Texas Legislature stir emotions
only in a handful of legislators. only in a handful of legislators. The supporters and a few staunch op ponents.
Pari-mutuel wagering is an ex-
ception to the rule. Few lawmakers are ambiguous where that issue is concerned. Walk the halls of the Capitol and talk to legislators about
horse racing, and you quickly find that everyone has an opinion. Two years ago, during the 68 th Session of the Legislature, a bill was introduced in the House and Senate endum on the horse-racing issue. If passed, Texans would have voted in November 1983 on whether to legalize pari-mutuel wagering on horses
With a consistutional on the books, Texans then could have legalized such betting on a county-by-county basis. We voted against that measure jority of Panhandle-area residents were opposed to pari-mutuel wager ing. Despite our efforts, the bill
passed the passed the Senate. It later was
defeated by two votes in the House Last Monday, though, the parimutuel issue returned, thanks to a bill filed in the House by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi. The
same bill is being carried in the Senate by Sen. O.H. "Ike" Harris, R-Dallas.
This bill differs in one major way from the bill filed two years ago
This measure by-passes the Constitution. If it passes the Legislature and is signed by Gov. Mark White,
