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Two Bids Awarded By Commissioners Court

During the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court conducted Monday, March 10, bids were awarded to two firms.

Bids were open for two cars for the Sheriff's Department with only two bids being submitted. Bidders were Reeves Chevrolet and Friona Motors.

After due consideration, the Court voted to purchase two LTD Ford cars in the amount of \$3700.00 each, with trade-in; with the following provisions:

cars are to be white in color and per specifications on bids submitted. If white cars cannot be found within two weeks, green cars can be delivered at this same price.

Next order of business was the opening of bids for a back hoe for Precinct 4. Bids were received from Yellowhouse Machinery Company, Tucker Equipment Company, Case Power and Equipment, and Decker Equipment Company.

The Commissioners accepted the bid of Tucker Equipment Company of Clovis as shown on the bid sheet and \$4950 will be paid for the back hoe.

Next on the agenda was a discussion of insurance for the Law Enforcement Center. It was agreed with Wendol Grissom of Ethridge-Spring Insurance Agency that insurance in the amount of \$240,000.00 be taken when this facility is completed. This is 80 percent of the approximate \$300,000.00 cost involved.

The Court then discussed letters written to certain persons regarding the Court's position on several bills which have come before the state Legislature. After discussion, it was agreed these letters with bill numbers attached be mailed to the individuals concerned.

Discussion was further entered into relative to a letter from the Commissioners Court to the Federal Power Commission requesting that natural gas be redesignated into a priority which would not allow it to be interrupted during irrigation season.

Jana Pronger, county extension agent, reported to the Court that her mimeograph machine is in need of repair or replacement. The Court granted the agent permission to obtain prices on the equipment.

Depository forms were returned to the Commissioners with the approval of the State Comptroller's office and the county officials resolved that Friona State Bank be designated as County Depository for the next two years.

Commissioners ratified the signing by Judge Paul Fortenberry of a Panhandle Regional Planning Council Agreement on March 3. They also ratified the payment of Bookmobile expenses for 1975 in the amount of \$4,472.50.

Next item of business concerned the spraying of hormone-type herbicides. After much discussion the Court agreed that April 1 be designated as cut-off date for aerial spraying and that ground rigs be regulated by the State under H.B. 402. It is further suggested that ground rigs use canopies when doing this type spraying.

It came to the attention of the Commissioners Court that Charles Cerf wished the following advertised for lease:

Labors 1, 2, the E/2 of 3, the E/2 of 8; all of Labors 9, 12, and E/2 of 13, S/2 of 16, S/2 of 17, the E/2 and SW/4 of 18, and all of Labors 23, 24, and 25, League 317, Parmer County School Lands, Gaines County, Tex.

The Court resolved that the land be advertised as required by law.

It was further reported that the Caterpillar Company, represented by Ronald Strawn of Lubbock, had invited the Court to visit its facility in Peoria, Ill., May 5, 6 and 7.

