If you don't believe it, we suggest that you drive by whenever it's convenient, regardless of the day or night of the week, or the time it may happen to be. Somebody'll be here most likely.

On special occasions, however, we do manage to get the Trib bolted shut. It's a frightening experience knowing that the old shop is shut up and people can't come and go of their own free will, so we've stuck to the tradition established by the late author of this column, our dear old dad, and kept the key near at hand.

And as Hop used to say in the paper, "The key is hanging right by the door. Sometime if you need something and we're not here, help yourself. But be sure to lock the door as you leave."

The way he figured it was that there weren't very many people who'd be interested in heisting a 14,000-pound newspaper press off our hands. We guess the old boy was right, because as far as we know we've never had a thing stolen that amounted to what you'd call a "burglary."

We've been quizzing small businessmen in this and several other small cities in the area during the past few weeks about the operation of their concerns.

One thing that everybody is interested in is prices. Are the prices we have to pay for things we need going up or down? Well sir, you may hardly be able to notice it, but just about everything we have checked on is still going up.

The businessmen of our part of the country, bless 'em, are cushioning the prices in most instances, in spite of the avalanche of high priced things which they must have to stay in business.

Take coffee, for instance, the most generally indulged in habit of the American people. It probably will come as a surprise to you to learn that grocery men, virtually without exception, are selling coffee to you below what it costs them to replace the stock you purchase.

The price right now is hovering somewhere between \$1.05 and \$1.17 per pound, depending upon the brand. Show us a grocer who isn't selling the bean at or below wholesale. We don't think there are any.

Furthermore, the grocery boys say we ain't seen nothin' yet on this coffee price business. Nearly everybody thinks it will go to \$1.50 per pound. Some think \$1.75, some \$2.00, and one said \$3.00 isn't beyond the imagination.

Drug store operators say everything they buy is still climbing, but you probably haven't noticed it on your bill. You farmers will certainly agree that farm machinery, without which our industry would be shackled and useless, is high right now.

But talk to the fellow who sold you the new plow or tractor this year and he'll tell you about what a buy you got, compared with the price HE had to pay for the machinery.

The only thing we've been able to spot that's coming down is—yes, you guessed it—the price for the products the farm produces.

Today, instead of getting involved in the tremendously complicated question of farm surpluses, farm marketing, farm price supports and what-not, let's say this (which is something that, for a change, we think everybody'll agree on):

Through better practices and techniques, it is going to be necessary for the farmer to make better, more efficient use of the elements at his disposal—his land, water, machinery, supplies, and labor, if he hopes to hold his own economically in the face of declining farm prices and against rising costs of investment and production.

It may be a pretty tough row to hoe, but somehow we have faith that we're going to be able to do it, and come out on top.

About that sand that stacks up on the lawn. With two brooms expended already to say nothing of our muscular agonies, and the first day of spring yet to come, we've about decided that maybe we shouldn't interfere with Mother Nature's ways.

We've never been able to see any difference between ignoring a debt honestly made for a

Found in his car at the time of the arrest were 12 batteries which were soon due to be sold to a Clovis salvage company. Lovelace said it was through wrecking yards that he got his lead on Miller, who has disposed of many batteries in this manner.

FB Explaining '54 Allotment

Sees Need for County To Plant Entire Allotment for 1954

(Editor's note: President of the Parmer County Farm Bureau, Aubra Ellison, called at The Tribune's office Monday and requested assistance in publicizing the details of the new cotton allotment program for 1954—especially the phases pertaining to reapportionment of unused or unwanted acres.

He stressed that it was not the Farm Bureau's intention or desire to interfere with the program which is done under the authority of the ASC office, but that the organization was hopeful that something might be done whereby cotton growers of the county might be brought to a fuller understanding of the problems relating to the 1954 program.

Ellison said he was particularly anxious for the farmers to understand how acres are turned back to the county committee, and stressed that it was highly important that Parmer County plant its full allotment in order to preserve a record for future allotments. The Bureau's prepared statement is as follows:

Aubrey Ellison, president of Parmer County Farm Bureau, reports that he has been encouraged

by Texas Farm Bureau officials to make every effort to familiarize cotton growers with the provisions in the new cotton allotment program pertaining to release and reallocation of allotments. In checking with the ASC office, Ellison says the following information will be valuable to farmers who receive cotton allotments.

