



We'd like to wish Benna Felts well. She retired last week after more than 13 years as county treasurer. And "good luck" to her successor in that post, Anne Norton.



Eldred A. Brown, chairman of the Board of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, announced Monday the Cooperative prepaid the outstanding balance due on all monies borrowed from the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) Dec. 30.

Public Law 99-509, enacted by Congress on Oct. 21, 1986, provides that borrowers from REA may prepay the outstanding balance due, at discount, on all REA notes.

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative had undertaken detailed financial studies and determined that the prepaying of the REA notes was in the best interest of the members of the Cooperative.

The payment to REA on the principal debt of \$9,654,796 plus interest was in the amount of \$6,695,837. This prepayment resulted in a discount of 30.6% and a savings of approximately \$3 million plus the interest that would have been paid had the notes been carried to maturity.

There are several benefits resulting from the prepayment:

(1) The three million dollar note reduction or discount.

(2) Increase in future capital credit payments. (3) Reduction of the Cooperative's

quarterly debt service payment.

(4) Relief from unnecessary REA regulations.

(5) And increasing members equity substantially.

To fulfill future monetary needs, Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative will borrow monies from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation and other private lending institutions.

Deaf Smith is the second of about 1,000 electrical cooperatives to take advantage of the new law.
