## Chamber Scores Handling Of Henderson Bankruptcy

In 1951 the most severe economic shock in the history of Farwell struck this community with the impact of a West Texas tornado. The Henderson Grain Company was thrown into bankruptcy by a suit involving that firm and the Commodity Credit Corporation over alleged shortages of government-stored grain at Farwell and Lariat.

The case, which is still running the gamut of the federal judicial system, has not been settled, but one thing does seem settled as far as local citizens are concerned:

The loss of the local grain company has left a gaping hole in the economy of the entire trade territory. The results of the case have been serious and far-reaching. The letter reprinted below was submitted to Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson last week by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce. Individual signatures at the bottom of the letter have been withheld by request—editor.

Dear Mr. Benson:

This organization feels that there exists in Farwell a situation that should be brought to your attention. If you will recall back in 1951 the Commodity Credit Corporation brought suit against the grain men all over this part of the country who were short of grain that had been stored in their respective warehouses under the government storage plan.

One of the companies forced into bankruptcy by CCC was the Henderson Grain & Seed Company of this small community. It was locked up, and a trustee and a referee and a group of lawyers took it over, and it has not operated since then. Now, the CCC was the preferred creditor in this case, and they apparently have all the authority in this matter, because there certainly is no indication that any of the other creditors will be able to realize even one cent on the dollar of their losses if this company is permitted to go on as it has been.

We believe that the CCC had a claim in excess of \$800,000.00 against the Henderson Grain Co., which to be sure is a lot of money; they were not the only ones to suffer however, and they are gradually letting all the assets of this company be paid to the trustee, the lawyer and other persons who do not have, and have never had a dime invested in this community.

The loss of this business was a terrific shock to the economic well being of this area. They were one of the largest grain companies operating in this county. They had trucks out all over the United States bringing in planting seed, building materials, tile, sand, cement and many other items too numerous to mention.

They furnished storage of about one million bushels of grain which was a definite asset to this area where storage space for farm produce is in great demand.

They employed from 25 to 50 persons with a yearly payroll in excess of \$100,000. In all ways this company was a needed business here, and now it apparently will never operate again unless definite action is taken immediately to

sell this business to a GRAIN man.

The man now running it knows nothing about the grain business. He is only at the business on an average of once or twice a month. It is our information that he has a high salary, plus expenses. The lawyer also gets a considerable sum per month, and he has only been in Farwell one time to our knowledge since the whole matter came up.

At present there is a bill for legal service up for approval in excess of \$7000 from the period September 1, 1952, through January 31, 1953. This amount we consider ridiculous.

These legal maneuvers are only for one purpose, and that is to spend up all the assets until there is nothing left, and then to abandon it, since it no longer will be any value to them.

Mr. Benson, the Commodity Credit Corporation will not get one cent of the money they claim if this condition is allowed to continue. They should, by all means, have more interest in this matter than anyone else because they are the largest creditor. They don't. How can the small creditors force this issue with the attitude assumed by the CCC?

The answer we are sure lies with the Department of Agriculture. We believe you could bring about a change in this situation that would be beneficial to all parties concerned; the CCC; the other creditors, and this community as a whole. We ask you to especially look into the following possibilities:

1. Determining the ownership of the main plant immediately, and putting it on the market for sale at a price set by an experienced appraiser.