Jaycees Elect Officers, Form Basketball Team

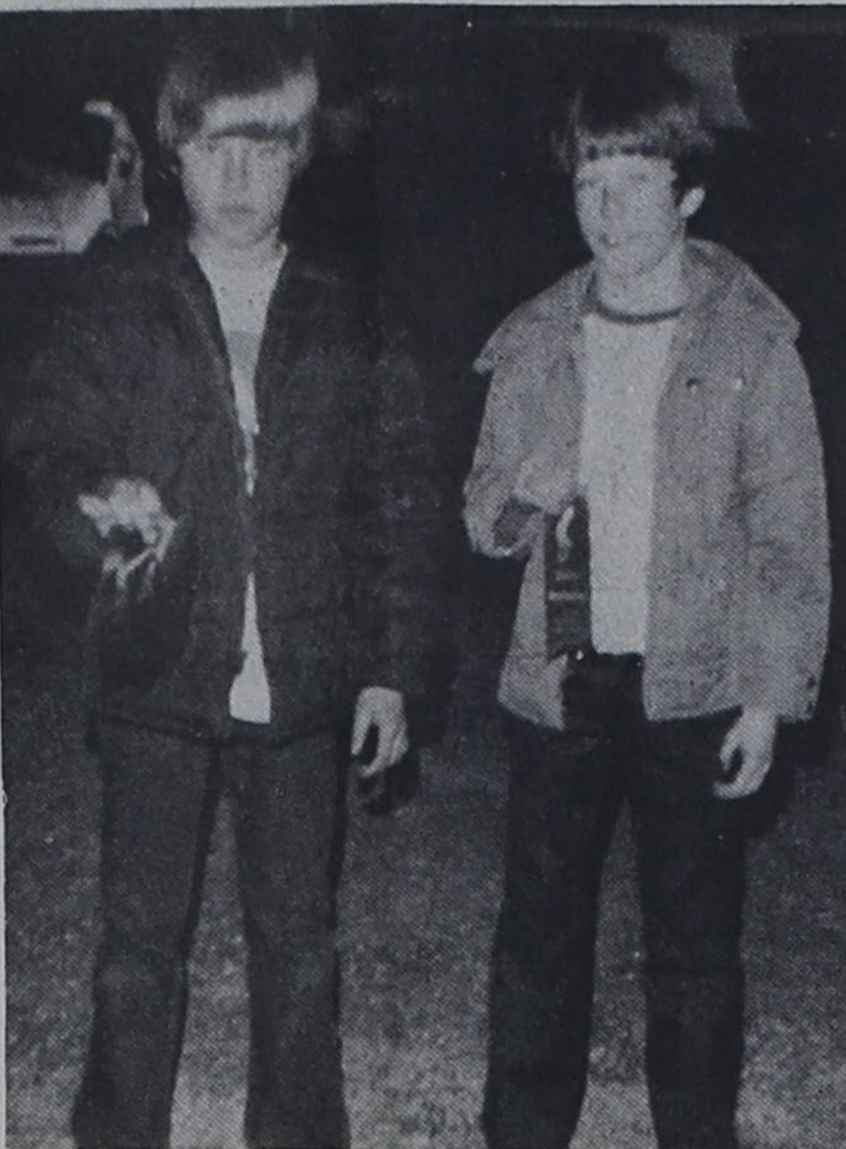
The regular breakfast meeting of the Farwell Jaycee Chapter was conducted Thursday, March 6, at Clara's restaurant.

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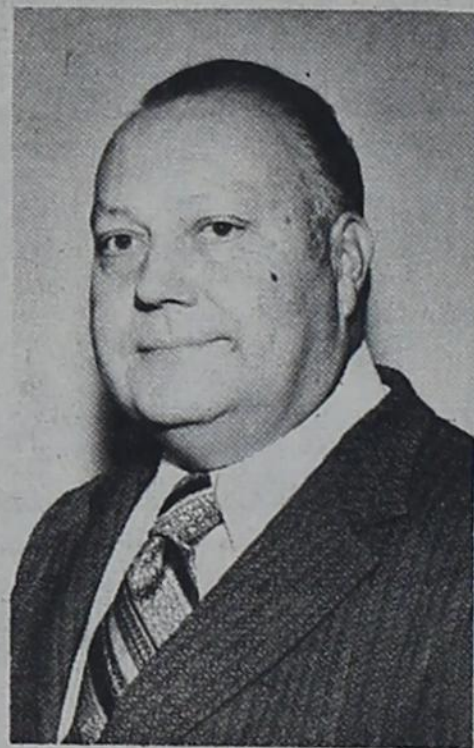

Richard May Is On The Move

Although Richard May, a sixth grade student at Farwell, is in a body cast as a result of a broken leg, he is not immobile. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. May, and thanks to the ingenuity of his father, Richard is able to be "on the move."

Richard received a broken bone above the knee of his left leg in a playground accident at Farwell school January 28. He was taken to Clovis hospital by the Farwell emergency vehicle.

Young May was admitted to the hospital where his left leg

was placed in traction until February 24. On that date he traded the traction set-up for a body cast which would not permit him to stand or sit; he could only lie down.

February 27 Richard was released from the hospital but was very despondent, his mother reported, at the thought of just lying in bed for at least six weeks. With the approval of Richard's doctor, Mr. May decided to try and improve the situation for his son.

Using an old, large child's wagon, May devised a method of transportation for his son that would enable the boy to move around freely, yet still in a prone position. He removed the standard bed from the wagon and replaced it with a flat board bed. He then covered the surface of the bed with thick pile carpeting.

Lying prone on his stomach on the wagon bed, Richard is able to use his hands to roll the carrier wagon wherever possible. He has used this device while attending Little Dribbler games and other school functions.

