## Two announce for Justice of the Peace

Two candidates announced this week that they are filing for Parmer County Pct. 1 Justice of the Peace on the Democratic ticket.

Albert Smith, who has served in the post for the past six years, announced he would seek re-election. Also seeking the post is Billy "Shorty" Hughes.

Smith, who also has served as a precinct Democratic chairman, has been a county resident for 59 years. He and his wife, Carolla, have three sons: Eddie and Arlin, both of Farwell, and Maurice, of Clovis.

Hughes has lived in Parmer County for 28 years and attends Eastern New Mexico University, Clovis. He has three children -- Joe, of Farwell; Dudley, of Bovina, and Jeanette Freiling, of San Antonio.

"If elected, I will serve the people of Parmer County to the best of my ability. I think I am well qualified to

run for this office. I would appreciate your support in the primary," said Hughes.

And Norbert Schuler and incumbent Wayne Spears are running for the Democratic nomination for Bovina Justice of the Peace.

Frances Euler, the Democratic incumbent, is opposed so far for Friona Justice of the Peace.

Others who have filed on the Democratic ballot are: Raymond McGehee, incumbent, county commission, Pct. 4; Porter Roberts, incumbent, county judge; Jack Young, incumbent, district judge; Bonnie Warren, incumbent, county clerk; Marjorie Watkins, incumbent, district clerk; and Anne Norton, county treasurer.

As of Wednesday, no one has filed for any Republican nominations.

The registration deadline is at 6 p.m. Feb. 4.

## Area group builds orphanage cafeteria

Twenty-three persons from Farwell and the surrounding area left for El Rancho De los Ninos in Guatemala Jan. 4 and returned Jan. 13.

The group helped build a cafeteria at the El Rancho orphanage.

Those in the group were John Rush, J.R. Shumate, Jo Beth Snell, Ralph Franse, Lewis Foster, Todd Geries, Rhonda Vaughn, Kirk Hines, Royce Bethel, Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Vaughn, Herman Geries, Jim Caplan, E.J. Caplan and daughter Eloy. David Swahland, David Gilliland, Bro. Wyatt Carpenter, Sharlet Taylor, J.B. Taylor, Dale Cook, Jerry Pierce, Craig Horne and Gene Nesbitt. The Caplans met the group in Guatemala City, coming from Alaska.

According to Ralph Franse of Farwell, "Out of 58 people, 42 were men and 16 ladies. We shared the cooking, washing and worked on the building. Some of the men worked on the equipment and trucks."

"We arrived at the Ranch on Sunday and by Friday the cafeteria was up. About 35 persons visited the Mayan ruins while the rest stayed working. The group from Las Cruces left Saturday. We celebrated with roasted pig on Sunday and christened the new cafeteria. We appreciated the many people and churches from the area."

Jo Beth Snell of Clovis said: "You think prayer doesn't work?" It was 95 degrees out and we knew we had to put up a sheet metal roof on the new cafeteria building. We were worried about how we would get it done when a cloud came out and cooled things down long enough to get the roof on.

"I learned to live with the spiders and lizards and other creepy, crawly things in the jungle. And I could tolerate the bedroll that never seemed to dry out. But I never got used to the cold showers. They were so-o-o-o cold."

"If I would lay my hammer down, one of the kids from the ranch would pick it up and start working. They were so helpful and appreciative of all that we did for them. When I looked at those kids, it was all worth it!"

Ms. Snell drew the blueprints for the building.

"It was really an exciting feeling of accomplishment. There were no injuries, and no hurt feelings. It was amazing how well the group worked together," she said.

The new cafeteria has 4,000 square feet. It is 80x50 feet.

Bro. Carpenter noted: "When you drive down the streets of Guatemala you see the slums and see how the life of the country is. You can definitely see the need of El Rancho. The plight of the children is greatly reduced by this home."

"The Ranch definitely has the presence of God in the middle of them. The people involved are deeply committed. The main thing that stood out was the spiritual life of the children and the quality of education offered to them."

"I'm glad to be a part of this. It is a most worthwhile cause. You know the money sent to the Ranch is definitely put to good use and the Ranch does receive the money."

"The Bartleys have a definite impact on the Ranch and Guatemala. They have the desire for these 42 children to become strong Christian men and women when they leave the ranch."

He continued:

"The Ranch is strong in three areas. They minister to the needs of the children, they educate them and they do a super job to provide food, shelter and clothing."