2. Immediate liquidation of all assets, and pro-rated payment to all creditors.

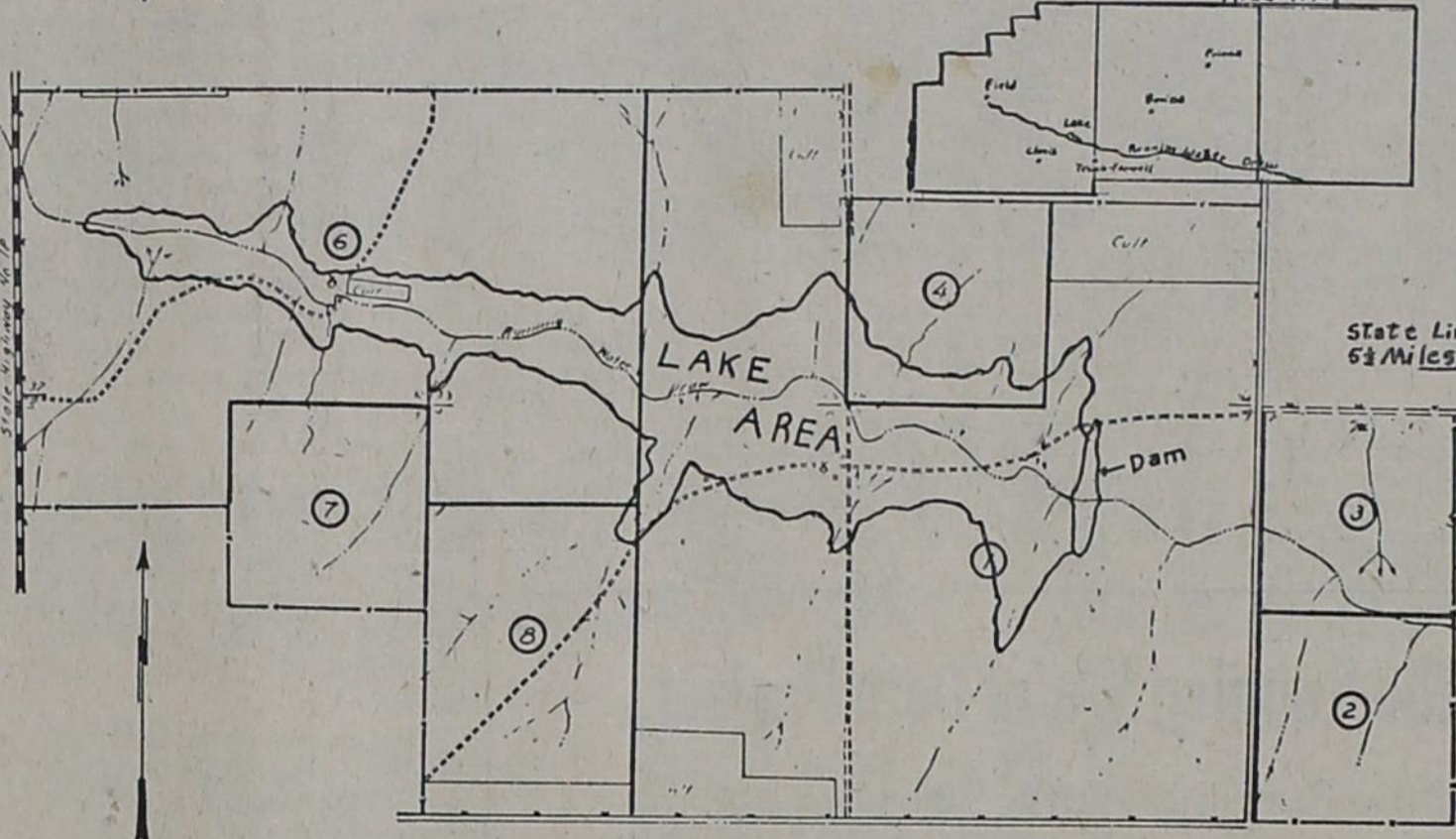
3. Let this business be opened for operation before the next wheat harvest in June. The storage facilities are badly needed.

## Need Petitions, Letters, Comment

(See editorial comment on page two, this section.)

Interest in one or more dams across Running water or Frio draws was evidenced by New Mexicans this week, after their attention had been drawn to the matter through editorial comment by publisher W. H. "Hop" Graham.

Our western neighbors, who have labored for many long years on a project to dam up Running Water 8 miles north of Clovis, have seen their dream almost at realization more than once. At the present writing, however, they are a long way from seeing the dam constructed.