If the county fails to plant the full number of acres allotted in 1954, it will adversely affect allotments in the future. These provisions in the law can be made beneficial to the individual grower and the county, too.

Growers who receive allotments and who do not wish to plant it, or any portion of it, may release those acres to the county committee, using forms provided for that purpose at the County ASC Office.

Acres released to the County Committee for 1954 will be considered as planted on the farm from which it was released, provided that cotton was planted on

Bovina folks weren't the only ones having their troubles with fire last week during the bad sandstorm. Clyde McDaniel, who lives about five miles southwest of Texico, lost several piles of bundled feed and a hay stack. Damage was estimated at about \$2000.

The Texico-Farwell Fire Department responded to the call and rushed to McDaniel's farm Thursday afternoon, where they found it necessary to employ water from a neighbor's irrigation well to extinguish the blaze.

Just as the fireboys were returning to town, an alarm went out from Pop Spurlin's Service Station in Farwell. Electric wires near the roof of his station had flapped against the building until the insulation had been worn off, and a fire had been started.

This blaze was snuffed out before it had a chance to cause much damage. One local fire truck had been summoned to Bovina.

Community Auction Saturday At Friona

Consignments are being invited for a community auction sale Saturday at Friona, which is designed to raise additional funds to finance the proposed new building for the Parmer County Community Hospital.

Bill Flippin, Friona auctioneer, and the Friona Chamber of Commerce are working on the project, which will be handled in such a manner as to allow consignees their choice as to how money from the sale will be divided.

Jim Baxter, hospital manager, said it works like this: When a person brings some article in to the sale, he indicates whether the money from the sale of the article is to all go to the hospital building fund; or whether a percent of it will go to the fund; or whether the total amount will be retained by himself.

The choice is up to the individual, says Baxter. Consignments are being taken at the Chamber offices in the American Legion building.

Involved in this agreement are four wheat exporting countries: the United States, France, Canada, and Australia. They have all agreed to sell their wheat at a price not exceeding \$2.05 per bushel, and the purchasing nations have agreed to buy the commodity at a price of not less than \$1.55.

Consequently, the purchasing nations are buying wheat from non-member producing nations at a price that is depressing world market.

During all this time, nations which import wheat will continue to buy wherever the product is the cheapest—which most likely will be from nations not members of the agreement.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Austin—Top news out of Austin this week is the opening of the 30-day special session of the Legislature, which started Monday.

The last special session of the Texas Legislature was in 1950. It was called for 30-days, but lasted three months.

Four problems have been placed before the 1954 session by Governor Allan Shivers, along with his recommendations for raising taxes.

These were the tasks given the legislators:

1. To provide higher salaries for public school teachers.

2. To raise the pay of state employees.

3. To finance construction of needed new buildings at Southwestern Medical School, Dallas; the University of Texas Medical Branch, Houston; Texas School for Deaf, Austin; and Eastham unit of the Texas Prison System.

4. To outlaw the Communist Party in Texas and provide for enforcement of this legislation.

Prior to making his tax recommendations, the governor talked with business leaders to get their views as to how the money should be raised.

It is thought that \$30 to \$35 in new money will be needed to pay for higher salaries and building.

The money, Shivers said, should come from these sources:

1. A new and valid gas gathering tax, more or less like the one passed during the last regular session of the Legislature, and ruled unconstitutional by the US Supreme Court. Shivers thinks the law can be rewritten so that it will be valid.

2. A tax on franchises paid by corporation, except for charters issued to religious, educational, and charitable groups.

3. An increase in the present state tax on beer.

Submitted to the governor by the Texas Industrial Commission were bills to make Communist Party membership a felony and set punishment of fines up to \$20,000 and imprisonment up to 20 years.

One of the bills would establish a state Loyalty Board of Review to investigate charges of subversive activities. Findings of the Board would be subject to appeal to the courts.

Penalties including death for Communist Party membership had been suggested by the governor, but the Board declined to go that far.

William J. Harris, president of the State Federation of Labor and a member of the Industrial Commission, expressed his opposition to one of the bills—that setting up the Loyalty board.

"This proposed law," said Harris, "not only does not guarantee trial by jury; it leaves the way open for blackening the reputations and destroying the livelihood of loyal, law-abiding American citizens."

