Mrs. Preston has been president of the Ladies Auxiliary for the past four years. The Auxiliary has 22 active members.

## Four county schools to get trust funds

The Parmer County Commission voted 2-1 Monday to divide up among the four county schools a trust fund of about \$875,000.

In favor of giving the money to the schools were Robert' White and Tommy Williams. Opposed was Ernest Anthony. Commissioner Raymond McGehee was absent due to illness.

Officials of the four county schools -- Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie and Farwell -- had appeared before the commissioners Jan. 14 to make the request. From comments made at that meeting, it appeared that White and Williams favored the request, while Anthony and McGehee were opposed.

The four schools had agreed on a formula to divide up the funds. It would be based on the past five years' daily attendance for each school. This would be: Farwell, 17.64 percent; Bovina, 19.95 percent; Lazbuddie, 10.75 percent, and Friona, 51.66 percent.

At the time, officials of Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie schools indicated that if they get their share of the funds they would leave it in the bank accumulating interest for the time being. Friona officials told of a pressing need -- more high school classrooms were needed.

The chief reason school officials gave in seeking the funds now is that they feared the state might try to take back the money, especially in a time in which the state is seeking more revenue.

The fund -- the county permanent school fund - consists of monies gained from partial mineral rights in Gaines and Andrews counties. This system was set up years ago by the state.

The amount of funds Parmer County has received from these minerals -- including the oil-producing well - has declined over the years and currently two small checks are received each month.

According to state law, the schools can only use money from this trust fund for either reducing bonded indebtedness and-or making permanent improvements.

The funds are in a bank CD until March 31.

When the school officials made their request Jan. 14, they asked that some money be left in the fund

in case more monies arrive. At the Jan. 14 meeting, Anthony and McGehee both indicated their opposition to the request basically because they felt it was good insurance for the money to stay in the county trust fund.

In other business, the commis-

-Agreed to pay the two county senior citizen centers \$1,200 each to help with various expenses.

-- Set the next meeting date for Feb. 22. -- Accepted the bid from Friona State Bank for being the county depository. The only other bid re-

ceived was from the First State

Bank of Bovina. --Accepted the bid of Peek Industrial Tractor Parts Co. on a motor grader. The cash price of \$78,800 was agreed to, with \$20,000 down and financing for the balance.



The council talked about the abatement ordiance that is being prepared by City Attorney Duane Hamar. It was indicated that once this ordinance is on the books, more work can be done in tearing down abandoned buildings along the highway.

Hamar presented a draft of a proposed ordinance governing costs for persons wanting water and sewer line extensions. The council will study it.

Hamar reported that the state EID is still not happy with coverage of garbage at the landfill.

At the end of the meeting, the council called an executive session to discuss the problem with city employees.

## Sarpalius wants your views

Most issues that come before the Texas Legislature stir emotions only in a handful of legislators. The average bill has a few staunch supporters and a few staunch opponents.

Pari-mutuel wagering is an exception to the rule. Few lawmakers are ambiguous where that issue is concerned. Walk the halls of the Capitol and talk to legislators about horse racing, and you quickly find that everyone has an opinion.

Two years ago, during the 68th Session of the Legislature, a bill was introduced in the House and Senate that called for a consitutional referendum on the horse-racing issue. If passed, Texans would have voted in November 1983 on whether to legalize pari-mutuel wagering on horses. With a consistutional amendment on the books, Texans then could have legalized such betting on a county-by-county basis.

We voted against that measure because our surveys showed a majority of Panhandle-area residents were opposed to pari-mutuel wagering. Despite our efforts, the bill passed the Senate. It later was defeated by two votes in the House.

Last Monday, though, the parimutuel issue returned, thanks to a bill filed in the House by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi. The same bill is being carried in the Senate by Sen. O.H. "Ike" Harris, R-Dallas.

This bill differs in one major way from the bill filed two years ago. This measure by-passes the Constitution. If it passes the Legislature and is signed by Gov. Mark White, the issue would be taken directly to the counties. Any county that wanted pari-mutuel wagering would need only call a county election and approve such wagering.

## Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports

The arguments for and against pari-mutuel wagering, however, are the same this session as they were last.

Proponents argue that the tax revenues from such wagering would help ease the state's growing budget problems. House Speaker Gib Lewis has used this argument in lending his support to Berlanga's bill. Proponents also point out that every state surrounding Texas has legalized pari-mutuel wagering and contend it's foolish to let Texans spend their money in those states when they could spend it at home.

Opponents have maintained for years that allowing pari-mutuel wagering in Texas would be an open invitation to increase organized crime in the state. They agree that well-regulated race tracks would not contain organized crime elements themselves but say off-track gambling would proliferate, with mafia forces behind the betting.

We understand this issue is an emotional one, and we want to be responsive to the wishes of District 31, just we we were last session. We plan to start polling the district in the next two weeks to see if there has been any change in people's sentiments during the last two years.

## Community Center improvements told

Improvements at the Farwell Community Center were announced at Monday's meeting of the Farwell City Council.

It was announced that Honetree Corp. of Clovis has donated light poles to be placed at the site. Also, a pay phone will be installed at the center.

The council named Martin Chandler, local ASCS manager, to head the community center board.

The council officially agreed to maintain and operate the center. It had already indicated in past meetings it would do this but the exact wording was needed to go into the council minutes. This was needed because it appears the center will receive a grant -- and the grantor needed to see this language officially in the council minutes.

It was pointed out that persons and groups which wish to donate funds or equipment to the center should go through the board of directors.

In other business, the council met with Precinct 3 County Commissioner Robert White to discuss a culvert problem on the west edge of Farwell. The council agreed to buy an 18-foot culvert, at a rough cost of \$260, for the site. The county will install it.

The council appointed Mayor Walter Kaltwasser to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Last month, the council planned to ask Prentice Mills to serve on that group but it was learned later that the Farwell liaison had to be an elected official.

The council agreed to give the city insurance contract for 1985 to Henry Insurance Co., Muleshoe.

#### Offices to close

Several government offices in the Twin Cities will be closed Feb. 18, in honor of Washington's Birthday.

These offices include both Texico and Farwell Post Offices, ASCS office, and the Farmers Home Administration office. Both the Texico and Farwell banks will be closed,
