#### CONSERVATION NEWS BRIEFS By Dick Barber

The Soil Conservation Service and other agricultural agencies have for several years been encouraging the use of plows that will leave all trash and crop residues on the surface. This type plow has come to be called the Stubble Mulch Plow. Our hopes are just now beginning to be realized as some of our most prominent local farmers are changing their method of farming and are using stubble mulch equipment.

Olan Schlueter, who farms in the Texico community, is one of the local farmers that has changed to stubble mulch equipment for his wheat land. Mr. Schlueter recently purchased an eleven foot stubble plow from a local dealer and is using it on all his wheatland. Gene Lovelace, also of Texico, has purchased a twelve foot stubble plow and if he thinks it does a satisfactory job, he will purchase another plow to us with it.

Albert Matlock of the Ranchvale community and John Garrett have mounted stubble mulch sweeps and beans on the frames of plows that they already have. This can be done at less cost than buying the entire plow. Other farmers in the District are also changing to the stubble mulch method of farming. Some are using large sweeps on their row crop tool bars with good results.

On July 14, 1952, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12 o'clock noon, there will be a stubble mulch plow demonstration at the Grady Pierce farm, one mile west and one mile north of Pleasant Hill. The demonstration is being sponsored by local machinery dealers, the Central Curry Soil Conservation District and the Extension Service. Some of the advantages of stubble mulch to be demonstrated are that it protects the soil from blowing and helps prevent runoff. It reduces evaporation and

