Nuremburg trial recalled

Jess Landrum of Farwell told the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club Wednesday of his reminiscences of the Nazi war trials at Nuremburg just after World War II.

Landrum noted that 1986 is the 40th anniversary of the trials and probably will receive publicity during this year.

He was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1941, and joined the Office of Strategic Services (OSS), an intelligence-gather unit, in 1944. After the war ended, he was assigned as a court reporter for the war trials' preparation.

At the trials, 22 top Nazis were indicted for crimes against humanity. They were jailed at Nuremburg in preparation for the trials at the Palace of Justice, which was largely undamaged.

Each Nazi was interrogated by the Allies before the trials began.

Landrum participated, in his job, in these interrogations, including those of Generals Jodl and Keitel, No. 2 Nazi Hermann Goerring and German Secret Service Chief Ernst Kaltenbrunner.

Landrum recalled that none of the defendants would admit to participating in any atrocities and gave as their defense "they were just following orders." No remorse was shown, Landrum said.

Before the actual trials started, Landrum's tour of duty ended and he returned to the United States.

Of the 22 defendants, 3 were acquitted, 11 condemned to death and 8 received prison terms. Rudolph Hess, a top Nazi with mental problems, is the only one still alive; he is in Spandau Prison in Berlin. Of those condemned to death, all were hanged except Goerring, who committed suicide the night before his scheduled execution.

Agricultural Conference draws large turnout

"Managing for Survival in 1986" was the theme of the sixth annual Irrigation and Agricultural Conference in Muleshoe on Jan. 13.

The meeting was jointly sponsored by Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association, Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District, and The Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"We had one of the largest groups we have ever had at our Irrigation and Agricultural Conference," said Duane Lloyd of Bailey County Electric Cooperative. "People seem really interested in the topics this year."

The agenda included information on the "Agriculture Conservation Program (ACD) and the Farm Program," by Danny Noble, ASCS County Executive for Bailey County and "FmHA Farm Loan Program," by Henry Taylor, the FmHA county Supervisor.

In each case, the speakers explained the new programs based on the information they now have.

Dr. Pat Morrison spoke about mite control in feed grains and Dr. Robert Barry spoke about wheat

leaf rust.

"I was really interested in the information about leaf rust," said one farmer. "It can do so much damage before you even realize that there is a problem. We haven't had much problem with it in this area in the past, but it may become more of a problem in the future."

Dr. James Supak talked about cottonseed quality, and Wayne Wyatt of the High Plains Underground Water District talked about the new Texas water legislation.

State Rep. Pete Laney also said a few words to the group concerning the new legislation.

"We anticipate no increase in electric rates this year," said Connie Gupton, of the Bailey County Electric Cooperative. "We wish we could say that they would go down, but at least they won't go up."

After lunch, Scotty Savage spoke about "Irrigation Efficiencies," and Mickey Black spoke about "Potential Efficiency Savings." Leon New and Bob Phipps and Mike Hill spoke on "Advantages of Surge and LEPA Irrigation."