"I'm personally grateful to all the volunteers in the U.S. and Guatemala for their time and resources."

El Rancho de los Ninos is run by Bo and Jeanne Bartley from Farwell. It is located at Flores, Guatemala, in the El Peten.

The church was built in 1983. They have a full time pastor. His family lives and works at the Ranch.

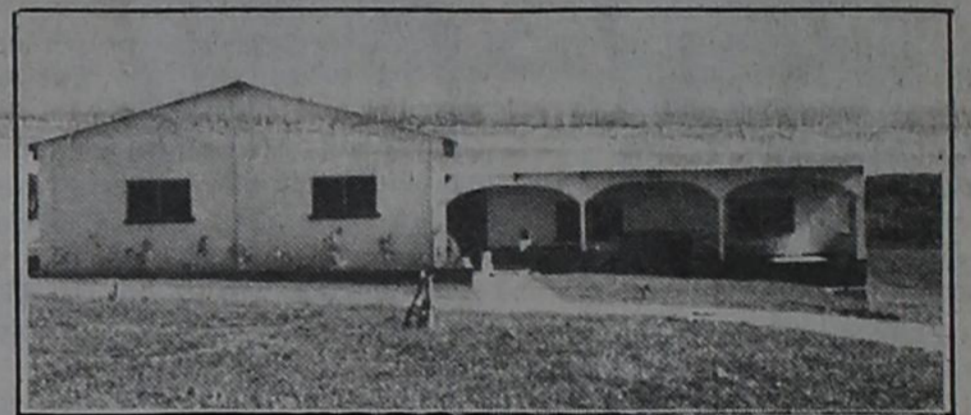

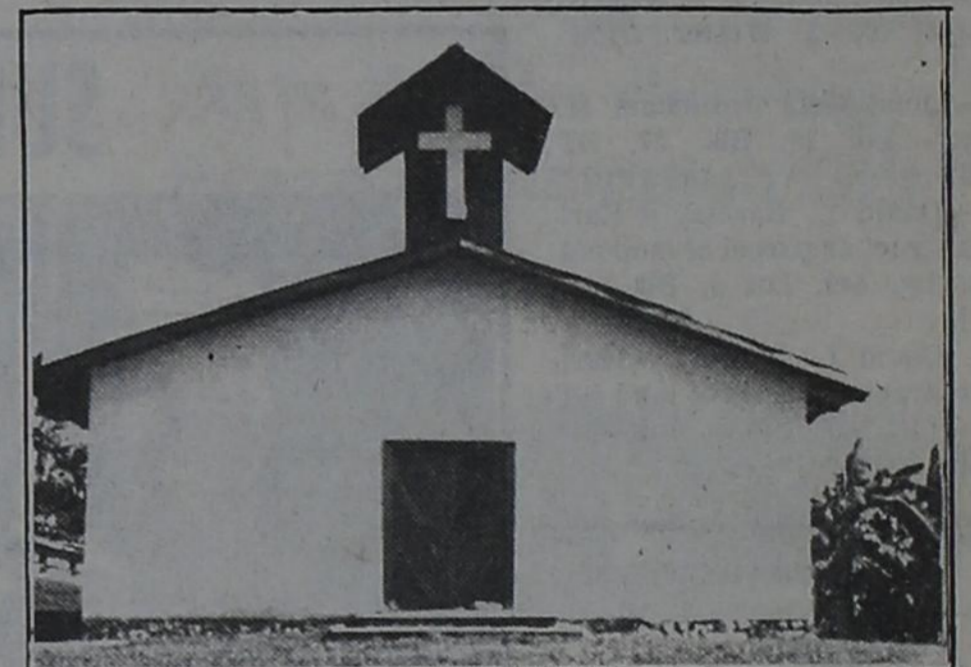

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## Change keeps revenue in Farwell

A change in sponsorship for the Farwell Dental Clinic will mean large savings for Farwell.

Tuesday night, the clinic sponsorship was changed from the Farwell Hospital District to the Farwell Development Corporation.

This paperwork change means that compensation that had been paid by the Hospital District to the National Health Service for dental services in Farwell will no longer be paid. Instead, the funds will remain in Farwell for the dental clinic to utilize.

In the past year, the Hospital District, out of dental clinic revenue, had paid more than \$27,000 to the National Health Service. Due to the sponsorship change, these funds now will stay in Farwell.

And it was decided Tuesday that this year's funds will go for three items: 1) hiring a part-time dental

hygienist to assist Dr. J.R. Ivins; 2) repairs to the clinic, including roof and carpeting; and 3) saving the remainder of the money.