For several months now, several interested farmers in Farmer County have been speculating over the possibility of damming up one or more of the county draws, with a view toward increasing the underground water supply for irrigation purposes, as well as providing recreation and a wildlife refuge.

The three men who have manifested the most interest in this respect are T. W. Bewley, Bill Sherry, and Matt Jesko. Bewley has gone so far as to correspond with this district's state representative, Jess Osborn, on the subject. Last week's Tribune carried a report on Osborn's comments.

This week, however, something new came into the picture. Representatives of the Curry County County SCS and the Curry County Game Protective Association made two calls here in the hope of arousing interest and support of a damming project of their own.

In a nutshell, here is the story of their project:

In 1939 there were five recreational areas studied and approved for construction by the Land Utilization Division of the Soil Conservation Service in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

World War II interrupted the projects, but all of them with the exception of the Running water project were completed. Buffalo Lake near Umberger was one of those projects.

From that time, the plan has had several revivals, and at one time reached the stage where \$175,000 was actually appropriated from state funds to finance the project.

That money is still immediately available. The only thing holding back construction on the dam is securing of a favorable report on the feasibility of the project.

Thirty-two hundred acres of land have been set out and purchased by the federal government for the project. The purchase, made several years ago, is being used currently by the GPA for a wildlife refuge.

Forty antelope have been stocked on the northern part of the tract, and plans are being made to plant large numbers of quail.

An extensive survey of the site was made back in 1950. The hydraulic engineer submitting the report compared conditions existing at Buffalo Lake to those north of Clovis.

This engineer's report is favorable in some respects, unfavorable in others. He estimates that there is ample run-off water in the draw at that point to maintain a lake approximately 2 1/2 miles in length, and forty feet deep at the dam.

That is, this will be true provided loss through seepage is not so heavy as to result in the lake going dry during years when run-off is below normal.

Several tests were made of the general soil structure in the proposed lake basin, and in his opinion the lake floor would not be "tight" enough to hold the water.

Some Clovis men, who had worked closely with the project, suspect that this report is inaccurate. They feel that the layers of caliche and clay that underlie the topsoil of the bottom of the draw will stop the water seepage, especially after silt has accumulated and packed onto the lake floor.

They base their contentions on seismic drilling reports conducted by the western Geophysical Company. Twenty-one holes were drilled by the firm and the samples analyzed to determine soil structure.

Many of these holes indicated the presence of impervious material at varying depths which would retard or stop completely the flow of water. Most of the holes were drilled to a depth of 300 feet or greater.

Cost of the service runs \$4 for the first plot of cotton and \$2 for each additional plot, Camp said.

## Boys' Ranch Show Scheduled Friday

"A boy is the only thing that God can use to make a man."—Cal Farley.

Texico-Farwell citizens will have an opportunity to assist in one of the most down-to-earth projects in "human engineering" in this part of the country Friday night when a group of boys from Cal Farley's Boy's Ranch of Amarillo will be here to present a program of western music.

The session is slated in the Farwell school auditorium, beginning at 8 o'clock, and is sponsored by Texico-Farwell ESA. Dardanelle Helton is mistress of ceremonies.

Sixty per cent of the money taken in from ticket sales will go to the boys, and remaining 40 per cent will be used for work in this community. An administrator of the ranch will be on hand to give a talk about work done there, and there is a possibility that Cal Farley will also accompany the boys.

Also, some local talent will be used to fill in for the show. Four Texico boys, Bobby Goldsmith, Jimmy Don Moss, J. B. Taylor and Marvin Pendergrass have consented to give some short numbers; and an ensemble from Farwell under the direction of Mrs. Erma Jobes, will present numbers.

Henry C. Schulte, vice-president and general manager of Boy's Ranch, informed the Trib-

une this week that "we are asking for help at Boy's Ranch so we can complete our building expansion program to take care of 500 boys in the next three or four years." At the present, nearly 200 boys are housed at the ranch and since Cal Farley started the project 14 years ago, over 800 boys have called the ranch home.

