The generals arrived and everything was in order. I stayed in the background as various officers and NCOs from our unit filled them in on how the missile system operated, its safeguards, etc.

We made a big point about its security. No way any saboteurs could get through and mess around with our missiles, let me tell you. There were guard houses, watch dogs, barbed-wire fences and electronic listening devices. We were ready.

However, as I stood off to one side, halfway listening to the presentations, I began to get concern-
