What you shouldn't do

So you don't get too upset, this column is devoted to "not what to do." Sometimes it's better to get a point across by pointing out the wrong way to handle something and exaggerate it. I thought this fable would be appropriate at this time of year, what with the kids' basketball leagues either under way or ready

Gosh, I'm lucky. My boy signed up to be on a Play, Inc., basketball team last week.

It's vital to me that he plays on the team because I really see myself out there as he plays. It's sort of called "living your life through your child." And, obviously, I don't want to be just a bum out there so it also is paramount that he does well. No problem, I'll make sure he does

The first thing I did is talk with the coach, Mark Williams. I explained to Mark that my boy is a super athlete and I expect him to get more than his share of playing time on the court. If he played the whole game, that would be okay with me.

I noted that this is important to a youth's progress -- getting lots of playing time. And it's also the only way he could score a lot of points and get a goodly number of re-

That led to my next point I made to Mark: the need to have the other kids feed my boy the ball so he can have lots of scoring attempts. This is easy to do, I said to Mark, if you station my son near the basket and design the offense around him. Other kids screening for him surely will help his point total zoom. That's important when you are a 10-yearold; it's never too early for the pro scouts to be watching.

If there was a problem with the kind of offense needed for the team, I explained to Mark, I could help in this area. In fact, I plan to sit right behind our team's bench during the whole season so I can give my advice to Williams right then and

Sitting right behind the bench also will allow me to talk with my son during the games and give him needed advice. Thus, if he is having a good game, I can praise him for his work. And if he is having a bad game, I can tell him it's not his fault but the other kids. Sitting near the floor also will give

me a chance to let the referees know my feelings -- if needed. It's a funny thing but it always seems that my son picks up more than his share of fouls. I admit that I've told him to be aggressive on the court but I think it's because the refs pick on him. So by being near the floor I let the refs know exactly what my feelings are toward them.

I pointed out to Mark how my son doesn't have a high opinion of practices and often skips them. He's a "game player," as they say. He doesn't need the workouts; once it's game-time, he's at his best. So if he avoids some practices, not to worry; he'll go full-steam when the whistle blows.

And as a realist, I acknowledge that my son may be kept from winning the first place trophy by the other kids on the team. So I've had a heart-to-heart talk with my boy. It went something like this:

"Son, in cause you don't win the top trophy, it's probably because your teammates didn't give 100 percent. Basically, it's their fault. Don't ever blame yourself. It's their problem, not yours."

I'm well prepared for the season. I went to Clovis last week and bought a trophy case for my son's room. I told my boy that I expect a really nice-sized trophy from the Play, Inc., league to break it in with. I told him how important it was to me that he got a trophy and that I would be very disappointed with him if he failed me.

The worst part about the above fable is that some parents have a tendency to fall into those traps, just as I have. What we need to be is realistic about our youngsters and not to expect too much.

It's a funny thing how we expect our young'uns to be the best hustlers, the best shooters, the best everything; that's probably natural being a parent.

Don't forget that sports have a lot to offer, in terms of a youth's progress. What the youngster learns in terms of teamwork, in pride at doing the best he can and in having

Bowie dispatched

[Editor's note: As part of the Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration this year, eight local businesses --Security State Bank, Franse Irrigation, Worley Mills, Farmers Cooperative Elevator, Sherley-Anderson Grain [Lariat], Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative and West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative - will be bringing you a weekly column about events in Texas 150 years ago. 1836: SUNDAY, JANUARY 17. General Sam Houston, Major General of the Army of Texas, today dispatched Colonel James Bowie with a detachment of 30 men to San Antonio de Bexar with orders for Colonel J.C. Neill, in command there, to blow up the Alamo fortress and bring off the artillery. General Houston has received word that Neill's garrison has been reduced to only 90 men, and there are reports that a large enemy force may be approaching.

San Antonio has always been the main anchor of Mexican forces in Texas, and the Alamo there, originally built as a mission, was converted into a fort and equipped with cannon by the Mexican army. It was captured by the Texians last month after a five-day seige.

