

It's time to sign up for Merchants Giveaway

More than 50 Twin Cities businesses will be participating in the sixth annual Border Town Days Merchants Giveaway program held in conjunction with the annual BTD celebration's park activities July 25.

This year's giveaway will take place throughout the afternoon of the Saturday festivities at Farwell City Park.

Each participating business has a box in which customers may register for the prize to be given away by that merchant. A person may sign up as many times as he wishes from now through July 24, when the boxes will be picked up and taken to the park for the drawing.

Drawings will be held from each individual merchant's box, and the person whose name is drawn will be allowed ample time to claim the prize. However, in the event that the person does not show up to claim the prize in the allotted time, another name will be drawn so that all prizes are awarded that afternoon. It is essential that a winner be at the park to hear when his name is called.

I support Col. North

It's always dangerous to write a column about a controversy which is not completed.

Danger... my middle name. So I'm writing this column before Congress begins its cross-examination of Col. Oliver North. This may not sound wise but I really don't care what Congress has to say; I support Col. North.

Unfortunately, his superiors are not good Marines; they are bureaucrats. For them, the password is to pass the buck. They set up a scenario where Col. North would become the fall guy in the eventual case of disclosure; no fools, those bureaucrats.

Well, I don't believe he should be a fall guy. I feel he should be honored as an American patriot. His work in doing the administration's bidding was correct.

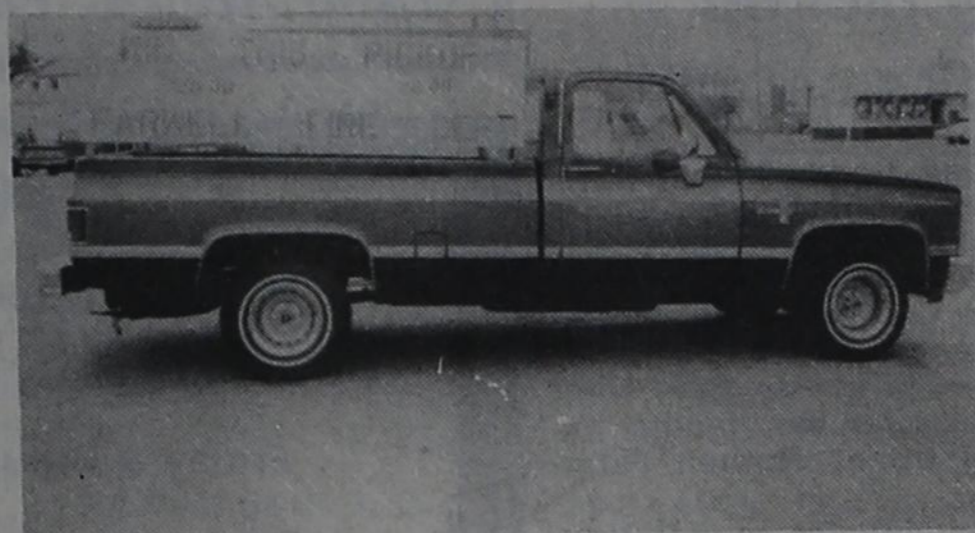

Congress can pass any amendment it wants, but our nation needs a leader for for-

Farwell drops out of Triad

The Farwell City Council voted Tuesday to withdraw recently by a billboard erected in Muleshoe by a Portales business group urging motorists to use a shortcut to Portales, and bypassing the Twin Cities and Clovis.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Gikas and councilman Curtis Smith report on their trip to El Paso for a statewide conference of city officials.

- Received two bids for the demolition of an old burned-out house on Ave. B between 6th and 7th. Eastwood Construction, with the low bid of \$1,050, was awarded the job.

The council talked of giving the materials to someone if they would demolish it but worries of safety hazards ended that idea.

- Okayed the annual pest control spraying bid from Mac Heald for the park, cemetery

- Received a list of about 35 tax delinquent statements from the county appraisal district. City Clerk Janie Bowery said most of the folks had no record of living here and she will write to the county telling them to put their statements in the county's hold file.

- Decided to seek bids on a new pickup truck for the water department. A second vehicle is needed because of the work to be done daily (in keeping records) at the new sanitation plant.

It was noted that the plant work is going slowly but should be finished this fall.

- Received 17 applications for the city clerk's post. Mrs. Bowery is retiring in December.

The councilmen will go over the list and pick out the top 5 or 6 candidates for interviewing.

- Agreed to block off the streets around the city park for Border Town Days.

- Heard resident Wayne Kelm complain of vandalism done by a pickup driver to lawns on Fifth Stret. He suggested the city hire someone to keep watch at night.

