I hope everyone enjoyed our special 75th anniversary and Texas Sesquicentennial issue Sept. 5.

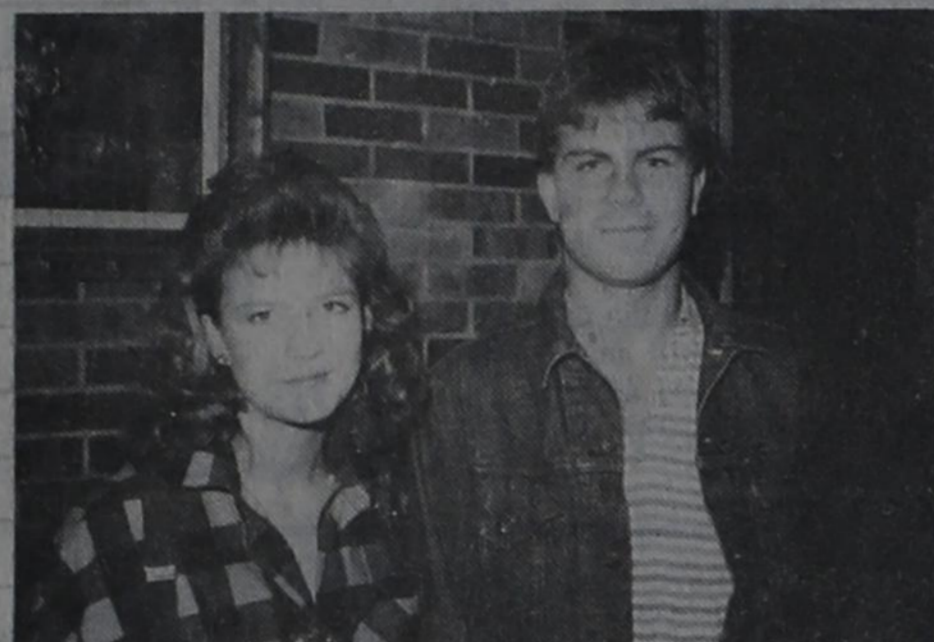
I was very concerned, being a relative newcomer here, that I would leave out someone who was a major contributor to the Twin Cities over the years. If I did, I apologize.

During his service here, Roberts was nominated as Superintendent of the Year for 1985. He also has been an active supporter of the athletic program and served as a Booster Club member for many years and as an announcer at Steer football games.

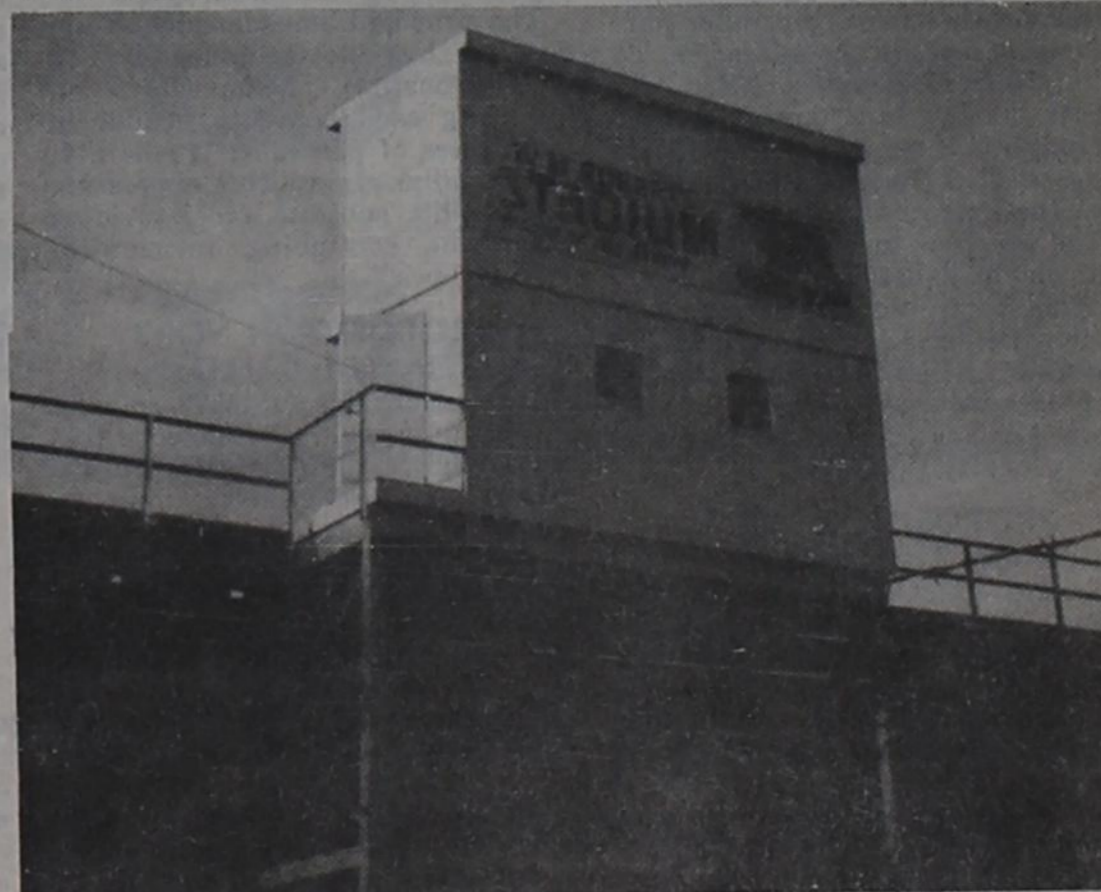
The proclamation also noted that Roberts "has not only excelled professionally but has excelled in his support for the students and all activities in which students are involved."