The ranch is on the banks of the Canadian river in the Texas Panhandle, 40 miles northwest of Amarillo, on the site of the ghost town of Old Tascosa. Purpose of starting the ranch was to try to

help the lower 10 per cent group of boys with whom Cal Farley had come in contact through the years.

Mr. Farley became a successful Amarillo businessman and ran the business and Boy's Ranch at the same time for many years, before selling his department stores in 1947, after the Boys' Ranch MGM movie was released.

At Boys' Ranch, boys raise much of their own produce, says

Schulte, doing their own slaughtering, and whatever ranch work is necessary, as part of their vocational training. They are now killing one beef and two pigs a week. A staff of 23 people is maintained including teacher, and a twelve grade school system. Four different trades are taught.

"We are in drastic need of vocational school buildings so that we can teach about fifteen different trades so boys can make a living when they leave Boy's Ranch," says Schulte. "We help them secure jobs and if they are mentally capable, we send them on through college." Fifty-two of the boys have been in college and this year, eight more will go.

A full-time non-denominational chaplain lives at the ranch, and regular Sunday services are held. Also, the chaplain counsels with the boys through the week. "We are not affiliated with any church, club, lodge, state or county-operated organization," continues Schulte "we are independently trying to raise America's forgotten boys."

Administrators depend on Cal Farley's belief in boys and the actual practice of his belief to create worthy citizens from boys who otherwise might not have had the opportunity.

Boys' Ranch has 29 buildings and 3,000 acres of land; carries on an active intramural sports program. (Cont. on last page, this section)

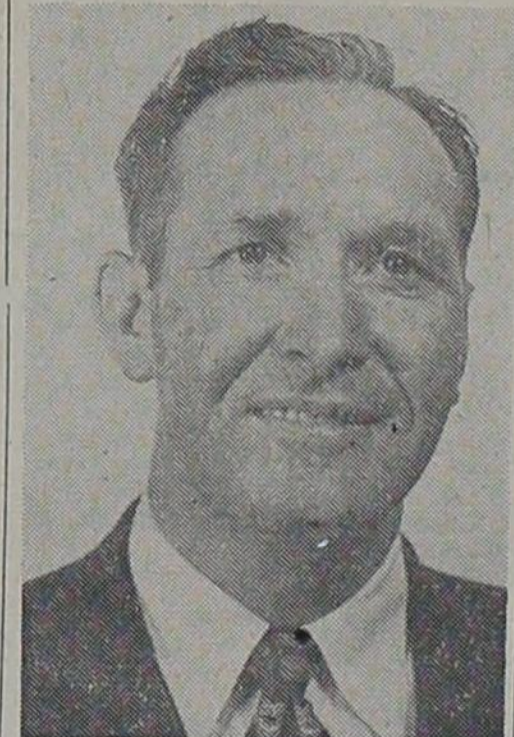

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## Being Good Neighbors Is Paying Proposition

This newspaper, or any other institution for that matter, should not have to remind Plains people that good neighborliness has always paid off handsomely—in both material and spiritual returns.

An opportunity has presented itself whereby the people of this part of the country can all benefit, either directly or indirectly, from its execution. That opportunity is the proposed dam across Running Water Draw northeast of Clovis.

Here are the reasons why The Tribune supports the program of the Curry County GPA in attempting to revive that 13-year-old project:

A dam across Running Water Draw will benefit all irrigation farmers of the Plains by replenishing their underground water supply. This is an accepted fact. Especially will farmers who are located southeast of the dam be benefitted. This is because underground water percolates through water-bearing sands in a southeasterly direction.

In addition, this area is notorious for its lack of recreational facilities. Young people are being chased off the streets in many small Plains cities because they don't belong there. Well, where shall they go when they seek a place for recreation? There simply isn't any natural setting available within one hundred miles.

There is some speculation that the lake, if ever established, would not have a bottom "tight" enough to hold water. That would be regrettable, because it would then be impossible to maintain a game fish population if the lake receded too far

or dried up completely during long dry spells. However, would it not be better to have that water disappear into our own land here on the Plains than run downstream where it eventually empties into the Brazos River for the benefit and waste of Central and South Texans? They don't need water down there—they have to worry about flood control every spring.