Gikas said the city also is looking for someone to do that. Meanwhile, he told Kelm to fill out a complaint with Municipal Judge Ysleta Kittrell and that a citation would be issued the person that Kelm believes did the damage.

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Grant sought to save depot

Texico residents David Kube and Ann Cooper asked the support of the Texico City Council Tuesday on saving the old Texico depot, built in 1908, the year the city was incorporated.

The Santa Fe Railroad plans to tear down the depot so it can straighten out its track.

Kube and Mrs. Cooper called a meeting of residents to help save the depot a few weeks ago but the turnout was slim.

Mrs. Cooper said they have been told that state grant money is available for projects for libraries and museums. She said they want to apply for a state grant of \$400,000 to move the depot elsewhere in Texico and make it a museum.

The council voted 4-1 (Steve Chancy opposed) to allow Mrs. Cooper and Kube to fill out the grant form in the name of the city, then submit it to the council (the form must be signed by the mayor). But the council reserved the right to withdraw from the project if they feel a lack of commitment is shown.

There was a long discussion on the topic. Mrs. Cooper said a museum would help bring tourists to Texico, thus helping local businesses. She said if a grant is received, no money has to be repaid. As for operating expenses, she said part of the museum could be "sold" to persons as a fund-raiser, then the interest used in keeping the building open.

There is room upstairs at the depot for a person to live, and this person possibly a retired man or woman, could run the museum.

Chancy questioned whether this building would duplicate the planned information center at the Port of Entry. And it was noted that the state doesn't want the depot as that center, but has designed its own plans.

Questions were raised whether the 700,000-lb. depot can be moved. Kube said a mover told him he could do it for around \$250,000. Mayor John Hadley said Santa Fe engineers said it couldn't be moved.

The Santa Fe wants to demolish the building within 90 days. Mrs. Cooper hopes that the city's action Tuesday will give them time to show the railroad they are working on saving the depot and that the demolition should be put on hold.

In other business, the council:

- Noted that the senior citizen center may need re-roofing.

- Noted that the 1987-88 budget and revenue sharing budget are available for inspection by the public during office hours at City Hall.

- Agreed to buy two new pagers for the fire department.

- Heard councilman Butch Tharp say that the city is short \$11,000 in water revenue but his committee is not ready to recommend a rate hike. They are considering all possibilities.

- Plans to discuss at a future meeting an ordinance revision to allow the city judge to sentence persons to 10 days of community service in lieu of fines in certain cases, to go along with state law.

- Heard councilman Bryan Kube suggest a small area in back of City Hall be fenced in and playground equipment placed there, for groups who use the community center with small children attending.

Band director hired

Norris Samuelson, from the Fort Worth area, was hired by the Farwell School Board last Thursday to be the new band director.

He has been teaching in China Springs, Texas. He replaced Ron McWilliams, who took a post in Seminole, Texas.

Also at the meeting, the board adopted a tentative budget for the next school year of \$2,140,000. This is tentative in that a final budget cannot be adopted until the board sees how much money the Legislature will give it. This should be known in September.

The current budget is

- Heard Kube say that a tree needed pruning across from the Baptist Church on Turner. Also mentioned was a tree at State and Hammond.

- Noted that a new state law prohibits discriminating against manufactured housing. The city zoning ordinance will need to be changed to comply with this.

- Discussed the problem of out-of-state motorists being ticketed, then not showing up for their hearing. Eventually, they pay (when they seek their auto license renewals) due to a compact New Mexico has with neighboring states.

They could post bond but that would mean the judge, now part-time, would have to be available whenever a motorist is ticketed.

- Noted the mosquito fogger is being used Mondays from 6-8 a.m. and 7-9 p.m.

- Noted that Eastwood Construction has mapped out the streets in line for repair. Councilman Butch Tharp said the paved portion of State Line Road should be included.

BTD meeting set

The final Border Town Days Committee meeting before this year's big event will be Monday at 8 p.m. at Luce's Restaurant.

The schedule for the bandstand will be made up, and any other last minute chores will be handled.

(Continued from Page 1) eign policy; not a group of 500 and women men vacillating between what to do and what not to do. Congress cannot make foreign policy. Period.

What we see is a partisan struggle. Times may change but politics don't. The Democrats are using the Iran-Contra affair as a pretext for throwing stones at the GOP administration.

In some cases, the GOP deserves it. But not to the point of televised hearings day after day. No, this is politics as usual. And I'm fed up with it.

If Congress doesn't want us involved in Nicaragua, then all the Congressmen should march on the White House and lay down in the streets until President Reagan promises a hands-off attitude. That's my way of saying it cannot be done.

