

# Crop Outlook Called Bleak

LOOK 'UM HEAP BAD

Farmer County's most mysterious weather prophet, J. W. Crim, looked pretty solemn and shook his head at 6:47 Sunday morning. He was noting the direction of the smoke from a ceremonial fire he had lighted just a few seconds before the advent of spring, 1953.

Assembled to join in the ritual were specially invited pale-faces, who temporarily were addressed with such titles as Chief Ig Drink, Dancing Red Eye, The Squaw man, Big Forester, and Rain in the Face.

They all agreed things look pretty black for the farmer this year. The wind was whistling straight out of the west. That, according to Indian legend, was a sure omen of poor crops.

Crim and his sons haven't missed this occasion for 28 years now, and they're pretty well resolved to abide by the yearly forecasts. Last spring, for example, the smoke indicated fair and average crops. That prediction was pretty accurately borne out at the close of the year.

# USDA Quick In Reply to C of C

Farwell businessmen standing behind the Chamber of Commerce this week were pleased to note the immediate response from their letter to Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson last week, in which they set forth a number of grievances concerning the handling of the bankrupt Henderson Grain Company.

Carl Davis, acting president of the local chamber, released a letter from USDA acknowledging receipt of the Farwell communication. The letter, signed by Drexal W. Watson, Grain Branch of the PMA, is as follows: Farwell Chamber of Commerce, Farwell, Texas Gentlemen:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 3, 1953, in reference to Henderson Grain and Seed Company, Farwell, Texas. As the operation of this company is under the control of the Court and the interest of Commodity Credit Corporation is being handled by the Department of Justice, we have requested the Solicitor, Department of Agriculture, to consult with proper representatives of the Department of Justice in reference to the information that you have furnished.

Some businessmen immediately protested "buck passing" by the tone of the letter, but it is generally agreed that the matter would have to go through proper channels before any action might be expected.

Meanwhile, things were quite active in Farwell. The management of the trusteeship called Davis, as well as other members of the Chamber, to vigorously protest the language used in the letter.

The unusual aspect of the situation was that everybody was talking to everybody else in town, but nobody wanted to be "quoted as saying this or that."

In spite of the clam-mouthed attitude of the Farwell businessmen as well as the grain management itself, several stories leaked out and got widespread publicity in daily newspapers in Amarillo and Lubbock. The Lubbock-Avalanche dispatched a regional reporter to Farwell Monday. The Washington correspondent of the Amarillo News is understood to have staked out a watch over USDA there, and the court reporter of the News was sent to study matters at Lubbock. Chamber men make it clear that they are not going to relinquish their efforts to have the Henderson Grain Company (with a \$100,000 payroll) opened for business this summer if at all possible.

## Alex Bateman, Former County Agent Here, Dies on Sunday

A. E. (Alex) Bateman, of Lubbock, former county agent for this county, passed away in the Veteran's Hospital in Amarillo at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon, and funeral services were conducted in Hereford Presbyterian Church Tuesday morning, followed by interment in Lubbock.

Bateman came to Farwell in 1930 to organize the first AAA office in Parmer county, and remained for two and one-half years. He then moved with his family to Hereford, where he was county agent for 13 years. Later he returned to Farwell for around one year, and the family has resided in Lubbock the past year.

Born Jan. 3, 1890, he attended Texas A&M and Southeastern State College in Durant, Okla. He was a veteran of World War I. Following graduation from college he coached at Indian schools in Oklahoma.

Later moving to Texas, Bateman taught at Quanah and Plainview and then went into agricultural work.

Survivors include Mrs. Bateman; two sons, Robert of the Navy and Jimmy of Lubbock; two daughters, Ann of Lubbock and Sandra of Galveston; one brother and three sisters.

Local people attending the funeral included John Aldridge, Joe Jones, Arlon Hartzog, Mrs. N. L. Tharp and Beth, Gabe Anderson, Bill Sherley, Tom Finley, Herbert Potts, Scotty Barry and Rev. M. D. Durham of Bovina.

## 127 Are Chartered In Baptist Church

The First Baptist Church of Farwell was officially organized the past Sunday afternoon, when a crowd of several hundred members and visitors gathered at the Farwell school for that purpose.

Rev. W. F. Markham, retired pastor who resides in Texico, served as acting moderator for the group in the initial period, after which Rev. D. M. Durham of Bovina was named to serve as moderator for the afternoon, and Elsie Hardage, of Farwell, acted as temporary clerk.