Another pre-session development was a conference between Shivers and House Speaker Reuben Senterfitt, who has differed with the governor over various aspects of the special session.

Notably, Senterfitt disagreed with Shivers' compromise plan for teacher pay and school financing.

Neither the governor nor the speaker would reveal to the press what was discussed.

Senterfitt has announced that he will be a candidate for governor this year. Shivers has not disclosed his plans—whether he will try for re-election, run for the US Senate, or retire from public office.

District Judge J. Harris Gardner, speaking from his bench here, lashed out at the legislature on four counts. He found these flaws:

1. Juries in criminal cases have the responsibility of fixing punishment.

2. More stringent divorce laws are needed.

3. Funds are required for a workable adult probation system.

4. That provision should be removed from the statutes which makes "justifiable homicide" a defense in slayings committed by husbands in adultery cases.

There are some faults in Texas' insurance laws, says Garland Smith, Chairman of the state's insurance commission, but he denies that the situation is as bad as it was described by Robert Gilmore, head of the National Association of Life Underwriters.

Gilmore, speaking at a meeting of his group at Knoxville, Tenn., said that Texas has the "worst insurance laws in the United States", and most of the companies writing health and accident policies with "tricky" provisions are "huddled in Texas".

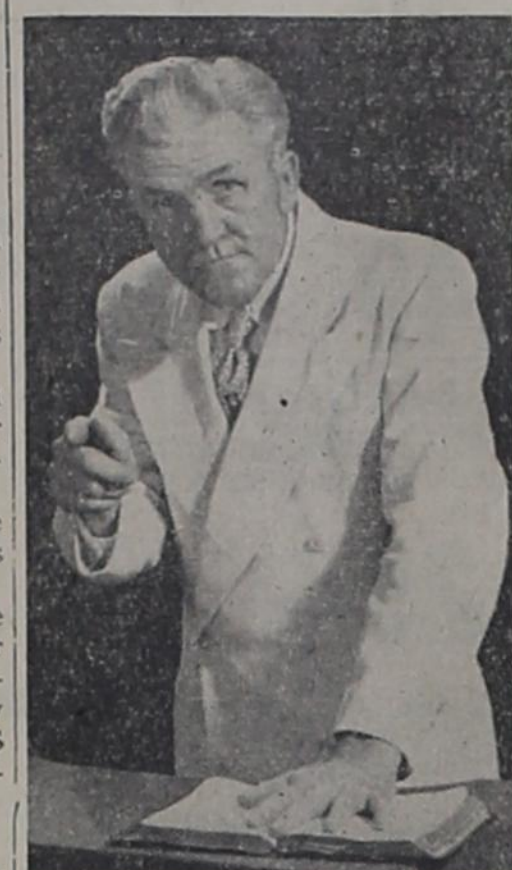
While it is true that Texas laws do not specify the provisions of health and accident policies, the board has set up for those policies

the same standards that are in effect in other states, Smith declared.

Duval County's strife continued as the United Mothers of the dukedom announced that they would visit Governor Shivers and "offer our services in the work that is being done to clean up our county government."

Mrs. Oliver Trevino, chairman of the Duval woman's group, said the main purposes of the organization is to assure the governor that "we are behind him in his efforts to help us."

Mrs. Trevino is a Benavides teacher and wife of an oil company employee. She said her group would ask the governor to leave the Rangers in Duval County.



Meeting Continues At Legion Hall

"Armageddon" was the subject of Evangelist Balsler, in the American Legion Hall, Farwell last Sunday night. A good crowd was in attendance.

Balsler declared "That Armageddon will bring an end to civilization on this present earth. It will ring down the curtain on the affairs of man. Time will be no longer."

The evangelist pointed out that this last battle will be fought in Palestine according to several definite prophecies. The battle will take place during the sixth and seventh of the seven last plagues which occur just preceding the return of Christ. No earthly power will be victor as the battle will not be fought to a finish. "Christ's return will intercept the battle", Balsler declared.

God has hung out three great sign boards to help us know when Armageddon is near. First John the Revelation says "the nations are angry." Second, the prophet Joel declares "The Heavens will be awakened," and third Joel says, "there will be universal preparation for war."

