The following has been prepared with the cooperation of The Tribune staff, since I have not been feeling well enough to compose this column lately.

It is beginning to look as though persons interested in the possibility of damming one or more of the draws that course through Parmer County are getting some attention for their efforts.

We have received a copy of a letter sent from Representative Jess Osborn to T. W. Bewley of Friona. Bewley, as you know, is one of three Parmer County farmers who are awake to the future needs of this area with respect to conservation of water—our most precious natural resource.

Here is a portion of that letter: "Dear Mr. Bewley, I have been checking again on the possibilities of damming up Running Water and Frio Draws, and I am enclosing a booklet that shows what will have to be done, including all rules and regulations in regard to damming up these draws.

I understand that there is no one having a water right at this time on either of these draws except the City of Crosbyton.

We now have a bill introduced to cancel all water rights that are ten years old and have never been used.

If there is any way I can assist you in this matter, please advise me."

Why doesn't someone who has access to a private airplane spend a few hours time looking over the courses of the draws in the county to determine the most likely natural setting for a dam, and what would appear to be the most practical reservoir for containment of these waters, should our plans continue to progress? It might be a small investment that would pay off in big dividends later on.

**All Parmer County RTA Lines Staked**

The staking of lines of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative has now been completed in Parmer County. Four exchanges are to be located in this County as follows: Parmer, three miles north and seven miles west of Friona; Hub, 3½ miles south and four miles east of Friona; Tharp, three miles north of Bovina; and Oklahoma Lane, one mile northwest of Lariat, Leo Forrest, project manager, says.

The four exchange buildings have now been completed. These buildings (12 feet x 20 feet), made

of prefabricated steel are easily recognizable by their vivid green color. The equipment (manufactured by the North Electric Company in Galion, Ohio) has been placed in all of these buildings except Oklahoma Lane and it is expected shortly. A team of installers is expected from the factory shortly, who will put this equipment into operation.

The contractor for the pole lines, Thompson, Hight and Keister of Oklahoma City, Okla., have set the poles in the Friona area, are now digging the holes in the

Bovina area and will move on into the Oklahoma Lane area shortly. The wire and cable crews are completing their work South of Hereford and will move into the Friona area next week.

Two crews of two men each, headed by Bill Hampton and H. R. Hellman are installing phones in the area at present. The installation work is almost completed in the Friona area. "These crews will not install your phones while you are away from home, but will continue to call until someone is at home," Forrest adds.

Parmer and Hub exchanges will connect to the Friona exchange, Tharp to Bovina, and Oklahoma Lane to Farwell. Negotiations are now actively underway, and have been for the past year, with the General Telephones Company and the Mountain States Telephone Company for this extended area service. Directories are being printed; however, the exact date of putting these phones into operation cannot be set at present. "Late May and June are the expected date. The Board of Dir-

ectors and employees of the Cooperative are just as anxious as the people to get these phones into operation as quickly as possible. It has been a long wait and many Parmer County people have worked long and diligently to make the Cooperative Telephone System reality," Forrest explains.

**Meeting Called For Friday Night**

Plans for the organization of a new Baptist church in Farwell were announced by a group of 68 local people this week. Jack McManigal, who is spokesman for the group, announced a meeting will be held Friday night at Farwell Schools to make further plans.

He extended an invitation to persons who might wish to become charter members of the proposed church to attend the meeting and assist with organization.

"First and foremost," he stressed, "we want to make absolutely clear to everyone that we are not organizing this church because of any dissension with the parent Texico-Farwell church."

"We have done everything in the open in regard to starting our church over here, and we have asked for the prayers of our parent church."

It was understood by The Tribune at near press time that the list of 68 names was steadily growing.

McManigal continued, "And we don't want anybody to get the idea that our church is being organized by any clique, either."

Asked about what might be the immediate plans of the new church after it is organized, McManigal replied that the members would rent some building for the time being.

He indicated, however, that an attempt will be made to get a church building under construction in the immediate future.

"We hope to erect a building in the neighborhood of \$100,000," he said.

Another person, one of the original 68, emphasized that it was not the desire of the group of which she was a member to pull away or split the Texico-Farwell Baptist Church.

"Rather," she explained, "we are hoping that some day instead of having 240 out to Sunday School at the Texico-Farwell Church, we may have 480 persons each Sunday in the total attendance of the two churches."

She mentioned what she considered to be "out-grown" facilities in the present church.

