The race is still very close, however. The two-month totals: Lubbock, 214; Lamb, 202; Hockley, 200; Parmer, 195.

Neighbors of Parmer County also in the district were left far behind. Bailey had 105, Castro 143, and Deaf Smith 81.

These figures seem more impressive when it is remembered that Parmer County is installing new irrigation wells at the rate of about 25 per week at the present time.



It's Spud Planting Time On High Plains Farms

It's potato planting time on the High Plains, and this year more farmers than ever before will be watching with interest their neighbors who are giving the vegetables

With acreage restrictions on wheat and cotton, and lower prices for feed grains, Plains farm residents are casting about for other cash crops which may be adaptable to conditions here-

Because of the unusually high expense involved in potato production, not too many farmers are plunging in recklessly this year, simply because they have acres which they feel might do well in spuds. Still, it is evident that many more farmers will eye the possibilities of vegetable production this year than ever before, and the way potatoes fare this year may well influence what Plains farmers will try in the next few years.

Two potato processing stations will be in operation in Parmer County this year. One will be at Friona, in its third year of operation. The other will be at Lariat, a new venture.

Prices were greatly improved last year, he adds, but growers didn't get any more cooperation out of the weather, and yields were cut considerably. In short, the price was satisfactory, but volume was reduced.

Neff moved to the Texas Plains in 1940 to begin his potato growing here. He is a native of Blackfoot, Idaho. His first years were spent in the Hereford area, but two years later he moved to Friona, and with his brother-in-law, installed the shed.

Neff now lives on a farm northeast of the city, and this year is planting 170 acres to spuds.

Oswald, a native of Menan, Idaho, moved to Hereford in 1947, and to Friona in 1952. Both men were familiar with potato production in Idaho, before moving to the Southwest, and both are convinced that the soils and climate of this part of the Plains, coupled with irrigation water, are well adapted for growing potatoes.

Cost of seed potatoes averages about \$3.25 per hundred, says Oswald, and 35 cents per sack is added to this cost for cutting up and handling the stock.