Another point: the construction of this dam need not interfere with other dams in Parmer or neighboring counties. The drainage area of the proposed Clovis lake would be about 100 square miles. Running Water heads up only about 25 miles northwest of the dam, near the community of Field. Trace 25 miles downstream on the map. If a dam were established there, near the Lazbuddy community, it would have just as large a watershed as the Clovis project on Running Water, PLUS run-off from Cattfish Draw which intersects Running Water just east of Bovina.

Furthermore, if the Clovis project proves successful, it would strengthen our own argument for a dam here on Running Water or Frio draws.

The boys across the line are miles ahead of us. They have \$175,000 appropriated, 3200 acres of land, the site surveyed, the dam planned, the area fully mapped out.

What can we stand to lose by casting our lot with them? Our good New Mexico neighbors are perfectly willing to foot the bill for the entire project. Our support and influence may help them push the deal through at this crucial point in the game. Scarcely a week goes by that another illustration underscoring the soundness of the philosophy of trading at home is not encountered by us.

Take last week, for example. A local business telephoned us and asked that we quote prices for printing 5000 business letter-heads. A representative of a printing specialty house in Amarillo was standing near the inquiring customer as he telephoned.

We took a minute to figure up what we considered to be a pretty competitive figure, submitted it to the potential customer, and asked how our bid compared with his. We did not have previous access to his figures, mind you.

Our bid was \$34.90. His was about two dollars below ours. The customer, satisfied with our proposal, closed the deal in our favor. That business would have had to pay postage on the printing from Amarillo anyway, and they probably saved money by having the work done at home.

The out-of-town stationer was representing a firm which made job printing a specialty. Their volume, compared to The Tribune's job work volume, would be astronomical. And yet we were

customer a price very closely in line with theirs.

There were several "hidden" benefits that went to the customer by doing business with us, too. First of all, his dollars stayed here at home, helping his community, and in turn helping himself.

The customer was guaranteed reasonable service with a minimum of red tape and bother. There weren't any extra trips to the post office; there weren't any long-distance phone calls.

Too many businessmen in small towns such as Texico-Farwell don't know a free-rider when they see one. Why they will listen to the slick talk of polished salesmen and be taken in by his line is very often a dark mystery to us.

Yet this businessman will buy printing from a representative of a firm that:

- (1) Operates in the town without paying a cent in local taxes,
- (2) Never belongs to the Chamber of Commerce,
- (3) Doesn't give a hang what happens to the town,
- (4) Can't very often save the customer money except on large orders,
- (5) Has inferior service.

## Support Price For Grain Announced

The 1953 support price for grain sorghums grading number two or better stored on the farm in Parmer County is \$2.37, according to

Joe Camp, PMA secretary. Announcement of price support rates at this time and well ahead of planting gives encouragement for full production of grain sorghums, he says.

The 1953 acreage goal for grain sorghum sets 10 million acres as the desired acreage goal for the nation. If achieved, this would be

Jackson Sentenced Here On Tuesday

Donley Leroy Jackson received a four-year penitentiary sentence in district court here on Tuesday, the sentence being handed down by District Judge E. A. Bills after Jackson offered a plea of guilty to charges of forgery.

The 28-year-old Jackson was picked up approximately a month ago in Hobart, Oklahoma, Sheriff Chas. Lovelace said today, and was last week indicated in this county on the forgery charge, which grew out of the passing of checks allegedly signed by Jackson in the name of C. W. Dixon of Friona. Three checks were issued in Friona, in the total amount of \$165. Jackson had been employed on the Dixon farm prior to the offense.

Jackson is at present in the Farmer County jail, Sheriff Lovelace said on Wednesday morning, adding that he was to be transferred this week to San Antonio, to face charges of forgery in both Bexar and Tascosa counties. Forgery charges in this county were filed in July, 1952, the official added.