To Rev. Otis Holladay, of Vernon, went the honor of being the minister to bring the first sermon to the newly-organized congregation. Rev. Holladay formerly served the Texico-Farwell church, resigning to go into the service as a chaplain.

A total of 127 letters was received for the new church, this group to be listed as charter members of the organization, Sterlyn Billington reported. The gathering adopted the articles of faith, and passed a resolution to be associated with the Southern Baptist Convention.

The church covenant was read by Rev. Morgan of the Progress church. Other visiting pastors who participated in the meeting included Rev. Pond of West Camp, Rev. Barto Massey of Oklahoma Lane, Rev. Durham of Bovina, and Rev. Jess Fender of Bonham, Tex.

Four deacons are already on hand to serve the new church, with three coming from the Texico-Farwell church and one from Oklahoma Lane. They are: Dick Gerles, Willie Hardage, Sterlyn Billington and Joe McWilliams.

Great enthusiasm in the new church is being shown in the community, Billington said today, adding that a meeting held last (Wednesday) night was to iron out incident details of organization, including election of church, Sunday School and BTU officers, and appointment of committees.

## Opening Set Soon For Bovina Supply, Some Selling Now

Bovina Supply, newest business in that city, will set its opening date in the near future, announces Roy Horn, owner-manager. Horn came here several months ago to begin work on his large business building, and is conducting some retail business at the present time.

The building, which faces Highway 60 in north Bovina, is 90x34 feet. Practically all construction has been finished, except for minor shelving and arranging on the inside.

Horn explains that the only thing he is waiting on for his opening at present is merchandise. Most of the large building is empty.

The Ferguson tractor and implement line is already being shown at the firm, and the owner said he had already made one tractor delivery. Horn intends to push his butane business too. Lester Rhinehart has been named head of the butane department, and will have two trucks for deliveries.

Twenty-four-hour butane service will be available to customers, Horn says, noting that he has 22,000 gallons of butane storage in cylindrical tanks behind the new store.

Bovina Supply stocks the Wanda line of oils and greases, and Horn says he plans to add several lines of appliances in the near future.

The firm has a large stock of Marv-ls cotton seed on the floor, and some irrigation supplies.

On the east side of the building is located the repair shop, which Horn says is well-equipped and manned by a full-time mechanic. Repair service on all makes of farm machinery will be available, he adds.

## Drilling To Start On Parmer Wildcat

The latest location for a wildcat oil test in Parmer County has been staked on the Bill Sherley farm in the Lazbuddie community, with drilling operations slated to get underway around April 10th.

Sherley, contacted by The Tribune on Tuesday, reported that the test is being run by L. L. Ccollum & Associates of Midland, Texas, with the drilling contract being let to Donnell Drilling Co., also of Midland.

The depth to which the test well will be drilled, of major interest to observers in the area, has not been announced by the speculators.

Oil activity has flared in this county, off and on, for the past several years, with various companies persistently trying to find a new field. The majority of the attempts have been made in the northern section of the county, out from Friona and Bovina.

The drilling company is slated to begin moving in machinery shortly, with a combination rotary and standard rig to be used, Sherley said. Legal location of the test is the NE quarter of Sec. 67, Block H, Kelly Subdivision, located approximately 1 1/2 miles north of Lazbuddie.

## Woman Killed when Passenger Train Crashes into Auto

The second section of diesel passenger No. 7 brought a grinding death to a woman and critically injured her husband last (Wednesday) night at 9 o'clock on the main Santa Fe crossing between Texico and Farwell.

The 1941 Ford sedan in which the couple was riding was impaled on the front of the diesel engine, and dragged for over 300 yards before the train could be halted.

The train was entering town from the northwest, and the car was headed west. The woman was crushed when removed from the wreckage, and death was presumed to have been instantaneous. The man was still breathing when taken from the crumpled auto.

Sheriff Chas. Lovelace tentatively identified the couple as Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Benham of Benjamin, Texas. There were no known witnesses. This story was written at 10 p. m., and at time no details were available on the condition of the man.

Men from this area who have returned from the Korean War will be honored at a special meeting to be held in the Legion Hall under the sponsorship of the local American Legion and Auxiliary, it was announced today by Dorothy Quickel, Auxiliary president.