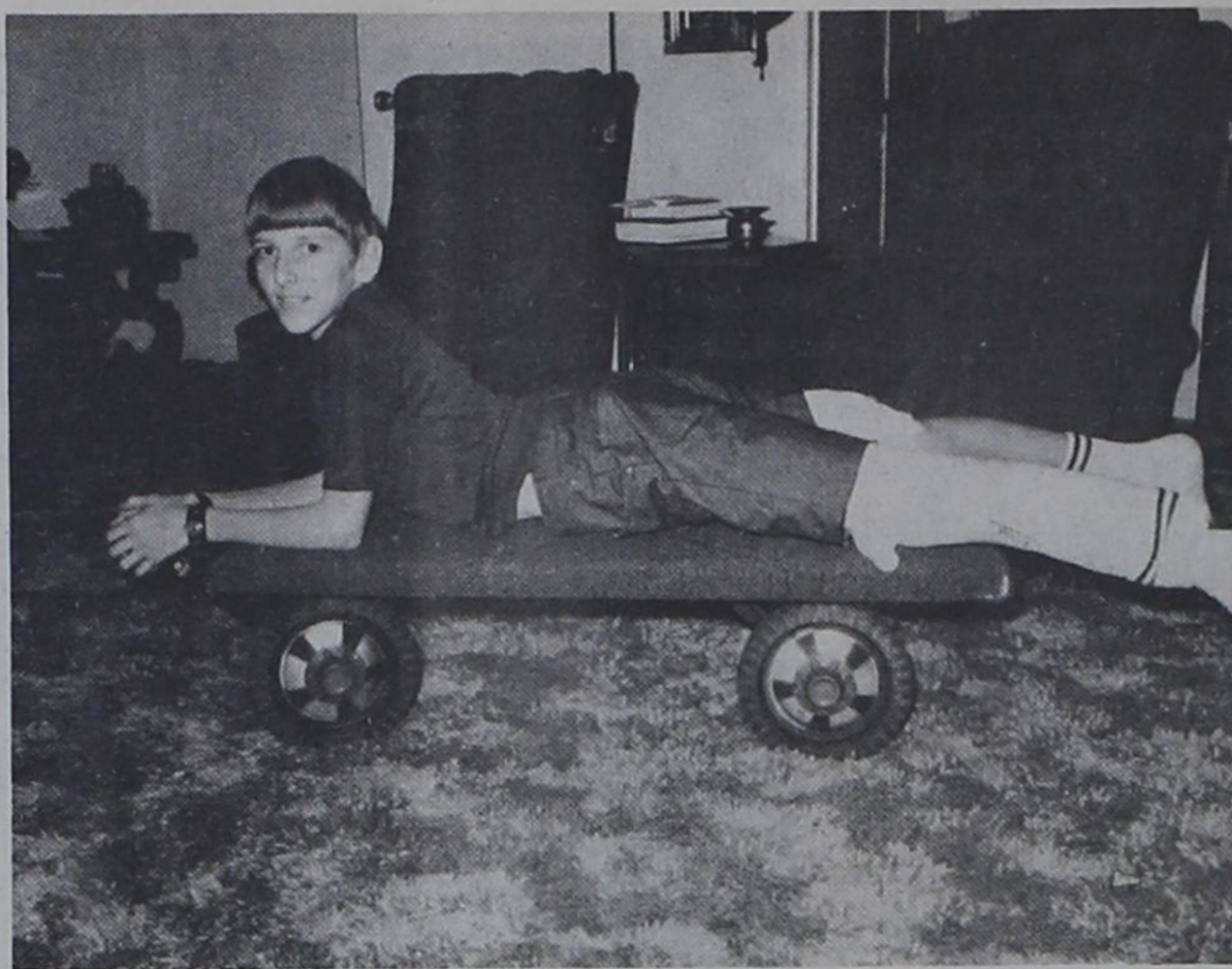
However, Mrs. May reports that she does not think that it is wise for Richard to attend school even with the wagon carrier. "With so much traffic in the halls between classes, I am sure that the risk of Richard re-injuring the leg is too high.

"We are hopeful that Richard can continue his lessons and stay up with his class by studying at home," Mrs. May stated.

Mrs. Frances Boling, Richard's home room teacher, plans to visit with him at least once a week and provide lesson tapes and give the lad instruction and guidance for that week's work, according to Mrs. May.

Richard will have to remain in the body cast until April 28 and then he will remain in the hospital for a week of therapy in learning to walk again, said Mrs. May. He is then scheduled to use crutches for a few more weeks.

