This is a good time for everyone to review poison prevention in your households. Consider these facts. Each year an estimated 500,000 children will be the victim of accidental poisoning. Aspirin is the most common cause of accidental poisoning. Most poisonings occur while the product is in use. Below are some ideas to "poison proof" your home.
I. Keep household products and medicines out of reach and out of sight of children, preferably in a locked cabinet or closet. Even if you must leave the room for only an instant, remove the container to a safe spot.
2. Store medicines separately from other household products and keep these items in their original containers - never in cups or soft drink bottles.
. Be sure that all products are properly labelled, and read the label before using.
