## FROM THE HOPPER By HOP

We regret to report that Mr. Graham, editor-publisher and customary author of this column, will be absent for an indefinite time due to illness. He and the Mrs. left yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon on the train for Temple where he will remain under the care of Scott & White Clinic. It is hoped that his absence will not be in excess of two weeks.

A pioneer in the true sense of the word died in California Sunday. Many Texico-Farwell people will remember Ira W. Taylor, who came to Texico before the turn of the century when there was only a box-car "office" by the Santa Fe tracks as they entered New Mexico.

For forty years, Taylor was a next-door neighbor of "Uncle Tom" Randall, who is something of an old-timer himself.

Uncle Tom says that Taylor helped drill wells for his father-in-law in Portales for several years, then came back to Texico where he and a fellow named Ragsdale entered into an agreement to organize the town of Texico.

Ragsdale did most of the promotional work, says Uncle Tom, but Taylor was supposed to be a 50-50 partner. Taylor, who claimed a quarter-section straddled by the railroad where much of Texico now stands, broke up his holdings into town lots and offered them for sale.

He and Ragsdale cooperated to improve the lots, and Taylor advanced \$90 toward a well for the new town. Somehow, Taylor lost claim to his town lots and his half of the profits, says Uncle Tom.

Shortly thereafter he lost his position with the railroad, after he had worked his way up from the section gang to be foreman of the Texico section.

In 1905 he homesteaded four miles southwest of Texico where he lived as a neighbor by Uncle Tom for forty years. There he farmed and carpentered until leaving for California in 1945.

"He never was a very strong man," asserts Uncle Tom. "But he sure had a sharp wit. He had an answer to every question, and never hesitated for a quick retort. He was a real neighbor, too. When you were sick—it didn't matter what the weather was—he always came over to see you."

Hop wrote the following shortly before he left for Temple:

Well, I'm off to another seige with doctor's nurses and hospitalization. This is written on Wednesday morning, and according to present plans, wife and I will board the Santa Fe this afternoon for Temple, where I will enter the Scott and White clinic for observation and possible treatment.

Don't have the slightest idea when we will be able to return home. In the meantime, the paper is in the hands of my faithful son and wife, assisted by Richard Hapke and Allen Lockhart.

In leaving, we want to take this occasion to thank our many friends who have assisted us in making preparations for our departure. We couldn't get along without friends, and you have been so wonderful.

Your continued support and cooperation with the office staff during our absence will be sincerely appreciated.

One thing that we won't have to worry about while away is how we shall cast our vote in the forthcoming election. We cast our absentee votes before taking off.

Knowing full well that MacArthur does not have a chance in the voting, nevertheless it was a pleasure to cast my ballot for the man whom I firmly believe is the best man on the ticket.

Douglas MacArthur has been my choice all the time, and I am glad his name appears on the ballot.

## Farwell C-C Attempts To Revive Trades Day

Directors of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce met last Monday night and considered plans for re-organizing and reviving the local Trades Day promotion, which has been dead for over two months.

Directors agreed that it will take a minimum of fifteen members in the new organization to make another Trades Day effective and permanent.

Carl Davis, C of C vice-president, disclosed that eleven businesses had agreed to participate if another program is opened, and all these establishments are in Farwell.

"In order to make Trades Day a permanent thing," emphasized the officer, "we need more cooperation from local merchants. This time our organization will be made iron clad."

Explaining what was meant by "iron clad," Davis explained that businesses which decline to participate in the community project will not be permitted to redeem awards, which will be issued in the form of "scripts" good for retail trade value.

Furthermore, they will be ineligible to compete for the awards themselves which will be made weekly.

Davis cautioned that all of the details for another Trades Day have not been worked out, but predicted that an announcement of a concrete nature will be issued after another directors' meeting which is scheduled for Monday night.

## Euler Reviews Polio Situation in Past Year, Warns that Contributions Must Go Higher

The sharp, unexpected increase in polio cases this past summer has made urgent early organization to insure that the next March of Dimes drive will be the greatest in history, Raymond Euler, County Campaign Director declared today.

Returning from a regional pre-campaign meeting of March of Dimes chairmen, directors and workers held in Oklahoma City, Euler said: "We heard both good news and bad news at the meeting. A staggering total of around 4,000 new cases a week at summer's end piled up a burdensome total. There are indications 1952 will have over 50,000 cases of polio far exceeding the record-breaking year of 1949.

"The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is meeting the emergency with all of its resources. Medical care is available for all patients, with financial assistance provided for those needing such aid. Drain on chapter funds, however, is terrific.

"Plans therefore have been made to recruit the greatest force of workers ever enrolled in the March of Dimes, so that the drive from January 2 through January 31 will raise the added funds which must be contributed this year. We must continue to care for the thousands and thousands of victims who have known the tragedy of infantile paralysis and at the same time pursue the now-promising search for polio preventive."