However, the Texas army depends almost entirely on volunteers, and many have been returning to their homes and farms to catch up on much-needed chores. The garrison was further depleted when some 200 men, eager for more action, joined one of the volunteers, Dr. James Grant, in a proposed attack on Matamoros, a Mexican port city near the mouth of the Rio Grande

Texas has been in revolt against the Centralist government of President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna since last September. On the fifteenth of that month, General Martin Perfecto de Cos, brother-inlaw of President Santa Anna, landed at Matagorda, Texas, with 500 troops to reinforce Texas garrisons. The first actual fighting came about when the town of Gonzales, about 60 miles east of San Antonio, was ordered to return a cannon that had been provided them for defense against the Indians. The town refused, considering the order to be an effort to deprive it of defenses. When a contingent of 100 Mexican cavalry was dispatched to take the cannon by force, Texian volunteers rushed to the town, and after a few days of parley, there were several skirmishes, with shots being fired. This was on October 1. The next day the Mexicans retired without the cannon, having suffered several deaths. There were no losses for the

News of this affair immediately spread throughout Texas and caused great agitation. When word reached the Mexican Colonel Dominic Ugartachea, in command at San Antonio, he addressed a letter to his former friend Stephen F. Austin at San Felipe de Austin, urging him to counsel with the citizens of Gonzales. "Mexicans will never suffer themselves to be insulted," he wrote, and threatened that if Gonzales refused to deliver the cannon, "the consequences will be a war, declared by the col-

The same day, Colonel Ugarthacea set out for Gonzales with 500 men and three pieces of artillery. However, his scouts reported that hundreds of volunteers were streaming into Gonzales from all THIS WEEK IN THE

parts of Texas, and he decided to

halt his march and return to Bexar. No one person was in command of Texian forces at this time, but Stephen Austin was looked to for orders and advice, and San Felipe was adopted as the center of action. "Committees of Safety" were appointed in the thirteen major muncipalities of Texas, and all worked together in the emergency

After reinforcements arrived from east Texas, General Austin moved the army forward to Slado Creek, only about five miles east of San Antonio. On October 20 his force was about 600 men. He did not consider it sufficient to storm San Antonio, where General Cox had heavily reinforced. It is reported that Austin at this time offered his command to Houston, who has much greater military experience. Houston declined, in view of Austin's election by the volunteers.

The army marched to the mission San Francisco de la Espada, on the San Antonio River some nine miles below Bexar. Austin dispatched J.W. Fannin and James Bowie with 90 men to examine the missions up-river for a better campsite. They left on October 27, inspected San Juan Capistrano and San Jose, and around noon arrived at La Purisma Concepcion de Acuna, about a mile and a half from Bexar. They considered it to have excellent defense terrain, and made camp there.

Their position was discovered by the enemy and several skirmishes occurred that afternoon, causing Bowie to dispatch an urgent message to Austin, eight and a half miles below. The next morning the Mexicans attacked with some 400 men, including five companies of cavalry and a 6-pound cannon. After a furious battle that lasted about half an hour, the superior position and marksmanship of the Texians prevailed, and the enemy retired, leaving their cannon and about 60 killed, many of them officers. The Texians lost but one killed and none wounded. The main army did not reach the battleground until shortly after the battle was over. The next day the Mexicans, under a flag of truce, received permission to bury their dead. This is now known as "The Battle of La Concepcion."

On November 25, General Austin received word of his appointment by the Provisional Government in San Felipe to head a commission to the United States to raise funds for Texas independence. He resigned his command, and Colonel Edward Burleson was elected to succeed him. Meanwhile various skirmishes were taking place. On November 26 a large Mexican contingent was sighted approaching Bexar, with horses laden with bags that the Texians thought might contain gold to pay Cox' troops. They attacked, killing about 50 Mexicans plus many wounded, and capturing about 70 horses. The bags turned out to contain fodder for the animals inside Bexar. The battle is now known as "The Grass Fight." Although the Texians did not realize it at the time, it was an indication of how desperate matters were inside the town.

"We still need \$600 to pay for the decorations," said Chamber President James Pierce. "We would ask that if any persons would like to


contribute toward paying off this amount, please stop by the Texico Bank and leave their donation."