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

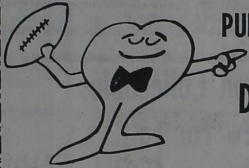
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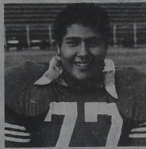

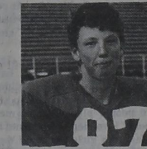

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# President Houston changes his attitude

1837: FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 15. President Sam Houston today issued a proclamation reestablishing Letters of Marque and Reprisal against Mexican shipping. Such letters give authority to those who have been granted them to capture enemy ships, including merchant ships of other nations trading with the enemy, and to sell the captured ships and cargo for profit.

Such letters, originally granted by the Texas Provisional Government and by the ad interim government of the Republic, were later repealed by President Houston because of his "utter abhorrence to every species of warfare not calculated for a nation's glory and the attainment of an honorable peace."

The present change in Houston's attitude is prompted by the imprisonment of Colonel John A. Wharton by Mexican authorities in Matamoros. He arrived there under a flag of truce in the schooner Orleans, carrying 15 Mexican prisoners captured in the Battle of San Jacinto. His purpose was to exchange them for his brother, William H. Wharton, who was taken prisoner when the Texas Navy vessel Independence was captured by the enemy on April 17. He was on board, returning from his mission as a commissioner to the United States.

The Orleans encountered a sudden storm as it was arriving at Matamoros, and was wrecked, with two men drowned. The exchange prisoners thus gained their freedom. John Wharton himself was captured and imprisoned, despite the fact that his vessel had been carrying a white flag. In prison, he learned that his brother had already escaped, as had a number of other prisoners. Six days later John Wharton also escaped. However, a number of Texans are still being held in the Matamoros prison.

1840: FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 18. A treaty of recognition, friendship and commerce between the Republic of Texas and the Kingdom of the Netherlands was signed today at The Hague by His Majesty King Willem, attested by Baron Verstolk van Soelen, Minister of Foreign Affairs. It was signed for Texas by General James Hamilton, Texas emissary to Europe with full author-



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ity to negotiate. Holland is the second European nation to formally recognize Texas. A similar treaty was signed with France on September 25 last year.

The treaty with Holland consists of 22 articles, which established complete equality and reciprocity between the two nations. Each country enjoys the privileges of the most favored nation in matters of import duties and navigation. The treaty is to remain in force for a minimum term of eight years, and continue thereafter unless terminated by either country by giving 12 months notice. Ratifications by Holland and Texas are expected to be routine, and are to be exchanged at The Hague in nine months.