"We are going to have a long ordeal before Richard is walking without aid again," emphasized his mother. "The wagon carrier leaves a lot to be desired but it seems to be the most practical way of giving Richard some means of movement since he cannot sit in a wheel chair," concluded Mrs. May.

Mr. Arnold died Thursday, March 6, in a nursing home in Clovis. He was born on March 28, 1888 in Wood County, Tex.,

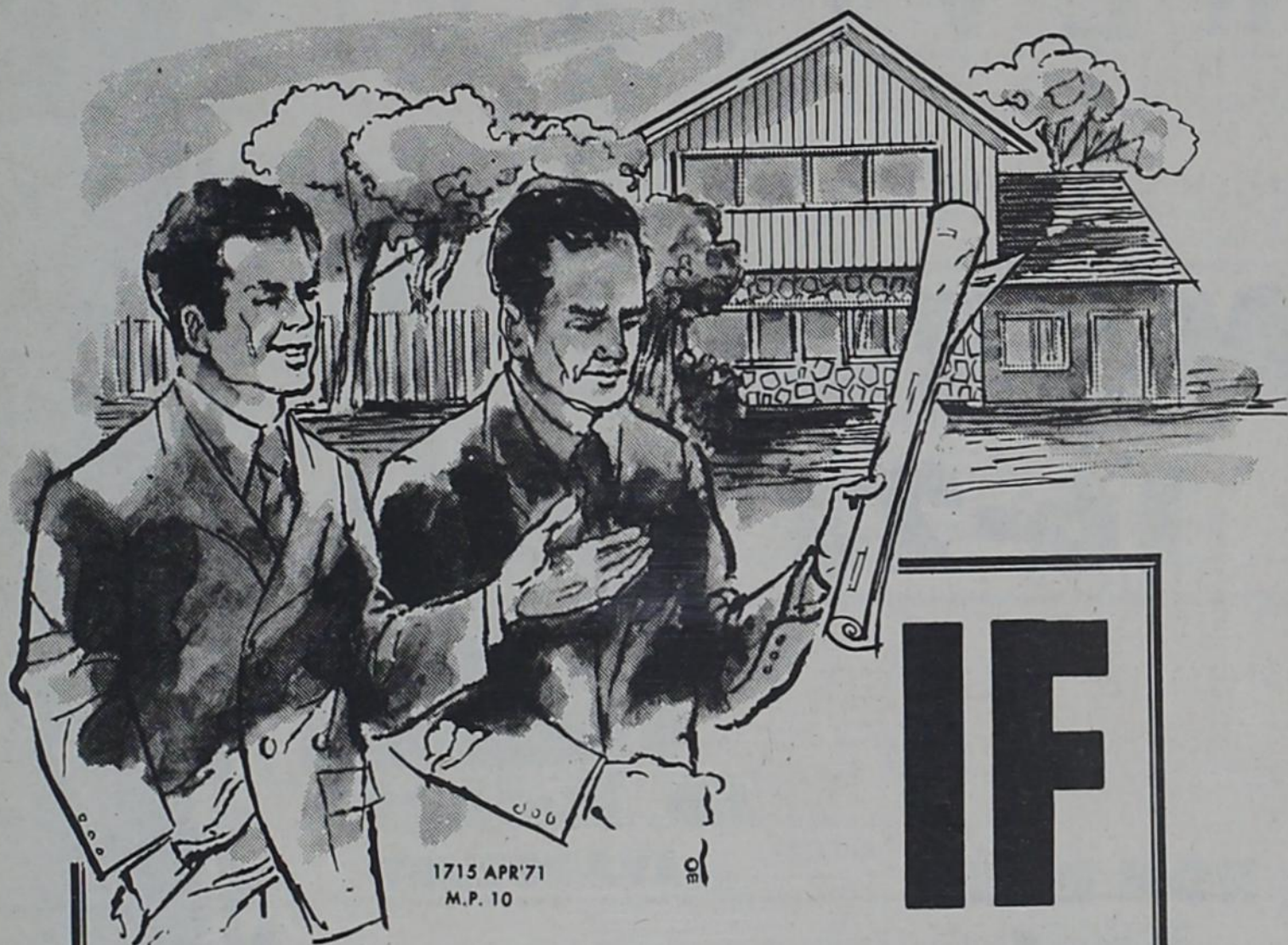

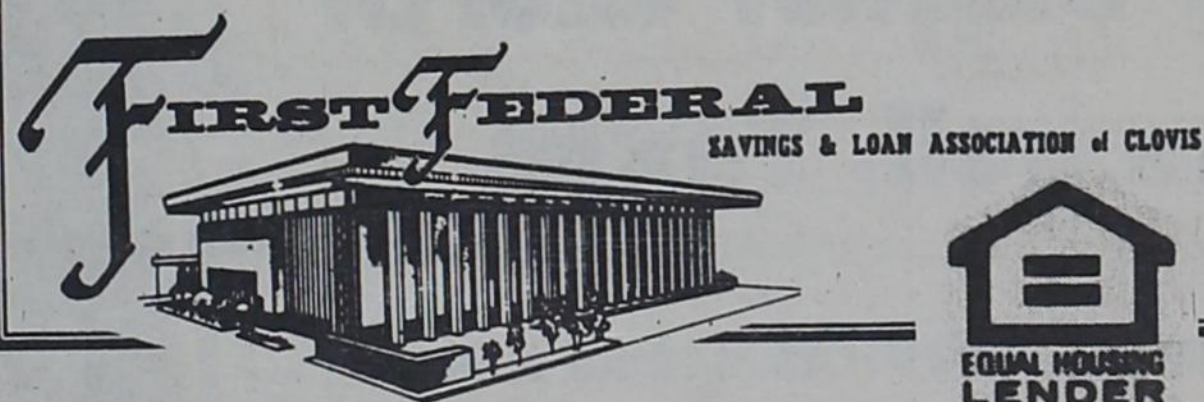

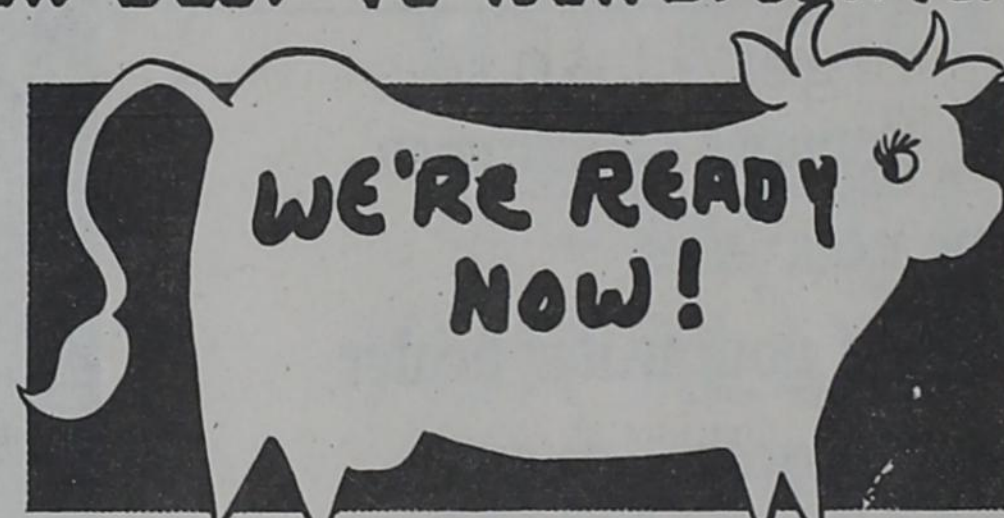

Interest Rates Are Lowered

The Commodity Credit Corporation has announced that Price Support Commodity Loans disbursed on or after April 1, shall bear interest at the rate of 6.125 percent per annum for the date of disbursement to the date of any subsequent change in the interest rate. This reduction applies to cotton, feed grains, wheat, storage facility, and dryer loans.

The interest rate on outstanding loans bearing adjustable interest rate will be at the rate of 9.375 per annum through March 31 and at the rate of 6.125 percent per annum from April 1 to the date of any subsequent change in the interest rate.

This lowering of interest rates will be of real benefit to farmers having a commodity under loan at this time as well as to those who may tender a commodity for loan at a later date, according to Prentice Mills, Parmer County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service executive director.

The final date for placing 1974 crop cotton under loan is May 31, 1975. These cotton loans mature 10 months from the month of disbursement.