"Persons who have not been contacted in this matter are invited to attend Friday night's meeting," McManigal stressed. The meeting is to be in the auditorium at 8 o'clock.

**PLANS ARE IN FINAL STAGE FOR TEXICO IMPROVEMENTS**

Plans reached a final stage of preparation this week as the City of Texico made ready for extensive improvements to its water service lines. A contract has been drawn, but is not yet signed, between the city and Starr & Cummins Contracting Co., of Albuquerque for laying around 6400 ft. of six-inch line.

Mayor M. C. Roberts said all conditions between the city and the company had been verbally agreed upon, and only the contract signing stood between the city and its improvements at the present time.

The contract, which will be for \$6615, will provide for the mentioned line improvements, as well as 10 fire plugs for the city.

W. L. Freeman, city clerk, summed up the project this way: "We are striving toward two objects with these improvements. One will be to improve our position for fire insurance rates, and the other will be better water service for citizens."

The city already owns the pipe which will go into the ground.

**Two Local Lasses Weigh Anchor Sunday For An Exciting Life with the WAVES**

Two local girls are deserting the High Plains for a life of travel and adventure, at least for four years. Misses Joan Hapke and Mildred Moore left Sunday for Albuquerque where they were sworn into the WAVES, the women's branch of the U. S. Navy.

As the first two girls from Texico, to enlist, the girls feel that they are going to enjoy advantages far above those that they have been enjoying as secretaries since their graduation from high school. Joan has been employed by George H. Sasser in Clovis, and until recent months Mildred was an employee of an insurance agency in Clovis.

In recounting the numerous advantages offered by the service, the girls name travel first. Their first travel began after leaving Albuquerque on Monday, when they left by plane for Bainbridge, Maryland, where they will undergo nine weeks of basic training. Enroute to Bainbridge, the girls planned to meet a girlfriend in Chicago, and to see the sights in Baltimore during their lay-over periods. "The real travel will come after a year in the service, when we can apply for overseas duty," said the girls, "and be sent to Hawaii."

The girls stressed the fact that they would not have to see combat duty, but would be in safety at all times.

Another advantage," says Joan, "will be meeting people. I think that will be an education in itself."

Mildred says, "We'll be learning all the time, as there are many fields we can go into that will be good training for a career later. Some of them are communications, radio, electronics, clerical work, and hospital duty."

"We'll also have our clothing supplied," says Joan, "which is one of the main expenses a girl in civilian life must meet."

Other advantages include room, board, a thirty-day leave with pay annually, medical and dental care, and a \$10,000 insurance policy. The girls say, "All of these advantages added to the \$78 pay check monthly make it look awfully good."

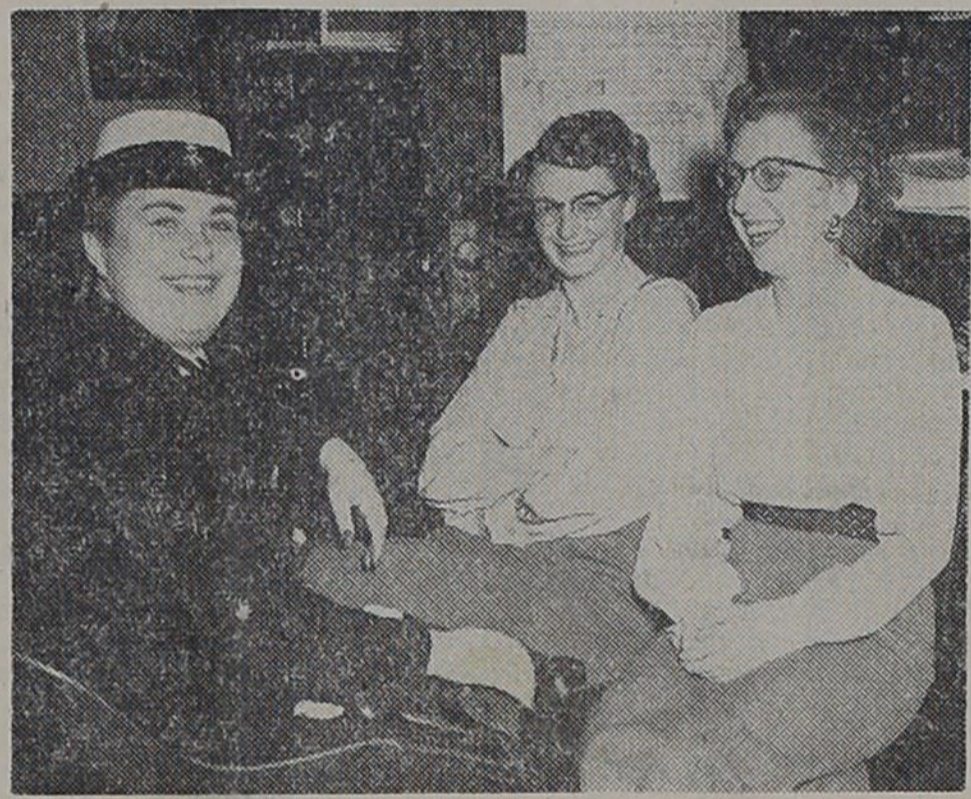
The girls may come home after their basic training period is finished, or they may wait until later to take their leave.

