Times sure have changed

It's always fun to look back at old city ordinances, regardless of where you live.

Texico is in the midst of updating their ordinances. They probably will get rid of some that no longer have any meaning, while altering others that need updating.

I got a copy of the list of ordinances last week and found them most interesting. What it showed was how a community can change over the years.

For example, among the earliest Texico ordinances was one listing "Bawdy House Regulations and Penalties." Kind of liberal, huh?

Later, though, came ordinances putting penalties on bawdy houses, and a prohibition against loitering in saloons on Sundays.

Still later came an ordinance prohibiting minors from entering saloons, then ordinances prohibiting gambling and requiring businesses to be closed on Sundays. Getting conservative.

Then came ordinances prohibiting card playing, public dances and drunkeness. Texico was changing.

More recent ordinances were ones you would expect, vacating certain streets and alleys, requiring health certificates for food handlers, etc.

Looking back at those old ordinances, especially ones from 1908, were most interesting.

Like the one on bawdy houses, ordinance No. 14. "It's unlawful for the master or mistress of any bawday house to permit any prostitute to remain in their place for a longer period than 24 hours unless the above named prostitute has a permit from the Clerk..."

See, even then, government had its hand in the till.

Here's another one from 1908:

"Any person who shall aid, countenance or assist in making any riot, disturbance or other improper diversion or shall fight in any public place in the said town or who

shall be guilty of indecent or immoral or insulting conduct, language or behavior in the street or elsewhere in the said town, or who may remain prostrate in the streets or elsewhere in the said town, and all persons who shall collect in crowds in said towns for unlawful purposes or to the annoyance or disturbance of the citizens, shall for every such offense be punished by a fine not less than \$5..."

Ordinance No. 1, the first ever passed in Texico, dealt with city scavenger and sanitary regulations. These included:

"All persons whether owners, renters, leesees or users of any property in the Town of Texico where there may be any privy or water closet are hereby required to clean and purify the same every 30 days or more often if necessary. Such purifying to be done at night and lime shall be kept and used in all water closets..."

- "It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit or throw or permit to remain any slops or waste water, feathers, refuse, rubbish, manure or other unwholesome thing in or upon these streets or alley and it shall be the duty of the scavenger of the Town of Texico to inspect said town regularly every 30 days ... "

The ordinance that brought the biggest smile to my face was Ordinance No. 2. It dealt with dogs running loose.

Some things don't change...

Did you hear the news of the huge hike in second class postage that goes into effect in April?

That means the Post Office is putting another huge bite

Arguelles faces drug charge

Pedro Puente Arguelles Sr., a former Farwell area resident who moved to rural Portales last year and lists his occupation as a horse trainer, was arrested March 19 in a major drug raid near Zapata, in southern Texas.

Arguelles, 53, has been charged with possession of narcotics with intent to distribute after law enforcement agencies raided a ranch and uncovered 535 pounds of pure cocaine, with a street value of \$90 million, according to Hobbs, N.M., Police Chief Steve Lasater.

Lasater said he believed it was the largest drug seizure ever in Texas.

Six persons were arrested in the raid by law enforcement personnel from Hobbs, Lea County, the FBI and Texas narcotics agents. Arguelles is being held in Laredo, Texas, without bond, pending a court appearance.

Lasater said 2 boats, 1 houseboat, 3 vehicles, 4 handguns and the ranch were

Lasater thanked the Parmer County Sheriff's Office for its cooperation in the 3-month investigation.

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said police began checking on Arguelles, who moved to a site just east of Farwell in 1982, in 1984. The checks intensified within the past 18 months. "People think you're not doing anything, but trying to get the big law enforcement people involved - who have the facilities -takes time," said Morgan. "We don't have the money to fly around and check all these things."

Morgan said he didn't believe major drug trafficking was taking place here. "They were staying clear of here," he said.

Morgan said the other law enforcement agencies would call his office and say, "We need this...' and we would try to comply. All the agencies worked together."

Texico disbands plan commission

The Texico City Council voted 2-1 Tuesday to disband the city planning and zoning commission.

In favor of eliminating the group were Doyal LaRue and Steve Chancy. Opposed was Butch Tharp.

Chancy explained that he felt the commission had done a very good job but that city residents expect the City Council to make decisions on variances so the commission is not necessary.

It was noted that the commission had problems getting a quorum.

After the vote, LaRue said he still had misgivings about completely eliminating the commission. LaRue suggested sending letters of appreciation to the former commission members. He then made a motion to establish a planning committee for longrange planning, but it died for lack of a second.

The council will use state guidelines on dealing with variance requests, including sending letters of intent to

adjacent property owners. In other business, the coun-

- Discussed the codification of city ordinances. City Attorney Duane Hamar has been putting the ordinances into booklet form. Soon, the council will go through the ordinances, deciding which ones to deleter and which ones to alter if necessary.

- Discussed a computer system for the utility billing. City employees will contact computer companies to look at their systems, then report back to the council. It's needed to go on line by July 1 when the utility rate hikes take effect.

- Heard a request from the Burger Barn for the alley to be cleaned in back of it. The city will clean its property.

