and considerable illness. nd considerable illness. the Verein in Texas is Baron Ottfried Meusebach of Potsdam. he arrived last April, and has already become a Texas citizen, relinquish-
ing his German title and taking the name John $U$. Meusebach. He was sent to replace Prince Karl zu Solms-Braunfels, Texas in July, 1844.
Prince Karl's Prince Karl's mission was to
determine the suitability for determine the suitability for coloni-
zation of land contracted for by the Verein. On September 19, 1843, it agreed to take over the colonization contract of a Frenchman named
Alexander Bourgeois de'Oryanne Alexander Bourgeois de'Orvanne,
who accompanied Prince karl to Texas. This land was west of San Antonio, on the Uvalde, Frio and medina Rivers. However, the time limit for this grant had expired and
could not be renewed. On June 26 last year, the Verein Fissociated itself with Henry Francis Fisher, formerly Heinrich Fischer. Originally the German consul in
Houston, he had returned to Houston, he had returned to Ger-
many to serve as Texas consul in Bremen. His grant, in Fayette County, is with a partner, Buchard Miller, and is known as the fisher-
Miller land grant Miller land grant. Prince Karl
decided that it was too remote and unfit for farming.
Shortly after his arrival, Prince
Karl was surprised when esing Karl was surprised when a shipload of colonists appeared in Galveston