The summary of the situation is reported as follows:

## Four Cases Tried In Courts Here Wednesday

Four cases were tried, three in district court and one in juvenile (county) court here Wednesday following a session of the grand jury Monday which returned 11 indictments.

Judge E. A. Bills presided over district court, which considered the following cases:

Virgil Redding, 18, Roswell, sentenced to four years under the Adult Probation Law and court costs for attempted burglary of a Friona shoe shop this summer.

Marion Rolan, Hobbs, four years under the Adult Probation Law for forgery. The hot check was passed at Meeks Service Station in Farwell. Justin Zachary, 22, Antlers, Okla., 6 years in the state penitentiary at Huntsville. Zachary, a 3-time loser, burglarized the T. W. Bewley home in Lazbuddy last August.

Gene Davis, a juvenile, of Hobbs, was paroled to the custody of his mother. He accompanied Redding in the shoe shop affair in Friona. His trial was before County Judge A. D. Smith.

All persons in the above cases entered pleas of guilty.

Five other indictments were returned by the grand jury Monday, but no names will be released pending their apprehension.

Bob Cooper, charged with forgery, will be tried Nov. 10 in district court with a jury.

## Lazbuddy Homecoming Planned Next Weekend

Homecoming for Lazbuddy will be celebrated Friday afternoon, October 17, when Lazbuddy Longhorns will meet the team from Three-Way at 2:00 p.m.

Highlight of the activities will be the crowning of the football queen at the half.

Lazbuddy suffered its first defeat of the season, last Friday night, by the Pettit Eagles by a score of 48-18. They now have a record of two wins and one loss.

# '52 Cotton Rolls In, Hand Pickers Short

## Ten Miles Of Paving Planned For Parmer

Plans for ten more miles of farm-to-market paved roads were submitted to District Highway Engineer S. C. McCarty in Lubbock by a unanimous commissioners vote Tuesday.

Working under a long-term agreement drawn up in 1948, the commissioners choose the ten-mile strip from "Crossroads" into Friona as the next link in Parmer's expanding farm-to-market network.

"We have about one-hundred thousand dollars ready to divert into this new road, and the construction will take place in 1953," said County Judge A. D. Smith, who attended the meeting.

"The plans, which are all in order, will be submitted to the State Highway Commission for approval about December first."

In addition to the decision on the new 10-mile strip of paving, the commissioners conferred with Engineer McCarty concerning the last phase of the 1948 road program.

This concerns building a farm-to-market road from the intersection of the east-west Lazbuddy road and the north-south Muleshoe-Friona road. The location is commonly referred to as the "twin houses."

When completed, the Castro County line will be linked to the intersection, which would make available markets of Muleshoe, Friona, Lazbuddy, Bovina, and Farwell over all-paved roads.

Attending the meeting were commissioners E. F. Billingsley, E. R. Day, H. L. Ivy, C. H. Jefferson, Judge Smith, and Forrest Osborn.

## Olan Schlueter Named New Farm Bureau Head

Texico Farm Bureau met in regular session Monday night, Mrs. W. H. McDaniel, reporter, says, with 40 members present. A chili supper was served preceding the meeting.

Luther Pearce, outgoing chairman, presided at the meeting. He discussed commodity grain, and told attendants that the community would soon have telephone service, the lines slated for completion November 20. Texico Farm Bureau booth which was entered in Curry County fair was discussed, and it was reported that a \$10 prize was awarded the organization.

Pearce was commended for having served the Farm Bureau as president for four years, and new officers were elected: Olan Schlueter, chairman; Roscoe Burris, vice chairman; Barney Harding, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. W. H. McDaniel, reporter; Mrs. Barney Harding local chair woman.

Mrs. Buddy Pearce then invited the women of the Farm Bureau to a tea to be held at Clovis October 31.

B. A. Rogers and E. U. Scott were named on a committee to draw up resolutions for the Farm Bureau; and John Hadley told of resolutions on grain purchases. Members played "42" at the conclusion of the meeting.

A jury of view was appointed to study a road petition by David Carson. To study the question are: Carson, F. L. Carson, B. L. Marshall, R. L. Rule and E. R. Barry. The road is located east of Bovina, connecting with State Highway 86 south.

"Give us more boll pullers!" is the cry of cotton farmers and gin men all over Parmer County. The huge 1952 cotton crop, just beginning to thread its way to the gins, is sorely in need of labor to assist in harvesting.

This is the opinion of three cotton gin men from representative areas of the county. Wright Williams, manager of North Plains Gin at Friona; Guy Nickels, manager of Lariat Gin; and T. M. Smauley of the Morrison & Ely gin at Bovina all agree that manual pullers are the number one need at the present time for a successful harvest.

