Items Valued Over \$16,000 - -

## Rash Of Burglaries Hit Area Residents

Parmer County was hit with a rash of break-ins last week, and items taken in the five different burglaries were valued at \$16,326.12.

Approximately \$6,500 worth of merchandise taken in the burglaries has been recovered, and more recoveries are expected, said Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Joe Jones of Agri-Sprayers, Inc. in Bovina reported that on Wednesday, March 14, that place of business was burglarized. Tools, drills, gloves, one typewriter, and other miscellaneous items taken were valued at \$7,666.12.

Upon investigation by sheriff's department officers, over \$2,500 of the missing items have been recovered after a search of a house south of Bovina.

One suspect has been arrested and is in the county jail, charged with burglary of a building. The case is pending Grand Jury action.

De Haseloff of Farwell reported that on the night of March 13 or 14, his home was

entered and five guns, valued at \$2,150, were taken.

All five guns have been recovered, according to Sheriff Morgan, and a warrant has been issued for a suspect for burglary of a habitation.

The E.D. Chitwood residence, northeast of Lariat, was burglarized on March 15. Taken were cash, jewelry, a gun, and a small calculator. Total loss was valued at \$5,190.

Also, during the afternoon of the same date, Joe Estrada, who also resides northeast of Lariat, had his home broken into, and taken were some cash and jewelry, valued at \$650.

In the Chitwood residence burglary, many of the items have been recovered by sheriff's officers in four different locations, according to Sheriff Morgan.

One suspect has been arrested and charged with burglary of a habitation. The suspect is in the county jail pending Grand Jury action.

Also on the night of March 15,

Terry Travis of Farwell reported that an air compressor, cutting torch, some welding hose, striker, and goggles were taken from his barn located south of Farwell. Total loss is estimated at \$670.

In other action by Parmer County law officers, the following arrests were made:

Jesus Alfredo Aranda, 32, of Muleshoe was arrested on March 17 by Texas Highway Patrol officers, and charged with DWI. He appeared before Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts on March 19, on a plea

of guilty. He was fined \$350, plus \$96 in court costs, and given three days in the county jail.

Antonio Rios, 23 of Bovina was arrested on March 18 and is incarcerated in the county jail charged with burglary. He appeared before Justice of the Peace Albert Smith on March 19, and his bond was set at \$25,000.

Johnny Zapata, 18, of Muleshoe was arrested on March 18 and is in the county jail charged with burglary. He appeared before JP Smith on March 19, and his bond was set at \$10,000.

## 19th Congressional Seat - -

### Thomas M. Richards Announces Candidacy

Thomas M. Richards, 43, a longtime Lubbock cattleman/farmer/attorney, has announced his candidacy for the 19th Congressional district seat being vacated by Congressman Kent Hance.

Richards is a conservative Democrat. Both he and his wife, Polly, are native West Texans. Born and raised in Cottle County, Richards still has ranch and farm interests there.

"I am not a professional politician nor do I ever intend to become one," Richards said. "The only office I ever want to hold is that of congressman from this district so I can work for the people I have known and respected all of my life."

Richards said he would stay as Congressman, if elected, "until I retire or the voters retire me."

"I also will give up my law practice if I am successful in this race," he added.

Richards said that he "does not have all of the answers to the problems we face today, but

nobody will work harder and spend more hours working on solutions for those problems." Richards said his background (Continued on Page 2)

Last Sunday saw a lot of things, movable and immovable, going down the street. It was only a medium size blow measured by past standards, but it is surprising how many folks seem to forget that this is the windy, with a capital wind, time of the year.

We really have gotten past the February bugaboo for either massive snowfalls or howling gales which last for several days. Whatever is yet to come this year will probably not be of the size and velocity we have known in past seasons.

This does not mean that we are out of the weather picture, as the Golden Spread is just on the edge of the tornado season. Our particular area is not that prone to being visited by the devilish twisters but beginning 30 to 40 miles east, they increase considerably in frequency.

