I notice, though, that the people who are first to disclaim any responsibility for their bad acts are at the head of the line when it comes time to take credit for the good ones. It looks like expediency figures in somewhere here.

Now I'm not one to throw back my faults to my folks. People can see through that too quick. They notice that whenever I get beat at tennis it's because I have blisters on my thumb. I make sure they understand that. When I win (and it's seldom) they also notice I have blisters on my thumb, so that story exposes the plot.

Even though I have had some failures in the field of responsibility dodging, I'm not giving up. I have decided that when the day comes that I get in real trouble I am going to plead temporary

Actually, this shouldn't be too hard to prove. I have been told with a degree of regularity all my adult life that I was crazy. Crazy in doing certain things, of course, not completely cukoo. I want to be careful not to indict my entire personality. But being judged a little haywire

at convenient moments should have its own rewards. Not everybody has caught onto this ducking act. Even our president, who should have learned a few tricks coming up as he did in ways political, lok

the blame for our big Cuban

slip-up a while back. Now, he was showing a big heart in not pinning the blame on somebody else as he could have, and we admire him for that. But the guy ought to have been tipped off on this Freudianstyle thinking that would have given him a clean slate and hurt

no one else either. He could have come up with something like "This is the perfect example of the inevitable schism of incompatible ideologies in an area of the world where civilized man, by the very nature of his thinking, is frustrated in anticipating the stratagem of a barbarous culture."

That would have gotten him off the hook.

Actually, there doesn't seem to be much point in taking the blame for anything any more. No one expects you to.

The guy who writes hot checks can't be criticized just because he is temporarily out of a job. If you fail to do a piece of work for the boss, it's easy to come up with a half dozen reasons why the work couldn't be done.

The reasons can range all the way from indigestion to tornado. The boss expects you to be able to squirm out with your record clean. What we would do with a George Washington today is an interesting contemplation.

And don't disregard the "They just don't understand me" technique. It works good at times too. By hiding behind this one, you don't have to put out much effort to be a decent

sort of person. You can just sulk around with your chin on your chest and a chip on your shoulder, doing pretty well what pleases you and all the while mumbling that magic phrase, "They just

don't understand me." I tried this subtle subterfuge once -- and once only. At first it looked like I was going to get away with it. I was along about junior high school age (that critical point, you know) and put it up to Mother that they weren't trying to see my side of things in the way the

family was being run. Mom suggested to Hop what I had hoped she would: 'Maybe we really don't understand him." I was eavesdropping of course, and was chilled to the marrow with my father's

Wolverines Finish Second At State

James Halsell and Leslie Winsper, Texico's ace trackmen, teamed up over the week end to lead the Wolverines to a secondplace finish in the Class B state track meet.

Texico wound up with 40 1/3 points, but an all out effort on the part of the Wolverine thinclads wasn't enough to match the overall depth of perennial power Ft. Sumner. The Foxes won their seventh straight state crown by compiling 64 1/3 points.

Halsell, who racked up two first places, tied for another, and set a new state record in the shot put, was the meet's individual star with 20 points, half of his team's total

He nosed out Ft. Sumner's Owen Fox for individual high point honors by one point. The Ft. Sumner sprinter had 19 points and in third place was Texico's Winsper with

On his first throw in the finals Saturday afternoon, Halsell heaved the shot 53 feet, 7 inches to break the old record of 51 feet, 1/2 inch.

He also won the discus with a throw of 134 feet, 1 inch, and tied for first in the pole vault with four other athletes. All four of the vaulters cleared 11 feet, but went out on 11 feet, 6 inches.

Halsell picked up his other two points with a fourth place in the javelin.

Winsper also placed in four events, winning the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet,

10 3/4 inches, finishing second in the 220 and third in the 100.

The Texico speedster was nosed out by Ft. Sumner's Fox in the 220, and he finished behind both Fox and Lordsburg's Estrada in the century race. With the sprinters running against a strong wind, the winning time in the hundred was 10.4 and the fastest time in the 220 was 22.7.

Winsper also ran the anchor leg on Texico's 440-yard relay team which finished second. Other members of the Texico foursome, who turned in a time of 45.5, were Hal Ed Helton, Leon Kelley, and Victor Harrington.

Dwight Turner placed in three events for the Wolverines, finishing fourth in the high hurdles, tieing for third in the high jump, and tieing for fifth in the pole vault.

Turner went out on 5-9 in the high jump. 11 feet in the pole vault, and he turned in a 15.9 in the hurdles.

Two other Texico lads who qualified for the state meet but failed to place were Gary Singleterry in the mile run and Kenneth Murdick in the javelin.

For the second straight year, it was the top three teams from District 6-B who finished the same way at the state. Last year Ft. Sumner won first, Tatum was second and Texico third.

This year the Foxes again won, the Wolverines were second, and Tatum was third with



Children's Clinic Plans Complete

Arrangements and staff for the sixth annual crippled children's clinic in Hereford were announced this week by the Oasis Shrine Club, the sponsoring organization.

The clinic this year is being drastically expanded to handle more children, says Claude Miller, Friona, one of the Shrine's

Children with physical, speech, and hearing defects will be examined on Saturday, May 20, by an outstanding group of medical specialists. These specialists, including some from Dallas, Lubbock, Galveston, Amarillo and Denver, donate their time and service to the clinic.

Miller emphasizes that there is no charge for those attending the clinic and that all children up to 19 years of age in the Panhandle area are eligible to attend.

In order to speed up processing and routine clerical work, parents of children who enroll at the clinic are asked to fill out a pre-registration form and mail it in advance. These forms may be obtained from any Shriner or from your local physician, Miller says.



Even though irrigating of early cotton is not a recommended practice, there are times, such as a dry spring like this one, when the crop needs a little water to help it along. By planting on the ridge, it is possible to water between the rows, thus giving the cotton some badly-

Also, by using a knife-type planter, the seed can be put into the ground without turning up the soil and exposing subsoil moisture. The knife cuts into the ridge and drops the seed in the ground where it is con-





It has been the custom to attribute the condition to a high fever but too many of the children are uncooperative -- no

Shoemen seek an answer to the question because good customers are lost when parents blame shoes for the occurrence. If a certain shoe was responsible, most of the children who wear that kind of shoes would develop the weakness. That just doesn't happen.

The most acceptable reason is that periods of weakening and strengthening should be expected because children's feet grow in spurts. Growth of a size or a size-and-a-half is usually followed by a period of slow growth or no growth at all. We believe that rapid growth causes the weakness which is overcome by exercise during the period of slow growth. That may not be the whole answer or the correct answer but it sure beats the high fever story and being told by the mother that her child has been disgustingly healthy.



Social Security Benefits For More Persons

If you have reached retirement age (65 for men and 62 for women) and have never inquired about social security benefits because you are still working, you should talk to a social security representative beneficiary who earns exactly right away, Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, advises.


Up until this year, social security beneficiaries who earned more than \$1200 in a year lost one month's social security benefits for each \$80 of earnings in excess of \$1200.