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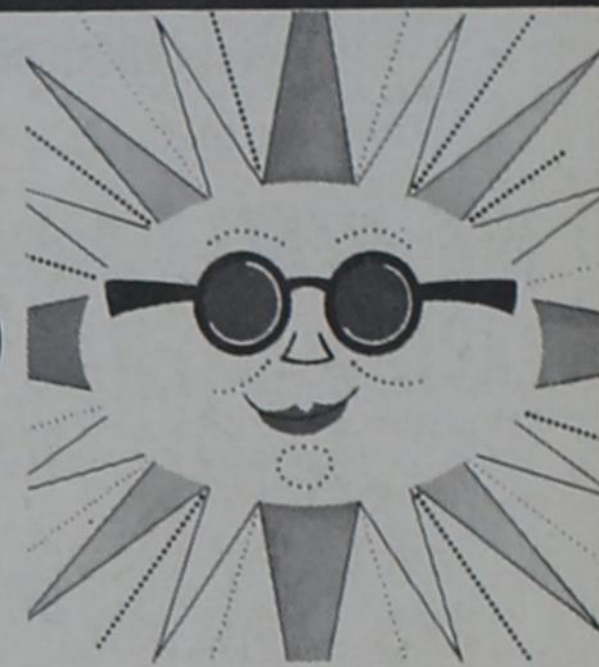
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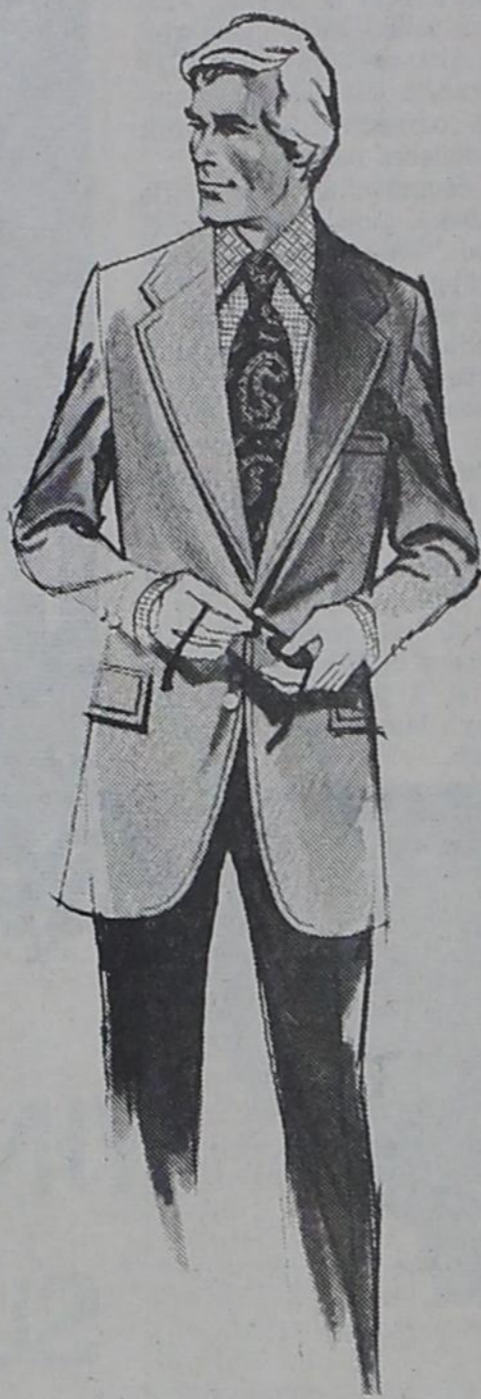


