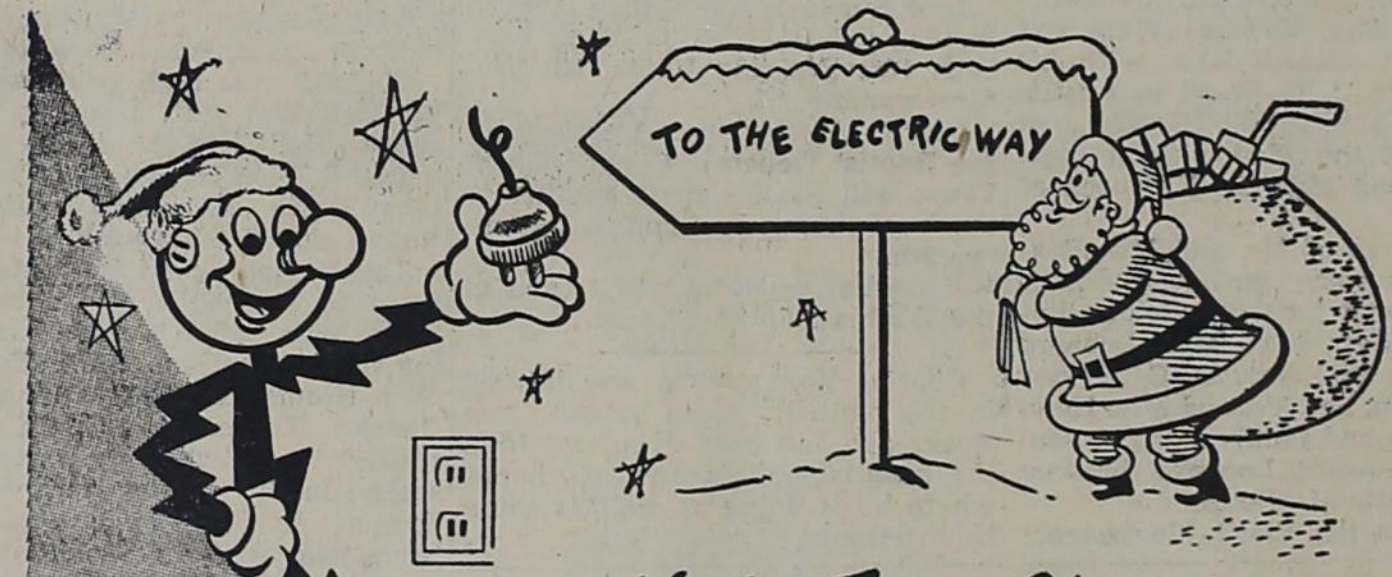

Friona's Newest Business Is Ginning, Literally, As Cotton Pours Into Yard

The Friona gin, established south of town during the past summer, is currently running on a 24-hour schedule, as the 1951 cotton harvest in the area hits full swing, Wright Williams, manager, reported on Tuesday morning.

At that time, a total of 1312 bales of cotton had been turned out, and Williams nodded to the gin yards, remarking, "We're pretty well caught up today, only have a little over 100 bales in the yard to go at present—one time last week we were 300 bales behind."

Just what the total may be expected to run cannot even be estimated, since this is the first year that Farmer County farmers have gone into cotton production to any great extent. One farmer, waiting for his receipts at the gin desk, opined that no more than 15% of the crop had been taken from the fields, while another put his guess at around 25%. Whatever remains, Williams said, will be undoubtedly be sufficient to keep the gin going at full capacity for some weeks in the future.

Overall, the turn-out from an acre of cotton seems to be running about three-quarters of a bale, the gin manager said, adding that some fields fell slightly below that and a few were exceeding the average. In the main, mechanical strippers have been put in the fields following the recent heavy freeze and very little hand-picking has been noted over the county.

Asked about seed disposal, Williams said that it was moving out rapidly, and estimated that between ten and fifteen per cent is being caught in local trucks by farmers for re-planting next year, with the remainder being hauled out to the Littlefield mills. Some of the cotton is certified, and a good majority of it is just one year removed from certification, he added.

Damp weather which hit the area last Saturday in the form of low-hanging fog and a slight drizzle slowed down picking over the weekend, giving the gin a chance to get back in the running of deliveries,

but with the return of good weather the first of the week, cotton in every conceivable type of carrier was pouring into the gin yards.

Activities Slated For Annual Mission Season

Activities which will highlight the Lottie Moon mission observance of the Christmas season at Baptist churches are slated to begin for local Baptists on Thursday night of this week, when a worker's conference is to be held in Dimmitt.

