

Farwell Farmers Host American Ag Meeting

"I'd like to think there is another way, but there isn't," Bart Kaderly of Galloway, Ohio, told the approximately 150 people who turned out for the American Agriculture meeting in Farwell last Friday.

"Our farm organizations won't help and writing to our congressmen doesn't seem to help either," he continued. "The situation is out of control. Everyone who works has someone to turn to except the farmers who can't even turn to the Department of Agriculture for help."

Kaderly is one of many farmers who are on strike in protest of low farm prices. "I

still have 1977's corn crop in the bin so why should I plant again this year," he asked the small group. "I can't sell what I already have so why do the whole thing all over again?"

Proponents of the American Agriculture Movement are demanding 100 percent parity for all goods produced. The Ohio farmer backs those demands completely.

"It seems strange that no one in Washington, D.C., seems to know what parity is or how to implement it," he said. "But the platform of the Democratic Convention back in 1976 included parity for farmers. It was good enough then to elect a Democratic president, but it isn't good

enough now to help the farmers of this country."

The speaker concluded his remarks by saying, "It's always an honor for me to come to Texas. You have all done more for agriculture in this country than you know."

Danny Bruton of Dimmitt spoke briefly on the history of the American Agriculture Movement and the incidents which occurred at Hidalgo.

"The idea of AAM was first conceived six years ago in Colorado," he said. "But it didn't begin to take hold until the last few months. Now during an election year is an appropriate time for the voice of AAM to be heard."

He called the strike and the movement "the second American revolution" and said "Hidalgo is the shot heard around the world."

"I was shocked at the events which occurred in Hidalgo," Bruton said. "When I first heard about it on the news I went to Hidalgo and at first they would not let me see the farmers who had been jailed. But thanks to John Hill I was able to get to see them."

He said that one area farmer suffered internal injuries during the border incident.

Bruton injected a humorous note into his otherwise somber address by saying that when

he arrived on the scene he was "mistaken for a Texas Ranger." "I guess it was the way I was dressed," he laughed.

An open letter by Arnold E. Paulson, a concerned citizen, was read to the group attending the first AAM meeting in Farwell. Excerpts from the letter are as follows: "...History records all of the great work events. March 1 at McAllen, Texas, will now long be remembered as the second Alamo. It was the event that really united and brought together the freedom-loving people of this nation in a united effort to destroy the real enemy and to preserve

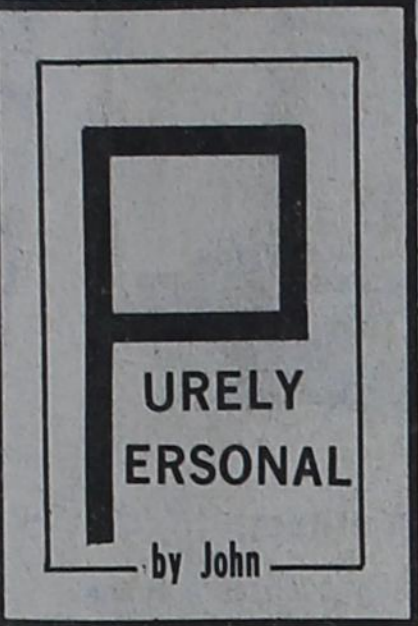
the virtues of freedom these enemies would take from you..."

"...March 1, 1978 was a turning point in American History. The strike was not broken. It was merely the shot heard around the world, which started the final battle for preservation of freedom..."

Guy Austin, who lives south of Farwell, reported that he had been in Washington, D.C., recently. He said that farmers converging on Washington seem to have more effect than anything else.

"We are told that until we started going to Washington to protest nothing was going to

Ah sweet mystery of life. Yes, there are several mysteries we have never solved. We readily admit that we have never been able to understand or predict the female of the species and at this late date have just quit trying.

On the other hand we are still interested in politics and often make predictions that usually turn out to be dead wrong. An illustration of the perversity of the voters is aptly illustrated in our latest report published by the Americans for Constitutional Action (ACA).

We were struck by the number of states that have United States Senators of completely different political thought.