The date has been set for Monday night, March 30th, Mrs. Quickel said, and the occasion will be a covered dish supper.

Both Mrs. Quickel and Post Commander Loyde Brewer joined in urging every Korean veteran and his wife to be guests of the two organizations at that time. "We hope to get out special invitations," Brewer said, adding, "it we miss any veteran, please come on to the affair anyhow."

A special film strip has been received which will be shown for entertainment, Brewer said today. He added that the film shows pictures taken at the 1952 national convention in New York City.

Certificates of appreciation have been ordered and will be presented to each Korean veteran attending, he added.

"The supper and program, which will begin at 7:30, actually is a double-header affair," Mrs. Quickel said, pointing out that they are honoring veterans and celebrating the 34th birthday of the American Legion, which occurred March 15.

## Spring Stock Show Will Draw Crowd On Saturday

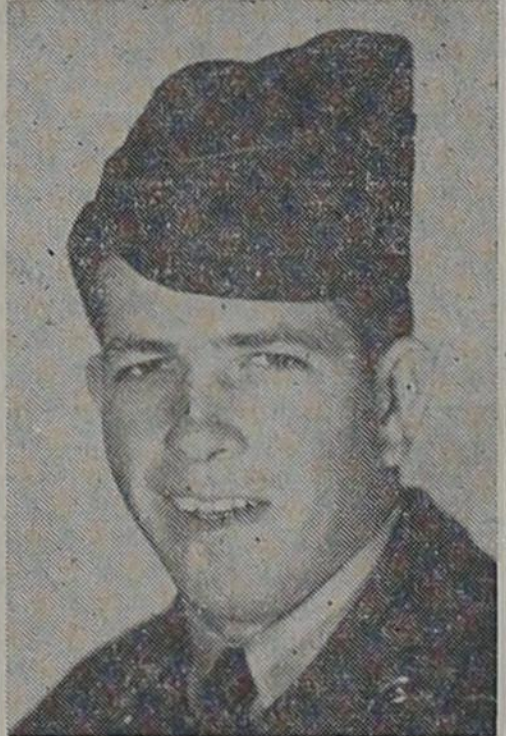
FFA and 4H club livestock entries will hold the spotlight in Friona on Saturday of this week as the spring stock show is held at the fair grounds.

Funeral services are scheduled to be held at Wolf & Roberts Funeral Home in Clovis at 2:30 (Clovis time), Friday afternoon, and interment will be made in that city.

## Elmore Home Entered, One Is Apprehended

The H. H. Elmore home, located between Friona and Black, was entered by thieves the past Thursday night, Sheriff Chas. Lovelace said on Tuesday, adding that one of the alleged burglars "has already been picked up."

Actually, Raymond Wilson of Arizona, charged with the theft, was picked up in Oklahoma City before the burglary in this county was discovered, since the Elmore family is visiting in California.

Wilson was apprehended on suspicion of theft in several Texas counties and was found in possession of some clothing bearing Elmore's name and address, the sheriff said. Investigation revealed that radios, clothing, jewelry, guns and field glasses were missing from the Elmore home, which had been entered after a window was broken. Most of the articles have been recovered.

Officers are also seeking the whereabouts of another youth believed to be Wilson's partner in the alleged break-ins. At present, Wilson is held in jail at Seymour, Texas, and is to be moved here this weekend, where he will be bound over to the grand jury, scheduled to meet April 13th.

Sheriff Lovelace said the local jail at this time is almost bulging at the seams with alleged house burglars, most of whom have been taken into custody since the grand jury met last October. All will be bound over to the next meeting of the jury, April 13th.

## Heart Attack Kills Former School Man

Sudden death stalked main street of Dimmitt, Tuesday, for O. T. Lloyd, 35, former Farwell school superintendent. Accompanied by his mother, Lloyd was driving in Dimmitt when he suffered a heart attack. The car rammed a pickup as it rolled to a stop and Lloyd was dead before he could be removed from the vehicle.

He had been serving as principal of the Dimmitt school. Some six years ago, Lloyd was superintendent at Farwell.

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt on Wednesday afternoon.

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## We'll All Prosper If We'll All Wake Up

Several weeks ago, considerable interest was being manifested in several of our neighboring Plains cities on the subject of what might be called "self-preservation."