By the time you get to east Texas and Oklahoma, the tornado shelter is as common as the one holer used to be. In fact we have heard stories where these devices were used as shelters in extreme emergencies.

In the Twin Cities, if you don't have a shelter, you will just get blown away, as the old Chick Sales have gone the way of the bustle and high button shoe.

Last Saturday morning, nostalgia raised its head for us and we recalled one of the screen heroes of our youth. We caught part of the old movie, "Fort Apache" with John Wayne and Henry Fonda, aired on the Atlanta station. These screen greats were of only passing interest to us as another character was portrayed by George O'Brien. George was our cowboy hero deluxe. In our juvenile estimation, he had it all over the likes of Tom Mix and Ken Maynard.

John Wayne was one of our latter day heroes, but nothing takes the place in memories lane like the gent that caused us to part with our last dime and sit through three runs of a 60 minute ride'em and shoot'em western. The wimps tossed at us today are poor substitutes for the knock'em dead he-men of four or five decades ago.

Louisiana is a major oil producing state, yet a severe case of foot in mouth disease seems to have struck U.S. Senator Bennett Johnson of that state. Johnson recently is reported to have said that it is unfair for oil companies which collectively arrange to borrow \$29 billion for mergers to deduct interest payments on these loans from their taxes. Bennett evidently thinks that the oil companies do not kick in enough to Uncle Sam's tax takers and needs to penalize them further.

A recent study shows that the domestic tax burden of 17 large oil companies rose sharply between 1974 and 1981. The tax burden for each dollar of sales climbed by 148 percent over that period of time.

In that same time span, their U.S. sales tripled but their tax liabilities increased seven fold. In addition to all the regular corporate and business taxes, the oil companies shelled out an additional 7.7 percent of sales that other corporations and industries do not pay. It hardly sounds like they enjoy favorable tax status.

Strangling government control of the oil industry almost put the United States afoot several years ago. Deregulation saved the day, but if the likes of Johnson and Metzbaum prevail, we will be back on roller skates in the next few years.

Well fellows, you and I do not like to think of kicking off, but apparently some of the major retailers are contemplating our demise. The wife was in Sears the other day and made a small purchase and desired to put it on our charge account.

Now this account is under the John Getz name. The wife signs the charge slips with her name and pays the billing with a check with her name, so it

## District Competition - -

### UIL Literary Events Set To Begin Tonight

Sixty-eight students from Farwell High school are busy preparing for the annual University Interscholastic League literary events held each year at this time. In the high school events, two winners are chosen from each district who will go on to regional competition, and possibly state.

The first UIL event to take place is the one-act plays to be held in Farwell tonight (Friday) in the auditorium. The plays will be judged on the professionalism and acting ability. Farwell will be performing "Goodbye to the Clown" by Ernest Kinoy. Cast and crew members are DeAnn Curtis, Kevin Hogan, Angie Charlson, Trena George, Tonya Meeks, Leonard Hillock, Rusty Stover, Paul Fulcher, Elva Whitesides, and Kenneth Adams.

Next scheduled literary events are the ready writing and journalism competitions which will be held March 27 in Earth.

Competing in the ready writing division are DeAnn Curtis, Twila Donaldson, and Delia Bermea. Dana White will serve as alternate.

Contestants in this category will be asked to choose one of two statements given to them, and write an 800 to 1000 word expository composition on their subject. These will be graded on interest, organization, correctness of style, and clarity, as well as grammar, punctuation, and spelling. None of the students competing will know ahead of time about what they will be writing.

Students in the journalism event will compete in one or more of four chosen categories; feature writing, news writing, editorial writing, and headline writing.

Competing in the feature writing event are Christina Pena, Mark Cole, and Delia Bermea. Alternate is Elva Whitesides.

Competing in editorial writing will be Mark Cole, Brent Stephens and Ray Galvan. Alternate is Elva Whitesides.