For example, California has Senator Cranston with an ACA rating of 4 and Senator Hayakawa with a rating of 96. Indiana has Sen. Byah with an 8 rating and Sen. Lugar with 81. Texas has Sen. Bentsen with a 42, a rather liberal rate and Sen. Tower with 92, very conservative.

Probably the most conservative senators come from Wyoming with Sen. Hansen registering 93 and Sen. Wallop hitting 96 on the ACA scale. Their next door neighbor South Dakota sends the most liberal senators in Abourezk and McGovern with 7 and 6, respectively.

With these anomalies in mind we can only suggest that you take most political predictions with a large grain of salt.

Don Alana was named athletic director and head football coach at Farwell High School Monday night during the regular meeting of the school board. That action was taken by the board members following the resignation of Van Tom Whatley who has accepted a position of assistant coach at Midland Lee High School.

Alana has been a coach in the Farwell School system for the past six years. His wife Nancy is a teacher in the elementary school.

"I know the athletic programs and the kids and they know me," he said. "I feel that is an advantage."

Alana said Farwell has a good "overall program," but he indicated that some changes would probably be implemented gradually.

The new athletic director is optimistic about the future. "I feel Coach Whatley did a good job," he said, adding, "I also believe that I am ready to assume my duties."

Alana said that since Monday night he had had very little time to think about his new assignments. In addition to his new appointment, Alana also heads the golf program at Farwell.

The Board voted to accept the resignation of Whatley, effective date to be approved

by Tom Knoy, high school principal. They then went into executive session to discuss finding a replacement and other personnel matters.

At the close of the executive session Board members announced that Alana had been hired as the new athletic director and head football coach.

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In other action the contracts of all elementary school teachers were renewed. Pending funding of all programs, the contracts of elementary aides were also renewed with the exception of Glenna Ruscoli, who has not met requirements for certification.

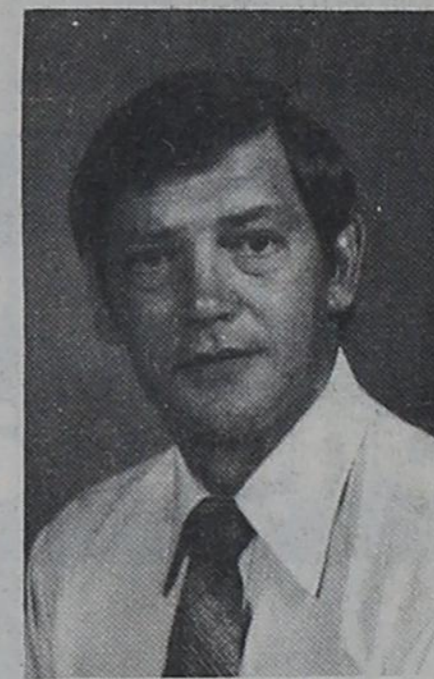
Farwell Coach Don Alana will be the clerk of the course. Starter will be Jerry King of Lubbock and Toby Booth will serve as the assistant starter.