General Hamilton is also negotiating with Belgium, and was in Brussels earlier this month to confer with Joseph Lebeau, Belgian Foreign Minister. Lebeau agreed that further negotiations can be carried on in London with the Belgian minister there, Van de Weyer. General Hamilton is therefore returning to London for this purpose, and also to continue his discussions with the British Foreign Minister, Lord Palmerston.

1842: WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER

BER 21. Mexican General Adrian Woll and his army of about 1,200 men vacated San Antonio yesterday morning, and last night camped at Canyon Ford, 20 miles west of the town. They are being closely followed by the Texas militia under command of Colonel Mathew Caldwell and Captain Jack Hays of the rangers. The Texans now number about 325 and are anxiously awaiting additional volunteers. They have received a report that General Woll is expecting a reinforcement of some 1,500 men under General Pedro de Ampudia from Matamoros.

Woll occupied San Antonio for ten days. His withdrawal is thought to be based on previous orders, and is probably not a retreat because of Texian opposition. A number of Mexican families of San Antonio have accompanied him. They took with them not only their own possessions, but whatever loot they were able to gather. There are some 150 carts loaded with furniture, utensils, household effects and plunder, plus about 500 head of cattle.

The 52 prisoners captured when San Antonio was taken on September 11 were sent on ahead, on September 15. In addition, 15 more prisoners were taken last Sunday, September 18, after a bloody fight with Texian unit under Captain Nicholas M. Dawson.

Captain Dawson and 52 men from Fayette County were riding to reinforce Colonel Caldwell, who at that time was engaged in a major battle with Woll's troops. Informed of their coming, General Woll diverted a sizeable force with artillery to head

them off. The Texans were caught in fairly open land, unable to obtain good cover. Although their rifle fire kept the enemy at a distance, they were raked with cannon. Seeing that eight or ten of his men were killed and a number wounded, including himself, Dawson raised a white flag and rode toward the enemy. However, their fire continued, and he fell to the ground dead, his white flag riddled with bullet holes. The Mexicans then charged and massacred 36 of the Texans, taking the rest prisoner, except for two who escaped. Five of the prisoners were severely wounded by sword and lance cuts.

The fight with Caldwell's forces, which Dawson was trying to reinforce, had been raging all day at nearby Salado Creek. The Texian volunteers had gathered at Cibolo Creek, and by Saturday afternoon, September 17, they had about 210 men in camp. They elected Colonel Caldwell of Gonzales as their commander. He is widely known as "Old Paint." He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and served as a captain in the ill-fated Santa Fe Expedition. Captured and sent to Mexico with the others, he was released last June and returned to Galveston only last month. Although he had signed a pledge before his release never again to take up arms against Mexico, he felt that he had as much right as the Mexican Generals Santa Anna and Cox to disregard pledges signed under duress.

Midnight Saturday the Texans moved to Salado Creek, and selected a site next to a ravine which provided excellent cover. It looked out over a level prairie, and Caldwell hoped that the Mexicans might be tempted to use it as a field to put their cavalry into the fight.

In the early morning hours of Sunday, September 18, he dispatched Captain Hays with a company of mounted men to draw out the enemy. It was exactly one week, almost to the hour, from the time of General Woll's original attack on the town. Hays succeeded almost too well. He and his men rode back toward Salado Creek closely pursued by Mexican cavalry. General Woll, thinking he had trapped a small enemy force, sent 100 men after them, but they reported back that they needed reinforcement, since the Texans were in a strong position. Woll then sent out another 360 men with two pieces of artillery. Before leaving Mexico, Woll had been ordered not to attack Texans in a forest, but at Salado Creek he decided to do so.

After several skirmishes, Woll

brought up another 400 infantrymen, plus 40 Cherokees under the traitor Vincente Cordova, leader of the Cordova Rebellion at Nacogdoches in 1838, and since then working as a Mexican agent to the Indians. The Mexicans now had some 900 men against about 210 Texans.

The fighting began about an hour before noon and continued intermittently. It became more furious in the late afternoon, with considerable casualties. The Texans kept under cover, yelling out taunts and temporarily revealing themselves in an effort to provoke the Mexicans into an attack over the open prairie. In the late afternoon Woll received word of Captain Dawson's attempt to reinforce the Texans, and dispatched a contingent to counter them, with the results that have been noted.