If Congress were wise, it would make sure its foreign affairs leaders would meet periodically with Reagan, and leave it alone. If the Congressional leaders, such as Barry Goldwater, felt that Reagan was going the wrong way, then they could issue a public report to the Congress as a whole, and push for Congressional action.

But 500 men and women cannot dictate foreign policy for the leader of the free world. It doesn't work.

My feelings are simple: we need to boot the Communists out of Nicaragua as soon as possible. If we don't, we're fools.

As for Iran, I can understand the humanitarianism involved in trying to free hostages. It didn't work. Forget it.

And as for Col. North, I publicly would like to thank him for his efforts in my nation's behalf. We need more like him.

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Taxes to increase home buyers' costs

The Texas Association of Realtors reports that the State Legislature has recently passed a tax on professional services which would increase the costs to home buyers. They have also proposed a transfer tax which would also make home ownership less affordable than it currently is.

Transfer taxes would apply to the application fee, appraisal, credit report, survey, title examination, attorney fees, points charge, and PMI premium. The transfer tax would require an extra \$500-\$1000 cash payment at closing. The new tax would increase closing costs of the seller.

The Texas Association of Realtors suggests that the new taxes would cause housing in Texas to become less affordable to more people. As a percentage of income, the transfer tax would have a much greater impact on the

Chadwick, Harrison qualify for nationals

Two Texico runners, Amy Chadwick and Keith Harrison, have qualified for the nationals to be held in Provo, Utah, July 23-25.

The Junior Olympics Track events will be held at the Brigham Young University track.

"Penny is a young runner; she will compete in this class again next year," said Harrison. "Just making it to the finals at the regional was an accomplishment."

Krystala Cross placed 4th

in the 100 and 200 meter dashes. She ran the best time she had ever run, and narrowly missed qualifying since there was only .3 second between the first and fourth place runners. She had a 27.01 in the 200 meter dash and 13.01 in the 100 meter dash.

The Texico runners participate in the Junior Olympics events as part of the Eastern Athletic Club from Portales. The club is open to athletes from Texas and New Mexico. They receive coaching from staff and students at Eastern New Mexico University.

The local runners who will be competing in the nationals in Provo have been looking for sponsors to help defray the cost of their trip.