Farm Bureau Flays House Bill No. 388

Every tractor farmer in Farmer County will lose one-fourth of his refund on non-highway gasoline tax if House Bill 388 is passed by the state legislature, according to Bruce Parr, president of the Farmer County Farm Bureau.

Rep. James W. Yancy of Houston introduced the bill which would take away one cent of the four-cent-a-gallon refund and allocate it to the available school fund, the county farm leader said.

"What the proponents of this bill forget is that the so-called tractor gas 'refund' is not actually a refund since the money never belongs to the state. The tax is collected just as on all gasoline, sent to Austin, and then returned to the rightful owners," Parr added.

The Farm Bureau leader said that the backers of the Yancy bill were apparently using the strategy of calling attention to the needs of the public schools and then pointing to the refund money as a likely source of revenue.

"The farmers pay their fair share of school taxes right along with everyone else in the school districts, and it isn't right for an additional burden to be placed upon them," Parr said.

If additional revenue is needed to finance teachers' pay raises, super-highway programs and other projects now being debated in Austin, the money should come from a tax on natural gas. Natural gas does not now pay its fair share of the tax bill, Farm Bureau maintains.

Gasoline is being taxed at about 30 percent of its retail value, yet natural gas is taxed at only about 1 1/2 percent of its retail value, according to Parr.

In referring to a tax on natural gas, the farm leader pointed out that some two-thirds of Texas' natural gas is piped out of the state. In Michigan, this Texas gas is being pumped back into the ground for storage. In some other states, the gas is taxed heavier than it is in Texas, he adds.

"This great natural resource is not inexhaustible" Parr said. "The natural gas that is leaving Texas today can never be replaced."

"If the need for additional revenue is now, then now is the time to tax natural gas," he said.

Insufficient Turnout Causes Delay Of C of C Election

With nine directors to be elected, only eight qualified men were on hand for the regular meeting of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce on Monday night, Wilfred Quickel, secretary-manager, said ruefully today.

Such lack of interest is naturally disturbing, Quickel said, and especially so in view of the fact that "we need to get our directors elected and plans mapped out for the coming fiscal year."

Of the current nine directors, from which is chosen by the directors themselves a president and vice-president, only one is unavailable for future service, that being Oliver Sikes, president, who is in ill health.

Currently Carl G. Davis, vice president, is serving as acting president of the organization, Quickel said. Other than Davis and Sikes, the list of directors includes Huggins Ray Mears, Felix Monroe, H. Y. Overstreet, and Bob Anderson.

The CC will try again, on March 30th, to elect its quota of officers, and urges that all local members mark their calendars now and plan to be on hand at the Legion Hall at that time.

