The offer was considered for a short time by the Negroes, and has been accepted. Under the agreement, colored school-age youngsters will be picked up by regular Farwell buses running the usual routes, and carried to the local grounds where they will be transferred to a single bus that will make a daily run to Clovis.



THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Humane Attitude Toward Negroes Encouraging

Whether it was done consciously or not, the Farwell school board has taken a humane and Christian attitude toward the matter of Negroes who are of school age in the school district.

Texas, a "Jim Crow" state, has a law that provides for equal educational opportunities, although at the same time it calls for segregation of Negroes from whites.

It would be a fruitless expenditure for the school to decide to rent or build some structure and equip it for classroom work and hire a teacher for the school, because such a small system could warrant only a single instructor, and opportunities there could scarcely be more than used to be found in the "little red schoolhouse."

The chance for Negro children to attend Lincoln-Jackson in Clovis is welcomed by Negro parents and students alike, for that school is well developed and "departmentalized" in such a way as to afford them a much better chance at a wellrounded education.

In most instances of this nature, the school pays little attention to Negro rights until openly coerced to do so. Most often, it is the petition of angry and earnest colored people which finally opens the door for Negro schooling. This is particularly true of schools of smaller enrollment, and where the Negro population is heavily in the

The school board is probably expecting some static from parents in the district who object to their children riding on the same vehicles with Negro children, and they probably won't be disappointed, either.

But this we'll wager: The principles involved the children themselves-are going to get along fine. Friendship and companionship at an early age are seldom marred by the scars of racial antagonism.

Some Hopeful Suggestions Relating to Our County Fair

The Parmer County Fair is the only occasion on which it is possible for every section of this great county of ours to sort of "get together." Whatever we do, we should strive for a continued improvement of this event, because as the county fair goes, so goes the prosperity of the area.

It would be unfair to criticize the small number of entries in the livestock divisions this year, since the "cow, sow, and hen" population in Parmer County is down from normal years.

But where the fair really should have shined was in the community exhibits, and the home arts department, Neither Farwell nor Friona submitted entries in the community exhibits contest, and their absence was noticed, don't think it wasn't. It probably is discouraging to rural communities to