Rev. Russell Pogue, local pastor, announced on Sunday that the theme of the meeting would be of a missionary nature, preparatory to the seasonal offerings taken in the churches for such work. Goal of the Lottie Moon drive this year is \$1 million from Texas Baptists, with the money to be expended in South America, Africa, Mexico, Japan, and Korea, the latter drawing the biggest portion of the offering.

On Tuesday, December 4th, the local WMU will hold an all-day meeting at the church, with Mrs. C. W. Dixon in charge of the program on missions, Mrs. James Tarpley and Mrs. Leonard Haws will assist.

Concluding the seasonal program, the church itself will observe Lottie Moon day on December 9th, the pastor announced, with a free-will offering to be taken at the service.

ENGINEER VISITS COUNTY

Ray Grace, of Plainview, was in Farmer County this week, looking over terraces, diversions, bench leveling and other engineering jobs. Grace is the engineer designated to represent the state conservation and the state committee.

BENCH LEVELING POPULAR

Ten farmers put in bench leveling this year for a total of 172 acres. First to break the ice was Osborn-Redwine, with 20 acres; T. W. Fuller followed with 8 acres; then Sloan Osborn, 7 acres; K. W. Neill, 8; Roy Euler, 27; D. L. Morrison, 17; Claud Primrose, 20; N. L. Tharp, 42; Bruce Parr, 1; and Henry Raseloff, 8 acres.

Nearly all of the above acreage is now covered with lush growth of alfalfa or irrigated pasture.

Bench leveling, sometimes called irrigation land preparation, is usually done on steep slopes. It can be done on gentle slopes easier and at less cost. In many cases it takes in the filling and leveling of small lakes. This practice provides for maximum use of rainfall, prevents erosion, and allows maximum efficiency of irrigation water.

To qualify for PMA payment in 1952 the benches must be parallel and the grade along the length must not exceed five hundredths of a foot per 100 feet. Seven jobs are already on schedule to be done next spring.

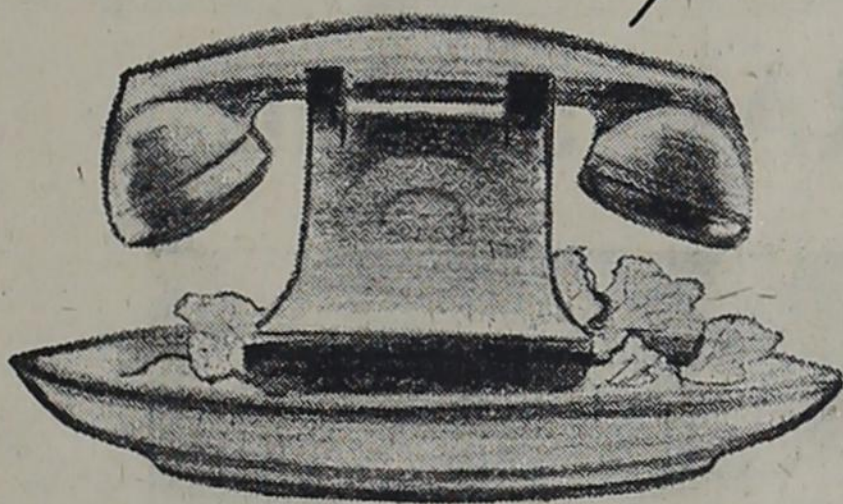

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Lazbuddie Squeaks Past Darrouzett For Bi-District Championship in 32-33 Game

Lazbuddie led by one slim point when the smoke of battle cleared away last Thursday afternoon in a scrap-fire scoring battle staged on the Lazbuddie gridiron when the Longhorns and Darrouzett battled it out for the bi-district six-man title. Final score, which Darrouzett came within a hair-breath of changing in the final minute of play, was 33 for Lazbuddie and 32 for the visitors.

In fact, had it not been for Ted Treider and Shan Foster, Darrouzett would likely have won, 34-33, when Bobby Schneider tried a drop-kick for an extra two points following the final touchdown of the game with 1 minute and 10 seconds left to play. Treider and Foster plunged into the Darrouzett backfield and the attempted kick slammed off Treider's side as he leaped into the air to knock the ball down and save the game for the Lazbuddians.

So far as the three-hundred-odd spectators were concerned, however, the outstanding player on the field during the game was Clarence Helfenbein, backfield man of the visitors, who did everything—and did it well. Helfenbein carried the ball for gains time and time again, fired beautiful passes, got out of apparently inextricable jams and was superb on defensive work. Not to be slighted, too, was his running mate, Lee Herber, who was no slouch when it came to running or passing the ball.

Leading the Lazbuddie team in ground gaining was Don McDonald, who looked like an awkward ostrich but managed to get yards practically every time he was called upon. On defense, McDonald was exceptional.