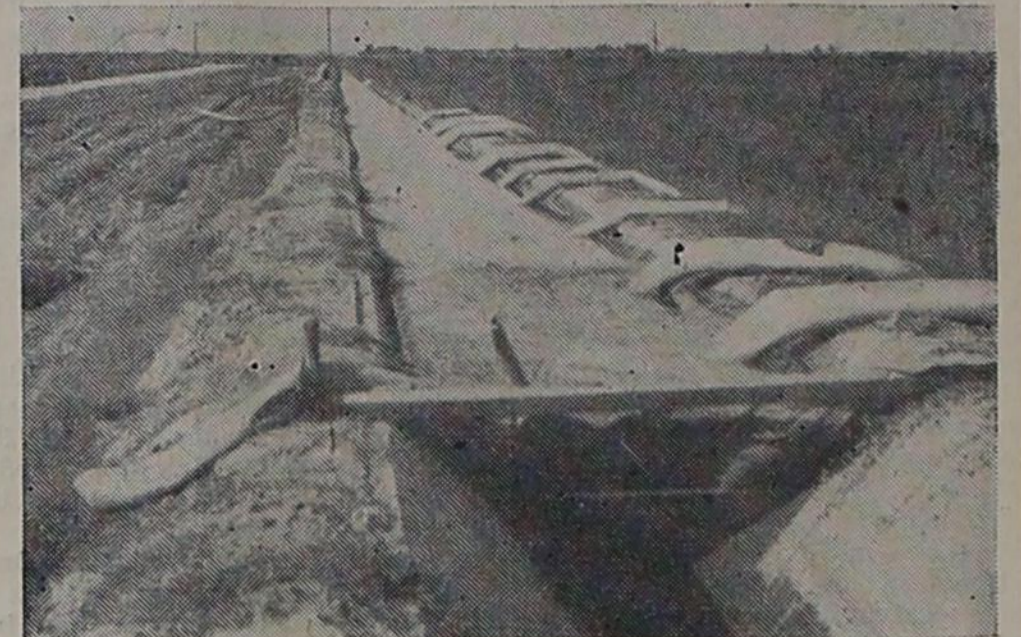

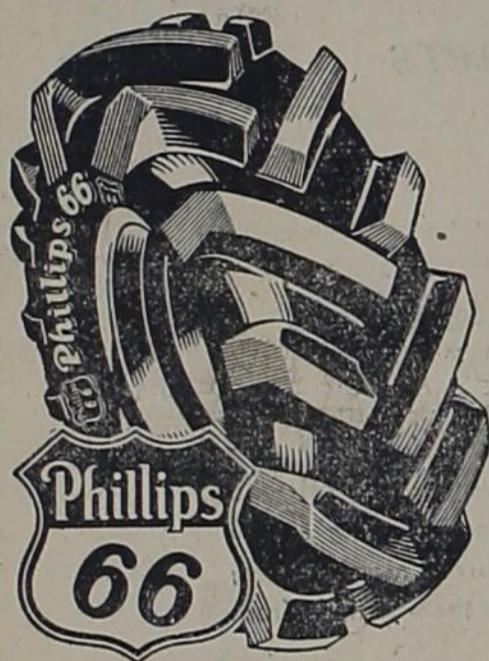

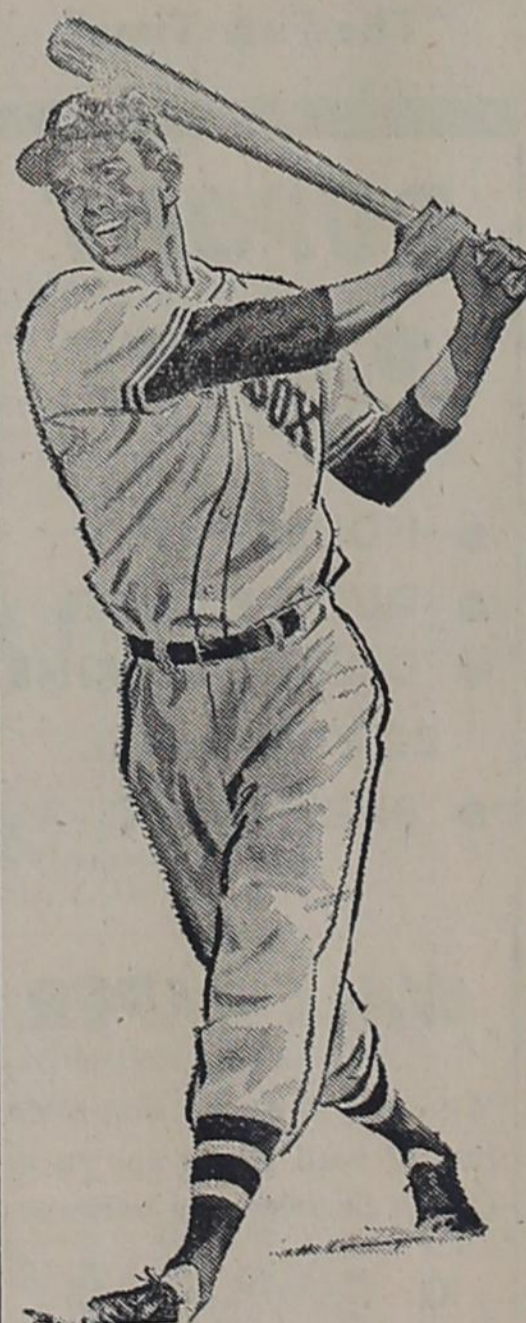

## Rev. Meyer Presents General Council Report

At the morning worship hour of the Congregational Church Sunday the Reverend George E. Meyer, pastor, reported on the eleventh biennial meeting of the General Council of the Church. This is the national body of Congregational Christian Churches' gathering. It was held in Claremont, California.

The Rev. Mr. Meyer attended, in addition to the sessions of the General Council, meetings of The Pre-Council Mission which had as its Missioner, Dr. John S. Whale, eminent English Congregational preacher, educator and author; also the national meeting of The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions; the Council for Social Action; the Board of Home Missions; the National Council of Congregational Churches, one session of the National Fellowship of Congregational Christian Women; a session of the National Laymen's Fellowship; and as a member of The National Seminar for the study and advancement of Evangelism, its several sessions. In this latter, he represented the Central South Conference.

Mr. Meyer reported the attendance at the national gathering as the largest in the history of the denomination, 3500 to be precise.

International speakers included, in addition to Dr. John S. Whale, Hon Kiyoshi Togasaki of Tokyo, Japan who is the editor of the Nippon Times; and the Rev. Sidney M. Berry of England who is International Minister and Secretary. Denominational outstanding speakers included Dr. Vere E. Loper, the moderator of the Council; Dr. Douglas Horton, Minister of the General Council; Mrs. Victoria Booth Demarest who is a granddaughter of General Booth, the founder of the Salvation Army;

The Rev. Truman B. Douglass, Executive Vice-president of the Board of Home Missions; Dr. Ronald Bridges of New York City director of Broadcasting and Film Commission of the National Council of Churches Hon Paul G. Hoffman of the Ford Foundation and Mr. Hugh Beaumont surprised his audience by stating and quoting substantial sources that church membership and church attendance of the Hollywood movie folks was 12 per cent higher than the national figures and that the divorce percentage was actually 20 per cent lower than for the rest of America.

Mr. Beaumont played a leading role in "Second Chance," a widely heralded and well-known picture. He pleaded for better pictures and better television programs and told how to get them.