At about 5 p.m. General Woll ordered "Assembly" to be sounded and pulled his troops back. He praised them in glowing terms and returned to San Antonio with his dead and wounded, and the 15 prisoners captured in the Dawson fight. The next morning a mass funeral was held in San Antonio.

Both sides have claimed victory in the Battle of Salado Creek. As

usual, statistics disagree. Woll had claimed 120 Texans known to be killed, plus perhaps some 60 more corpses "stretched out in the forest." Caldwell reported Sunday night after the battle that he had none killed and only 10 wounded. However, Sephen Jett, a San Antonian who had joined them that very day after escaping from the occupied town, was killed by Indians when he exposed himself against orders in trying to keep his horse from being stolen by them. Dawson's command, unfortunately, was completely wiped out—36 killed, including Dawson, 15 taken prisoner, and only two escaped.

Caldwell's report estimates 60 Mexicans killed and 120 wounded. Woll, on the other hand, claims that only 29 of his men were killed, and 58 wounded. San Antonians have reported that of the wounded Mexicans, 23 died the next day and were buried in the town.

For Texans, one important outcome of the battle is the death of the notorious Vincente Cordova, felled by a long-range shot by John Lowe, and later identified by A.C. Allen. Cordova has had a number of close calls in skirmishes with Texans during the past four years. The Battle of Salado Creek was his last.

## Harvest under way

Corn harvest is getting off to a slow start in Parmer County, due to the wet weather conditions.

Martin Chandler, director of the ASCS office of Farwell, says that they are expecting a fair to average corn crop this year. "It depends a lot on the weather," said Chandler, "If it warms up, crops could be very good."

Chandler stated, that harvest has not moved far enough along to make any predictions about the expected yields.

"The cotton crop is not expected to be very good unless the weather starts warming up," said Chandler.

Chandler says that grain sorghum looks like it could be real good, if weather conditions improve. "But if we have an early frost the yields may turn out low," he said.

The wheat crops are looking very good and are in excellent shape due to the good moisture, said Chandler.

Worley Mills of Farwell has reported its first load brought in by Doyle Johnson for Johnson, Mehler and Washington. The moisture content is averaging from 25.1 to 23.5.

Sherley-Anderson Grain in Lariat reported that they expect an average harvest, but not as good as

last year. Last year was an exceptional harvest, said John McFarland, assistant manager of the elevator.

The first load of corn was brought in by Steve Kaltwasser. He received a \$50 bonus. Darrell Stephens has also brought in some of the first loads. The moisture content is averaging about 22 and is weighing in at 56 pounds per bushel.

Sherley-Anderson-Pitman has also received some corn. Richard Haseloff and Jimmy Curtis have started bringing in their corn. Elmer Hargrove brought in the first load at the Farwell elevator. Moisture content is averaging from 22-25.

Sherley-Anderson Grain at Lazbuddie reported that their corn harvest has started. Kenneth McGehee received a \$50 bonus for bringing in the first load.

Scott Brown, manager of the elevator in Lazbuddie, has reported that the corn harvest has started off pretty good and that the moisture content is averaging from 24-25.

"The corn is heavy and so far the yields are looking pretty good, but maybe not as good as last year," said Brown.