## Mobile Chiropractor Hits Road For "Ike"

## Legion Has Series Of Coming Projects

Ten members were present for a business meeting for members of the American Legion Monday night, and disposed of several business matters, Loyde Brewer, commander, says.

Date for the annual turkey shoot, sponsored by the organization, was set for November 16, with details to be announced later. Turkeys are given away at the shoot, to those who have the best marksmanship.

Members of the group then decided to have an Armistice Day celebration for Texico-Farwell. Plans are not complete, but both Texico and Farwell school bands have consented to march in the parade, and to participate in festivities. A parade will originate in Texico and proceed to Farwell and down Third Street to Parmer County courthouse, where a flag raising ceremony is to be held. A platoon of Legionnaires, under the command of John Getz, will march in the parade and serve as color bearers and firing squad. More details will be listed later.

It was decided that the Legion would order ten 30-caliber Springfield army rifles which are available from the army ordinance without cost. The rifles will be used for Legion purposes, for firing squads for parades, or special ceremonies.

Monthly zone meeting was announced for the past Tuesday night in Canyon, and the 18th District convention in Hereford was announced for Nov. 8 at the Jim Hill Hotel. The convention will begin Saturday evening with a banquet at 7 o'clock in the evening. Reservations should be sent immediately to the manager of Chamber of Commerce at Hereford, says Brewer. None are accepted after 5 o'clock November 8.

Speaker at the convention will be Rev. Wilson Arnes, Baptist minister of Ft. Worth and past department chaplain of the Legion.

The local Legion also voted to sponsor a dance at the Legion hall in November, as a money making project.

Coffee and doughnuts were served at the conclusion of the meeting.

## Pendergrass In Hospital After Being Hit by Truck

Still confined to Clovis Memorial Hospital this week is Matt Pendergrass, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Pendergrass who live eight miles south of Texico.

The youth is recovering after being hit by a farm truck which he and his brother were attempting to start Saturday near the Pendergrass home. Marvin, Matt's brother, was at the wheel when the accident occurred, and the injured youth was rushed to receive medical attention immediately after the mishap.

## CONVENTIONS PLANNED

Farm Bureau State convention is planned in San Antonio, beginning Nov. 10, Raymond Euler says, and the local group will send a delegation. County convention will be held the latter part of this month or the first of next month, he adds. More details will be given later.

Williams reported a "pretty fair" run of cotton through the Friona gin by Wednesday of this week. All over the county, the tempo was picking up daily. "We have just a few pullers," he told The Tribune, "and it isn't likely that mechanical picking will begin in earnest until November first."

The Friona ginner reported a fairly hard freeze last week—around 30 degrees. This probably halted cotton growth and leaves will soon drop from the plants, but Williams says there is still a lot of moisture left in the bolls.

He was optimistic about the quality of cotton. "It sure is good," was his comment. The typical run is middling white, and Williams estimates the staple at 29-32 inch, average.

North Plains has ginned 136 bales this season.

**Rolls In At Lariat**  
Guy Nickles, reporting for Lariat Gin, modestly said "We're doing pretty good" when asked about the crop. They have turned out 519 bales already. "It's mostly middling cotton," he said, "a little above average, I'd say."

Nickles echoed the need for hand cotton pullers, and predicted that the harvest will hit its stride by next week. The Lariat gin turned out 60 bales on Tuesday of this week.

**90 Bales At Bovina**  
It was the same story back at Bovina, where the new Morrison & Ely gin was beginning its first season of operation. "We're getting out seven or eight bales a day," he said, "but the season really hasn't even started yet."

Morrison & Ely has ginned 90 bales. Most of the cotton was middling, most of its seven-eighths, with a few "29's."

"We sure are short on hand labor," exclaimed the gin man. "It's ten days or two weeks before we'll be able to use mechanical pickers effectively, and we need hand labor now."

Asked if he thought that most of the cotton farmers would wait until their cotton can be mechanically harvested, Smauley replied "yes" with no qualifications.

Other gins in the county could not be contacted before press time.

## Texico Old-Timer Dies In California

Ira W. Taylor Sr., 81, who came to Texico in 1899, died the day after his birthday Sunday at his home in Roseville, Calif.

Taylor, who came here even before any homesteading was done, had been in ill health for some time. He and his wife moved from here to California in 1945 and they returned to visit friends here in 1949.

The ex-resident is survived by three sons: Ira Jr., Blackwell, Okla.; Grant, Seattle, Washington; and Manning of Seagraves. Five daughters: Mrs. Dovie Woltman, Roseville, Calif.; Mrs. Sylvia Payne, Long Beach, Calif.; Mrs. Viona Kennedy, Roswell, N. M.; Mrs. Pearl Coburn, Sacramento, Calif.; and Mrs. Jewell Harpold, Clovis.

He also leaves 30 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be at the Roseville cemetery in California. He will be buried beside his wife who passed away a few years ago.