The special feature of the music of the General Council was the 48 Chorus Choir of the Kaweah Church of Honolulu, Hawaii which was flown to the mainland for the purpose. The singers brought thousands of orchids which were used as a floral background of the altar and gave more thousands to the women of the council meetings.

The Rev. Albert J. Penner of New York was reported as Council Chaplain and as having conducted the worship services; that the council lectures centered about "Love in the Christian Faith" were given by Dr. Daniel D. Williams who is an instructor of the Chicago Theological Seminary of the Congregational Church.

Mr. Meyer reported the outstanding services as being; The Service of Memorial and Holy Communion with 2800 participating and being served by 72 laymen as deacons; the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of The Church Building Society which took the form of a drama; the action of the drama being the acting out of the minutes, of the original meeting by men and women impersonating those who organized the society and costumed as were those of the original group. The presentation and dedication of The Woman's Gift was cited as another outstanding service. It was presented under the lead-

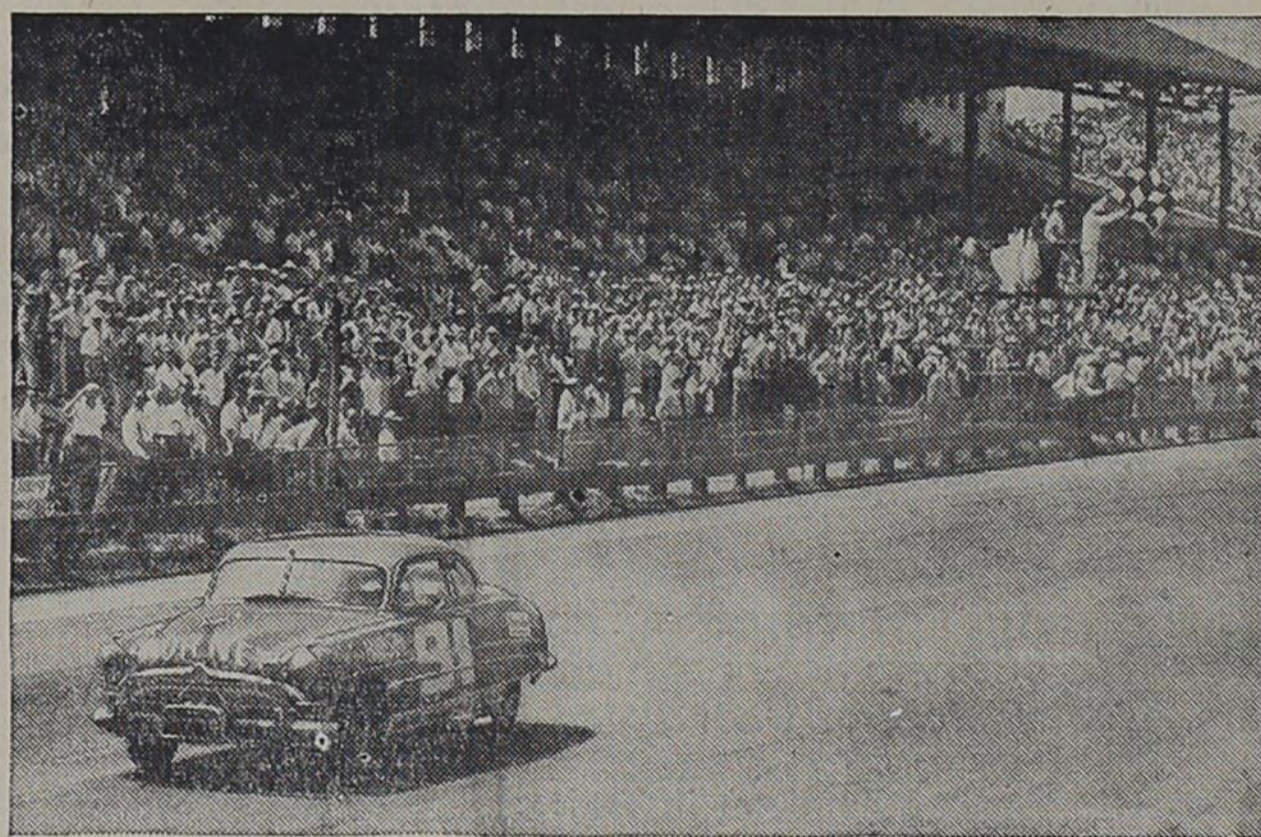
