Nobody knows the source of this tremendous water supply Some contend that it is an underground basin which is recharged hand, others contend that it is the in the Rocky Mountains, and is, therefore, in-exhaustable. All of which heads us back to our statement above-we don't know where our water comes from.

If it is an inexhaustable river, the High Plains country has just now begun an era of agricultural advancement that will rate it as one of the garden spots of America. If, on the other hand, our underground water greatest help possible." supply is limited to a huge basin, it is only reasonable to presume that this basin will be eventually pumped dry. Should the latter become an eventuality, the high Plains region is destined to become another great American desert.

All of which leads us back to my contention of the past few years that we had better seriously consider the establishment of a series of surface lakes on the high Plains, and thus recharge our underground supply.

TWO NEW GINS CERTAIN FOR PARMER FOR NEXT SEASON

King Cotton rode through Parmer County on a white horse this year, as is proved by checks with the six county gins who report that ginnings will almost certainly exceed 35,009 bales this year.

In spite of the drouth, a freeze that came three weeks too early. labor shortages, and a few insects, the 1952 cotton crop doubled that one of a year ago.

Widespread irrigation and mechanical harvesting spelled the difference in crops this year, and indications point to an even greater utilization of these two methods next year.

Two new gins have been announced for next season. One, to be built by Mills & Fleming, will be located at the old "Twin Houses" corner where the Muleshoe-Friona and Oklahoma Lane-Lazbuddy roads intersect.

The two gin men, from Burkburnett, have been in the county only one year, and the move for another gin indicates their confidence in the county's ability to produce.

Guy Nickles, a long-time cotton man at Lariat and Muleshoe, also announces that he intends to build a new gin at his Lariat location. "I lost about four or five thousand bales this year because I just couldn't handle it," he explained. He plans to erect a three or four-stand Contin-



Ginnings as of Tuesday afternoon, 5884, will go past 6000. Morrison had made a pre-season estimate of 5000 bales, but didn't hope for that much when the early freeze arrived. He is optimistic about the future, and looks for an increase acreage in the northern half of the county next

Mills & Fleming, Hub

Ginnings as of Tuesday afternoon, 7009-estimates 7100 will catch season. Both owners reported they would have "been tickled with 5000 bales this year." O. L. McMurtry, gin manager, reported he doesn't think that the freeze made much difference in the number of bales ginned at Hub, but that it did hurt the grade of the cotton

Watkins' Gin, Lazbuddy

As of 5 p.m. Tuesday-6998 bales ginned. Doyle Watkins, owner, estimates another 300 bales will catch the year. He admitted that the early freeze hurt "pretty bad" there, but declined to make an predictions on acreage of yield for next year.

North Plains, Friona

"Yes, it's been a nice year," says Wright Williams, owner. Ginnings there stood at 5724 Wednesday morning. "Even with an early freeze, cotton was very good for the year. I predict that there will be an increase of 20 per cent for the coming year, and perhaps more. South Plains farmers are coming in to plant cotton."

Lariat Gin

Ginnings Wednesday morning were 7869 bales, with 120 on the yard. Guy Nickles, owner, figures he'll finish out the year this week. He considers the past season an excellent one.

Watkins' Gin, Farwell

Ginnings Wednesday morning, 1463-"just about through" says Billie Whitmire, bookkeeper. Drew Watkins, gin owner, was out of town and could not be reached for a statement, but he is known to be optimistic about the future. He plans a thorough renovation of the gin by next year.

Another new gin, which might be considered in this general area, will be built near the West Camp community. It will be one mile east and one mile south of the schoolhouse, in




Over-Ripe Hay Hard For Cattle to Digest

Cattle can digest most of the cellulose in feed, but the hard woody fiber of over-ripe hay and grasses cannot be digested.

Veterinary medical authorities have reported that yignin, the wooly fiber makes the older grasses much less palatable for cattle. Cows, however, will readily eat black, weathertarnished alfalfa hay in perference to green leafy hay if the former was cut in the bud stage while the green hay was cut after lignin developed.