"Everyone knows that these three great sign boards very aptly describe our day," declared the evangelist.



feel capable of performing tasks assigned to them by buyers. Any man may redeem himself by paying the auction price, plus 50c. Anyone who would like to make a bid, but cannot attend the auction, may do so by proxy.

the farm in any one of the three years, 1952, 1953 and 1954. Thus a farmer who releases unplanted acres—whether reallocated or not—gets credit for them in future allotments. A farmer may release any part of his allotment that he does not want to plant. Released acreage that is planted elsewhere not only will help other farmers who want to plant cotton this year, but will also help to preserve the historical acreage

base of the county and state.

Acres must be released not later than May 21, by individual farmers, in order to comply, and may be reapportioned by the county committee as late as June 4th. Ellison and ASC committee stressed the importance of making releases at the earliest date possible, so that reapportionment can be made before June 4 deadline, if possible.

This new allotment provision brings an increase of 26,051.3 acres to Farmer County making a total acreage of 55,543 if it is all planted. Since the future acreage allotments are dependent upon use of this year's acreage, Ellison urges every farmer to give proper attention to these provisions that were gained after months of hard work.

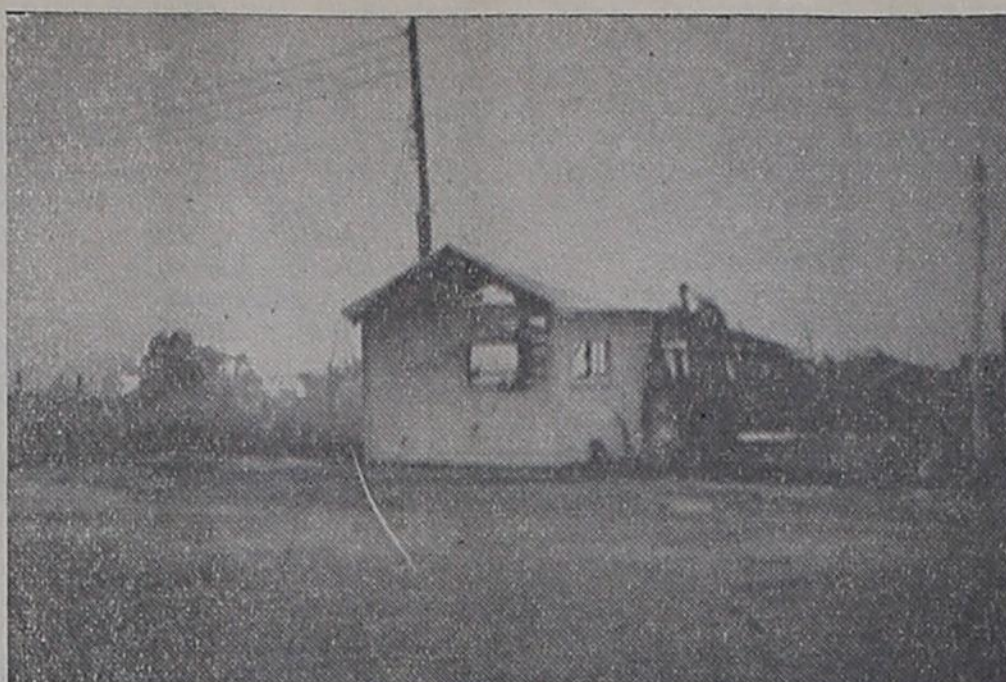

Cotton Burr Piles Flame Once Again, Entire Town in Danger Friday Evening

Bovina residents, who have had their share of fires in the past several months, went through another harrowing experience last Thursday, as the smoldering cotton burr piles at the Triplett Cattle Company again burst into flame.

A raging sandstorm, in progress about 3:00 that afternoon, fanned the embers into a big fire in short order. Everything east of the burr pile, for a quarter of a mile, was ignited and burned fiercely in the high west wind.

Included in the loss was a feed grinding mill and a feed barn and its contents located nearby, and a large part of the feed pens. Firemen from Hereford, Friona, Texico-Farwell, Clovis, and Bovina could do little but watch the demonstration and contain the area of conflagration.

The wind, coupled with a shortage of water (Bovina has no overhead storage tank, and one pump failed Thursday evening), gave the fire about all the lee-way it wanted.

This was the fourth or fifth outbreak from the same source, but the intensity of the fire last week consumed nearly all of the burrs, and further trouble is not

had rotated northward or north-eastward as predicted, the story might have been gravely different.