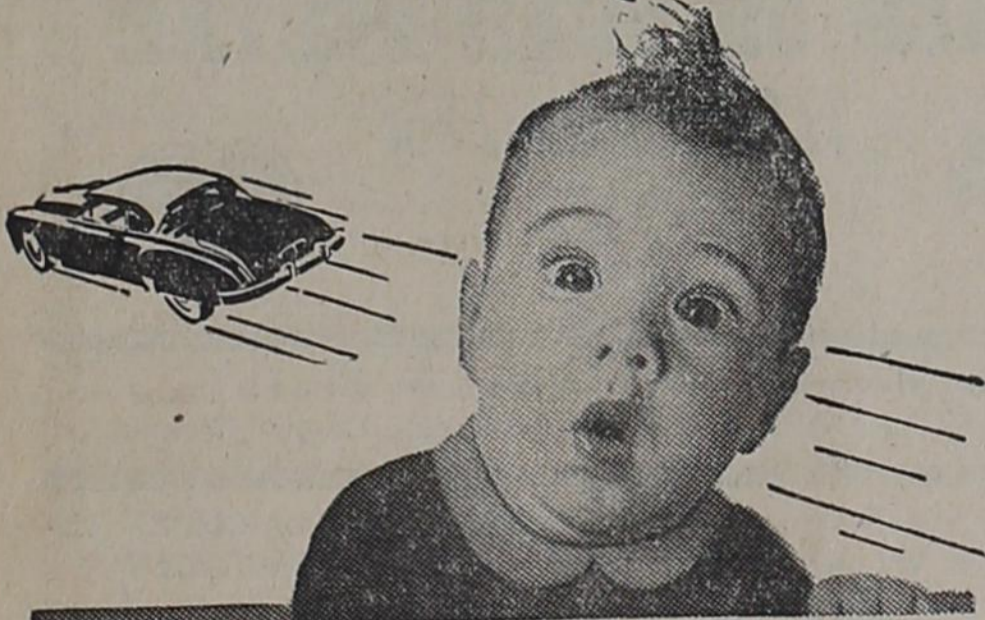

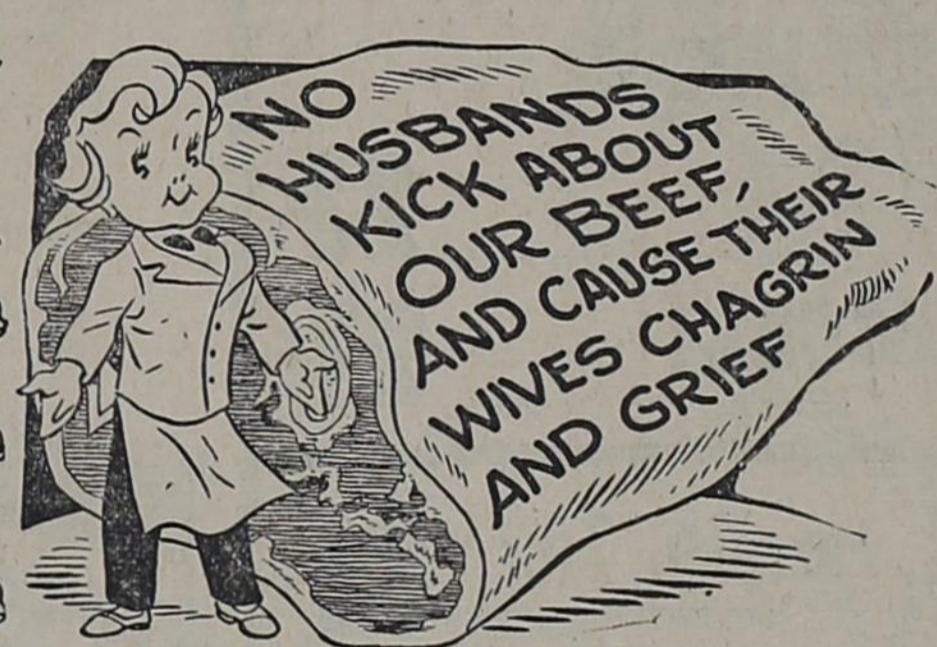

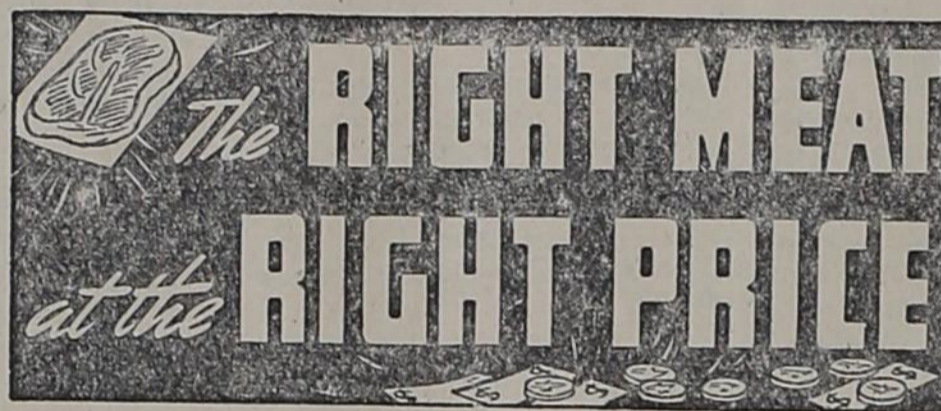

## ORDINANCE NO. 16

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CERTAIN RIGHTS TO THE MOUNTAIN TAIN RIGHTS T O THE MOUNTAIN STATES TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, THE SUCCESSORS ORS AND ASSIGNS, IN THE TOWN OF FARWELL, STATE OF TEXAS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Farwell, State of Texas, that: Section 1. There is hereby granted to the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, a corporation, its successors, assigns, and assigns, for a term of twenty-five (25) years from and after the date of the passage of this Ordinance, the right, privilege, and easement in and to the Town of Farwell, to install, maintain, use, and operate, over, under, and along the streets, alleys, public ways, and public places now or hereafter existing in said Town, all other fixtures shall be placed where the same will interfere with any gas mains electric light, water hydrant, sewer, or other utility, and shall be placed at the outer edge of the sidewalk and inside the curb line, and those placed in alleys shall be located along the line of the lot abutting on said alley, and then in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets and alleys.

Section 2. The Company at all times during the life of this franchise shall be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the Town, and shall be liable for any damage to or under as the Town, may by ordinance hereafter provide.

It is expressly understood and agreed that the Company shall be held harmless from all losses sustained by the Town on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand against the Company, arising out of the maintenance of its telephone system in the Town. It is agreed that the Company shall be held harmless from all claims or demands arising out of the maintenance of its telephone system in the Town. Section 3. The Town shall have the privilege of using the poles, wires, conduits, free of charge, where aerial construction exists, of maintaining upon the poles of the Company within the town limits wires and pole fixtures necessary for a fire alarm and police alarm system, such wires and fixtures to be placed and maintained under the supervision of the Company. The Town in its use and maintenance of such wires and fixtures, shall at all times comply with the rules and regulations of the Company, so that there may be a minimum danger of contact or conflict between the wires and fixtures of the Company, and the wires and fixtures used by the Town. It is further agreed, in order to avoid danger to life and property, that the above privilege is granted on condition that no police or fire alarm wires or fixtures of the Town shall be placed on poles carrying electric light or power wires, nor shall said police or fire alarm wires or fixtures be exposed, without the consent of the Company, to the danger of contact with any conductor carrying a voltage greater than the normal telephone voltage.