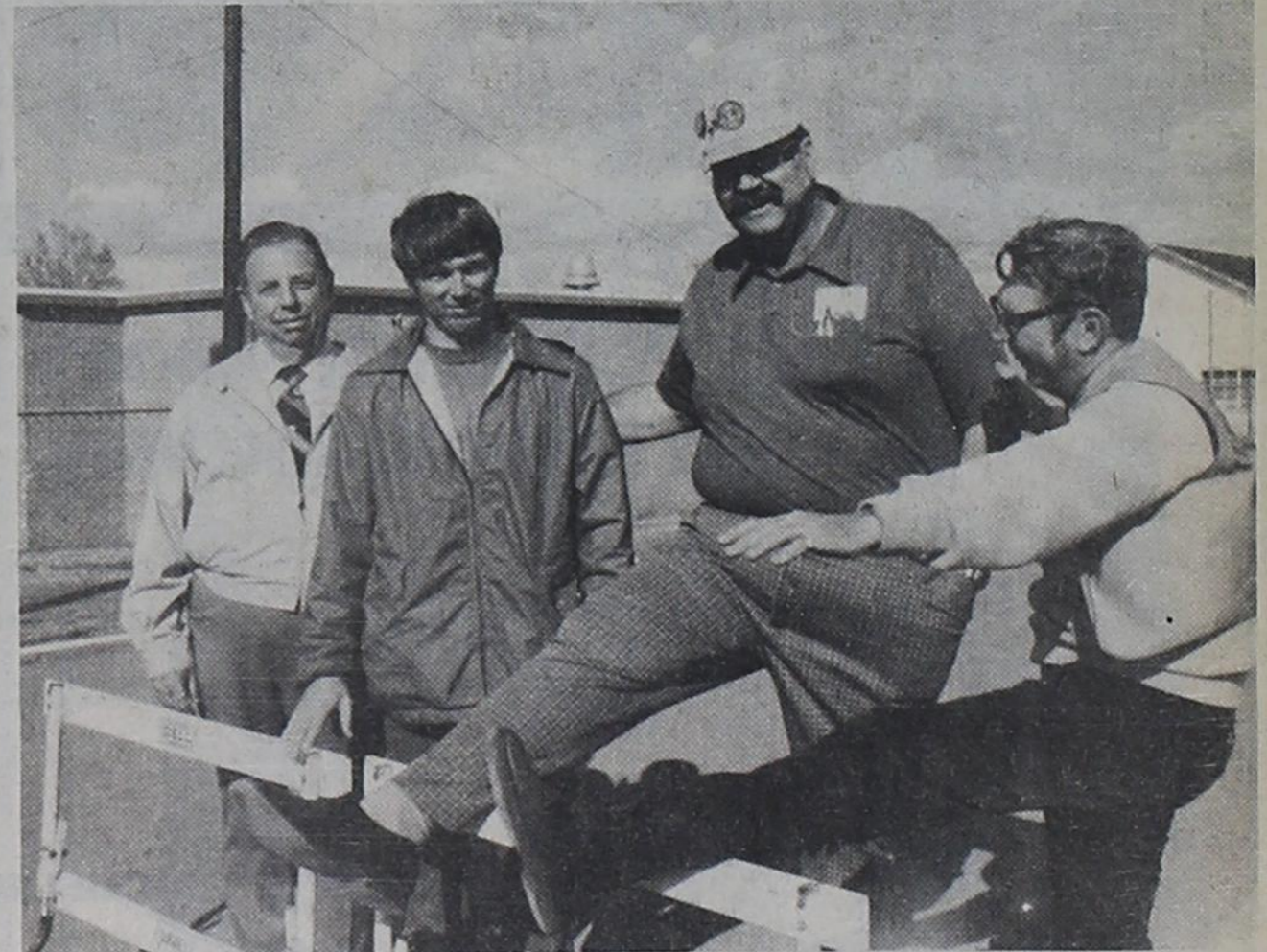
Little League Group Sets Important Meet

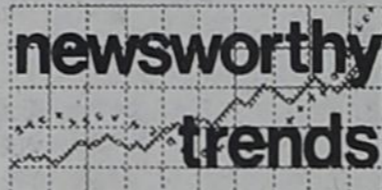

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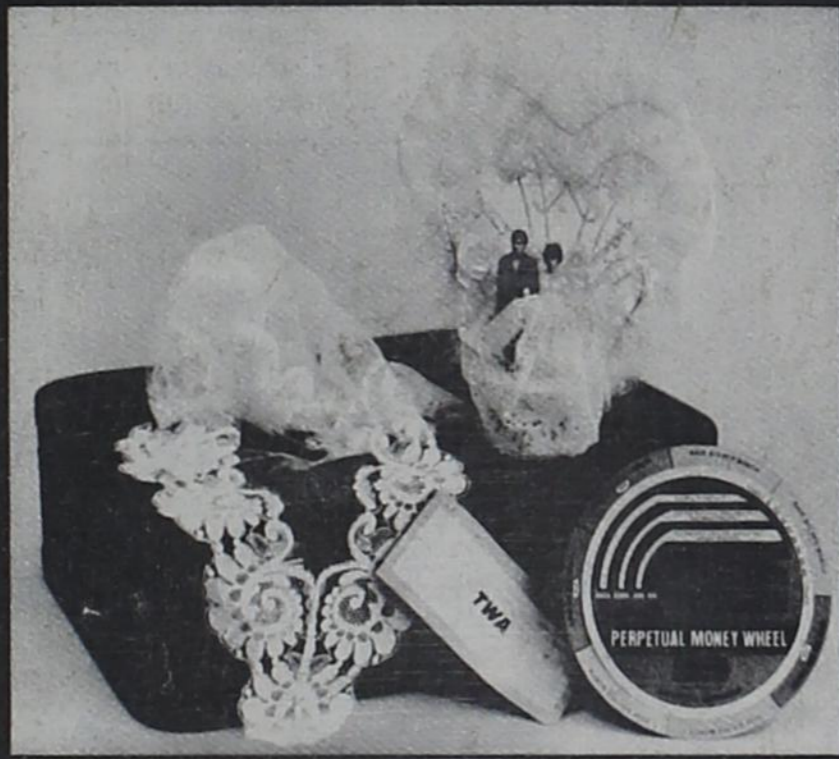
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Easter Services Set At Area Churches

