It's a good thing they didn't ask me; they would not have liked the answer.

So the big day came when the brass was to arrive. I had to close the PX early that day (much to the unhappiness of the coffee drinkers in our unit) and go as a repre- sentative of our unit on an inspec- tion tour of a nearby missile battery (I was stationed at headquarters).

The generals arrived and every- thing was in order. I stayed in the background as various officers and NCOs from our unit filled them in on how the missile system operated, its safeguards, etc.

We made a big point about its security. No way any saboteurs could get through and mess around with our missiles, let me tell you. There were guard houses, watch dogs, barbed-wire fences and elec- tronic listening devices. We were ready.

However, as I stood off to one side, halfway listening to the pre- sentations, I began to get concern- ed.

You see, the missile battery was right next to the Atlantic Ocean.

After the briefing ended, I wan- dered up to one of the officers who had spoken. I asked him how secure the base was against submarine attack, since it was on the edge of the ocean.

I said something like, "What would happen, sir, if a sub surfaced about 100 yards from us and launched its missiles at point-blank range. Wouldn't that wipe us out? How are we guarded against that?"

He gave me a blank look.

Ah, I loved the Army.

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
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

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'The' crossing will be fixed

Mayor Chris Gikas announced at Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting that the railroad crossing between Texico and Farwell finally is to be repaired.

The crossing is considered by many to be one of the rougher ones around.

Gikas said that New Mexico recently has put up its share of \$10,000 for the job. Texas already has pledged a like amount and the federal government has put up \$90,000. The Santa Fe Railroad also will kick in some funds, said Gikas.

Farwell school election set

Two posts are on the ballot for the Farwell School Board election April 4.

The 3-year posts currently are held by Ed Corn and Joe Hughes, who has been board president for several years.

The posts are at-large which means that all school district voters vote for both posts.

The deadline for signing up to be a candidate is March 4 at the school superintendent's office.

Hughes said that after 12 years on the board he has decided not to seek re-election.

Corn said this week he will seek re-election.

"We are talking about repairs that will make the crossing the type you can cross without even knowing that it's a railroad crossing," he said.

The work, which is expected to take three weeks and will involve detours, will be done as soon as it can be scheduled. He said some of the material reportedly has already been delivered here.

In other business, the council: -Heard Gikas say that the Hurschel Harding property just outside the city at its southeast corner is no longer being considered for annexation.

-Received two bids for the city's annual insurance coverage. Henry Insurance, Muleshoe, at \$9,416 was the low bidder and got the award.

-Heard Gikas say that the city's two worst alleys (between 6th and 7th and D and E streets) have been improved with dirt and bottom ash. More alleys will be worked on.

-Heard Gikas say that the state is willing to put flasher lights at 9th and Ave. A if it can figure out where to put the poles. If approved, they would flash yellow on Ave. A and flash red on Ninth.

-Discussed the water problem with some lots along 9th Street. Property owners will be contacted to see if they are willing to pay for curbs and gutters along with the city. Highway officials say it costs them \$9 per foot for curbs and gutters.

-Approved sending City Clerk Janie Bowery to election law school in Austin.

-Emphasized that the no-shooting within the city limits will be enforced. One resident's dog was shot recently while running loose.

-Heard Municipal Judge Ysleta Kittrell report that she has issued 7 tickets for animals running loose (and a dog bite case) since August. In the previous three years, two tickets were issued.

Mrs. Kittrell again urged county residents not to bring their dogs to Farwell and let them off there. She asked that they bring them to City Hall or contact Doug Landrum.

The Farwell Junior High seventh grade boys team won the consolation trophy in the seventh grade tournament at Sudan. They were defeated by Sudan, 28-26, and beat Kress, 43-24 and Sundown, 39-32. Coach Gary Cates said, "In the Sudan game, we started out pretty well. Then we quit scoring. At halftime Sudan got ahead by 6 points and in the third quarter by 14 points.