The Town shall be solely responsible for all damage to persons or property arising out of the construction or maintenance of said police and fire alarm fixtures, and the Company shall be held harmless from all claims or demands whatsoever, arising out of the attachment, maintenance and/or removal of said wires, and fixtures to the poles of the Company. In cases of rearrangement of the Company's plant, or removal of poles or fixtures, the Town shall care for or remove its own poles and fixtures and shall save the Company harmless from any damage to persons or property arising out of the removal or construction of its wires or other fixtures.

Section 4. Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along or to make an unusual use of the streets, alleys, and public ways of the Town which shall interfere with the poles, wires, or fixtures of said Company or Town, shall first give notice to the said Company or the Town, as the case may be, and shall pay to the said Company or the Town, as the case may be, a sufficient fee to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering, and moving of the wires or other fixtures of said Company or Town, and before a permit is given by the Town, therefor, the applicant shall present a receipt from the Company showing said payment. Thereupon the said Company upon presentation of said permit shall within forty-eight (48) hours thereafter provide for and so such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the streets, alleys, and public ways of the Town.

Section 5. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the Town and the Company that the grant or acceptance of any franchise, or of this franchise, shall not constitute a warranty either upon the part of the Company or of the Town, of any rights or claims and or made by either with respect to the occupancy of the streets, alleys, and public places of the Town under the laws of the Territory of Texas and under the Constitution and general statutes of the State of Texas, nor shall it in anywise prejudice or impair any rights or claims existing independently of this franchise, of the Town or of the Company, or its successors, day successors, with respect to the construction, operation and maintenance, either before or after the life of this franchise, of a telephone system in the Town.
