#### Has Anybody Been Fleecing Your Flocks?

It is common knowledge that the American public will fall for most any outlandish scheme a slick-tongued promoter happens to proposition them with. Maybe it's just because of our inherent trusting nature out here in the Southwest, but it seems as though shysters have certainly had bountiful harvests in recent years.

Magazine peddlers have been among the most notorious, but now and then another line pops up. Mrs. Foister Rector of Friona writes us to say that she and several other people have been sucked under by a promoter selling chicken worm medicine.

The entire proposition is set forth in her letter carried under a "letters to the editor" column elsewhere in the paper. The sum and substance of it is as usual, the whole scheme is a front to get quick cash from hard-working farm people who are credulous enough to fall for the line.

The moral of this sad story, and other similar incidents which have passed through this part of the country in recent years, is this:

Know what you're buying, and if you don't know what you're buying, at least know the guy you're buying it from. This simple little policy will sooner or later pay off by protecting you from some unscrupulous individual who is out for a dis-honest

Besides, it'll tend to keep your money at home in your own community where it'll do you more

In fact, the average individual would seldom have occasion to ponder the question of whether now is day clubs for night worthe State of Texas can be sued on kers. the same basis as a person or corporation. One of the prevogatives of sovereignty carried down from ages past into our present day laws is that of immunity from being sued. The State of Texas may not be sued without its consent.

The Legislature by a proper action may permit certain general types of suits to be brought against the state, under certain conditions and restrictions. Then, if a specific situation arises which is not covered by the general rules, the legislators are authorized to pass a special measure to water.







our point of view. One man in particular, C. R. Eliott of Bovina, was pretty unrestrained in speaking his mind on the matter. He (and we back him 100 per cent) thinks this government "retirement insurance" is a bunch of hogwash.

"Now, it wouldn't be so bad if the thing was optional," said that businessman, as he made what we believe to be a very sensible point.

"If the government would say to me, 'now, here is a deal we call Social Security. We believe it will be a good thing for you, but you can take it or leave it.'