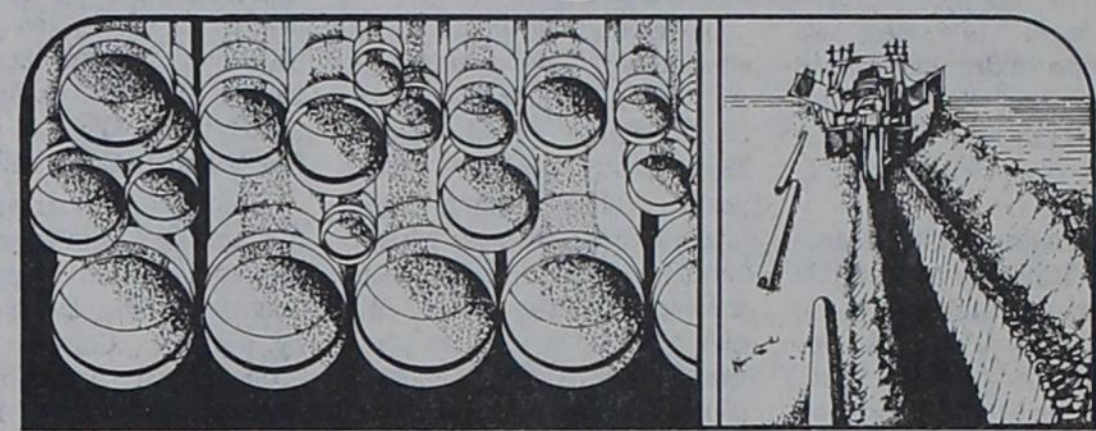
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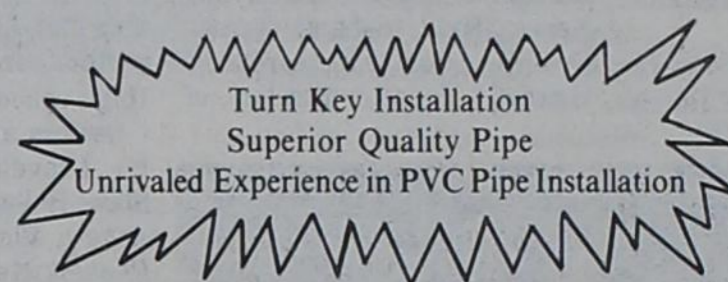

Pet Clinic Set In Twin Cities

Area residents are urged to bring their dogs and cats to the animal clinic scheduled for today (Friday, March 17) from 1 to 5 p.m. MST in Texico City Hall. It will be the only pet clinic offered this year in the Twin Cities. Dr. G.H. Kendall of Clovis will be in charge of the clinic.

A fee of \$4 will be charged for the rabies vaccination; a three-way shot for distemper, hepatitis and leptospirosis will cost \$5 and a four-way shot for distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis and pneumonia will be \$6.

Pet owners are reminded that ordinances in both communities require pets to be registered and vaccinated. In Farwell, cats and dogs must wear registration tags which are available for \$2 from the city.

Texico requires that dogs must be registered and these tags are \$1 at City Hall.

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Traditional Food Makes St. Patrick's Day Festive

The leprechauns are popping up, and so are all those luscious foods traditional for St. Patrick's Day, such as corned beef simmered with cabbage or roasted with small potatoes, carrots and onions - and perhaps a dash of horseradish.