In news writing, Mark Cole, Christina Pena, and Delia Bermea will compete, and in headline writing, Cynthia Ancira, Kim Routon, and Melinda McMillan will compete. Alternate is Daniel Hutchins.

Contestants will be given a fact sheet, and asked to write either an editorial, a news story, a headline, or a feature from it, depending upon which event they are entered. Contestants will be given an hour to write a feature, 45 minutes to write an editorial or news story, and 30 minutes to write a headline. Entries will be judged on professionalism in journalism.

The remainder of the literary events will be held in Olton, March 30. Remaining events are debating, informative speaking, persuasive speaking, poetry interpretation, prose interpretation, spelling and plain writing, number sense, science,

calculator applications, typing, and shorthand.

Members of the debating team are Mark Cole, Trena George, Kevin Owen, Brent Stephens, Sheryllyn Thigpen, and Jesse Anzuldua. Alternates are Sammy Sanchez and Daniel Hutchins.

Debate teams will be entered into a bracket by drawing lots, which they will also do to determine which team will take the affirmative and negative sides. Two teams will then debate a pre-determined issue, both sides having an equal amount of time for constructive arguments and rebuttals.

As a team wins, it will continue to move up in the bracket until a winner is determined. Teams will be judged on ability to thoroughly research and analyze a problem, and then on ability to defend their side.

Daniel Hutchins and Brent Stephens are entered in the informative speaking event. Contestants in this event will draw random topics on local, state, and international current issues. Each contestant will be allowed 30 minutes to prepare his speech, and seven minutes in which to deliver it. He will be judged on his delivery, interest, and clarity.

Freddie Smith will compete in persuasive speaking. Contestants in this event will also draw random topics on current issues. He will be allowed the same time for preparation and delivery, and will be judged on how well he delivers his point of view, and how well he does at bringing his listeners around to his way of thinking, his persuasive abilities.

Jesse Coburn, Sammy Sanchez, and Todd Davis are competing in poetry interpretation. Each contestant will have to pre-select from three categories, narrative poetry, dramatic monologue and lyric poetry, and program of poetry selections. They must also give an introduction into the reading of each poem. They will be judged on delivery, how well each poem fits into each category and the introduction.

Participating in prose interpretation are Angie Charlson, Maria Meeks, and Elva Whitesides. Alternate is Kim Routon. Contestants in this event must prepare selections of prose that fit into three categories, cuttings from a novel, twentieth century short stories, and non-fiction prose. They must pre-select their readings, and will be judged on selections, introductions, style of delivery and actual delivery.

Sharla Stewart, Steven Stancell, and Allan Wolfe will participate in spelling and plain writing. Alternate is Gracie Ortega.

He returned to Lubbock in 1981 to work in the congressional office while he worked on a law degree at Texas Tech. He has taken his bar examination, and will receive his law degree in May.