- Received six bids for remodeling City Hall. They ranged from a high of \$40,140 to a low (by Heart Enterprises of Texico) of \$21,753. The council said that the specifications for the job hadn't been written adquately so all bids were rejected.

The council will try to get a person to help set up clearer requirements, then rebid the job.

Filing for the 3 three-year posts were Margaret Avcock.


Virginia Loera, Willie Roberts and incumbents Doyle Johnson and Steve Kaltwasser.

Blanton: Keep watch for Russian wheat aphids

The return of warm weather is bringing with it the return of the Russian wheat aphid.

Farmers across the High Plains need to keep close watch on their fields. The Russian wheat aphid first appeared in the U.S. in March of 1986 near Muleshoe. Since then it has spread into 14 western states of the Great Plains. Its economic impact on farmers in this area has been estimated at some \$50 million.

Dr. Tom Archer, research entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, has monitored research plots of Russian wheat aphids. Numbers of these pests declined during the cold winter months of January and February; however, they have curs following treatment, a increased significantly in the last three weeks. Populations are expected to continue to increase into May.

According to Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Russian wheat aphid overwinters on wheat and certain other host plants both as mature and immature females. There are no males in the population. They give birth to living young and therefore have the ability to reproduce rather rapidly.

In 1987, the aphid had a tremendous rate of increase during the month of April. The pest appears to more heavily infest stressed wheat and is

often worse in dryland wheat. Russian wheat aphids are often found at the base of the upper-most leaf of the tiller. Feeding by this pest causes leaves to roll together from the edges, concealing the aphids inside. Infested leaves and tillers develop long white streaks and may turn purple in response to Russian aphid feeding. This is the result of a powerful toxin injected into the leaves as the pest feeds.

Morrison said that economic treatment levels have not been determined for wheat grown in the U.S. A a general guideline is to consider treatment when 10 percent of the plants are infested at the growth stage when the first nodes of the stem are

If heavy reinfestation ocsecond application is recommended when the flag leaf is first visible and 10 percent of the tillers are infested.

Most damage is done between the time when the flag leaf first appears and the head is first visible. Treatment strategy is aimed at protecting the flag leaf because of the major contribution it makes to the eventual yield.

Growers need to consider grazing and yield potential when making treatment decisions. In some cases, it might not be profitable to treat with insecticides.

Over the last two weeks, I have has found Russian wheat aphid infestation of

5 to 80 percent in Parmer and Bailey counties. The pest was present in 90 percent of the fields scouted; however, the level of infestation varied from field to field.

Several registered systemic insecticides are effective in controlling the pest, Morrison said. Systemic insecticides are needed because the aphids are inside the curled leaves and are protected from contact insecticides. He urged growers to consult the insecticide label for small grain restrictions because grazing and pre-harvest intervals vary for each product.

on newspapers. And that means all newspapers will have to raise their rates to pay for the hike.

So when you get your next annual subscription bill and wonder why it's higher and where the extra money is going, look no further than the Post Office.

The March edition of Rural Electrification magazine has an article about Fisher County where local farmers are "farming" mesquite, cacti, and cotton burrs.

Instead of importing an industry from outside, the county leaders decided to build upon what was available in the county. They found that the native mesquite could be chipped, bagged, and sold to restaurants that feature mesquite-grilled steaks.

Cotton burrs could be fashioned into wreaths or compacted to make fireplace logs. Cactus and other native plants could be marketed to landscaping nurseries.

They also found that the abundant low cost housing in the area could be made into an attractive retirement area.

Each of the projects listed above used available resources without requiring large capital investments from outside the community. That means that potential profits from the project will remain in the community instead of going out of town.

Recently, we had the opportunity to learn about an industry which is being tried in the area - wineries.

Llano Estacado Winery is located near Lubbock, and La Escarbada XIT Winery is located in Hereford.

These wineries purchase grapes from growers within about a 60 mile radius of the wineries. Some growers are located within our readership

The wine industry in our area is a rather new one. Llano Estacado Winery started about a decade ago as a commercial experiment, and La Escarbada is newer than that. Since it takes grapes about 2 years to start producing and about 5 years to reach maturity, it is obvious that neither winery has had many seasons of production.

Both wineries have won awards for their products, and the wine from Llano Estacado has even been served at the White House.



This is a good time for everyone to review poison prevention in your households. Consider these facts. Each year an estimated 500,000 children will be the victim of accidental poisoning. Aspirin is the most common cause of accidental poisoning. Most poisonings occur while the product is in use. Below are some ideas to "poison proof" your home.

1. Keep household products and medicines out of reach and out of sight of children, preferably in a locked cabinet or closet. Even if you must leave the room for only an instant, remove the container to a safe spot.

2. Store medicines separately from other household products and keep these items in their original containers - never in cups or soft drink bottles.

3. Be sure that all products are properly labelled, and read the label before using.

4. Always turn the light on when giving or taking medicine.

5. Since children tend to imitate adults, avoid taking medications in their presence.

6. Refer to medicines by their proper names. They are not candies.
