He went on to say that in the first place, the "redbeds" are several thousand feet deep, and it is not possible that the test would have penetrated them. He theorizes that the test may have hit a sand pocket in which water was stored, but he discouraged hopes of ever getting much production from it.

Occasionally we hear a story from some of our acquaintances about logs coming from wildcats in the area, in which there turns up the mention of water-bearing sand stratas at deeper depths than the Ogalalla.

If our memory is correct, there was a wildcat north of this community not very many years

In fact, all of Parmer County can be classed as having an abundant supply, compared with some of the eastern areas. He said our sands usually run somewhere around 200 feet in thickness. This compares with as little as 20 feet in some of the older developed areas to the east.







## Support Price Program A Problem for All

Still raging is the argument over whether price supports on farm products are good-or badfor agriculture and the nation. There are so many things that need to be known before anyone ventures an opinion that it is difficult for the man on the street to thoughtfully express himself, and it seems to us that there is more general ignorance surrounding the farm problem than anything else we have ever heard of.

In fact, a great many farmers are speaking out for what they want without really knowing how it can be attained. We might say that this is true of both sides of the question.

Our own opinion is that more regulation is the last thing that anybody in America ought to invite, and especially the farmer-who long has been accustomed to living "next to Nature" where freedom of choice and action is virtually boundless.

We say "is virtually boundless," perhaps we should say "was virtually boundless" instead, because in recent years we have seen the shackles of government regulation harness the farmer until tion. he can do little more than hobble meekly about.

cept the farmers themselves, however, for in every case of additional controls, they overwhelmingly accepted them.

Back to price supports: We all would like to see permanent prosperity on the farm. Even big business wants to see the farmer making money, because it is the rank and file of the farm population which consumes so great a share of the nation's industrial output.

Yet, everyone wonders: which way leads to permanent prosperity-firm price supports with firm controls, or no price supports and a free wheeling farm economy?

### Our answer is BOTH, but NEITHER.

Let us first look at the proposition of no support prices, and no controls. How can we expect the farmer to sell on an open market and buy on a closed one?

Manufactured goods in this country are protected from international competition by tariffs. If you buy a British-made car or a German-made piece of equipment, you pay part of your money to Uncle Sam-to protect his own manufacturers, strange as this may seem.

This country is not flowing with Venezuelan oil because of the duty imposed on that product when imported. Venezuela would like to sell us every drop of the oil this country needs-and they could do it, except for import restrictions. Consequently, we pay more money for our domestic product.

The immediate effect of this history-making announcement will be that nearly all children in the first and second grades of Texico, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Friona and Bovina will receive at least two-and possibly three-"shots" which will protect them from the dreaded child crippler. Tests run last summer on the vaccine proved its effectiveness ranges from 80 to 90 percent, and developers report that the 1955 version of the serum is even more potent.

Of foremost importance to all Dr. Spring said he expected parents is the urgent message to get started with the program

are signed giving permission to have their children inoculated. There is no cost, but it is necessary for the parents to give their consent before the vaccine is administered.

Dr. Paul Spring, Parmer county health officer, said today that he will continue to accept applications "up until we begin giving shots," and indicated that he expected many parents to come in at this late hour with their authorizations.

He said that children "ready to go," included 160 in Friona, 61 at Lazbuddie, 80 at Farwell, and there is no complete report from Bovina. In Texico, Supt. Agrie Jones reported that 70 out of 77 children in the two grades were

okayed by their parents.

yet the vaccine is not even in Texas, and it probably will be flown in from producers in Indiana.

From Austin it will be distributed through the State Health Department to counties all over the state. "I feel sure that we will have enough vaccine to inoculate all first and second grade children when it arrives," he said. Vaccination itself is expected to take about two days, and the county health officer is ready to

go into action the minute supplies arrive. On the matter of whether two or three shots will be given children, there seems to be some


confusion. The state health di-

rector has suggested that only two be given during the first program in order to spread the vaccine supply, and make it available to more persons.

However, Dr. Spring said he has had word to give a series of three shots, and "Until I hear differently, that is what I plan to do."

Later this summer, the supply is expected to overtake the demand, and plenty of vaccine should be available for all those who need it. No official report is out on the cost of "shots," but suggestions of from \$4 to \$5 per injection (in additon to the doctor's fee for services) has been heard from several quarters.

This cost, of course, is of interest only to those who have children not in the first and second grades, and who plan to re-