Then there'll be Irish soda bread baked in some homes - and shamrock-shaped salads and cakes will also add to the celebration.

Corned beef tastes delicious on St. Patrick's Day, but it's good any day of the year.

Purchasing - or preparing - corned beef is really quite easy to do, says Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

When you're looking for corned beef in the grocery store, you'll most likely find it wrapped in a transparent wrapping, vacuum sealed to keep the juices in with the meat. Most packages weigh from two to five pounds.

Be sure to read the label. It tells you whether the meat is a brisket or round cut of corned beef.

The brisket has more waste and will cost less per pound in the store than the round, but brisket's price-per-serving isn't always lower than that of round. You can plan on about three servings of corned beef brisket to a pound - and about four servings of round to a pound.

Corned beef is usually made from less-tender cuts of meat that are put in a salt brine cure.

Some corned-beef cuts also are spiced, and this information will be on the label. Pickling spices are commonly used, and garlic is a favorite seasoning.

Corned beef comes plain, mild, flavored, and spicy. The amount of processing may also affect the price of the meat.

Directions for cooking are also found on the label. You may want to cook the meat longer than recommended cooking times if you wish to have a more tender meat.

No matter how any of us, Irish or not, spend St. Patrick's Day, it's a good time to be wearin' the green - at the dinner table. Cabbage, the inevitable "sidekick" for corned beef, is plentiful and delicious in so many ways.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that he recovered a Honda Odyssey Motorcycle Sunday which had been stolen from the Grady Herington farm, two and one-half miles northeast of Farwell. The vehicle, valued at \$1850, was discovered near the junk yard hidden under trees and covered up. Sheriff Lovelace said it was not damaged, but was "out of gas."

Don Huckabee, manager of West Friona Grain reported a break-in in which one Coke machine box and a cigar box containing 30 pennies was taken. Entry was gained by breaking out a window in the east door, Sheriff Lovelace said.

Hi-Pro Feed of Friona was also burglarized and an estimated \$428 in soft drink machine change, boots, a saddle and an Old Timer pocket knife were taken.

Deputy Henry Minter and the Bovina law officers investigated an incident in which Dalfino Valasquez of Bovina allegedly drove his car through part of the door and window of the Allsup's Store. Valaquez is presently in jail in Clovis on a DWI charge. Upon being released he will be brought to Parmer County to face charges of malicious destruction of property, reports Sheriff Lovelace.

George Guillen of Bovina was fined \$100 and ordered to pay all court costs for "assaulting with words" reported Sheriff Lovelace.

A Farwell juvenile was charged with "assault by threats" according to the sheriff and County Judge Paul Fortenberry sentenced him to 10 days detention. However, the sentence was modified to three days and the youth was allowed to return to school. The juvenile reportedly took money from another juvenile he had threatened several times, Sheriff Lovelace said.