That is, these communities were being forced to step up to a mirror of public opinion and examine themselves for flaws which were responsible for the economic and social recession which had set upon them.

There are several small cities involved in the matter, but it was the Sudan Rotary Club which got things started when they conducted a town-wide survey on "What's Wrong with Sudan?" This survey grew out of a condition which had at first been ignored, but because it steadily worsened, it fairly shouted for attention by time the Rotarians got busy.

Business in the small city had slacked off. People—whole families—were picking up and moving out, lock stock and barrel. The service club wanted to find out why.

Shortly thereafter, the same symptoms cropped up in Morton down on the South Plains. The Morton Tribune ran a long and searching editorial inquiring into the matter. Farming, the backbone of the economy of all we small Plains cities, was admittedly having tough sledding down there. Dry years, sudden and damaging storms, and other natural calamities over which men have no control were pointed up.

But then inquiries began to be made into the human element. By that time Canadian was beginning to do a little investigating of itself, too.

Putting the opinion of all three towns together can mean a lesson of great value to Texico-Farwell, Friona, Bovina,--and all other communities of similar size and circumstances.

Now, rather than setting down and presenting a long list of do's and don'ts on the subject of protecting the economic well being of our communities, let us first see what our neighbors found wrong with themselves, then conscientiously try to avoid letting ourselves be drawn into a like situation.

Here's what was found wrong:

First of all, the businessmen were not progressive. They did not participate in affairs which were for the betterment of the community. They displayed no interest in things such as chambers of commerce and service organizations. They did not present attractive displays, did not advertise their goods or services in the community newspaper.

Secondly, their citizens were not civic minded. They let worthwhile causes go by without support, clubs die for lack of membership. They permitted intense rivalry and animosity to be expressed between certain groups or factions.

This newspaper submits that there is no justification for such a situation to exist in this or our neighboring cities. In fact, there is every reason for this area to come into a new era of optimism.

Three very dry years in a row have made no appreciable impression on the volume of local retail business. The spark for this optimism, of course, is the untold potential of irrigation and the crop diversification that it will make possible. We no longer will be forced to carry all our eggs in one basket, agriculturally speaking.

Why then, do some people seem to be evidencing the doldrums? There is no reason, we suppose, except for the fact that no matter how many blessings some people have a few will always be dissatisfied.

Truly, the future is ours for the taking if we

will but open our eyes and expend a little effort.

In line with the same theme just expressed, the touchy theme of community spirit, comes our next subject: The Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

Why some businessmen in a small community, where everybody must depend upon everybody else, will stand idly by and express the attitude of "let Joe do it" will forever be a mystery.

While these individuals rode on the shirt-tails of their hard working neighbors (who needed to stay at their business and see to its management) some enterprising and far-sighted businessmen got together and instigated or participated in the following things, and all since Feb. 14, 1946:

1. Curb and gutter on Main Street.
2. Curb to curb paving on Main Street.
3. City street lights.
4. Assisted the school in its expansion program, especially athletics.
5. Began movement to incorporate city.
6. City sewer system.
7. Sponsor of irrigation and fertilization meetings three years.
8. Santa Claus for the kiddies.
9. Began city park.
10. Sponsored Trades Day.
11. Encouraged new businesses, residences.
12. Financed city operation in early stages.
13. Promoted good will in neighboring communities.
14. Christmas lights downtown.
15. Sponsored contest on best decorated home two years.

Mr. Citizen, take any two of the above projects, and you'll have reason enough for having a Chamber of Commerce here. There are other projects, incidentally, that may have been overlooked. These were quickly grouped together in an unofficial count for this editorial.

The stinking shame of the whole matter is that we are standing on the threshold of a new age and haven't the gumption to recognize it. If we forge ahead and promote, talk up, and sell our own town at every opportunity, we're going to prosper.

If we don't, the towns around us who have common sense are going to make fools of us. They'll win our trade, dominate our politics, and we'll dry up and blow away in a few years.

Your Chamber of Commerce has just done what no individual could possibly have done. It has dropped a bomb on the stinking mess made out of the Henderson bankruptcy. Certain persons connected with the present management of the firm have protested vigorously to some members of the Chamber.

That doesn't bother us a bit. If some individual gets offended by the Chamber's statments, it's only going to be incidental, we predict. The main thing we desperately need is to get that firm back into operation with its \$100,000 payroll as soon as is possible.