**Slow, Drizzly Rain Visits Plains Area, Boosts Wheat Hope**

**Rainfall Reports Fluctuate Widely**

Rain, the slow, drizzly kind that is dear to the heart of every wheat farmer, pelted down all over the High Plains Sunday afternoon and evening, giving another boost to the prospects for a wheat crop this summer.

The fact that acreage is so slight will prevent Parmer or any of its neighboring counties from producing a bumper wheat crop this year, but farmers are predicting that if green bugs and bad weather don't set in, the wheat return will be respectable nevertheless.

Rainfall fluctuated to a surprising degree within several localities last weekend and amounts in rain gauges read from .04 to .80 inch Monday morning.

Here is a rundown of several farmers of the area and their comments on the moisture:

Ed Muckelroy, six miles west Texico-Farwell reported three quarters inch.

John Holland, six miles south, says he got .70. He doesn't have any wheat himself, but says of his neighbors, "That sandy land wheat is sure lookin' good."

Olen Schleuter, 2½ miles north of town, who has 700 acres of wheat, says his crop is "going to be good if the greenbugs don't

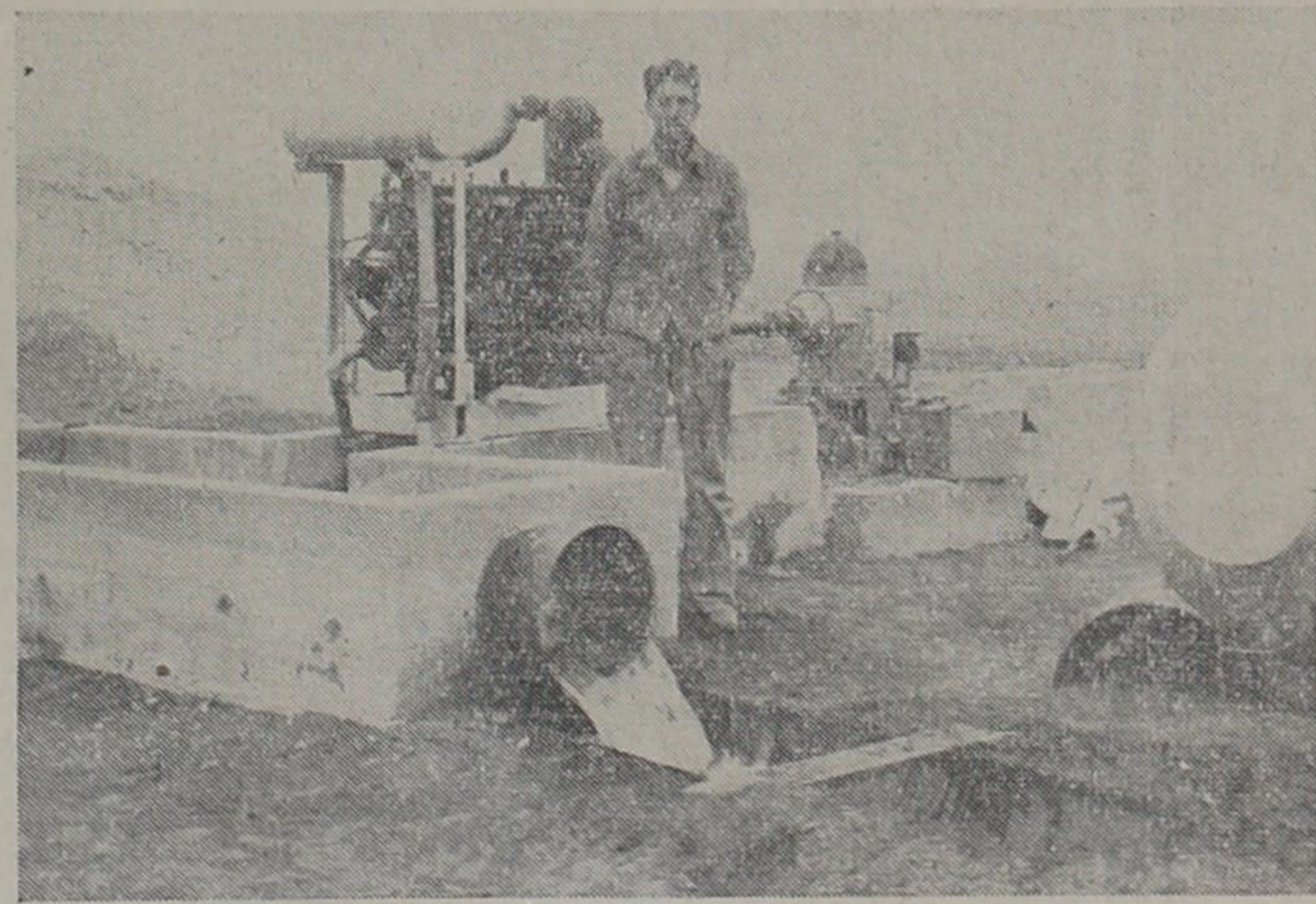

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

Rhea Farm Bureau, one of the most active locals we know of, had Mike Pavalus, hospital technician out to their monthly meeting last Friday night to type blood of their members. This is a commendable service for any group to perform. A life is often saved in an emergency when it is already known just who can furnish the needed transfusion. Charlie Calaway is president of Rhea Farm Bureau. Thanks to Mike, too, for this off-duty service.