W. M. Roberts, principal of Farwell schools almost had his future cut out for him before he finished high school. "I think I had an idea that I would go to North Texas State Teacher's College and study to be a teacher two or three years before I received my high school diploma," he says. Explaining further, Roberts adds that he had two brothers and three sisters who received degrees there before he did, and another brother followed him as a North Texas student. All of the Roberts children received degrees in education.

The local school teacher was born in Anson, Texas, where he grew up, and received his preliminary education at Swan's Chapel, a rural school. He completed his senior year at Anson High School. Robert's father was a farmer.

Going to North Texas in Denton for his college work, Roberts majored in math with a minor in education and history. After receiving his degree, he began his teaching career. He has been an instructor all the time with the exception of only three years, when he farmed.

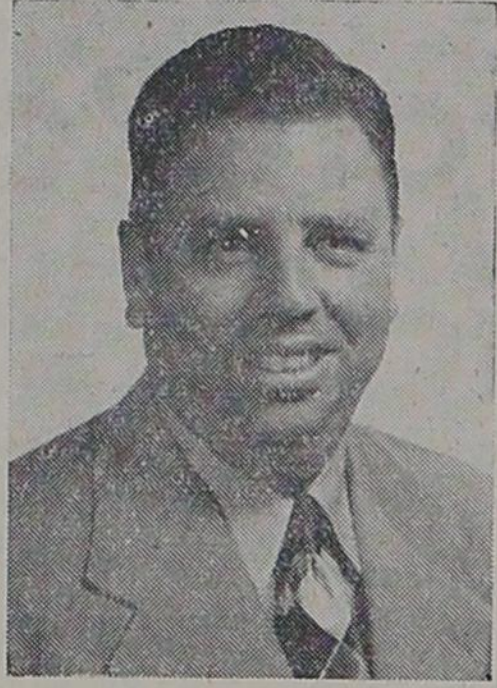
The local man has taught at Wylie, King's High School near Quanah, Mullins School in Dawson County, Bellevue, Oklahoma Lane and Farwell. He was at Oklahoma Lane for two years, and upon consolidation of Farwell and the rural schools, he went back to Bellevue for a period. In 1949, the principal returned to Farwell and began his duties in Farwell schools.

King's High School was one of the memorable schools where Roberts has taught. He met his wife there. "The first time I saw Mrs. Roberts," he states, "was the day I went to King High School to apply for a job." She was a student there. The administrator doesn't remember when he and his wife began dating, but they were married in September after she received her high school diploma in June. He didn't teach any of the classes in which his wife was enrolled, but he did coach basketball and she was a member of the team.

Roberts instructs math, and coaches junior high football, in addition to his job as principal, at the local school.

In 1951, he received his Master's degree from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts have two sons: James, who is a sophomore in high school and Charles, who is in the second grade.



"I still like school teaching after all these years," he says, "and will probably remain in that profession."

**Joe Camp Explains New PMA Program**

The 1953 ACP program will be changed considerably from the past programs, Joe Camp, PMA secretary, says. Under this program, the farmer will be contacted by one of the PMA Community Committeemen who will explain the program. The farmer is then given an opportunity to request assistance on any of the practices approved for 1953 that are needed on the individual farm.

"In order to be eligible for assistance under this program, it is necessary that you turn your request in to the committeeman at the time he contacts you," emphasizes Camp.

Camp points out that Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan has announced that there will be no marketing quotas or acreage allotments on upland cotton produces this year. He further announces that a national average price support of not less than the following on 1953 crops: wheat, \$2.21 a bushel; grain sorghum, \$2.43 hundredweight; and barley, \$1.24 bushel.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF FARMER  
To the Resident Qualified Property Tax-paying Voters of Farmer County, Texas:  
TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 4th day of November, 1952, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 8th day of September, 1952, which is as follows:

On this 8th day of September, 1952, the Commissioners Court of Farmer County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Farwell, Texas, with the following members of the Court to-wit: A. D. Smith, County Judge, E. R. Day, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, C. H. Jefferson, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2, E. F. Billingsley, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, H. L. Ivy, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, being present, and among other proceedings had by the Court, were the following:

Commissioner E. R. Day introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner C. H. Jefferson. The Court carried with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

YES: Commissioners E. R. Day, E. F. Billingsley, C. H. Jefferson, H. L. Ivy.  
NOES: Commissioners none.

The order is as follows:  
WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such election, which changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Farmer County, Texas, in its order, is able and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF FARMER COUNTY, TEXAS:  
That a special election be held in said County on the 4th day of November, 1952, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property tax-paying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Farmer County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:  
Not exceeding fifty five cents (55c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes.  
Not exceeding fifteen cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges.  
Not exceeding five cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the county; and  
Not exceeding five cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be authorized by a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed to the leaving of in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6 of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.  
A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Farmer County, Texas, each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.