Tom Nichols, president of the Hospital District Board, said that the district paid the National Health Service more than \$100,000 (from gross revenue) over the years. The National Health Service pays the salary for the dentist and furnished the equipment for the original dental building.

Even though Farwell now will get to keep the \$27,000, the National Health Service will continue to pay the dentist's salary.

Here's why:  
Farwell was able to get a waiver from continuing to pay the \$27,000 (or whatever the figure would be based on a percentage of revenues each year) because the government

takes into account economic conditions in rural America. If the dental clinic is sponsored by a non-profit, non-tax supported agency — such as the Farwell Development Corp. — then the funds can be kept in the local community.

The Hospital District is tax-supported and, as past dental clinic sponsor, could not be approved for the waiver. Thus, the sponsorship change was necessary.

This opportunity to seek a waiver was researched last year by the board. Nichols credited Dr. Ivins and Jackie Smallwood, of the clinic,

with preparing the applications that resulted in this savings. "We owe them a lot of thanks," Nichols said.

Nichols also pointed out that the annual savings expected will exceed the total tax revenues for the Farwell Hospital District. "This is a large saving for our community," he added.

He noted that hiring a hygienist "will free up our dentist's time, thus allowing him to work with more patients, thus generating even more revenue — which, in turn, will stay in Farwell for improved health services for our residents."

## Texico plans production sale

The Texico FFA and FHA members are at it again.

On Jan. 31, after the varsity boys game against Melrose, they will have their second annual production sale. The member, or members, will be sold in groups of one, two, or three at a time. They will be auctioned off to the highest bidder.

The members will do anything to equal an 8-10 hour working day. They will do anything from cleaning house to driving a tractor.

Proceeds will go toward the funding of FFA and FHA trips and ban-

quets throughout the year.

The FFA will be attending local, district, and state judging contests. The state trip will be in Las Cruces. The FFA will also hold a parent-member banquet in the spring.

The FHA will attend a state leadership camp at Glorieta in the fall. They will also hold a banquet in the spring.

## Council, governor reach impasse

1836: FRIDAY, JANUARY 22. A rump council of the Provisional Government of Texas, meeting without a quorum, today ordered Governor Henry Smith to deliver to them all government documents. Governor Smith has refused, declaring that he would defend them with force if necessary. An impasse has existed for some time between the Governor and the Council, and it may be said today that the Provisional Government of Texas no longer exists.

The Provisional Government was set up last November 3 when a Consultation consisting of delegates elected from 13 municipalities of Texas met in San Felipe de Austin. Two previous Consultations, one in 1832 and another in 1833, had addressed petitions to the central government of Mexico. However, the present dictator of Mexico, President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, issued a decree last October 3 abolishing state governments, and the 1835 Consultation felt it necessary to set up a Provisional Government of its own. Smith, delegate from Columbia, was elected governor by a vote of 31 to 22 over Stephen F. Austin, who is considered too closely allied with Mexico. James W. Robinson, a lawyer from Nacogdoches, was elected lieutenant-governor. The Consultation then set up a Permanent Council of 21 members representing Texas municipalities, and adjourned.

The Council and the Governor have been at odds almost from the beginning. Governor Smith strongly favors independence, while most Council members merely want the overthrow of Santa Anna and a return to the Federalist Constitution of 1824. Matters came to a head on January 9, when Smith requested a secret meeting with the Council. He read them a blistering denunciation, in which he called them "Mexican like," accused them of acting in bad faith, and charged that some of them were corrupt and dishonest. "Look around your flock," he said. "Your discernment will easily detect the scoundrels."

A committee was appointed to reach agreement with the Governor, and when this failed, the Council impeached him for "malfeasance and misconduct." He was ordered to vacate his office immediately, to be replaced by Lieutenant-Governor Robinson. Smith refused. With this impasse, some Council members have returned to their homes, and it is no longer able to muster a quorum.

The situation has become public knowledge, and both sides have been issuing statements almost daily. Fortunately, while the Council still had a quorum, it passed an act providing for a new convention to be assembled at Washington-on-the-Brazos on March 1, with delegates to be elected February 1.