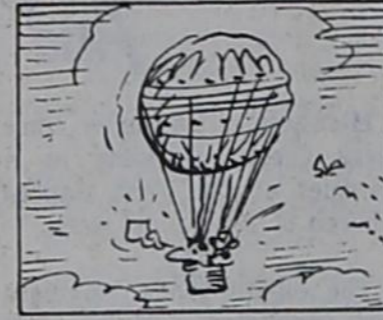

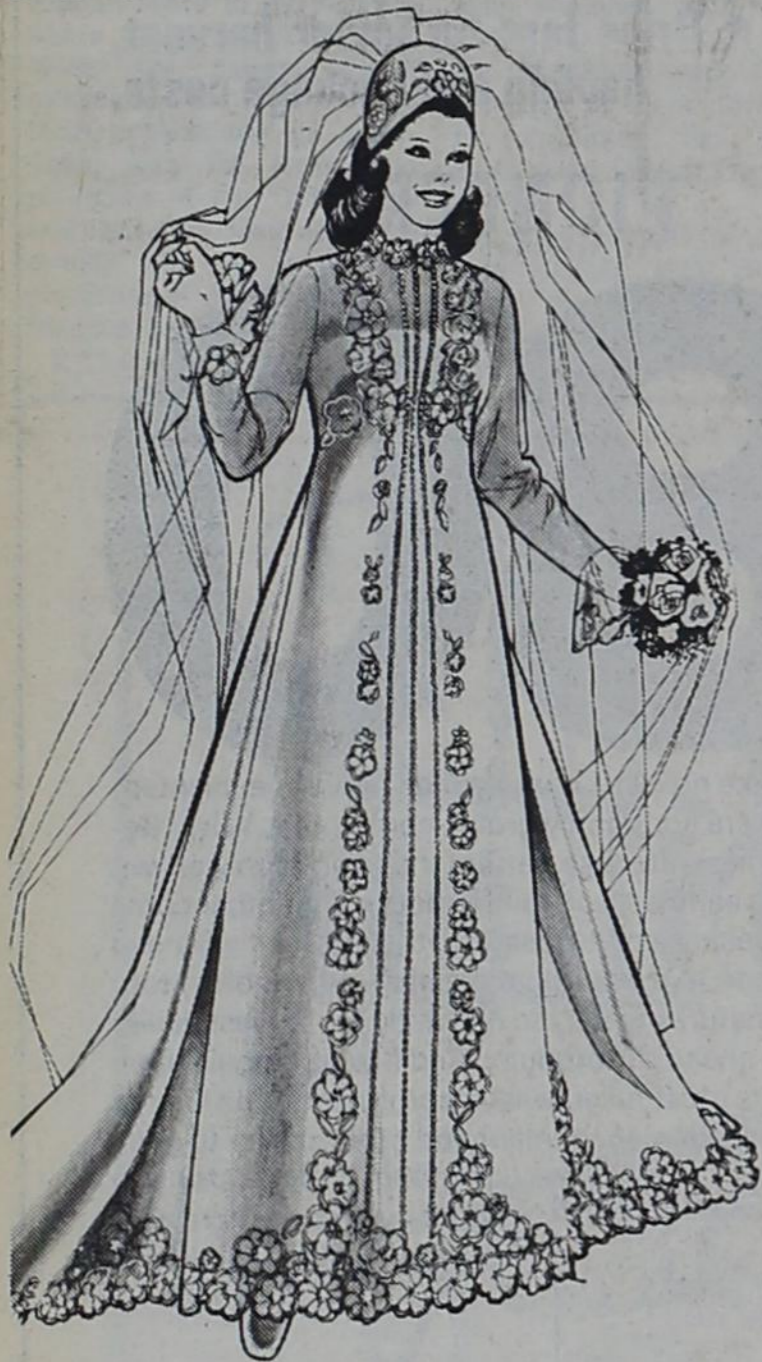

All students enrolled in science, grades 7-12, were required to enter the science fair on an individual or group basis.