No estimates have been released on the loss to the Triplett concern in terms of dollars and cents. The mill and a new supply of feed, both marked off as total losses, would have run into thousands of dollars.

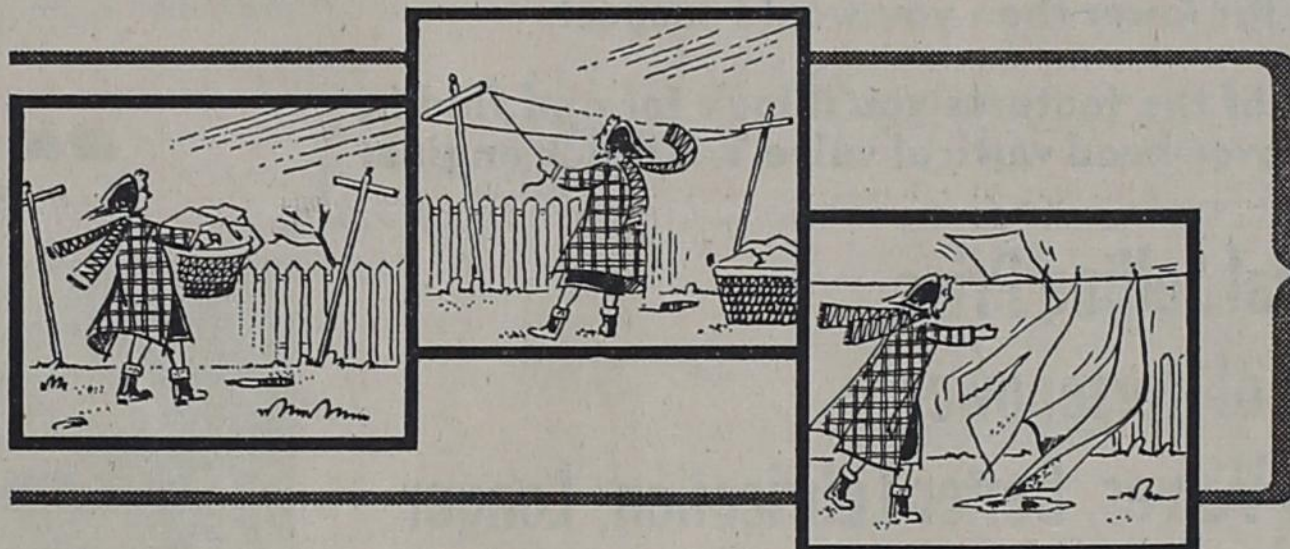

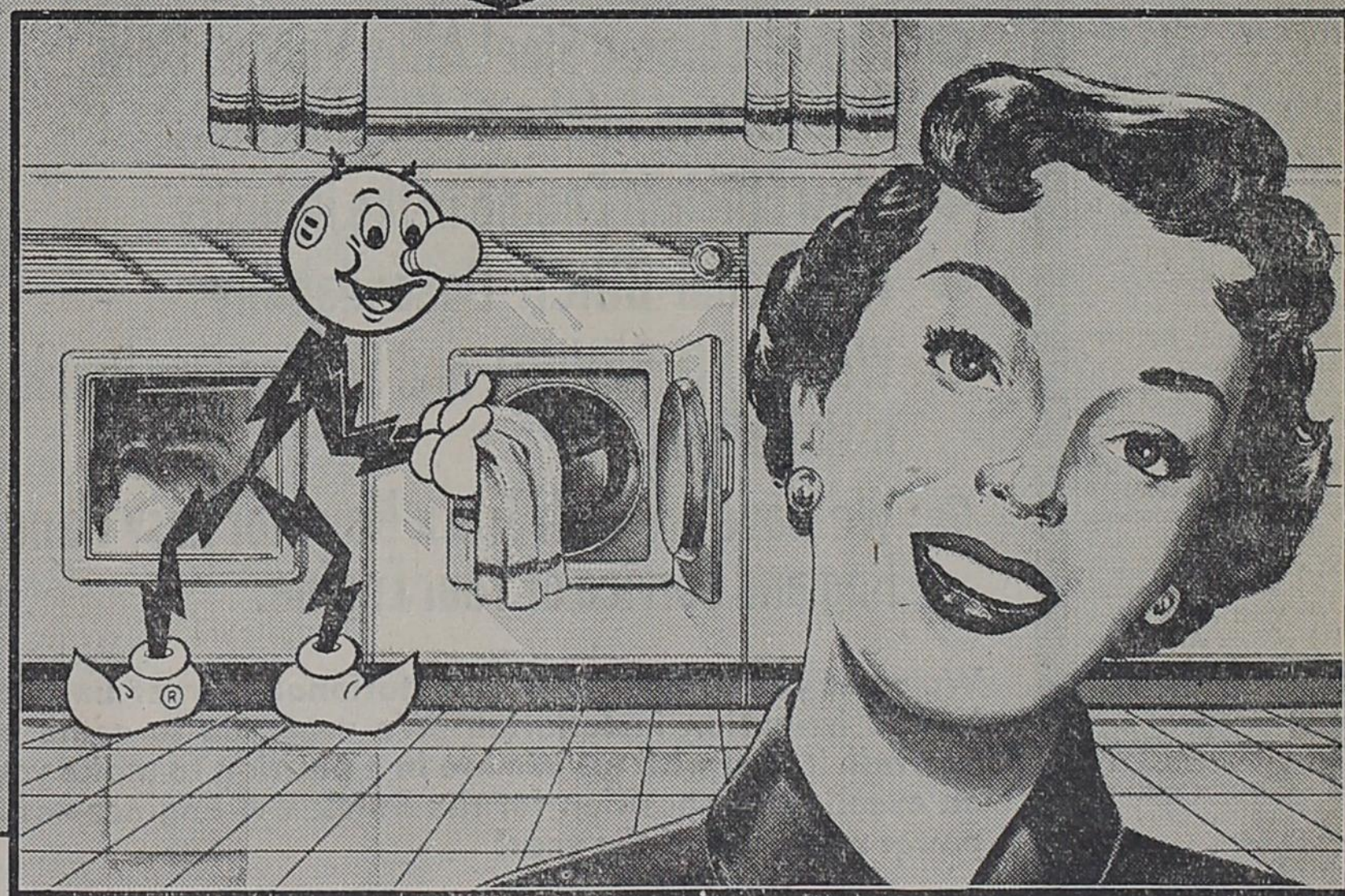

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU
By RAYMOND EULER

In at least some of the local papers, you will find published, some of the problems facing farmers north of the Canadian River in relation to the availability of natural gas for operation of their irrigation wells. Since there is nothing in the books of Farmer County Farm Bureau relating to this particular case, it will be appreciated if members will study the matter and report their feelings about it to the office so we will know whether to lend assistance in the solution.

Be sure, if you receive a cotton allotment which you do not wish to plant this year, to release it to the County Committee. Someone else may be glad to use it this year, and you will still be credited with it for your base next year. If you ignore it, it's gone from your farm and county for good.

Of 15 billion, 194 million dollars designated for Federal Aid to specific groups in 1954; 520 million are designated for agriculture. This is 27 million less than the 1953 estimated amount for agriculture. In every other group receiving aid, there is a sharp increase. Business' share, for instance, is increased by 45 million. Farmers have a right, in view of these figures, to make demands for decreases in the spending of tax monies, to which they contribute, in other fields. Farmers constitute 15 percent of the national population, but their share of assistance is 1 billion, 759 million dollars short of that percentage of the total amount. Who is accumulating the national debt?

This column appears in three papers serving Farmer County citizens, but since there are those near Deaf Smith and Curry County, New Mexico who take other papers, we have been requested to submit it to two other papers for more complete coverage of the membership area. We'll submit it and hope it is accepted.

For those who wonder: Any action of the Water District or Committee is entirely separate from Farm Bureau. To be more specific, there is no connection between the two. Farm Bureau, for the convenience of the public, is providing assistance in speeding up issuance of permits by providing its office facilities. We consider this a public service.