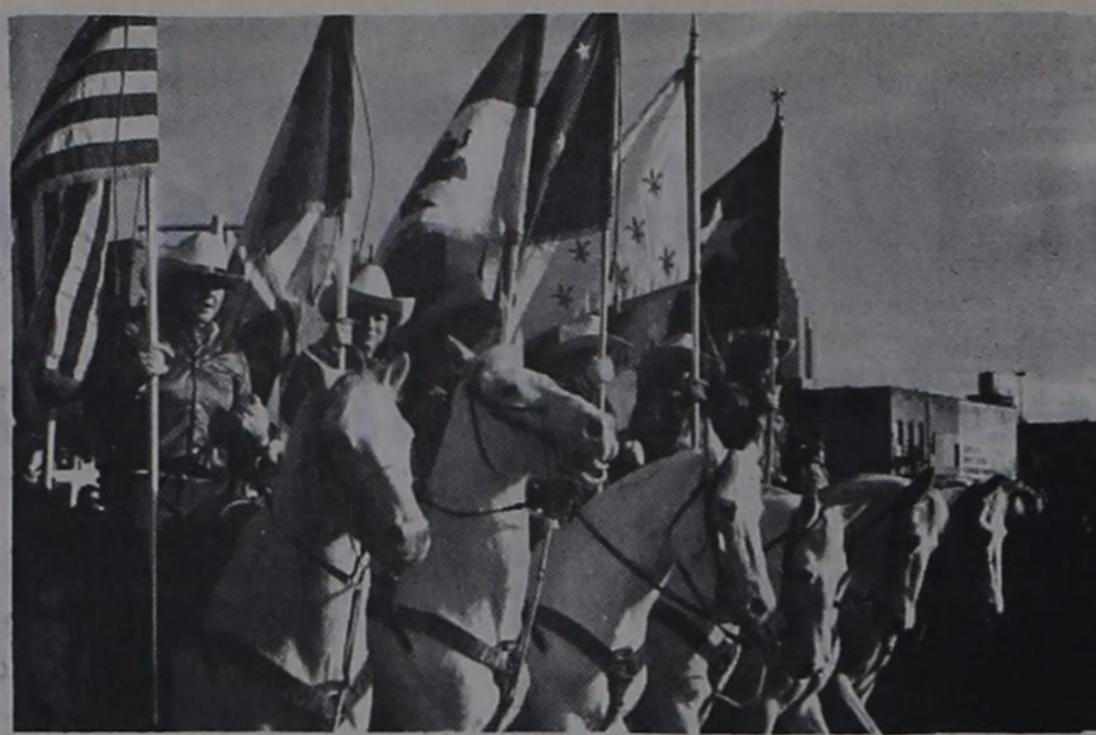
The Council has been interested in an invasion of Mexico by Texas, which Governor Smith opposes. Early last December, it voted to provide aid to General Jose Antonio Mexia, a former associate of Santa Anna but now a bitter enemy, who proposed an invasion of northern Mexico. When Governor Smith vetoed this act, the Council passed it over his veto, with the request to General Mexia that he first aid the Texian forces then besieging Bexar. He replied that he could not honorably do so as a Mexican officer, whereupon the Council dropped the matter of aid to his proposed invasion.

After the capture of the Alamo from General Cox, one of the volunteers, Dr. James Grant of Pararas, Coahuila, proposed to lead an invasion of Matamoros, in northern Mexico. He claimed that all of Mexico was rising up against Santa Anna, and that as soon as the Texans appeared, they would be joined by all of Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon. He painted a lively picture of the rich spoils that would fall to the invaders.

On January 3, the Council authorized Grant and Colonel Frank Johnson, commander at San Antonio, to capture Matamoros. When Johnson declined, Colonel James W. Fannin, Jr., was appointed commanding officer. Grant was appointed "Commander-in-Chief of the Volunteers," and since the entire army is composed of volunteers, this has the effect of putting both Fannin and Grant in supreme command. It also has the effect of stripping the command from General Sam Houston, who opposes the Matamoros invasion.

Eager for action and spoils, some 200 volunteers who had remained at San Antonio joined Grant's expedition, leaving only about 90 to defend the garrison. They stripped the Alamo of cannon, ammunition, supplies, clothing and blankets, so that it is now left practically defenseless. The Texians army is presently spread over a wide area, from San Antonio to Goliad to San Patricio.

1839: FRIDAY, JANUARY 25. President Mirabeau B. Lamar today signed an act establishing a new flag for the Republic of Texas. It consists of a blue vertical bar next to the staff, about one-third of the flag's width, with a large five-pointed white star in the center. The remainder consists of two horizontal bars, white above and red below.