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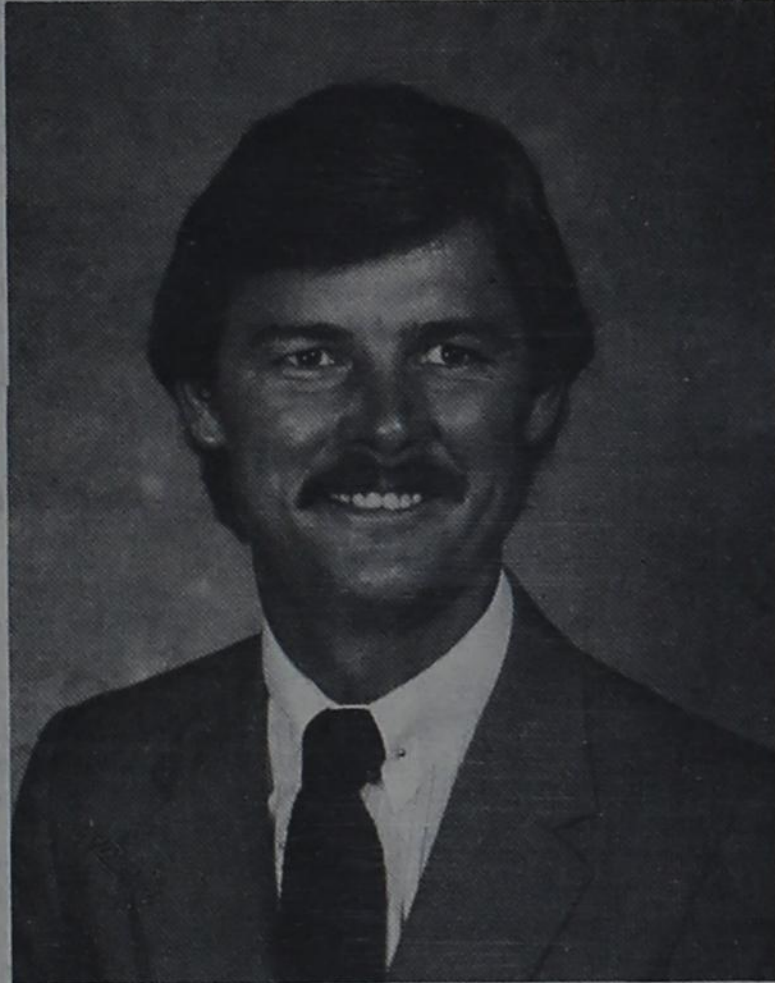

## Farwell Explorer Classes Display Talents, Projects

The Explorer classes at Farwell Elementary School conducted an open house on February 23. Parents and friends were invited to come and see what the students had been learning and working on during the past several weeks.

Seven Explorer classes were offered as electives for students in grades three through five, and each class contained a mixture of students from each grade level. The classes offered were nature study, signing, genealogy, art, class piano, woodworking, and latch hooking.

During the open house, visitors were treated to several displays and demonstrations by the students in each class.

The nature study class, taught by Flo Davis, exhibited several stuffed sea creatures which they had made, as well as a sea shell collection. Visitors were offered a choice of sea foods to taste also.

Karolene Inman's signing class displayed their talents by singing and signing several songs for parents and friends. In addition to the songs, these students also learned the sign language alphabet, signs for certain colors, animals, and family members, and learned to sign sentences involving the words which they had learned.

The genealogy class taught by Nelle Craig displayed all the hard work they had done in tracing their ancestors with a display showing all of the dif-

ferent countries and states in which they had discovered their 734 ancestors. Some of the students who wish to take their family tree even farther back, will be going on a field trip to the library in Lubbock, where they will do more extensive research.

The art class which was taught by Verona Traynor displayed their drawing talents by displaying several works of art. Most of the drawings were done in pencil, and included perspective drawings, 3-D drawings, still life, and other combinations. The class also learned about mixing colors, and displayed this knowledge with a color wheel which they made.

Class piano was taught by Billie Worley to another explorer group. They displayed their talents with a small recital during the open house. These students were taught the basic fundamentals in music and piano playing, and enjoyed working on electronic key-boards on their desks or on the piano in their classroom.

Woodworking was taught by James Craig, elementary principal, and the students in his class enjoyed showing off the projects they had made during the course, such as picnic table salt and pepper holders, signs, wooden toys, boats, and their pride, a set of Canadian geese.

Cathy Lanum taught latch hooking to her explorer class, and they displayed several of the pillow tops and rugs which they had learned to make during their class.

The first and second grade classes also formed explorer groups, but kept each course inside their own classroom, and did not mix the classes.

