That sucking noise you heard last year was the 2,300 irrigation wells in Parmer County taking a long draw on Texas' biggest "ice cream soda"-the 13,000,000 acre feet of water beneath the rich farms that produced 60,000 bales of cotton, 14,000,000 bushels of grain sorghum, and 1,500,000 bushels of wheat in spite of the worst drouth in history.

Coming at the tail-end of a sixyear dry spell, the 1956 growing season gave the wells of the county their biggest test yet, and they came through in magnificent fashion.

But-what of this year, and next year, and the next, and the next? Can we keep drawing on our underground water supply, wonderful as it is, indefinitely? The county's wells pulled the water table down an average of 5.18 feet in 1956. That was a slight increase over the decline registered in 1955, when the level dropped 4.04 feet.

If we are going to deal in generalizations, it can be said that on the basis of these declines, the water supply runder Parmer County can be expected to continue highly pro-







The vote of 449 Parmer County farmers in the wheat referendum last month was the biggest block of votes in Texas, Prentice Mills, ASC office manager, announced this week. Parmer County even outvoted the big wheat producing counties of the North Plains.

Like farmers the nation over, local wheat growers approved marketing quotas in that vote.

The outlook for improved egg prices in the months ahead is good, says Extension Economist John McHaney. For the first four months of 1957, commercial hatcheries in Texas produced 23 percent fewer eggtype chicks than during the same period in 1956 and in the nation, the reduction was 21 percent. Egg prices to producers, he says, should be higher for the last months of 1957 and the first quarter of 1958.


