My crusade against \$100-deductable clause on storm insurance policies for Texas policy-holders is beginning to attract attention of other newspapermen over the state. The latest to come to my attention appeared in the Amarillo Daily News of last Sunday.

Written by Thomas Thompson, financial editor of the News, he raises his objections to form No. 200 "that was probably written under pressure from the insurance companies. . . ." Here's what Thompson has to say about the objectionable law:

We have heard that some companies pulled up and left the state. Others threatened. It now appears that the commission went too far in placating the companies. Larger policy holders are getting a relatively free ride at the expense of the little fellow, chiefly the GI living in a home with 700 or 800 square feet and trying to get a

This, clearly, is a case for the veterans organizations. With their tremendous political pressure, they can do things to right an unfair situation if leaders take the cause of their younger members to hear it.

Louisiana we understand had a lower "deductable" plus a privilege clause which permits the policy holder to pay about 10 premium annually for full coverage.

Mr. and Mrs. Jess J. Gentry of Friona, suffered a horrible death in a freak accident at the Santa Fe Grain elevator in Friona at an early hour Monday morning. The young lad was assisting Night

Foreman Albert Davis and other workmen in unloading wheat from boxcars that had been shipped to Friona for storage when the accident happened shortly after 4 a.m. Attaches at the elevator said that young Gentry pried loose the grain door on a boxcar to allow the grain to pour into a shallow pit. Livesay and his wife both received the verdict and sentence very calmly. Asked if he had anything to say, Livesay quietly answered "no sir" to Judge Bills. The sentence begins immediately, as the defendant waived right of appeal. The verdict was returned at 7 o'clock after one hour and 45 minutes deliberation. Paving of six blocks along Second Street in Farwell will begin at an early date, according to an agreement reached Monday night" when property owners along the street met with Edgar Martin, head of the D. & T. Construction Company at the courthouse. Mrs. Fay Anderson, representative

of the construction company, reported that only 225 feet of frontage along the street remained in the "doubtful stage." Mrs. Anderson also admitted that additional frontage had not been contracted, but she said she "felt certain" this remaining footage "would come in."

Martin said that he was "willing to take the chance" of getting the outstanding footage signed up and would proceed with the paving if given a favorable vote of those attending the meeting.

"I have been in the business a long time and my experience has been that we have had very few losses after the paving has actually been installed," Martin said, in expressing his willingness to proceed with the paving.

It was finally voted to proceed with the paving program, leaving out the curb and gutter along the 225 feet yet in question.

The street will be paved, according to the agreement reached Monday night, the entire six blocks, beginning at Ave. A and continuing south to Ave. G. The actual paving surface will be 38 feet wide with an additional two feet for curb and gutter, Martin explained. Where the curb and gutter is left out, the paving would be the uniform 38 feet wide, he said.

Martin said early Wednesday morning that he expected to begin construction work on Second Street the first of next week.

With discussion of Second Street disposed of, a delegation of property owners living on First Street pressed for paving action along that street. explaining the deplorable drainage situation that prevails along the north end of that thoroughfare.

"You can't show me a worse situation on any street in town," Vernon Symcox asserted, and his statement had the backing of every person present who is familiar with the situation, particularly those living on the street.