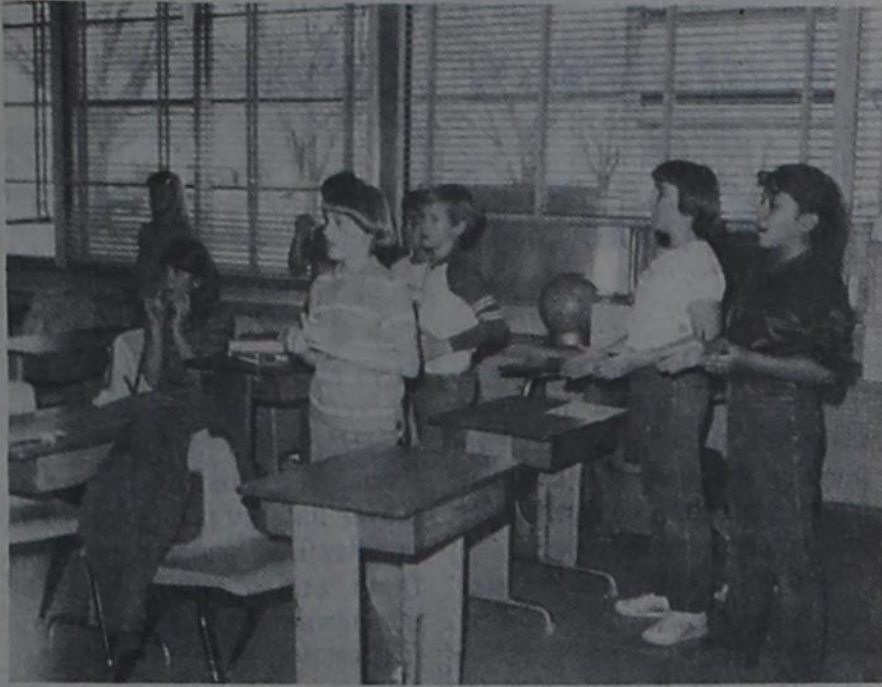

His tools used for making arrowheads are deer horns, a piece of deer hide 10 by 20 inches, and a five-inch square piece of deer hide. He learned

his art from different Indians, but two friends, a Sioux and a Nez Perce Indian who served with him in Vietnam, taught him a lot of the old secrets.

On April 23, the club will be giving a slide presentation on "Geology from a Car Window," a 30-45 minute program on elementary geology, telling about rocks, soil and geological formations that can be seen along the highways.

On July 28-29, the club's annual gem and rock show will be held in the YMCA youth building at 7th and Sycamore in Clovis. Special exhibits are expected this year at the show, and five dealers will be on hand selling rocks, gems, jewelry, and equipment.

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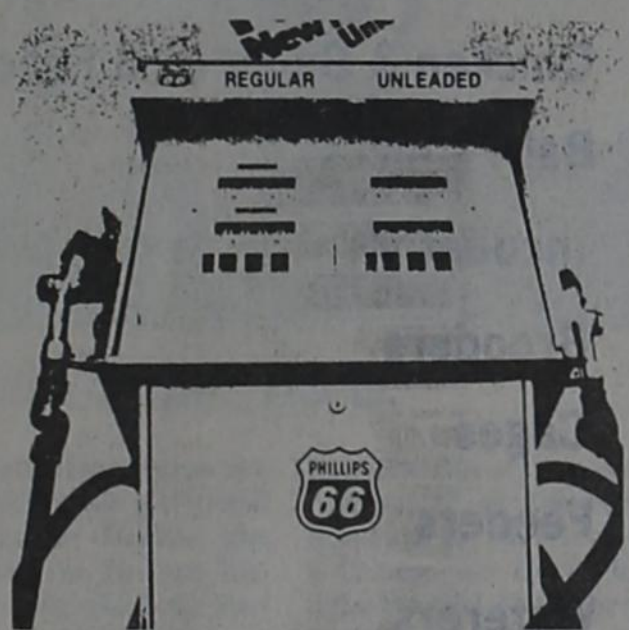

