

Sees Need for County by Texas Farm Bureau officials to make every effort to familiar-**To Plant Entire** Allotment for 1954

FARWELL, TEXAS

(Editor's note: President of the Parmer County Farm Bureau, Aubra Ellison, called at The Tribune's office Monday and requested assistance in publicizing the details of the new cotton allotment program for 1954-especially the phases pertaining to reapportionment of

unused or unwanted acres. He stressed that it was not the Farm Bureau's intention or desire to interfere with the program which is done under the authority of the ASC office, but that the organization was hopeful that something might be done

larly anxious for the farmers to understand how acres are turned back to the county committee, and stressed that it was highly important that Parmer County plant its full allotment in order to preserve a record for future allotments. The Bureau's prepared statement is as follows):


If the county fails to plant the full number of acres alloted in 1954, it will adversely affect allotments in the future. These provi-

Take coffee, for instance, the most generally indulged in habit of the American people. It probably will come as a surprise to you to learn that grocerymen, virtually without exception, are selling coffee to you below what it costs them to replace the stock you purchase.

isn't selling the bean at or below wells in Parmer County. wholesale. We don't think there are any.

Furthermore, the grocery boys say we ain't seen nothin' yet on this coffee price business. Nearly everybody thinks it will go to \$1.50 per pound. Some think \$1.75, some \$2.00, and one said \$3.00 isn't beyond the imagination.

Drug store operators say everything they buy is still climbing, but you probably haven't noticed it on your bill. You farmers will certainly agree that farm machinery, without which our industry would be shackled and useless, is high right now.

But talk to the fellow who sold you the new plow or tractor this year and he'll tell you about what a buy you got, compared with the price HE had to pay for the machinery.

The only thing we've been able to spot that's coming down is-yes, you guessed it-the price for the products the farm produces.

Today, instead of getting involved in the tremendously complicated question of farm surpluses, farm marketing, farm price supports and what-not, let's say this (which is something that, for a change, we think everybody'll agree on):


Through better practices and techniques, it is going to be necessary for the farmer to make better, more efficient use of the elements at his disposal-his land, water, machinery, supplies, and labor, if he hopes to hold his own economically in the face of declining farm prices and against rising costs of investment and production.



Man Still Isn't Smart Enough **To Outwit Natural Law**

For a long, long time, and especially so in the United States since the depression of the 30's, men have sought to analyze and control one of the basic laws of the universe: supply and demand. Their efforts have largely proved fruitless, as the present confusion on the national farm front will bear out.

Legislators and economists, who have trained many great minds on the problem, have had some uccess, admittedly, but there always is a point that they have reached beyond which they lost control b)f the situation.


A case in point is the International Wheat Agreement, a pact under which the United States is presently seeking to dispose of the tremendous stockpile of this grain already on hand-which represents billions of dollars to the nation. It must be sold sooner or later, at whatever price can be obsained-or given away, because space must be tiade for forthcoming crops and our domestic profuction has considerably outstripped our domestic gonsumption.

Involved in this agreement are four wheat exporting countries: the United States, France, Canada, and Australia. They have all agreed to sell their wheat at a price not exceeding \$2.05 per bushel, and the purchasing nations have agreed to buy the commodity at a price of not less than \$1.55. Whenever the prevailing market falls beween these two points, there is no obligation for either party to buy or sell, and bargaining goes on just as it would under normal conditions.

This agreement, several years old, has worked reasonably well in the past, but in the last two years, and especially so this year, there has been a world-wide abundance of wheat. There are lots of countries besides the four in the agreement which raise a lot of wheat-including the USSRand they have not been bound to their consumers by such restrictions.

Consequently, the purchasing nations are buying wheat from non-member producing nations at price that is depressing world market. We hold ut for good prices-chiefly because a lot of money ras tied up in the subsidized crop. Now Canada as cut the price to something like \$1.70, and the arket probably will fall to the base level of \$1.55 com there.

During all this time, nations which import wheat will continue to buy wherever the product is the cheapest-which most likely will be from nations not members of the agreement. What will happen when the four members are trying to sell wheat for \$1.55-and Russia will let it go for \$1.40?

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU By RAYMOND EULER

In at least some of the local papers, you will find published, some of the problems facing farmers north of the Canadian River in relation to the availability of natural gas for operation of their irrigation wells. Since there is nothing in the books of Parmer County Farm Bureau relating to this particular case, it will be appreciated if members will study the matter and report their feelings about it to the office so we will know whether to lend assistance in the solution.


Be sure, if you receive a cotton allotment which you do not wish to plant this year, to release it to the County Committee. Someone else may be glad to use it this year, and you will still be credited with it for your base next year. If you ignore it, it's gone from your farm and county for good

Of 15 billion, 194 million dollars designated for Federal Aid to specific groups in 1954, 520 million are designated for agriculture. This is 27 million less than the 1953 estimated amount for agriculture. In every other group receiving aid, there is a sharp increase. Business' share, for instance, is increased by 45 million. Farmers have a right, in view of these figures, to make demands for decreases in the spending of tax monies, to which they contribute, in other fields. Farmers constitute 15 percent of the national population, but their share of assistance is 1 billion, 759 million dollars short of that percentage of the total amount. Who is accumulating the national debt? This column appears in three papers serving Parmer County citizens, but since there are those near Deaf Smith and Curry County, New Mexico who take other papers, we have been requested to submit it to two other papers for more complete coverage of the membership area. We'll submit it and hope it is accepted. For those who wonder: Any action of the Water District or Committee is entirely separate from. Farm Bureau. To be more specific, there is no connection between the two. Farm Bureau, for the convenience of the public, is providing assistance in speeding up issuance of permits by providing its office facilities. We consider this a public service. Your Responsibility

The recovery of a person when he is ill has the responsibility of doctor, nurse, and hospital staff. The results they obtain are not totally their responsibility though, because no matter how capable they may be, they can do no more than the facilities available to them allow. The doctor can make his diagnosis, have the laboratory test, and x-rays taken, issue orders to the nurse for the proper drugs to be given, write prescriptions for the pharmacist to fill, but he can not make a place that is safe for his patients, he can not make comfortable surroundings for them. That is your responsibility as a resident of Parmer County.

It is your responsibility because it is your hospital. It is not the members', because they are only people who gave money in the beginning to acquire a hospital in Parmer County. They obtain some benefits which have been explained in previous reports, but it amounts to no more than pre-paid insurance. A few of these memberships are available for transfer to those who would like to have one.

It is not the doctors' hospital, because they pay to use its facilities. The rent collected from the doctors amounts to 25 percent of their total income. They believe they can give better service having a clinic in the same building as the hospital. We think so, too, plus the fact that it is cheaper for you to see your doctor here than if his office were up town. The hospital would find it hard to operate without the clinic being here to supply income from shots, laboratory, x-rays and prescriptions. The income from these departments all go to the hospital. You can imagine how it would be without the doctors here in the building to bring this business to us.