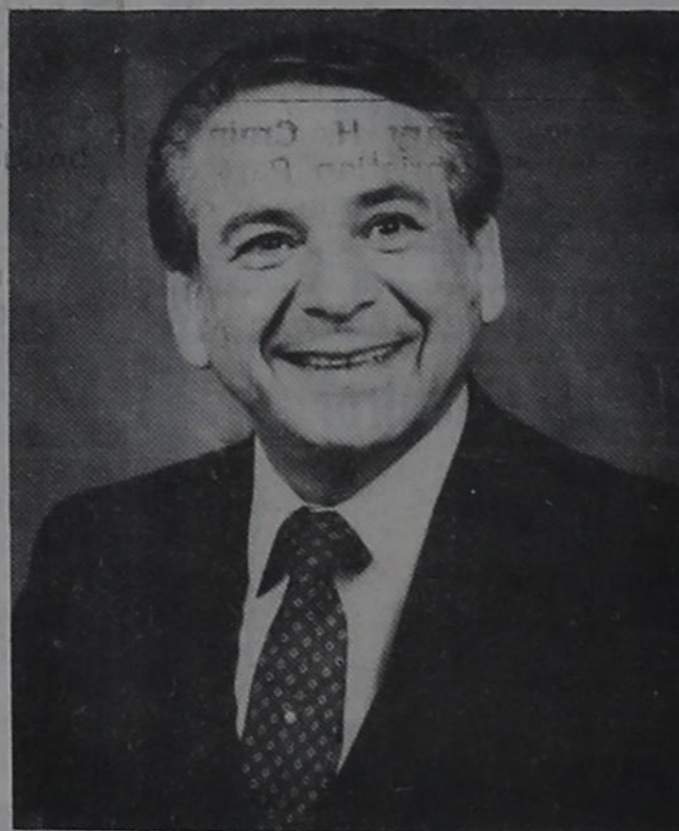

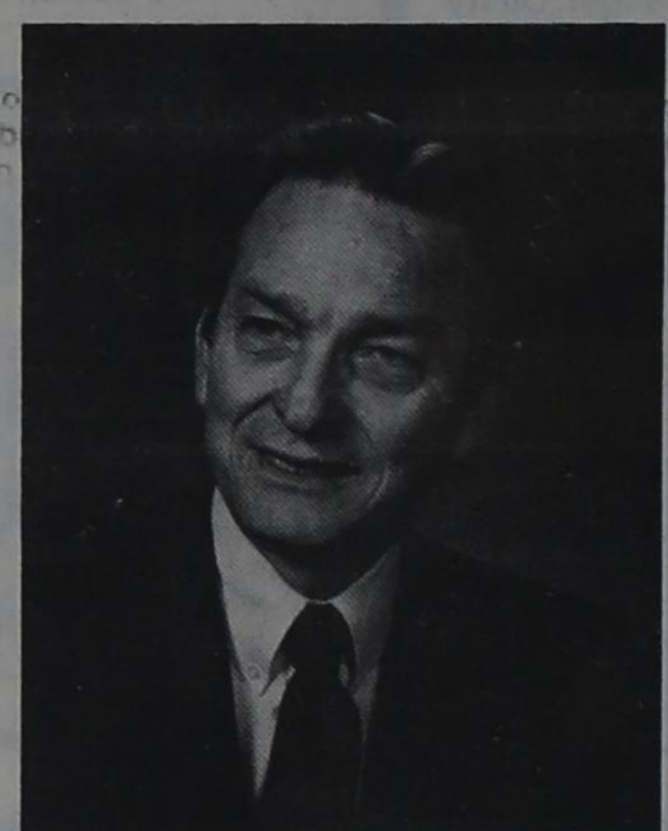

Carolyn Langford was the first Border Town Days Queen. Horsemanship was a qualification for the queen in those days. Over the years, the queen has had to perform in skits, show a talent, write essays, and model fashions. The qualifications change with the times.

Year after year, Walter Hughes has overseen the barbeque.

In 1980 Janie Bowery organized the first arts and crafts show for the Border Town Days.

Julia Symcox led the drive to build the gazebo in the Farwell park. Dozens

of people from the Twin Cities donated money, materials and labor to make the gazebo a reality.

ESA sorority donated park equipment so that little children would have a place to play both at Border Town Days and all year.

Over the years there have been Rodeos, golf tournaments, Minnie Pearl Hat contests, greased pig contests, parades, dances, past fashion shows, and lots of fun.

Reunions have brought back old friends and relatives. Visiting in the park is great fun.

Some people have more than twenty years of experience in organizing the Border Town Days celebration, which really helps to make things go smoothly.

"John and Joann Getz are really the glue that held this thing together," said one longtime committee member. They were there year after year to keep things rolling.

Lewis and Ann Cooper have also been there every year to help in a variety of ways.

But they were not alone. Each year more groups of

people are involved to make it a successful celebration. And each year the celebration grows.

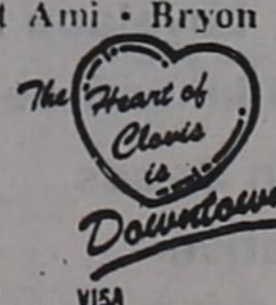

Recipe of Week

The following recipe comes from ENMU's Home Economist, Sheryl Borden:

Buttermilk Dressing Mix

Combine the following dry ingredients and store in an airtight container:

1 cup dry buttermilk powder or nonfat dry milk powder; 1/4 cup sugar; 4 teaspoons dried basil, crushed; 4 teaspoons minced dried onion; 2 teaspoons dry mustard; 1 teaspoon garlic powder; 1 teaspoon salt. Makes 1 cup of dry dressing seasoning.

Use the following directions to reconstitute the powdered dressing mix into a liquid dressing. It might be wise to store these directions with the powdered mix.

Combine 1/4 cup of the mix with 1/2 cup of water. Blend into 3/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing. Shake well before serving.

Makes 4 batches of buttermilk dressing.

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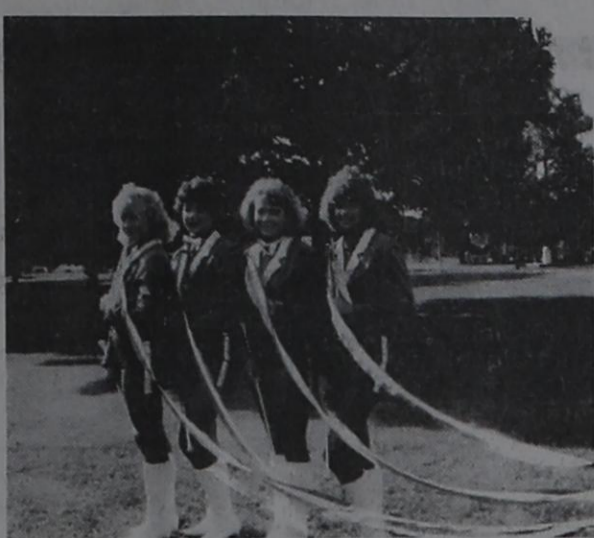
Courthouse elevator?