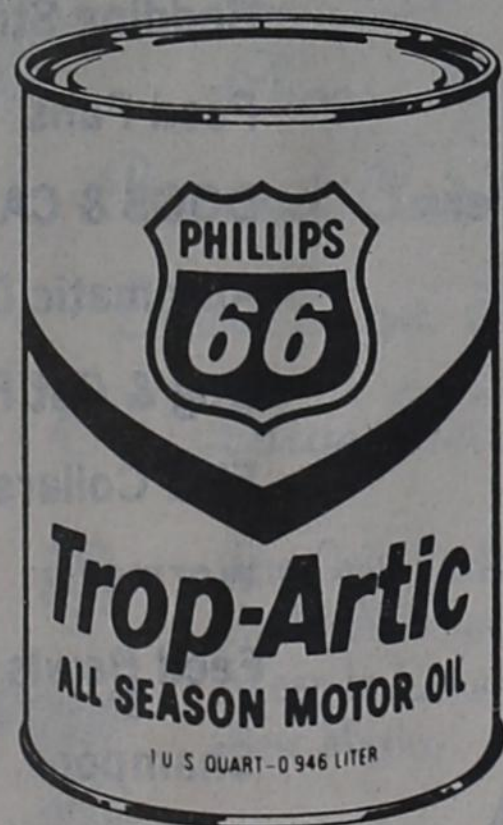
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## Steers And Steerettes Compete In Bovina Meet

## Farmers, Ranchers Advised To Acquire Comp. Insurance

Farmers and ranchers with one or more employees had until March 16 to buy workers' compensation insurance or face very serious liability without common law defenses should they be sued by an injured employee, according to Floyd Schueler of Friona, president of the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

Any farm or ranch employee injured after March 16 could claim his right to sue his employer if that employer does not have workers' compensation insurance, Schueler said.

He pointed out that this situation came about as a result of the ruling March 7 by State District Judge Harley Clark of Austin that the exemption of

farm and ranch laborers from workers' compensation is unconstitutional.

Schueler noted that any employer liability policy (employer liability endorsement on farm and rancher owners, homeowners or farmer's comprehensive personal liability) covering farmworkers as approved by the State Board of Insurance states that it will not pay claims of injured farmworkers if they are covered by the workers' compensation law.

He stated that Texas Farm Bureau has and will continue to oppose removal of the exemption of farm and ranch employees from workers' compensation. The Texas Attorney General has indicated that his office will appeal the ruling.

Pending final disposition of this case, attorneys who have reviewed the judge's ruling have advised that the only safe course of action is for employers to acquire workers' compensation insurance immediately Schueler said.

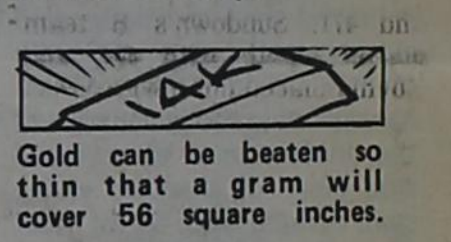

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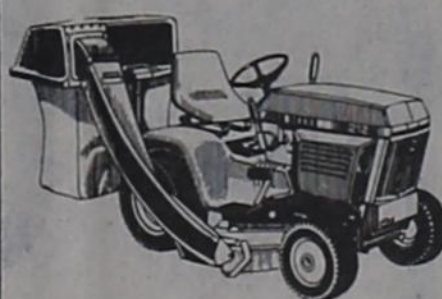

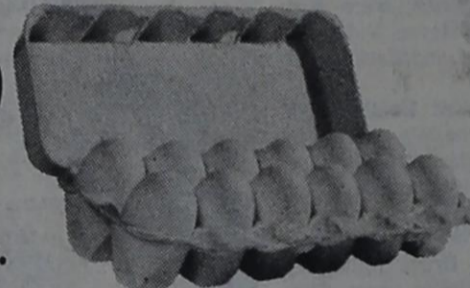