G. A. Dietz, of Happy, is a member of the State Farm Bureau Irrigation Water Advisory Committee. In Olton last week, he asked the elected officials of Water District 1 for advice in handling pending legislation in Austin. Local Farm Bureau members are urged to present suggestions on this, or any other subject to the county directors for consideration. You can run your own business by using your organizational strength in such matters.

There is no direct connection, but all County Farm Bureau Offices in the district are assisting farmers in securing permits for irrigation wells. Nearly 200 approved permits are on file in the Parmer County Office in Friona.

Mr. R. D. Fisher, who is farming the former C. P. Warren farm north of Bovina is the latest new resident of this area to take advantage of Farm Bureau Services. The Farm Bureau Queen Contest to be held in September is expected to arouse wide interest. If the queen selected from Parmer County wins in the district, she will be entitled to an expense paid trip to Mineral Wells in November. If she wins there, she will go to Chicago in December with expenses paid for her attendants and herself.

Agricultural policies, as set forth at the 1952 National Farm Bureau Convention include: (1) Full employment, high productivity and a good distribution of income, after taxes, must be maintained throughout the economy in the interest of the general prosperity which is necessary for continuing farm prosperity; (2) Monetary and fiscal policies which will contribute to the maintenance of a more stable general price level must be used effectively. (3) Government policies which tend to place agriculture at a disadvantage with the rest of the economy must be corrected.