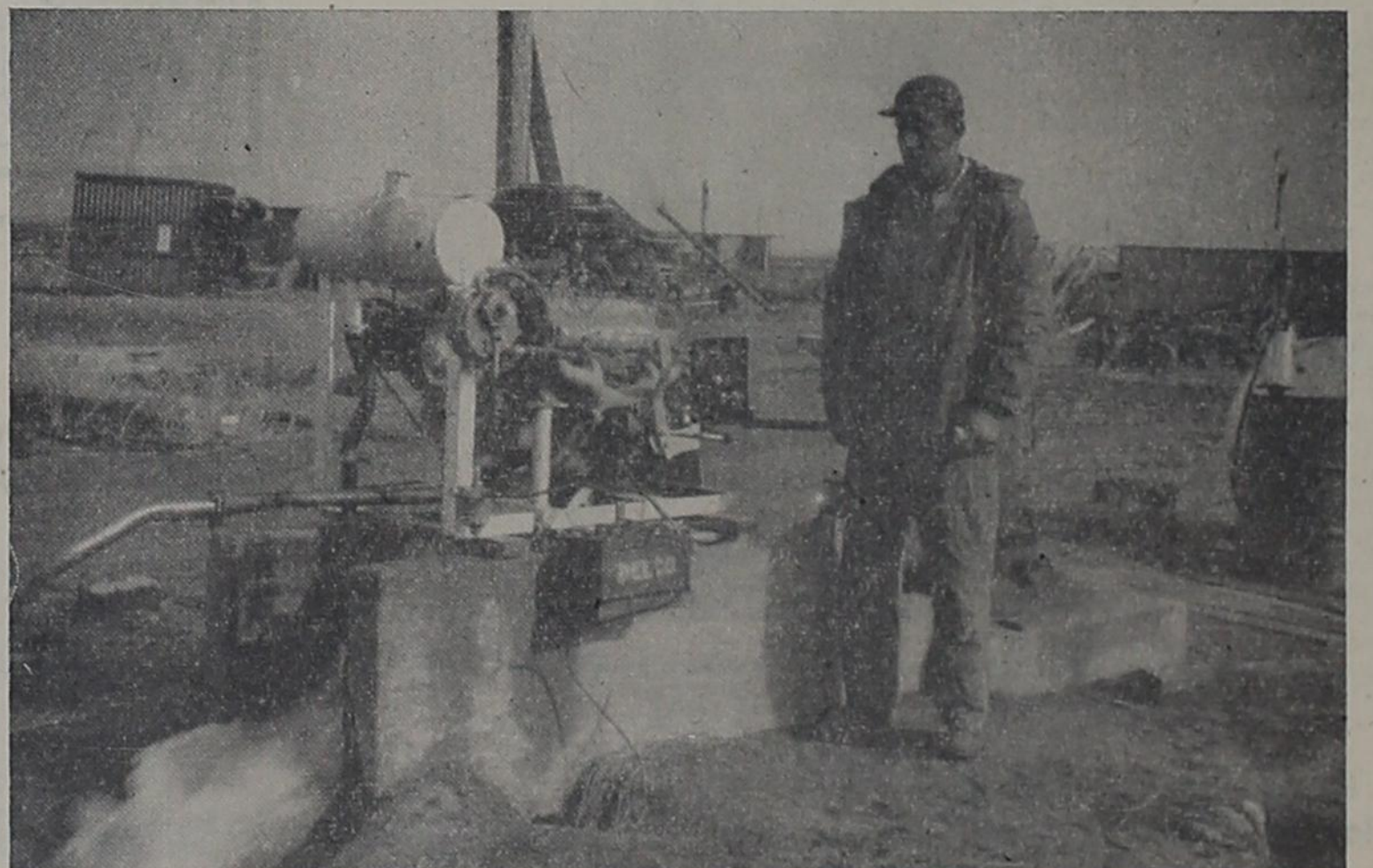

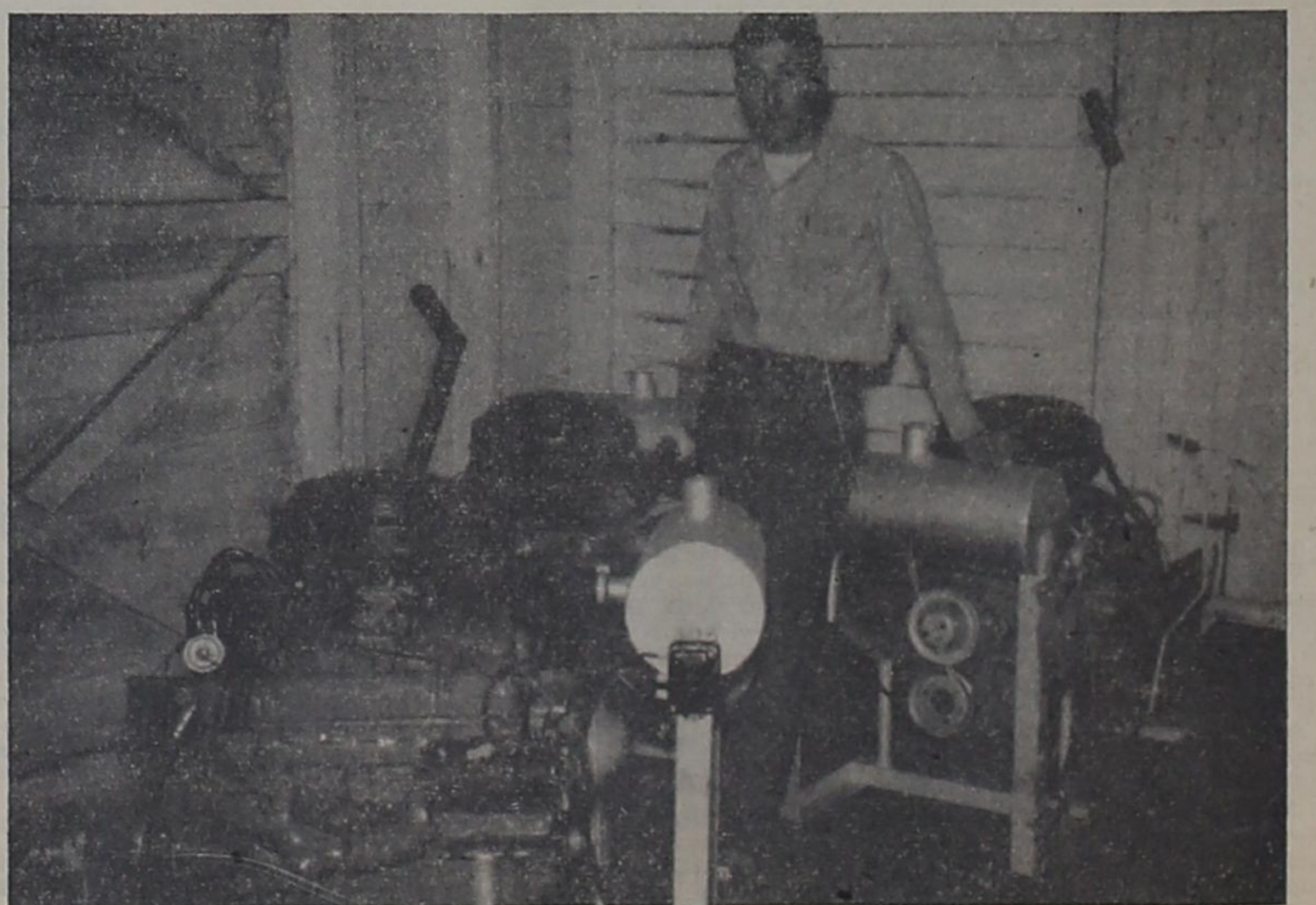

Petition Will Be Circulated On School Bond

A petition seeking an election on the voting of bonds for construction of additional buildings for the Friona school system is slated to make its appearance this week, sponsors of the measure report.

Agitation for another grade school building to handle students of the local institution came about following a survey which was conducted recently to determine the number of scholastics in the district. The survey revealed definitely that additional room will have to be provided in the future if all scholastics now residing in the district are to be offered a place of learning.

The proposed bond issue will be in the amount of \$250,000, school trustees and officials reveal, saying further this week that definite plans concerning the location of the building—if one is approved by the bond election—will have to be made in the future.

At the present time, approximately 700 students are enrolled in the local school, and the recent checkup revealed that this number could be expected to increase. Class conditions are crowded in the grammar departments of the school.

Volleyball tournament play will begin in the gymnasium the afternoon of April 1, continuing through the 2nd. The recovery of a person when he is ill has the responsibility of doctor, nurse, and hospital staff. The results they obtain are not totally their responsibility though, because no matter how capable they may be, they can do no more than the facilities available to them allow. The doctor can make his diagnosis, have the laboratory test, and x-rays taken, issue orders to the nurse for the proper drugs to be given, write prescriptions for the pharmacist to fill, but he can not make a place that is safe for his patients, he can not make comfortable surroundings for them.