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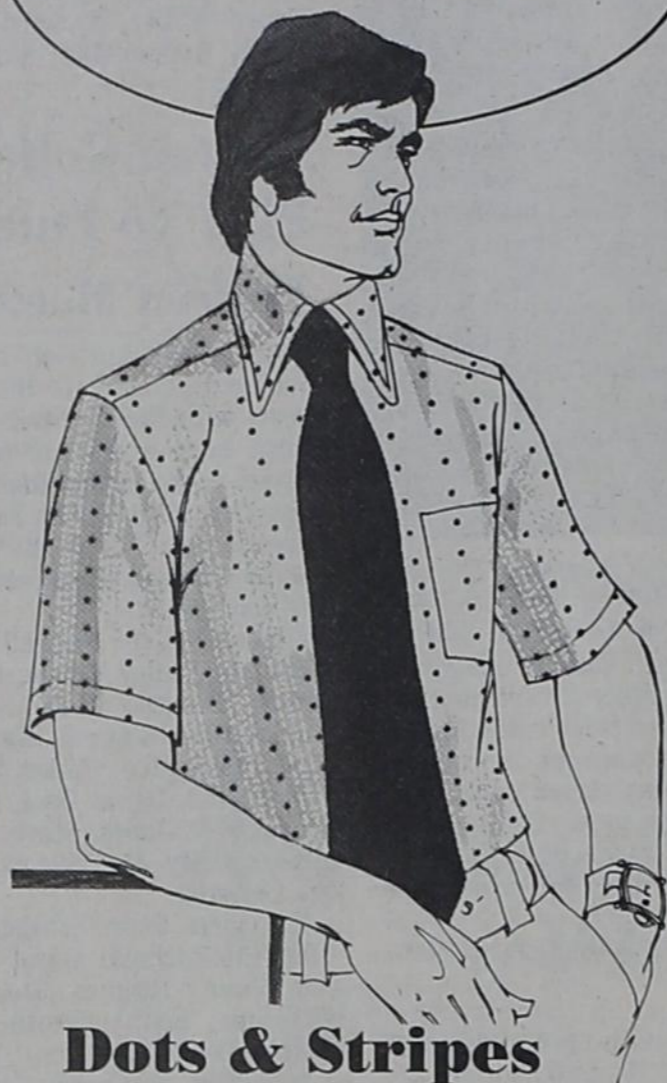


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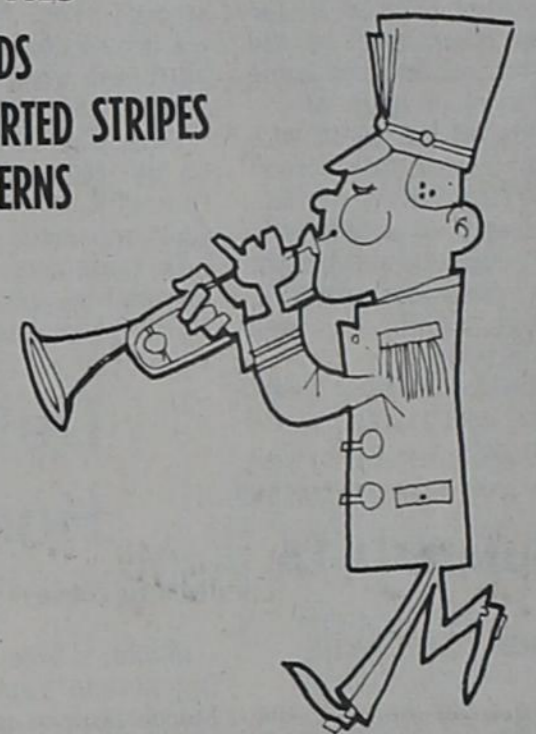
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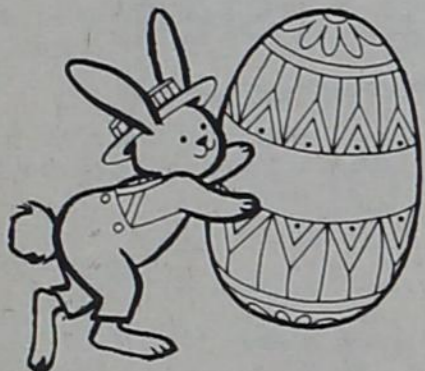
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Wolves Take Third In Regional