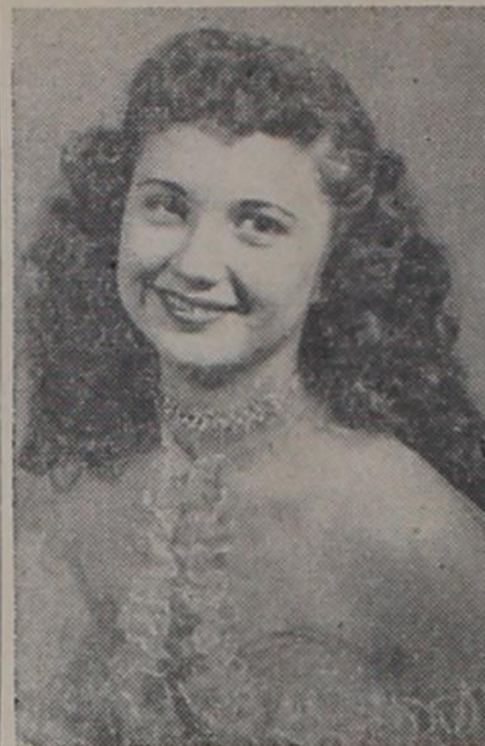

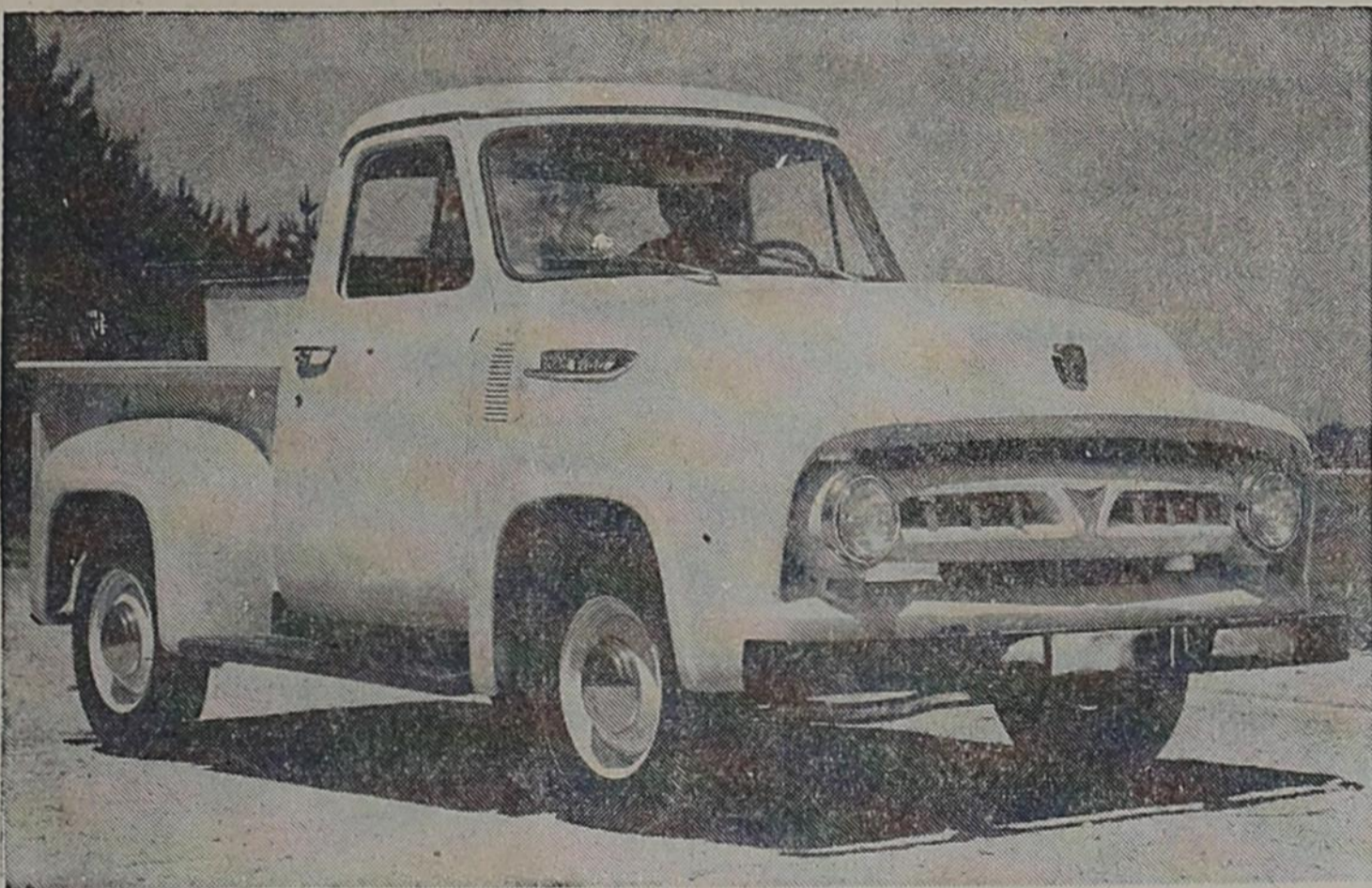

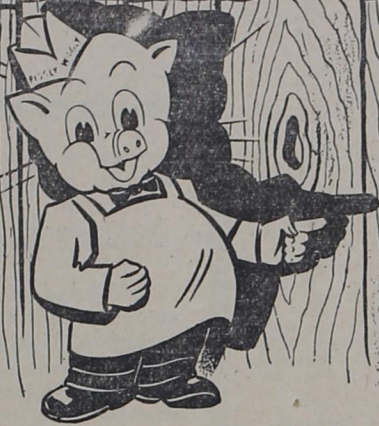