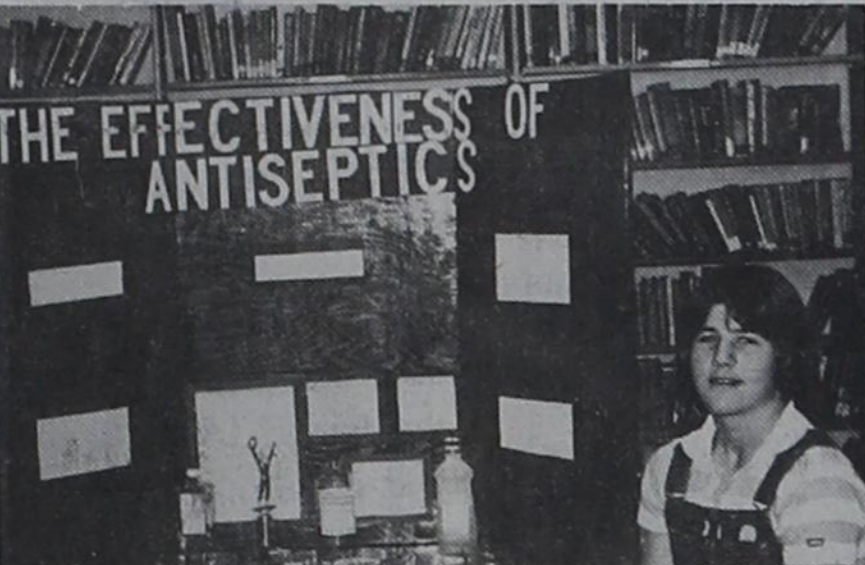

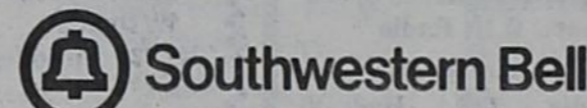

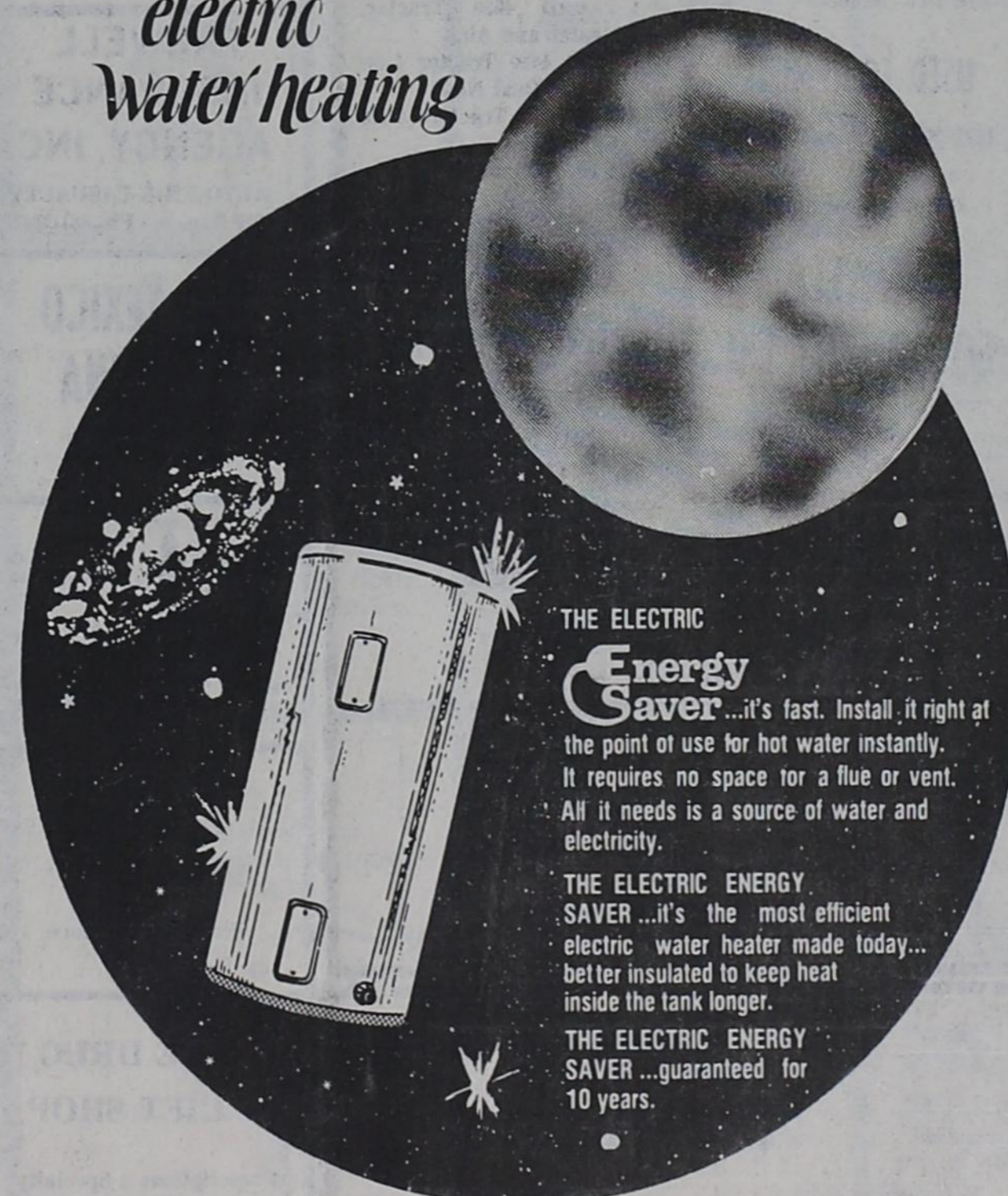

BE YE RECONCILED

Reconciliation postulates alienation. Only enemies can be reconciled. Thus God's message of reconciliation takes us back to Adam, the father of the human race, who first rebelled against God, and explains why God must deal with us all on the same level, as sinners who need salvation.
 In Rom. 5:12 we read: "...By one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned."
 Thank God, though, the message of reconciliation is not concerned exclusively with the "one man" by whom sin entered into the world. Indeed, it is chiefly concerned with the "one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus" (I Tim. 2:5).
 "Therefore as by the offence of one, judgment came upon all men unto condemnation; even so by the righteousness of one, the free gift (of salvation) came upon all men to justification of life."
 "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous" (Rom. 5:18,19).
 It is by this other "one Man" and His death on Calvary, then, that sinners may be reconciled to a holy God. In Col. 1:21,22, Paul, the apostle of reconciliation, writes to believers:
 "And you, that were once ALIENATED AND ENEMIES in your mind by wicked works, yet now hath He RECONCILED,
 "In the body of His flesh, through death, to present you holy and unblemished and unprovable in His sight."
 Thus "when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of His Son" (Rom. 5:10). And thus, too, the apostle pleads: "We pray you in Christ's stead, BE YE RECONCILED TO GOD. Farmers Can Influence Prices

"Farmers hold their fate in their own hands," according to J.D. Smith, member of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee. Smith, who produces cotton and grain sorghum in Lamb County, attended a meeting in New Orleans with top ASCS officials to discuss the farmer-owned grain reserve program and the 1978 wheat and feed grain set-aside.