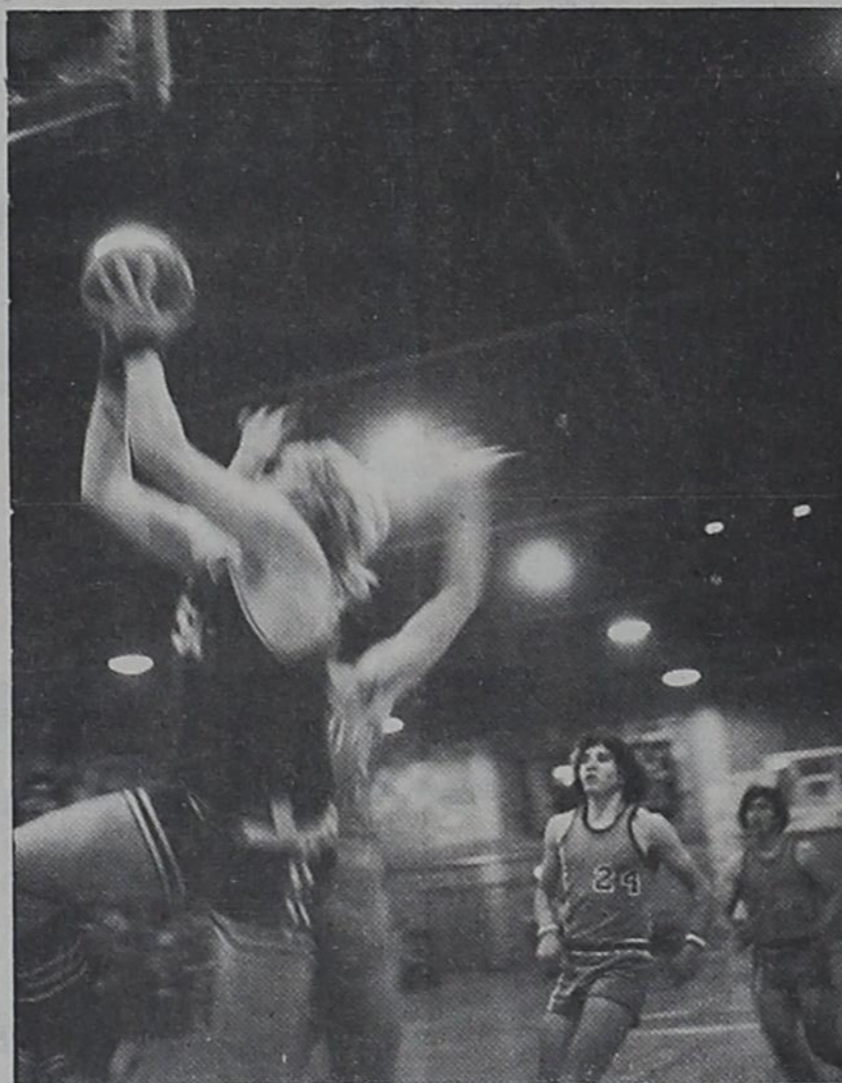

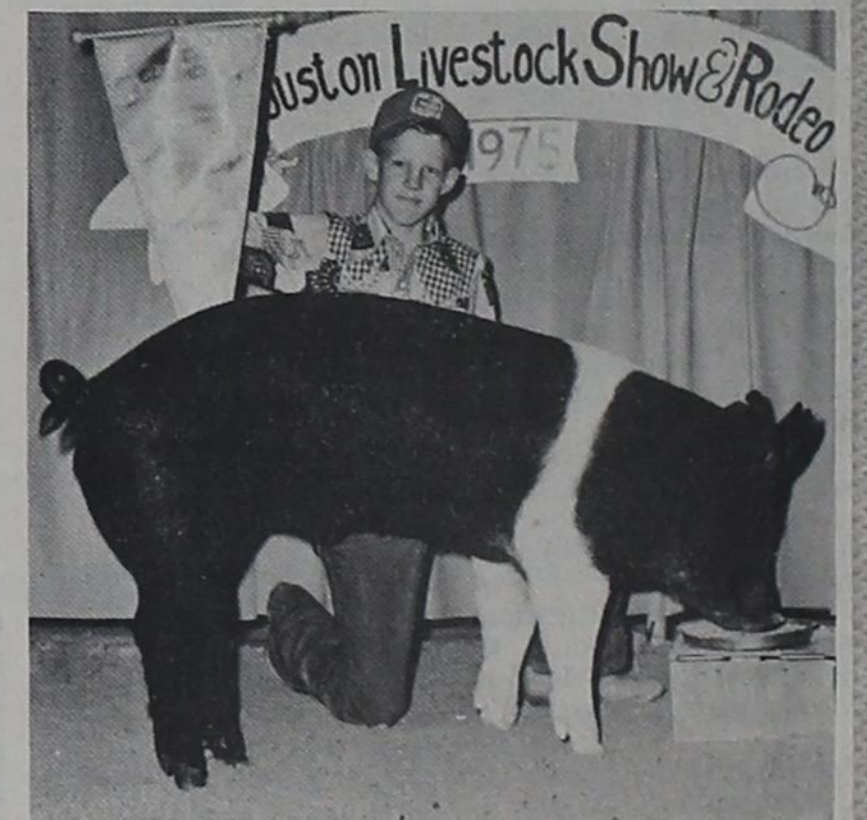
Farwell FFA members placing in the show were Paul Brigham with his 4th place heavyweight Duroc and Gary Green with his 14th place lightweight Chester White.
