Farmers To Vote **On Wheat Quotas**

Parmer County farmers, together with others throughout the nation, will go to the polls August 14 to vote in a farm referendum on whether marketing quotas will

wheat crop. A two-thirds majority of all U. S. farmers must favor the quotas if they take effect next year.

The referendem has been ordered by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson in the face of a huge surplus of grain now being stockpiled in elevators and warehouses.

The alternative to marketing quotas and 90-per cent of parity price supports would be price supports at the level of 50 per cent of parity and no acreage controls.

If farmers reject the proposed acreage allotments, and marketing quotas, price supports on wheat will be dropped from the current level of about \$2.21 per bushel to about \$1.20 per bushel, county PMA officials advise.



THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Our Confidence in the Administration Begins To Wane Somewhat

Up until just recently, we had been hopefully regarding the new administration as a sort of knight in shining armor bent on saving the damsel called America from the clutches of the socialistic state.

Alas, our hope is fading. President Eisenhower has announced a plan designed to make 10 million more Americans "beneficiaries" of the Social Security plan (whether they like it or not).

This, of course, will mean that another burden has been thrown on the American taxpayer who is unfortunate enough to be making a modest living. This also will mean an additional strain on the already quaking federal debt, which is pushing toward new record.

"Social security" is the biggest hoax ever perpetrated on the citizens of this country. The inequalities and inconsistencies of the program are a national scandal.

A man who has been self-employed and who paid no taxes into the fund for thirty years is now eligible for benefits when he reaches 65 years of age, even though he has been paying into the fund only during the last two years.

Maybe it would be more clearly explained this way: A man, who was 64 in 1951, and had been self-employed for 30 years (having paid nothing toward Social Security during that time), now finds he is just as eligible for benefits at 65 as his neighbor, also 65, who worked for someone else and has been paying taxes toward SS for 30 years. All this is because of modification of the SS laws a couple of years back.

Another thing which has caused us some concern is the apparent disregard of the administration of its pre-election campaign to reduce if not eliminate the federal debt.

Ike got his ears pinned back when he tried to get the red-ink limit moved up to \$290 billion. Hooray! It took a coalition of Demos and Republicans to do it, but it's heartening to see that some legislators are waking up to the fact that the good old USA prosperous as she is, cannot hold up the world economy herself.

Failure of Credit System Will Mean Disaster

The other day a fellow who was genuinely concerned over just how long he would be able to remain in business took time to point out just what credit is doing to the retail businessman in Texico-Farwell and other small High Plains cities.

"What in the world has gotten into people?" he asked us. "They come in and fill up their car with my gas and say 'charge it,' then when it comes time to pay their bill they look at me and say, 'well

"ride." It's little short of embezzelment, at the very least. You're using the other fellow's money without his permission.

Few indeed are the businessmen who will bear a grudge against a customer who will come in and Parmer and Adjoining honestly say, "Look, Fred, I don't have enough money to pay this bill. Here's ten dollars, though. Outside this Area I'll pay you more as soon as I can."

But when a man or woman simply ignores dunnings and notices month after month, there can be little condemnation of a retailer who resorts to legal (if not brute) force to regain his investment.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 25-A survey just completed by the Texas State Teachers Association indicates that there will be only 2,550 new teachers available for approximately 8,000 vacant teaching jobs in Texas next September, Research Director E. L. Galyean announced Saturday. Supt. W. H. Willoughby, Bovina, notes the survey.