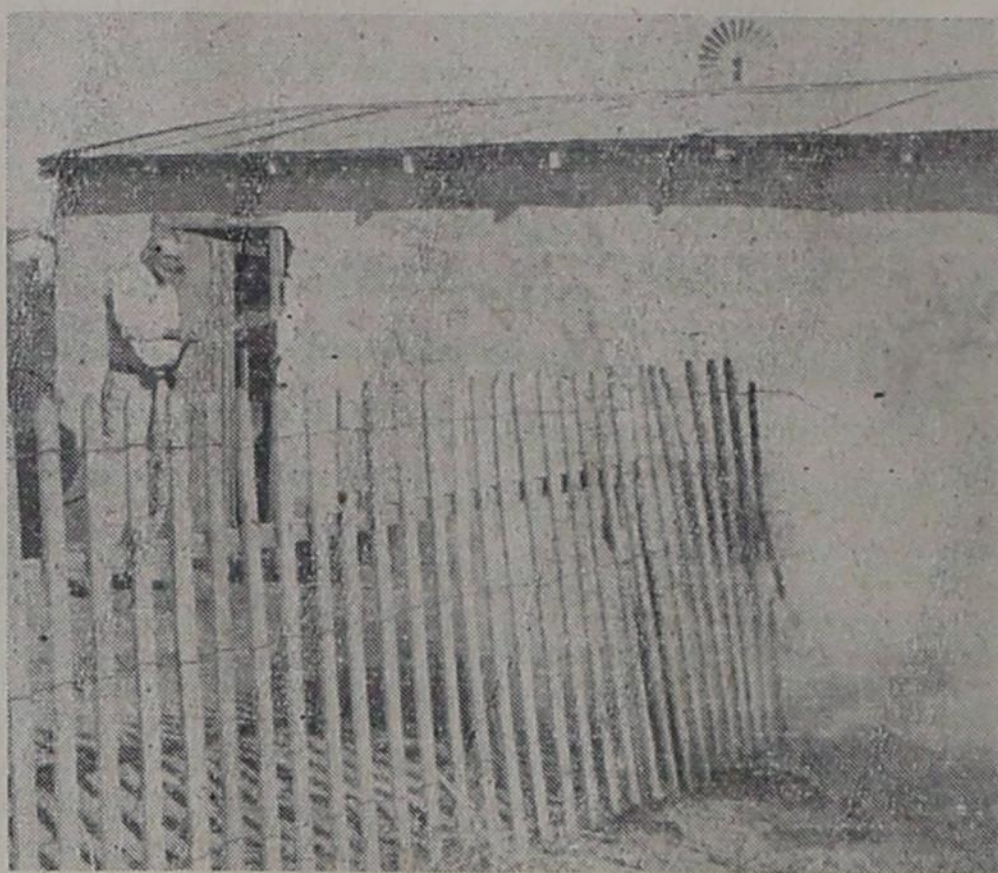

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce needs backing now as it has never needed it before. It is doing untold good for the community right now. It could do tremendously more.

Be on hand when the election of officers comes up Monday night. You'll be asked to participate. Don't refuse, and you can help run this town like it ought to be--instead of as it is.

Letters from Senator Andy Rogers and Representative Jesse Osborn assure Farm Bureau that every effort is being made to kill House Bill 388 in the sub-committee it has been referred to. Rogers says of this bill, "it is the only attempt, so far, to tear up our farm program, and it doesn't seem to have much steam behind it." Both Mr. Rogers and Mr. Osborn request continued contact with our local Farm Bureau on bills of interest to farmers.

Bovina Farm Bureau meets every fourth Monday night of the month. Aubrey Ellison is president and he is a productive worker in the community, as well as in the county bureau. They have about a hundred members. Those who attend Bovina Local Meetings regularly, know that Farm Bureau works for them if they work with it. ## Cerebral Palsy District At Lubbock March 23

A clinic for crippled children will be held at the Cerebral Palsy Center, 3502 Avenue N, Lubbock, Monday, March 23.

The Lubbock County Crippled Children's Society, the County Medical Society, the Lubbock City-County Health Unit, and the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health are sponsoring agencies.

Primary purposes of the clinic will be to locate crippled children in need of treatment and to examine children who have received treatment in the past to determine if they will require additional care. No charge will be made for the examinations.