First Quarter

Things opened up in a hurry in the high-scoring game, as Darrouzett booted to the 15, Foster returned to the 30 for Lazbuddie, and on the next play McDonald was far and away down the field for the initial touchdown, reversing his field and

spinning away from Clifford Baker at the 10-yard line to go into the end zone unmolested. Foster's kick was good, but the team was offside, and the second try, a pass from Foster to Wayne Clark, failed to connect. Lazbuddie led, 6-0.

Foster booted to the end zone, with Darrouzett starting work on their own 15. Herber made a yard, a jump pass over center was incomplete, Helfenbein made 10 before Treider and R. Jesko nailed him, Herber booted and Lazbuddie had the ball on the 35. Paul Jesko got 5, then sent a pass downfield to Clark which was incomplete, but interference was ruled and Lazbuddie was set upon the Darrouzett 35. Herber got Foster for nothing, and McDonald fumbled with Herber recovering on his own 25.

Herber's first try was no good, Helfenbein's pass to Schneider was good but gained nothing, Herber made a yard, and a fake kick saw Helfenbein plunging on downfield to the 28. His pass intended for Moller was intercepted by Rufus Lucy on the 1, but Lazbuddie drew a penalty of 15 yards. Herber fired to Robbins, on the 13, then Helfenbein carried over for a Darrouzett counter. On an attempt to run for the extra, the ball was fumbled, and the score was tied, 6-6.

Darrouzett booted, with Paul Jesko taking the ball on the 15 and returning to the 25. He then carried again to the Darrouzett 35, where he fumbled, with his teammate, Clark, recovering. McDonald got four in the middle, Lazbuddie drew a 5-yard penalty, McDonald went six, Paul Jesko got nothing, and Foster made an incomplete pass to Engleking with the ball going over on the 30-yard line as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Meller carried for six; Herber went on downfield, being nailed on the Lazbuddie 21 by McDonald; Helfenbein gathered in eight, then tossed an incomplete aerial to Rob-

ins, standing in the end zone. Herber reached the 10 and then Schneider fired to Herber for a touchdown which put Darrouzett ahead. The line play failed to click, and the score stood 12-6, for the visitors.

Darrouzett kicked to the 25, McDonald got 5, then 8 which was nullified by a 5-yard fine; Lucy lunged to midfield, a pass try, Foster to Lucy, was no good, Lazbuddie lost 5 on another penalty, McDonald made five and Lazbuddie kicked in to the end zone.

In possession on their 15, Darrouzett sent Helfenbein to midfield, but the play was called back and the visitors penalized to their own 1. Herber's pass was wide, five yards resulted in two more attempts, and the visitor's kicked out of bounds on their own 18.

Paul Jesko snared five for Lazbuddie, then McDonald was into the picnic grounds again and his perfect conversion kick put Lazbuddie ahead, 14-12.

Foster sent the ball spinning downfield. Robbins received on his 10 and came back to the 32. Helfenbein crossed into Lazbuddie territory, Herber added eight, and Helfenbein passed to Beller, in the end zone, but the touchdown failed to count when Darrouzett was penalized 5. Helfenbein to Herber carried to the 3; Schneider to Robbins was incomplete; Herber got nothing as McDonald got in the game, and the ball went over to Lazbuddie, on their own 14. Only one play was run, with McDonald racking up six, before the half ended at 14-12, Lazbuddie.

Third Quarter

Lazbuddie kicked, with Darrouzett taking over on the 15. On the first offensive play, Helfenbein shot a beautiful pass to midfield, where it seemed a cinch to be knocked down by Lazbuddie—only at the last second Meller fell to one side, grabbed the ball at his knees, and with nothing but stripes between him and the goal, was long-gone for a counter. Schneider's drop kick was true. Darrouzett led, 20-14.

Lazbuddie took over on their own 25 on the kickoff; Paul Jesko got six yards, Rudolph Jesko added seven; and Paul Jesko went for a first at midfield. McDonald garnered three, then 10, Rudolph Jesko failed to go, McDonald lunged on downfield for a first down, and then negotiated a slick pretend hand-off which fooled the defense and enabled him to get into the end zone unmolested. Robbins blocked McDonald's kick, and the count was tied, 20-20.

Darrouzett started play on their 15, with Schneider tossing an incomplete pass. Helfenbein amassed 7, then was stopped for nothing; and Schneider kicked out, with Paul Jesko returning the boot to the middle marker. McDonald got two, then passed to Engleking on the 10, McDonald got nothing, Paul Jesko reached for four but a five-yard fine was called. Paul Jesko then gained the two-yard line, and McDonald swept left end for another counter. A pass from Paul Jesko to Rudolph Jesko clicked for the extra, and the score was 27-20, Lazbuddie.

Lazbuddie kicked off, Helfenbein received and was run out on the 17 as the quarter ran out.

Fourth Quarter