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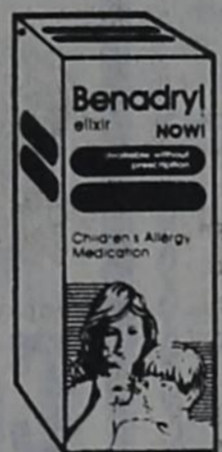
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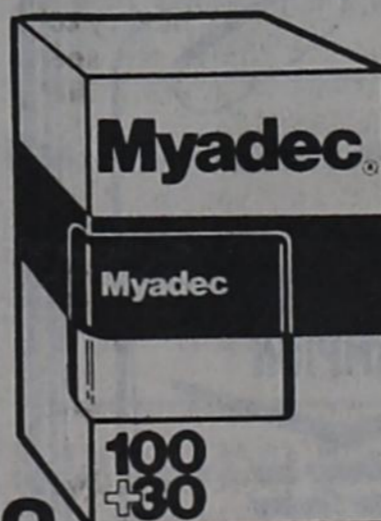
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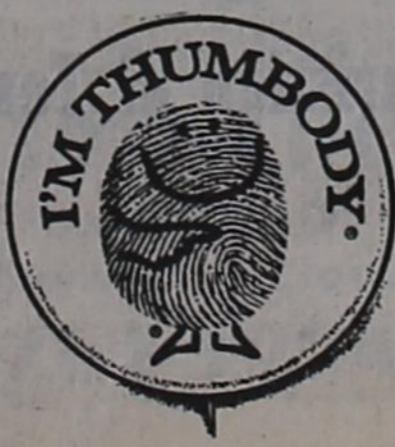
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# Williams, French wed

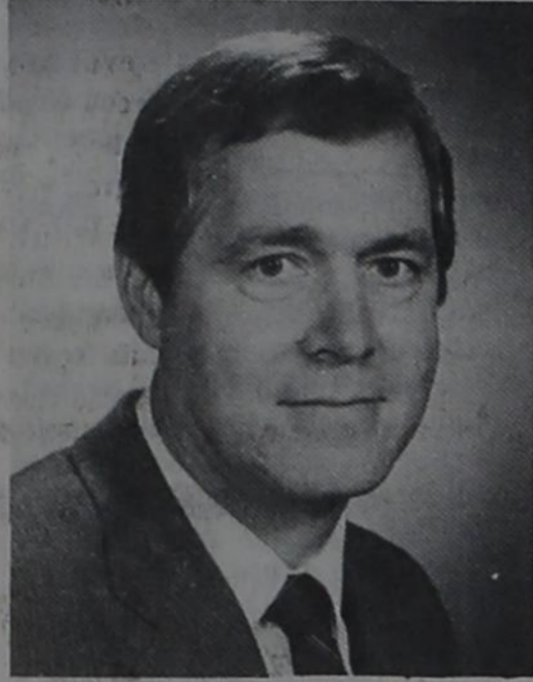
# Garner graduates from FBI National Academy

### Emergency response service begun

An Emergency Response Service is being set up by the St. John Lutheran Church at Lariat with the first training session scheduled to begin Oct. 1.

It is a program operated by the Lutheran Social Service of Texas. It gives elderly and disabled adults 24-hour access to emergency assistance.

Most elderly people wish to remain in their own homes or neighborhoods for as long as possible. Illness, disability and the inability to summon for help are of deep concern to the elderly, their friends and relatives. Consequently, some people have been prematurely institutionalized or forced to live with persons outside their familiar environment.

Emergency Response is a system using a device connected to a telephone. By pushing the button on the main unit or the hand-held unit, the person sends a signal to the Response Center, based at the Lutheran Church at Lariat. If the phone is not answered, designated friends or relatives are called on to investigate. Fire, police, or ambulance services can also be called if needed.

A 24-hour timer, if not reset daily,

sends a signal in the event a person is unconscious or unable to push the button to call for help.

The hand-held button works within 200 feet of the main unit that is plugged into the telephone. Therefore, people are able to go about their daily activities and still have the security of emergency assistance without having to get to the phone.

People use their units for a variety of emergencies: heart attacks, strokes, falls, emotional stress, robbery or assault.

This service will be available to homes in Farwell area after Oct. 1. Three or four persons have already placed their orders.

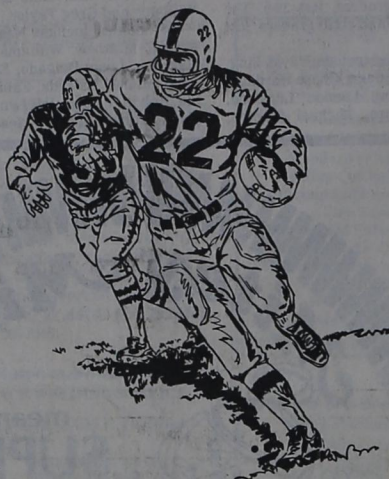