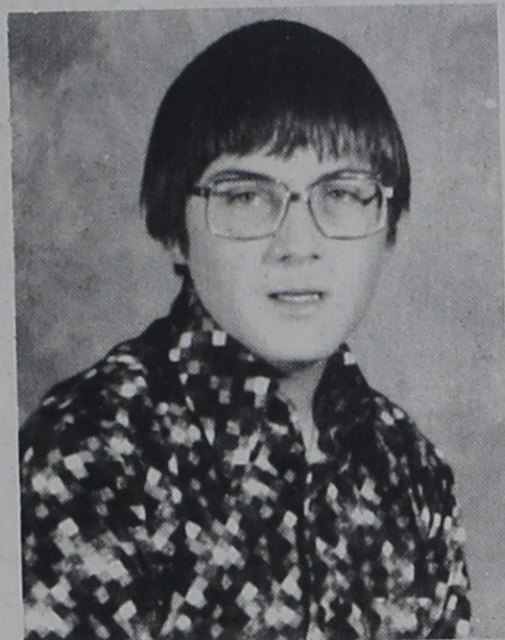
"I came away convinced that only through heavy farmer participation in the reserve program and the wheat and feed grain set-aside programs can we come out of the price slump we're in now," he said. "Through voluntary, individual participation in farm programs, farmers can achieve the organization and the clout necessary to affect the marketplace," Smith said.

"The advantages of the reserve are clear - store now for future profit and receive help with your storage costs. Many farmers have been holding their grain since harvest. Placing it in the reserve gives them the opportunity to make a profit when prices rise. We as farmers need to send a message to the grain traders - we won't sell cheap," he said.

"Not only is it important to isolate surpluses from the market," Smith said, "we must try to prevent a further buildup in supplies. The set-aside program offers each farmer the opportunity to make an individual decision on how much acreage he or she wishes to plant and how much he or she wants to hold out of production," he said.

"While the program is voluntary, only those who participate will be eligible for commodity loans, target price payments and disaster benefits. Those farmers in the north and west part of the state who have received low-yield payments and our wheat producers know full well the value of these benefits," he noted.

He is a 1974 graduate of Texico High School. His wife, Linda, is with him in Germany.

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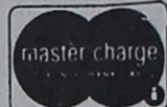


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St. Patrick's Day Decor

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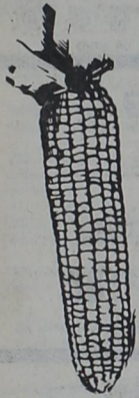