Children who are crippled or who have conditions which might lead to crippling will be admitted for examinations.

draw?"

ORDINANCE NO. 16 AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CERTAIN RIGHTS TO THE MOUNTAIN STATES TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, IN THE TOWN OF FARWELL, STATE OF TEXAS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Commission of the Town of Farwell, State of Texas, that:

Section 1. There is hereby granted to The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, for a term of twenty-five (25) years from and after the date of the passage of this Ordinance, the right, privilege, and easement to construct, install, maintain, and use, in, upon, along, across, above, over, and under the streets, alleys, public ways, and public places now or hereafter laid out or dedicated, or any extensions thereof, and additions thereto in said Town, poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other telephone lines necessary and proper for the maintenance and operation in said Town of a telephone exchange, and lines connected therewith, provided, however, that no poles, or other fixtures shall be placed where the same will interfere with any gas mains electric light, water hydrant, or water main, and all such poles and other fixtures placed in a street shall be placed at the outer edge of the sidewalk and inside the curb line, and those placed in alleys shall be located close to the line of the lot abutting on such alley, and then in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets and alleys.

Section 2. The Company at all times during the life of this franchise shall be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the Town, and to such reasonable regulations as may be imposed by the Town, by ordinance hereafter provided.

It is expressly understood and agreed that the Company shall save the Town harmless from all losses sustained by the Town on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever resulting from the negligence of the Company in the construction or maintenance of its telephone system in the Town. It is agreed that the Town shall not be liable for any claim or demand either by suit or otherwise made against the Town on account of any negligence as aforesaid on the part of the Company.

Section 3. The Town shall have the privilege during the life of this franchise, free of charge, where necessary for the construction or maintenance of the poles of the Company within the Town limits wires and pole fixtures necessary for a fire alarm and police alarm system, such wires and fixtures to be placed and maintained under the supervision of the Company. The Town in its use and maintenance of such wires and fixtures shall at all times comply with the rules and regulations of the Company, so that there may be a minimum danger of contact or conflict between the wires and fixtures of the Company, and the wires and fixtures used by the Town. It is further agreed, in order to avoid danger to life and property, that the above privilege is granted on condition that no pole or fire alarm wires or fixtures of the Town shall be placed on poles carrying electric light or power wires, and shall said pole or fire alarm wires or fixtures be exposed, without the consent of the Company, to the danger of contact with any conductor carrying a voltage greater than the normal telephone voltage.

The Town shall be solely responsible for all damage to persons or property arising out of the construction or maintenance of said pole and fire alarm fixtures, and shall save the Company harmless from all claims or demands whatsoever, arising out of the attachment, maintenance and/or removal of said wires, and fixtures to the poles of the Company. In cases of removal of the Company's plant, or removal of poles or fixtures, the Town shall care for or remove its own poles or fixtures and shall save the Company harmless from any damage to persons or property arising out of the removal or construction of its wires or other fixtures.

Section 4. Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along, or to make any unusual use of the streets, alleys, and public ways of the Town which shall interfere with the poles, wires, or fixtures of said Company or Town, shall first give notice to the said Company or the Town, as the case may be, and shall pay to the said Company or the Town, as the case may be, a sum sufficient to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering, and moving of the wires or other fixtures of said Company or Town, and before a permit is given by the Town, therefor, the applicant shall present a receipt from the Company showing said payment; thereupon the said Company upon presentation of said permit shall within forty-eight (48) hours thereafter provide for and so such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the streets, alleys, and public ways of the Town.

Section 5. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the Town and the Company that the grant or acceptance of any franchise, or of this franchise, shall not constitute a warranty either upon the part of the Company or of the Town, of any rights or claims had or made by either with respect to the occupancy of the streets, alleys, and public places of the Town under the laws of the Territory of Texas and under the Constitution and general statutes of the State of Texas, nor shall it in anywise prejudice or impair any rights or claims existing independently of this franchise, of the Town or of the Company, or its predecessors or successors, with respect to the construction, operation and maintenance, either before or after the life of this franchise, of a telephone system in the Town.

Section 6. This Ordinance shall become effective 31 days after its enactment—provided that within said 31 day period the Company shall file with the Town Clerk its written acceptance thereof. Within ten days after receipt of said written acceptance, the Town Clerk shall acknowledge to the Company in writing the receipt thereof, passed this 9th day of Feb. A. D. 1953.
